DISSOLUTION OF THE REICH LIGHTING DISTRICT PAGE 2

DISCUSSION:

The Reich Lighting District was formed on May 9, 1978 by resolution of the Board of Supervisors. In 1991, the entire district was included in the Van Dusen-Terminal-Townsend Reorganization to the City of Riverbank. The district is bound by Townsend to the north and Terminal Avenue to the west. The district has operated two streetlights since its inception, with the power being provided by Pacific Gas and Electric.

Pursuant to Streets and Highways Code 19270, a resolution from the Riverbank City Council was necessary to initiate the dissolution of the district and for the transfer of the remaining district funds. On October 23, 2000, the City of Riverbank adopted Resolution No. 2000-109, which began the dissolution process for the Reich Lighting District.

With the acceptance of the resolution by the Board of Supervisors, the dissolution of the district will be complete and the transfer of the administration for these two lights and the remaining district funds will take place over the next 30 days.

POLICY ISSUES:

Under Government Code 19270, the dissolution of the district cannot become effective until filed with the governing body of the district. This action also addresses the Board goals of efficient government and multi-jurisdictional cooperation.

STAFFING IMPACT:

There are no staffing impacts associated with this agenda item.

Resolution No. 2000-109

A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Riverbank Dissolving the Reich Lighting District.

Whereas, On May 9, 1978, the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors formed the Reich Lighting District; and

Whereas, The entire district was included in the Van Dusen-Terminal-Townsend Reorganization to the City of Riverbank which was approved in 1991; and

Whereas, It is not cost effective to maintain the District, which consists of two street lights.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the City Council of the City of Riverbank does hereby dissolve the Reich Lighting District.
