- FISCAL IMPACT: funds for an extra-help Agricultural Assistant I and educational brochure publication costs. It is requested that new revenue and expenditure accounts be increased by \$11,858 for Fiscal Year 2000/01 and by \$16,485 for Fiscal Year 2001/02 to reflect this contract. State reimbursement will match Stanislaus County's expenditures.
- DISCUSSION: Locally, invasive weeds such as the Yellow Star Thistle, cause damage to valuable plants, crops and livestock. Noxious weeds, which extract nutrients and water from their surrounding environment, grow rapidly and spoil adjacent areas when left uncontrolled.

Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture is working cooperatively with San Joaquin and Merced Counties along with other private and governmental agencies through the Northern San Joaquin Valley Weed Management Area. The group has developed an Integrated Weed Management Plan for contracting with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to implement a work plan for the control of noxious and invasive weeds. Stanislaus County's portion of the plan is reflected in this contract. Monies expended for weed control cover Stanislaus County only, however we will share brochures and computer time with other members of the Weed Management Area. Some resources, such as GPS (Global Position System) units, will be purchased under other contracts by Merced or San Joaquin counties and shared with us.

Our contract involves three components, one for private landowners and another that reimburses Stanislaus Public Works for a portion of costs incurred in this fiscal year for Yellow Star thistle control work along public rights of ways. There is also a mapping element that documents the areas of infestation in the county, and an educational piece that consists of outreach to the public through the printing and distribution of brochures. Contract reimbursement for these activities is \$11,858 for the current fiscal year and \$16,485 for Fiscal Year 2001/02 for a total amount of \$28,348. It is requested that the Agricultural Commissioner's Revenue and Appropriations be adjusted to reflect this new state contract.

The Weed Management Area program has the potential to play an important part in the protection of valuable agricultural and recreational land in Stanislaus County. It is anticipated that funding for the program will be available for at least two more years

POLICY ISSUE: Approval of the Weed Management contract is consistent with the Board Priorities for a Safe and Healthy Community and represents Multi-Jurisdictional Cooperation and Protection of Economic Development.

STAFFING IMPACT:

Work performed under the proposed contract will be completed by one additional extra-help Agricultural Assistant I. All other work performed under this contract will be completed by existing staff.

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Northern San Joaquin Valley Weed Management Area Integrated Weed Management Plan

Introduction

The Northern San Joaquin Valley Weed Management Area (NSJVWMA) includes all of Merced, Stanislaus, and San Joaquin Counties. This area consists mostly of cultivated land, grasslands, and oak woodland at elevations from sea level to approximately 4,000 feet elevation. Total land area is over 3 million acres. Approximately half of this land is rangeland, irrigated pasture, or undeveloped. Ownership is primarily private with significant federal and state land (wildlife refuges, BLM, parks, reservoirs and other waterways).

In 1999, NSJVWMA was established for the purpose of working cooperatively to prevent, control, and, if possible, eradicate noxious weeds in the three counties. Currently, there are over 26 signatories to the memorandum of understanding. The signatories include federal, state, county, and city agencies, special districts, reclamation districts, cooperative extension offices, pest control professionals, and private land owners. NSJVWMA is currently operating under a Strategic Plan (1999-2005) which is updated annually. Key elements of the strategic plan are control projects, public education and outreach, inventory and mapping of infestations, and evaluation of effectiveness.

The Focus

The focus of this Integrated Weed Management Plan is to collaboratively perform integrated weed management activities specified in the NSJVWMA Strategic Plan. Integrated weed management is a systems approach to management of undesirable plants. Integrated weed management is defined in the Federal Noxious Weed Act as a "system for the planning and implementation of a program, using an interdisciplinary approach, to select a method for containing or controlling undesirable plant species or groups of species using all available methods, including education, prevention, physical or mechanical methods, biological control agents, herbicide methods, cultural methods, and general land management practices." It is a multi disciplinary, ecological approach to managing unwanted plant species.

During 2001, the NSJVWMA has decided to concentrate primarily on integrated management of yellow starthistle (YST) on public rights-of-way in the three counties. Key components will be public education about the YST problem, purchase of start-up equipment and first year survey of the YST infestation on public roads in the three counties, and augmentation of YST herbicide control programs currently underway by public agencies in the three counties.

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I. Control

Integrated weed management of yellow starthistle (Centaurea solstitialis)

Yellow starthistle (YST) is widely distributed throughout the three counties in the NSJVWMA. Infestation levels range from trace amounts to very heavy amounts. As a general rule, the heavier infestations occur in agricultural areas of limited development, such as, rangeland and irrigated pastureland. Public roads and other rights-of-way adjacent to rangeland and irrigated pastureland also tend to be heavily infested with YST. NSJVWMA's long range plan is to establish YST control programs throughout our rangeland and pastureland areas. During this first year, NSJVWMA has decided to concentrate our YST control efforts along public rights-of-way as well as encourage adjacent landowners to begin control programs on their private property. As YST control along public rights-of-way progresses, NSJVWMA intends to provide funding in future years to private landowners.

The three county agricultural commissioner offices are all active in establishing, maintaining, and spreading available YST biological control agents in their counties. In addition, several state and federal agencies have active biological control programs on their lands for YST. These biological control activities will continue during this fiscal year as in-kind activities.

Objective 1–YST Control Project-Private Landowners Since Stanislaus County Public Works is adequately funded for their roadside YST control program, The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture intends to initiate a YST control program on lands adjacent to roadsides that Public Works or Cal Trans crews currently spray and other rights of way that have the potential of spreading YST to unaffected lands. The program involves a commitment on the part of landowners for at least two thirds the cost of the chemical applications. For this reason the educational and promotional aspects of the project will be very important to the success of the program. The property operator receive reimbursement from Stanislaus county for one third the cost of a PCO's total charges or one third the cost of the chemical applied if weed control is performed by the applicant.

Action 1: Initiate year one of Yellow Star Thistle Weed Control Project for Private Landowners

Procedure: The property operator applies for the voucher at Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture. Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture Biologist/Inspector visits the applicant's property to prioritize the site and assure that YST is present. Once approved, the voucher is issued to the applicant. After the work is completed, the landowner sends a copy of the PCO's bill (or a copy of the chemical bill and pesticide use report, if doing the work himself), copy of the check, and the voucher. Stanislaus County rebates landowner one third of PCO's bill or one third the cost of the chemicals applied.

Choice of Treatment Method and Rationale: Transline is the least costly and most effective option for controlling heavy infestations of YST in the spring, other recommended chemicals may be used such as , 24-D amine or Glyphosate for late season treatments.

Task 1: Assessment of sites

County biologist will inspect sites to assure that YST is present, prioritize applications, issue vouchers and evaluate efficacy of the application. Success of treatment evaluated by quadrant sampling in at least 10% of the cases (before and after) and a visual percent cover estimate in all cases.

Evaluation 1: A log of hours will be recorded on a daily. A list of sites visited will be maintained Records detailing acres treated, location, a copy of original bill will be submitted to clerical for processing.

Task 2: Treatments with <u>recommended herbicide</u> Transline to 1000 to 1200 acres 1/3 subsidized cost, 2/3 landowner

Cost of chemical Transline, \$360.00 to \$390.00/ga average treatment @ 6 oz/acre: \$16.88/A to \$18.28/acre- \$6.00 to \$19.00 /acre

Cost of application: \$0 (grower applied costs not subsidized) to \$30.00/acre (PCO applied)

Task 3: Evaluation of treatment

Agricultural Biologists will sample 10% of the sites using quadrant sampling and /or photo points to evaluate efficacy of the applications. Visual cover estimates will be made on all sites.(See task one).

Task 4: clerical processing of vouchers.

Appropriate files of landowner participation in the program will be maintained for five years including acres treated, location, a copy of the original bill, and rebate check. A list of the participants and the amount of rebate will be submitted with the invoice to the California Department of Food and Agriculture.

II. Education and Outreach

Education is one of the best tools in preventing introduction and limiting further spread of noxious and invasive weed species, locating previously unknown and remote noxious weed populations, and in rallying support for controlling and eradicating infested sites. Public awareness will be raised through demonstrations, personal contact, and brochures to help to identify noxious and invasive weed species and control of those species.

Objective 1: The NSJVWMA will produce YST control brochures using existing University of California Cooperative Extension publications as the basis.

Action 1: Brochures will be distributed through Agricultural Commissioner Offices, University of California Cooperative Extension Offices, pest control dealer offices, public libraries, educational facility outreach programs, private and commercial applicator pest management update meetings, county fairs, and other means.

Project Evaluation 1: The number of brochures distributed will be recorded. Phone calls resulting from the brochures will be counted. Information received about noxious and invasive weed locations will be recorded for follow-up.

Objective 2: Develop and obtain materials for informational displays to be set up at county fairs, school fairs, presentations to elected officials, etc. This will provide excellent opportunities for NSJVWMA members to demonstrate the importance of noxious and invasive weed species control. It will also provide opportunity to learn of new locations of infestations and recruit new participants.

Action 1: Digital photos will be obtained showing noxious and invasive weed species and the impacts they have on the productivity of land. These photos and appropriate text will be assembled into posters which can then be displayed. As much as possible, NSJVWMA will provide in-kind personnel to present information and answer questions about noxious weed species.

Project Evaluation 1: Logs will be kept which will show the number of interested persons, feedback received, and in-kind hours expended.

Objective 3: The education and outreach committee of NSJVWMA will liaison with CDFA to provide information to keep our website information current. Information about upcoming meetings, displays, and outreach activities will be posted.

Action 1: Regularly supply CDFA with current NSJVWMA information. Include access information in brochures, posters, and displays described in Objectives 1 and 2.

III. Mapping and Inventorying

The Northern San Joaquin Valley Weed Management Area (NSJVWMA) believes that a strategic and long-term approach to noxious and invasive weed control is based on solid knowledge of the distribution of weeds in our 3 counties. To work towards accomplishing our NSJVWMA Strategic Plan (1999-2005), we propose to use SB1740 money for the purchase of four Global Position System (GPS) units and to hire seasonal employees to map and inventory yellow starthistle (YST) along roadsides. Other noxious weeds will be recorded while GPS mapping YST for inventorying at a latter date. A central repository of the data for the 3 counties will be created.

Roadsides are considered to be the major vector in the spread of YST onto private and public lands, thus both sides of roads within our counties will be surveyed and mapped. Knowing the location and extent of YST (our highest priority weed species) through mapping and inventorying will allow for the appropriate control strategy. Mapping where YST is not found is just as important as recording where it is found. Outlier populations of YST are important to identify because they may be easier to eradicate or stop further spread.

The items described below are only one part of the NSJVWMA Strategic Plan. This geographic information system (GIS) Project is part of a California-wide Noxious Weed Program coordinated by CDFA. All data will be in accordance with the mapping guidelines outlined by that Program. Data for the NSJVWMA will be obtained from many sources, including the GPS Weed Mappers. They will focus on areas prioritized by the NSJVWMA which do not have survey data already or areas that need to be re-surveyed.

Objective 1: Purchase 4 GPS units, to accomplish Objective 2.

Action 1: The NSJVWMA will purchase two educator 2-packs Trimble Geo Explorer 3 units with software and manuals in May 2001.

Evaluation: These units are consistent with the CDFA Noxious Weed Information Project. By partnering with University of California Cooperative Extension offices, reduced price educational units will be purchased. By doing this, we will be able to purchase 4 units at the reduced price for only a little more cost than purchasing 3 units individually at the regular price.

Objective 2: Hire seasonal employees (Weed Mappers) from within the 3 counties to map YST using a GPS. Each employee will work from one of the County Agriculture offices. A central repository of their data will be managed by each employee with oversight from the Mapping and Inventory Committee.

Action 1: The NSJVWMA will hire and train Weed Mappers and establish a work area in each County Agriculture Department Office.

Evaluation 1: Work areas are established and employees are hired.

Action 2: Gather existing digital data for each County to be included in the central repository.

Evaluation 2: A bi-weekly progress report to the Mapping and Inventory Committee.

Action 3: Survey and map roadsides previously not surveyed to be included in the central repository.

Evaluation 3: A log of hours and work conducted will be recorded daily. Maps will be made on a weekly basis of the areas surveyed illustrating the level of YST infestation.

BUDGET DETAIL AND PAYMENT PROVISIONS

1. Invoicing and Payment

1. 1

- A. For services satisfactorily rendered, and upon receipt and approval of the invoices, the State agrees to compensate the Contractor for actual expenditures incurred in accordance with the rates specified herein, which is attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement.
- B. Invoices shall include the Agreement Number and shall be submitted in triplicate not more frequently than monthly in arrears to:

2. Budget Contingency Clause

- A. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the State shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Contractor or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement and Contractor shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- B. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State, or offer an agreement amendment to Contractor to reflect the reduced amount.

3. Prompt Payment Clause

Payment will be made in accordance with, and within the time specified in, Government Code Chapter 4.5, commencing with Section 927.

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EXHIBIT D (Standard Agreement)

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Excise Tax

The State of California is exempt from federal excise taxes and no payment will be made for any taxes levied on employees' wages. The State will pay for any applicable State of California or local sales or use taxes on the services rendered or equipment or parts supplied pursuant to this Agreement. California may pay any applicable sales and use tax imposed by another state.

2. Settlement of Disputes

In the event of a dispute, Contractor shall file a "Notice of Dispute" with the CDFA within ten (10) days of discovery of the problem. Such Notice of Dispute shall contain the Agreement number. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such Notice of Dispute, the Agency Secretary, or Designee, shall meet with the Contractor and the CDFA project manager for the purpose of resolving the dispute. The decision of the Agency Secretary or Designee shall be final. In the event of a dispute, the language contained within this Agreement shall prevail over any other language including that of the bid proposal.

3. Evaluation of Contractor

Performance of the Contractor under this Agreement shall be evaluated. The evaluation shall be prepared on Contract/Contractor Evaluation Sheet (STD 4) and maintained in the Agreement file. For consultant agreements, a copy of the evaluation will be sent to the Department of General Services, Office of Legal Services, if it is negative and the agreement amount is over \$5,000.

4. Agency Liability

The Contractor warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Contractor for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, the State shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work actually performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

5. Potential Subcontractors

If Contractor subcontracts out a portion of the work required by this Agreement, nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between the State and any subcontractors, and no subcontract shall relieve the Contractor of his responsibilities and obligations hereunder. The Contractor agrees to be as fully responsible to the State for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the State's obligation to make payments to the Contractor. As a result, the State shall have no obligation to pay or to enforce the payment of any moneys to any subcontractor.

6. <u>Right To Terminate</u>

The State reserves the right to terminate this agreement subject to 30 days written notice to the Contractor. Contractor may submit a written request to terminate this agreement only if the State should substantially fail to perform its responsibilities as provided herein. However, the agreement can be immediately terminated for cause.
