DISCUSSION: The goal of the Information and Education (I&E) Program is to decrease teen and unintended pregnancies by providing educational programs with an emphasis on primary prevention that enhances knowledge, attitudes, and skills of males and females of childbearing age to make responsible decisions relevant to their sexual and reproductive health.

The Health Services Agency's I&E Program for 1997-2002 will concentrate its efforts on high-risk youth in and out of school, between the ages of 12-17. The primary objective is to have a sphere of influence in reducing teen pregnancies, repeat pregnancies, sexually transmitted infections, and supporting students who have chosen to abstain from sexual activities.

The program will be delivered to students from elementary, junior high and high schools in Stanislaus County, as well as at Juvenile Hall, Probation and alternative schools.

POLICY

ISSUES: The Board of Supervisor's approval of the I&E Program will enable approximately 2,500 at-risk youth in Stanislaus County to receive pregnancy prevention educational services.

2. Paragraphs 2.a. and 2.b. of Exhibit A(S), entitled <u>PURCHASING/PROCUREMENT</u> <u>RULES</u>, are amended to read as follows:

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- "a. Units of local government, public entities (including the Universities of California and California State University and auxiliary organizations/foundations thereof), and state or federal agencies, whether acting as a contractor and/or subcontractor, may use their existing procurement systems to secure all articles, supplies, equipment (e.g., nonexpendable items with a unit cost of \$5,000 or more and a useful life expectancy of one year or more, including EDP/ADP, telecommunications, and motor vehicles), and services related to such purchases that are required in performance of this contract, without regard to dollar limit, subject to the provisions in paragraphs e through i of this section. The provisions in paragraphs b, c, and d of this section may also apply, if purchases are subdelegated to subcontractors that are nonprofit organizations, for-profit entities or private vendors.
- b. All other entities (nonprofit organizations, for-profit entities, or private vendors), whether acting as a contractor or subcontractor, may use their existing procurement systems to secure articles, supplies, equipment (e.g., nonexpendable items with a unit cost of \$5,000 or more and a useful life expectancy of one year or more, including EDP/ADP, telecommunications and motor vehicles), and services related to such purchases that are required in performance of this contract. Equipment procurement shall not exceed an annual maximum limit of \$50,000, subject to the provisions in paragraphs c through i of this section. The provisions in paragraph a of this section may also apply, if purchases are subdelegated to subcontractors that are units of local government, public entities, state or federal agencies."
- 3. Paragraphs 3.a. and 3.e. of Exhibit A(S), entitled <u>OWNERSHIP/ DISPOSITION/</u> <u>INVENTORY OF EQUIPMENT PURCHASED,/REIMBURSED WITH CONTRACT</u> <u>FUNDS OR FURNISHED BY THE STATE</u>, are amended to read as follows:
 - "a. All equipment with a unit cost of \$500 or more and a life expectancy of more than one year and certain theft sensitive items (regardless of cost), purchased/ reimbursed with contract funds or furnished by the State under the terms of this contract and not fully consumed in performance of this contract shall be considered state equipment and the property of the State.
 - e. Equipment purchased/reimbursed with contract funds or furnished by the State under the terms of this contract, shall only be used for performance of this contract."

- 4. This provision supplements provision 22 appearing in Exhibit A(S) entitled "Additional Provisions".
 - A. Unless otherwise indicated in this agreement, no amendment or variation of the terms of the agreement shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties hereto, and approved, as required. No oral understanding or agreement not incorporated herein is binding on either of the parties.
 - B. Should either party, during the term of this agreement, desire a change or amendment to the terms of this Agreement, such changes or amendments shall be proposed in writing to the other party, who will respond in writing as to whether the proposed changes/amendments are accepted or rejected. If accepted and after negotiations are concluded, the agreed upon changes shall be made through the State's Official agreement amendment process. No amendment will be considered binding on either party until it is formally approved by the State.
- 5. The following is added to Paragraph 2, entitled <u>CONTRACT EXHIBITS AND</u> <u>DEFINITIONS</u>, as subparagraph 2.A.(4.6):
 - "(4.6) Exhibit B, entitled "Scope of Work Year 5, 01-02", dated July 1, 2001, consisting of five pages."
- 6. The following is added to Paragraph 2, entitled <u>CONTRACT EXHIBITS AND</u> <u>DEFINITIONS</u>, as subparagraph 2.A.(7.6):
 - "(7.6) Exhibit C, entitled "Budget Year 5", 01-02, dated July 1, 2001."
- 7. The following is added to Paragraph 3, entitled <u>MAXIMUM AMOUNT PAYABLE</u>, as subparagraph 3.C.6:
 - "C.6. The maximum amount payable under this agreement for services rendered during fiscal year 2001-2002 (July 1, 2001 June 30, 2002) shall not exceed \$75,000."
- 8. Paragraph 3, entitled <u>MAXIMUM AMOUNT PAYABLE</u>, subparagraph D is increased by \$75,000 and amended to read as follows:
 - "D. The maximum amount payable under this agreement shall not exceed \$375,000."
- 9. Paragraph 3, entitled <u>MAXIMUM AMOUNT PAYABLE</u>, subparagraph F, sentence 1 is amended to read as follows:

- "F. If funding for fiscal years 1998-99, 1999-00, 2000-01 or 2001-02 is reduced or deleted by the Governor, Legislature, or court orders, for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either:"
- 10. The following is added to Paragraph 8, entitled <u>ADDITIONAL TERMS</u>, as subparagraph 8.G:
 - "G. Contractor certifies that it has appropriate systems and controls in place to ensure that state funds will not be used in the performance of this contract for the acquisition, operation or maintenance of computer software in violation of copyright laws."
- 11. The following is added as Paragraph 18, on page 8.
 - "18. CHILD SUPPORT COMPLIANCE ACT
 - A. For any contract in excess of \$100,000, the contractor acknowledges in accordance with, that:
 - 1. The contractor recognizes the importance of child and family support obligations and shall fully comply with all applicable state and federal laws relating to child and family support enforcement, including, but not limited to, disclosure of information and compliance with earnings assignment orders, as provided in Chapter 8 (commencing with section 5200) of Part 5 of Division 9 of the Family Code.
 - 2. The contractor, to the best of its knowledge, is fully complying with the earnings assignment orders of all employees and is providing the names of all new employees in the New Hire Registry maintained by the California Employment Development Department.
 - 3. Questions about the New Employee Register and reporting requirements are to be directed to the California Employment Development Department.
- 12. All other terms and provisions of said agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
