FISCAL IMPACT: (Continued)

H. Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter \$ 444,379

It is requested that revenue and appropriations for Glassy-Winged program expenditures be increased in the amount of \$203,243 for Fiscal Year 2001/02 to reflect the additional contract amount granted by the state. The original estimate included in the Fiscal Year 2001/02 Budget was in the amount of \$241,136 and an adjustment is therefore requested to reflect the total contract amount of \$444,379. State reimbursement will match Stanislaus County's expenditures.

The following represents an <u>expenditure</u> of budgeted County General Funds:

- I. Wildlife Services \$ 32,100
- DISCUSSION: A. <u>Egg Quality Control</u>: (California Department of Food and Agriculture) This contract provides reimbursement for enforcement of egg quality standards. This includes retail monitoring, wholesale inspection, wirebasket enforcement and surveillance of eggs to USDA standards. The egg quality agreement has been in effect for many years. It provides industry funds for what has been paid fully by county general funds in the past. The contract amount is \$24,500.
 - B. <u>Pest Detection</u>:

(California Department of Food and Agriculture)

Pest prevention is a critical, long-term program. Detection trapping is a vital part of the prevention effort. Our most serious pests are not native to this area but have been introduced and allowed to gain a foothold. The trapping program targets pests with the most serious potential, such as Medfly. If we detect incipient infestations, we can eradicate them before they become established. We have been involved in this program for a number of years. This effort is of enormous benefit to the County's agriculture. The contract amount is \$ 64,221.

C. <u>Pesticide Use Enforcement</u>:

(California Department of Pesticide Regulation) This agreement provides reimbursement for enforcement of pesticide regulations adopted under Chapter 308, Statutes of 1978. The pesticide regulatory program has been in place for many years. This contract partially pays for increased activity mandated in 1978. Other sources of revenues for the pesticide program include: Mill Tax on pesticide sales; partial Pesticide Dealers License Rebate; Registration Fees for Pest Control Operators, Pest Control Advisors, and Pilots; and various other contracts such as Pesticide Use Reporting and Residue Monitoring. The total contract amount is \$115,333.

D. <u>Pesticide Application Reporting</u>

(California Department of Pesticide Regulation) Since Fiscal Year 1990/91, the California Department of Pesticide Regulation has contracted with Stanislaus County for the electronic submittal of Pesticide Use Reports. Under this program, Stanislaus County receives the Pesticide use Reports and enters the data in a format which is readily accessible to the State. The current contracts provide that information on both agricultural and non-agricultural chemical usage will be available to the State of California.

In 1996/97, this program was expanded to include CEDTS (California Electronic Data Transfer System). This system allows growers and pest control operators to electronically submit their required paperwork directly to the counties. The counties then review this data and electronically submit it to the Department of Pesticide Regulation. As a result, paperwork is vastly reduced. Stanislaus County currently has CEDTS in place, however, other counties still need to implement this system. A portion of the contract amount includes travel time and salary expense for our Systems Coordinator, Gordon Sweeny, to provide the necessary technical support to other counties, enabling them to activate CEDTS. The total contract amount is \$53,700.

E. <u>Marketplace Surveillance</u>

(California Department of Pesticide Regulation)

This contract provides funds to the Agricultural Commissioner's Office for pesticide residue sampling. The residue sampling program was enhanced several years ago in response to public concern about food safety. Under the terms of this contract, samples are taken of raw, dried, or processed commodities known to have been treated with a specific pesticide. The samples are collected at the time of harvest and are delivered to the California Department of Pesticide Regulation for analysis. Very few samples contain any residues in violation of safety standards. The safety of our food supply is evidenced by this effort. Work performed is paid for on a sample-by-

Marketplace Surveillance (Continued)

sample basis. For the current fiscal year, 48 samples are scheduled at a reimbursement rate of \$88.21 per sample. The total contract amount is \$4,234.

F. <u>High Risk Pest Exclusion</u>

(California Department of Food and Agriculture)

Inspectors with the Office of the Agricultural Commissioner have been performing pest exclusion inspection activities for years. In fiscal year 1999/00, the State of California began providing funding to the counties to enhance high-risk pest exclusion activities. This contract enhances the department's routine inspections by putting a greater emphasis on high-risk shipments at terminals (such as UPS and Federal Express) flea markets, exotic fruit markets and incoming truck and moving van shipments. A "high-risk" shipment is one where a high degree of likelihood exists that one or more serious plant pests will be introduced into the state or county by movement or entry of the shipment. This inspection process strives to ensure the detection and exclusion of plant pests and/or plant pathogens which have been determined to be serious and/or have the potential for causing severe damage to the state or county agricultural industry, natural resources or the environment. The contract amount is \$32,909.

G. <u>Weed Management</u>

(California Department of Food and Agriculture)

Locally, invasive weeds such as the Yellow Star Thistle, cause damage to valuable plants, crops and livestock. Noxious weeds, which extract nutrients and water from their surrounding environment, grow rapidly and spoil adjacent areas when left uncontrolled.

In March of 2001, the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors approved the Weed Management Area contract for Fiscal Year 2000/01 in the amount of \$3,000. Since not all the weed management activities were performed during Fiscal Year 2000/01 due to time constraints, the state has extended the reimbursement through Fiscal Year 2001/02 with this contract amendment. Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture is working cooperatively with San Joaquin and Merced Counties along with other private and governmental agencies through the Northern San Joaquin Valley Weed Management Area. The group has developed an Integrated Weed Management Plan for contracting with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to implement a work plan for the control of noxious and invasive weeds. The Weed Management Area program has the potential to play an important part in the protection of

> <u>Weed Management</u> (Continued) valuable agricultural and recreational land in Stanislaus County. The contract amount is \$ 3,000.

<u>Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter</u> (California Department of Food & Agriculture) The Agricultural Commissioner's Office has developed an action plan to combat the detrimental effect of the Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter (GWSS) and the associated destructive Pierce's disease. Retail nurseries, wholesale nurseries as well as urban and rural locations are monitored for the presence of the Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter. This contract provides for the supplies and personnel services required to continue an ongoing detection program. The Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter program and contract are critical for the protection of the agricultural industry in our County.

In the previous fiscal year, Stanislaus County received reimbursement in the amount of approximately \$400,000. The contract for Fiscal Year 2001/02 reimburses Stanislaus County in the amount of \$444,379 for Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter program costs and activities. Since the projected Fiscal Year 2001/02 Budget estimate for revenue and appropriations in the GWSS program was \$241,136, it is requested that the Agricultural Commissioner's Revenue and Appropriations be adjusted to reflect this increased state contract. The contract allows for the continued operation of the GWSS program which includes 12 extra-help Agricultural Assistants and necessary field, office and computer equipment and supplies, and associated training expenses.

I. <u>Wildlife Services</u>

H.

(United States Department of Agriculture)

This agreement provides for animal damage management on properties within Stanislaus County. Efforts are made to reduce, terminate and prevent predation and damage to livestock, crops and other property caused by damaging birds and mammals. This work is accomplished by a Wildlife Specialist employed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The total cost for one staff year for the Wildlife Specialist is \$64,200. The County cooperative share is \$32,100. Funds have been budgeted so that the services of the Specialist can be devoted full-time to Stanislaus County, thus enhancing the quality of service provided to our customers. The total County General Fund commitment amounts to \$ 32,100.

- POLICY ISSUE: Approval of these contracts will enable the Agricultural Commissioner's Office to oversee and enforce programs which protect the public as well as the agricultural industry and is consistent with the Board Priority for a Safe and Healthy Community and represents Multi-Jurisdictional Cooperation and Protection of Economic Development
- STAFFING IMPACT: No additional permanent staff will be necessary. The Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter contract allows for the hiring of 12 extra-help Agricultural Assistants.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF FOOD AND AGRICULTURE (CDFA) EGG QUALITY CONTROL PROGRAM AND COUNTY AGRICULTURAL COMMISSIONER (County) 2001/2002

I. AGREEMENT

(a) Pursuant to the California Food and Agricultural code and the California Code of Regulations, CDFA and the County hereby create an Agreement whereby CDFA will disburse funds as provided in this agreement to the County for costs incurred in Egg Quality Control activities.

II. DURATION, AMENDMENTS, AND CANCELLATION

- (a) This Agreement is effective and binding from July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002.
- (b) The County's Activity Plan will be amended each fiscal year.
- (c) All amendments to this document must be in writing and with the consent of both parties.
- (d) Either party may unilaterally cancel this Agreement by giving the other party 30 days written notice.

III. CDFA PAYMENTS FOR COUNTY ACTIVITIES

(a) Under the terms of this Agreement, the County will receive payments upon submission of completed Form 9s, as appropriate for the following functions:

1) Retail inspection; 2) Production inspection; 3) Wholesale inspection; 4) Wirebasket Enforcement (production only).

- (b) Disbursements will be made in four block payments: For work completed from July 1 to September 30, October 1 to December 31, January 1 to March 31, and April 1 to June 30.
- (c) Federal surveillance shall be paid at actual cost in accordance with federal guidelines consistent with cost recovery guidelines provided by the federal government. Payments will be made upon submission of completed quarterly "Surveillance Report", PY 156, PY 76, and PY 76-1.
- (d) Penalties: Any penalty imposed by the County for violations of the laws shall remain in the County imposing the penalty.

IV RESPONSIBILITIES

Agreement No. 01-0025 Exhibit A AHachment I

The State shall:

- (a) Coordinate the training and technical supervision of inspectors/biologist employed by the County.
- (b) Provide the County with inspection forms, noncompliance books, worksheets, hold-off-sale tapes, Report Form 9s, PY 76, PY 76-1 and PY 156s.
- (c) Provide for the collection of the necessary fees from the egg industry or through the Federal Trust Fund.

The County shall:

- (a) Maintain work records for each inspector/biologist on a daily basis, showing service performed under this Agreement together with copies of egg inspection worksheets that show the quality of eggs inspected, eggs rejected, and the number of 100 egg samples inspected. Copies of the worksheet will be given to the plant management after each inspection.
- (b) Submit completed Forms 9s (monthly), quarterly "Surveillance Report", PY 156, PY 76, and PY 76-1 during the first month following the quarter for which the charges accrue.
- (c) Maintain all records for a period of three years after final payment.
- (d) Permit the State to inspect such books, records, accounts, and other materials relevant to this Agreement.
- (e) Furnish the necessary inspection equipment, transportation, office space, supplies, and support services for carrying out the inspection work under this Agreement.
- (f) Use only Federally-licensed personnel to inspect eggs for USDA surveillance.

The State and County agree:

- (a) Quarterly payments in arrears will be made as outlined in the Assigned Work Activity Display for production, wholesale, retail inspections, and wirebasket enforcement.
- (b) To receive the maximum payments for production, wholesale and retail inspections, the minimum number of 100 egg samples must be inspected. If the minimum number of 100 egg samples are not inspected by the end of each quarter for production and wholesale, and by the end of the fiscal year for retail inspection, payments will be made at the specified rate per sample.

- (c) The appropriate State or Federal supervisor may observe the actual inspection of eggs in the County at any time where work is being done under this Agreement.
- (d) All certified and/or licensed inspectors shall adhere to the California Codes, Egg Inspection Manuel, Shell Egg Regulatory Inspectors Handbook, and program enforcement policies.
- (e) State and County personnel will keep each other informed of issues pertaining to inspections made pursuant to this Agreement.
- (f) In the performance of services, the State shall be responsible for any liability resulting from negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of its officers, agents, and employees, and the County shall likewise be responsible for their acts or omissions.
- (g) This Agreement may be canceled in part if funding by the USDA for federal surveillance is terminated. Payment shall be made for work performed up to this effective date.
- (h) That if the Budget of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this contract does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the State shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to the County or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement, and the county shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of the Agreement.

V FEDERAL SURVEILLANCE

- (a) The Federal supervising inspector will issue federal licenses to such qualified inspectors as may be employed by the County for federal surveillance work.
- (b) Inspections performed under this Agreement are to determine compliance with USDA standards. Except as provided in (c) below, these inspections performed may not be claimed under (Production, Wholesale, and Retail Inspections and Wirebasket Enforcement).
- (c) Inspections that comply with USDA standards but fail State standards shall be rejected for failing to meet State standards. Rejected lots may be claimed under production egg inspection.

VI WIREBASKET ENFORCEMENT

- (a) The County shall perform wirebasket enforcement, which will be conducted at the same time that production inspections take place.
- (b) To receive maximum payments for wirebasket enforcement, the minimum number of 100 egg samples must be inspected by the County at the time of production.

- (c) The State shall also pay for wirebasket enforcement that necessitates additional hours (rounding to the nearest half hour).

These are:

- (1) Hours spent conducting wirebasket related office hearings; and/or
- (2) Hours spent performing wirebasket inspections where five or more noncompliances have been served to any one handler.
- (d) Payments for additional hours will be included in the quarterly payments.

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS, GTC-201

EXHIBIT D (Standard Agreement)

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Excise Tax

The State of California is exempt from federal excise taxes and no payment will be made for any taxes levied on employees' wages. The State will pay for any applicable State of California or local sales or use taxes on the services rendered or equipment or parts supplied pursuant to this Agreement. California may pay any applicable sales and use tax imposed by another state.

2. Settlement of Disputes

In the event of a dispute, Contractor shall file a "Notice of Dispute" with the CDFA within ten (10) days of discovery of the problem. Such Notice of Dispute shall contain the Agreement number. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such Notice of Dispute, the Agency Secretary, or Designee, shall meet with the Contractor and the CDFA project manager for the purpose of resolving the dispute. The decision of the Agency Secretary or Designee shall be final. In the event of a dispute, the language contained within this Agreement shall prevail over any other language including that of the bid proposal.

3. Evaluation of Contractor

Performance of the Contractor under this Agreement shall be evaluated. The evaluation shall be prepared on Contract/Contractor Evaluation Sheet (STD 4) and maintained in the Agreement file. For consultant agreements, a copy of the evaluation will be sent to the Department of General Services, Office of Legal Services, if it is negative and the agreement amount is over \$5,000.

4. Agency Liability

The Contractor warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Contractor for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, the State shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work actually performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

5. Potential Subcontractors

If Contractor subcontracts out a portion of the work required by this Agreement, nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between the State and any subcontractors, and no subcontract shall relieve the Contractor of his responsibilities and obligations hereunder. The Contractor agrees to be as fully responsible to the State for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the State's obligation to make payments to the Contractor. As a result, the State shall have no obligation to pay or to enforce the payment of any moneys to any subcontractor.

6. <u>Right To Terminate</u>

A servicing is an inspection of the trap for the presence of the target pest. THIS REPORT MUST BE SUBMITTED WITH THE MONTHLY INVOICE FOR THE SAME TIME PERIOD.
- I. Provide one set of trapping records for all traps. This set, in the form of a "trapbook", will indicate the exact trap location using a site map and all information regarding servicing, baiting, and relocation of traps.
- J. Maintain county wall maps gridded into numbered square miles, depicting density of all traps deployed.
- K. Allow state detection personnel and/or federal PPQ officers to perform quality control inspections on all county trap lines including any specified county commitment trap lines.

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Excise Tax

The State of California is exempt from federal excise taxes and no payment will be made for any taxes levied on employees' wages. The State will pay for any applicable State of California or local sales or use taxes on the services rendered or equipment or parts supplied pursuant to this Agreement. California may pay any applicable sales and use tax imposed by another state.

2. <u>Settlement of Disputes</u>

In the event of a dispute, Contractor shall file a "Notice of Dispute" with the CDFA within ten (10) days of discovery of the problem. Such Notice of Dispute shall contain the Agreement number. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such Notice of Dispute, the Agency Secretary, or Designee, shall meet with the Contractor and the CDFA project manager for the purpose of resolving the dispute. The decision of the Agency Secretary or Designee shall be final. In the event of a dispute, the language contained within this Agreement shall prevail over any other language including that of the bid proposal.

3. Evaluation of Contractor

Performance of the Contractor under this Agreement shall be evaluated. The evaluation shall be prepared on Contract/Contractor Evaluation Sheet (STD 4) and maintained in the Agreement file. For consultant agreements, a copy of the evaluation will be sent to the Department of General Services, Office of Legal Services, if it is negative and the agreement amount is over \$5,000.

4. Agency Liability

The Contractor warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Contractor for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, the State shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work actually performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

5. Potential Subcontractors

If Contractor subcontracts out a portion of the work required by this Agreement, nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between the State and any subcontractors, and no subcontract shall relieve the Contractor of his responsibilities and obligations hereunder. The Contractor agrees to be as fully responsible to the State for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the State's obligation to make payments to the Contractor. As a result, the State shall have no obligation to pay or to enforce the payment of any moneys to any subcontractor.

In the best interests of the State, and under authority of the Director, the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR), Pest Management & Licensing (PML) Branch and the County of Stanislaus agree to the following:

All pesticide use records submitted to the County shall be reviewed against the grower's current permit and shall be reviewed for accuracy of the information. After said review, the County shall submit to DPR, all production agriculture and monthly summary pesticide use report applications for the period July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002 meeting the data requirements as stated herein on a monthly basis. (CalTrans data should <u>not</u> be sent by the County to avoid duplication.)

Data must be submitted on either 3-1/2" or 5-1/4" floppy disks or via electronic mail or the Internet. A summary of the number of records contained on each file must be included. Each file shall be clearly identified with the following information -- county name, application month and year, file name, number of records, and if it is being sent on a disk it must also include the disk number.

For both production agriculture and monthly summary data, the file name shall consist of eight (8) characters: the first position will be a letter; the second and third positions shall be the county number; the forth and fifth positions shall be the batch number; the sixth and seventh positions shall be the application year; and the eighth position is the disk sequence number.

Each file shall include data for one calendar year only. Data for overlapping years may be on a single disk, but each year shall be in a separate file and labeled appropriately.

Data must be readable by MS DOS version 2.11 or greater.

Data must be submitted in a flat or ASCII file.

Data must be in the format provided by PML, as identified in this exhibit.

Commodity codes must be from the 'Most Common Commodity Codes' list as provided by PML and identified in this exhibit. As necessary, changes will be made to this list and copies will be forwarded to the County.

All submissions will be verified by PML. A summary of the accepted data and a listing of the rejected applications will be sent to the County for review. Rejected submissions shall be corrected and resubmitted on hardcopy to PML. It is understood by PML that not all rejected submissions are correctable due to product label language vs the label database, and this will be taken into consideration for tracking purposes. Verifications may include, but are not limited to the following:

- any appropriate correction to the invalid record
- request to delete the record
- statement that a NOV was issued
- statement of compliance with the label (this will be verified by PML)

Contracts for the 2001/2002 FY are based on the average number of applications submitted in 1998 and 1999. (Contracts for the next fiscal year will be based on the average of 1998 through 2000 applications; and, subsequent contracts will be based on a three-year average also.) This number times 30 cents is the amount of the contract. Under this agreement, equal quarterly payments will be made in arrears upon receipt and approval of invoice as stated below. If it is noted that a county is deficient in sending PUR data, payment will be withheld until receipt of said data.

- 1st payment will be one fourth of the contract amount payable by January 1 of the year following the applications for July, August, and September
- 2nd payment will be one fourth of the contract amount payable by April 1 of the year following the applications for October, November, and December
- 3rd payment will be one fourth of the contract amount payable by June 15 of the same year following the applications for January, February, and March
- 4th payment will be one fourth of the contract amount payable by September 1 of the same year following the applications for April, May, and June.

The County shall maintain and make available for audit by the state all records pertaining to this contract for a period of three years after the payment of each apportionment received as a result of this agreement.

This agreement shall be effective for the period beginning July 1, 2001 and terminating June 30, 2002.

This agreement may be amended or canceled upon written mutual consent, upon thirty (30) days written notice.

The total amount of this agreement shall not exceed \$53,700.

In this event, the State shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Contractor or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement, and Contractor shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.

If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either, cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State, or offer an Agreement amendment to Contractor to reflect the reduced amount.

Contracts are based on an anticipated total yearly number of applications which are prorated for each county based on the average number of pesticide use reports submitted by that county from 1998 through 1999. EXHIBIT A. AGREEMENT SPECIFICATIONS FOR Marketplace Surveillance Program

ARTICLE I. SAMPLES

"Sampling" includes not only obtaining the sample in accordance with this protocol but also packing, storing, and transporting the sample in accordance with this protocol within the time frames specified.

Marketplace Surveillance Program

The Marketplace Surveillance Program is a regulatory program designed to monitor compliance with pesticide laws and help ensure that any detected pesticide residues are within the established tolerance levels. This commodity-based program will provide useful residue data for dietary risk assessment.

The 2001-2002 contract will focus on the following fresh, raw agricultural commodities: apricot, broccoli, cantaloupe, carrot, celery, cherry, citrus (orange, lemon, and grapefruit), corn (sweet), nectarine, pea (succulent), pear, pepper (bell), plum, potato, strawberry, tomato, and watermelon. These commodities are to be collected from point-of-origin sites. Point-of-origin sites includes: fields, packinghouses, coolers and packing sheds. In addition, samples can be collected from Farmer's Markets and roadside stands. Twelve samples must be collected in one day and delivered to the laboratory within 24 hours of collection.

All commodities will be run through a multi-residue screen (organophosphate, carbamate, and chlorinated hydrocarbons) to detect a total of more than 200 pesticides, metabolites, and breakdown products. All samples collected in the 2001-2002 Marketplace Surveillance Program contract will be analyzed for illegal residues. State and county staff will coordinate follow-up to illegal residues. Possible detection of multiple pesticide residues on a given commodity will provide useful information to evaluate the cumulative effects of residues that have a common mechanism of toxicity.

The sampling schedule is listed in Exhibit A. The county must collect twelve samples each sampling day. There may be instances when the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR) may have to postpone or cancel a sample collection day(s). DPR reserves the right to change this schedule. Should scheduled sample days require modification, notification by DPR shall occur within 24 hours prior to the schedule sample day.

If the county is unable to collect the commodity identified on any sample collection day, this shall be reported to the <u>Pesticide Enforcement Branch Food Safety Coordinator</u>. A minimum of 24 hours notice is required prior to sampling. DPR will assign an alternate sampling site. Alternate sites include wholesale, retail, chainstore, or point of entry collection sites located in your county. If an alternate collection site is assigned, DPR will fax or e-mail the appropriate collection site sampling protocol.

The county must collect twelve samples each sampling day. Failure to meet this requirement could result in termination of this contract.

ARTICLE II. SAMPLING PROTOCOL

Collection

Point of origin samples shall be collected at packing time only.

Training

County agricultural commissioner personnel who collect samples to fulfill this Agreement shall be trained in the sampling protocol. Training shall be provided by the appropriate regional office and conducted on an as-needed basis. Any samples collected by untrained staff will not be accepted for analysis. Samples must be delivered to the California Department of Food and Agriculture's Center for Analytical Chemistry Laboratory in the appropriate regional area by 7:30 a.m. following the sample collection day.

Sample Schedule

Twelve produce samples will be collected on each collection day. If the county is unable to collect the commodity identified on any sample collection day, this shall be reported to the <u>Pesticide Enforcement Branch Food Safety Coordinator</u>. A minimum of 24 hours notice is required prior to sampling. DPR will assign an alternate sampling site.

 The county must collect twelve samples each sampling day. Failure to meet this requirement could result in termination of this contract.

Guidelines for Field Sampling

Collect samples in the field site at packing time. Samples are to be collected from the box, bin, or carton, not from the tree or plant. These commodities are to be fresh, not spoiled or decayed.

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Ensure that the commodity is not destined for processing. The **minimum sample size is two pounds**. Spoiled, decayed, and underweight samples will not be accepted for analysis or reimbursement. Do not duplicate a sample from the same site for a specific commodity. One site per grower will be allowed on any given delivery day.

Complete the Produce Sample Analysis Report form (PR-ENF-002 Rev. 2/96), writing clearly and legibly. Place the sample number on the paper bag ensuring the number matches the Produce Sample Analysis Report. Avoid soiling the Produce Sample Analysis Report. Place the sample in clean double-strength paper bags. Do not place samples directly in plastic bags as these bags may contain substances which can be absorbed by the sample, causing misleading laboratory results. If the sample is wet, use two paper bags. Transport the samples to the laboratory in ice chests chilled with blue ice or dry ice.

Collect a composite sample from one individual lot. Use the following chart as a guideline.

Exception: Collect three melons regardless of the lot size.

Guidelines for Packinghouses/Packing Sheds/Coolers Sampling

When collecting from a packinghouse, packing shed, or coolers, ask the manager or responsible person if any of the produce will be receiving any pesticide treatment. If the commodity is going to receive post-harvest treatment, collect the sample at the end of the packing line after washing and trimming has been completed and the produce is in the final stages of packing for shipment. Do not sample from bins that have commingled produce.

If the commodity is not going to receive a pesticide application, sample the produce at the front end of the packing line. When sampling from bulk lots, do not strip outer leaves from a commodity. Collect the sample from the bins or truck. When sampling from a bulk container, collect a composite sample from one individual lot. <u>Ten subsamples constitute a composite</u>

<u>sample from a bin or truck</u>. Melons are an exception. When sampling melons from a bulk container, always collect three. Use the following chart as a guideline. The sample is to represent the "site." Do not duplicate a sample from the same site for a specific commodity. One site per grower will be allowed on any given delivery day.

Exception: Collect three melons regardless of the lot size.

Commodities sampled are to be fresh, not spoiled or decayed. Ensure that the commodity is not destined for processing. The **minimum sample size is two pounds**. Spoiled, decayed, and underweight samples will not be accepted for analysis or reimbursement. Complete the Produce Sample Analysis Report form (PR-ENF-002 Rev. 2/96), writing clearly and legibly. Place the sample number on the paper bag ensuring the number matches that on the Produce Sample Analysis Report. Avoid soiling the Produce Sample Analysis Report. Place the sample in a clean double-strength paper bag. Do not place samples directly in plastic bags as these bags may contain substances which can be absorbed by the sample, causing misleading laboratory results. If the sample is wet, use two paper bags. Transport samples in ice chests chilled with blue ice or dry ice.

Notification and Duplicate Samples

If the owner of the commodity, the packer, or a representative is available at the time of sampling, he/she should be notified that their commodity is being sampled. When sampling is complete, the owner of the commodity should be provided with a copy of the Produce Residue Analysis Report.

Sampling Protocol for Farmer's Markets and Roadside Stands

Collect samples from commodities that are packed and ready to sell. The minimum sample size is two pounds. Spoiled, decayed, and underweight samples will not be accepted for analysis or reimbursement. Collect one sample at a time. Complete the Produce Sample Analysis Report, writing clearly and legibly. Place the sample number on the paper bag, ensuring the number

matches the Produce Sample Analysis Report. Avoid soiling the Produce Sample Analysis Report forms. Place samples in clean, double-strength paper bags. Do not place samples directly in plastic bags as these bags may contain substances which can be absorbed by the sample, causing misleading laboratory results. If the sample is wet, use two paper bags.

Equipment

The following equipment should be carried or available when collecting samples:

Rubber gloves Knife/shears Felt tip marker with indelible ink Small and large paper bags/cardboard boxes Plastic bags/trash can liners Zip-lock storage bags Styrofoam ice chest/insulated coolers Blue ice/dry ice Wide package sealing tape Produce Sample Analysis Report forms (PR-ENF-002, Rev. 2/96)

Sample Preservation

Samples should be kept as cool as possible following collection and handled in such a way as to avoid bruising. Samples should be placed in a cooler with blue ice.

Paper bags and/or cardboard boxes should be used to collect samples. Write the sample number (not to exceed eight characters) on the outside of the paper bag. Complete the Produce Sample Analysis Report (PR-ENF-002, Rev. 2/96), seal it in a zip-lock bag, and attach it to the bag

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containing the sample. Place the paper bag inside a large plastic bag or trash can liner to keep the sample from getting wet during handling or shipping. Do not put the sample directly into plastic bags. Plastic causes sweating and chemical analysis problems. Place the sample in the ice chest on blue or dry ice, and then seal the lid of the ice chest with wide package sealing tape.

Sample Transport

Always maintain the integrity of your samples. After collection and during transport to the laboratory, be sure to keep the samples separate from areas in your vehicle that may be contaminated with pesticide residues. When loading samples into your vehicle, be sure to place easily crushed samples, such as strawberries and cherries, on top of heavier samples. Samples should always be placed in a cooler with blue ice during transport. If samples are stored prior to delivery to the laboratory, they should be refrigerated to prevent deterioration and degradation of any possible pesticide residues.

Samples must be delivered by 3:30 p.m. the day the samples were collected or by 7:30 a.m. the following morning. If the samples cannot be delivered in person, they should be shipped by a courier service that guarantees next-day delivery to the California Department of Food and Agriculture's Center for Analytical Chemistry in the appropriate regional office or regional area.

ARTICLE III. AGENCY RESPONSIBILITY

DPR shall, through the appropriate Pesticide Enforcement Branch Regional Office,:

- A. Provide technical assistance and training to county agricultural commissioner personnel on sampling procedures and completing a Produce Sample Analysis Report (PR-ENF-002, Rev. 2/96). Upon request by county, training shall be provided to county personnel by each regional office.
- B. Provide the county agricultural commissioner by phone or facsimile of the results of all contract samples found to contain illegal residue(s).
- C. In the event of an illegal residue case, DPR will coordinate follow-up.
- D. Ensure that samples meet the requirements in this Agreement.

The county agricultural commissioner shall:

A. Obtain twelve samples as specified in the Sampling Schedule FY 2001/02.

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- B. Ensure that all samples are accompanied by a properly completed Produce Sample Analysis Report (PR-ENF-002, Rev. 2/96). Samples with Produce Sample Analysis Reports which are not properly completed will not be accepted. Sample identification shall not exceed eight characters.
- C. Ensure personnel attend training provided by DPR's Regional Office for Marketplace Surveillance Program sampling.
- D. Ensure that all sampling procedures follow those outlined in Article II, Sampling Protocol.
- E. Allow DPR to perform quality control of the county sampling program.
- F. Allow DPR to accompany samplers. This may constitute field training for county personnel as well as a quality control check.
- G. Arrange for transportation of all samples to the California Department of Food and Agriculture's Center for Analytical Chemistry in the appropriate regional office or regional area, assuring that the samples arrive on the day designated in a manner suitable for analysis with <u>two</u> Produce Sample Analysis Reports (PR-ENF-002, Rev. 2/96) (original and copy) for each sample.
- H. Contact the Pesticide Enforcement Branch Food Safety Coordinator if the county is unable to collect a commodity identified on any sample collection day. A minimum of 24 hours notice is required. DPR will assign an alternate sampling site. The county must collect twelve samples each sampling day. Failure to meet this requirement could result in termination of this contract.
- I. Be responsible for maintaining the "chain of custody" since Agreement samples are "official" samples. Samples shall be under county control at all times until relinquished.
- J. If requested by DPR, the contractor will issue a "Quarantine," "Produce Hold Order," or "Red Tag" on any produce shown to carry an illegal pesticide residue. If requested by DPR, the contractor will verify the disposal/destruction of any produce that carries an illegal pesticide residue. The completed disposal permit will be faxed to DPR's Regional Office in the contractor's area.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK Criteria for Work Plan

The County of Stanislaus agrees to perform high-risk inspection and enforcement activities for the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) in compliance with the requirements imposed by Chapter 573 (AB 1771), Statutes of 2000, Food and Agricultural Code Section 2282.5, and County High-Risk Pest Exclusion Program Guidelines incorporated in this scope of work.

The County will perform activities approved by the CDFA as described in the attached Estimate of High-Risk Pest Exclusion Activities included in Exhibit B, Budget, and by this reference made a part hereof. Definitions of the key high-risk activities can be defined as follows:

Inspection work at US Postal Distribution Centers, United Parcel Service Facilities, Federal Express Facilities, and Air Freight Facilities can include, but is not limited to County biologist(s) reviewing invoices for content origin/destination, checking packages for quarantine compliance, rejecting parcels that do not adhere to quarantine compliance, inspecting for high-risk pests, i.e., red imported fire ants, Japanese beetles, flower thrips, etc.; daily record keeping of inspections in regard to pest finds, writing reports referencing Report 4 and Report 4a to reflect daily record keeping entries, notifying the Senior Agricultural Biologist of the presence of any significant pest finds, etc.; gypsy moth (008a) requires County biologist(s) to visit residence or storage facility to inspect household items for high-risk pests as defined above; Truck Referrals (008) Plants and Truck Referrals (008) Misc. requires County biologist(s) to visit receivers of products to inspect for pests considered to be high-risk as defined above, after hold notices are received from the border stations; specialty markets and swap meets require County biologist(s) to visit the markets to determine if products are being sold that do not meet the quarantine entry requirements; Post-Entry quarantine inspections require County biologist(s) to inspect plant material to determine if it is infested with high-risk pests as defined above; and other high-risk terminals which can include, but is not limited to maritime terminals, airport terminals, bus terminals, pet stores, aquatic plant dealers, etc., requires County biologist(s) to continue to enforce quarantine requirements at these facilities in the same manner as all activities listed above.

As quarantine areas and commercial channels change, County biologist(s) shall determine the need to redirect high-risk activities in other areas as needed.

The County's biologist(s) shall determine the time of day and week the inspections are to occur. If a County finds it necessary to deviate from its approved Work Plan, said County will notify the Pest Exclusion High-Risk Program of any changes.

Exhibit A Scope of Work Criteria for Work Plan

Itemized invoices and Report 4a's shall be submitted within 30 days after the end of the reporting period. Invoices shall be submitted to the CDFA contract Manager in accordance with the sample provided herein and identified as Attachment 1. All monthly reports shall be submitted on Form #66-092a to the CDFA contract Manager (see Attachment 2 for sample).

COUNTY HIGH RISK PEST EXCLUSION PROGRAM ESTIMATED WORK PLAN GUIDELINES

PROGRAM DEFINITIONS

High-Risk Shipments: are those where there exists a high degree of likelihood that one or more "A" or "Q" rated plant pests will be introduced into or spread within the State by movement or entry of the shipment. "A" and "Q" rated plant pests have been determined to have potential for causing severe damage to the State's agricultural industry, natural resources, or environment, and as such any shipment likely to harbor such pests is considered high-risk. <u>All high-risk shipments are to be inspected</u>. <u>Non-high-risk parcels</u> ("Flower of the Month Club" bulbs, bare-root nursery stock from areas which do not represent a serious quarantine risk, plant materials from California origin with nursery certification, etc.) moving through a "high-risk" facility may be monitored via profiling and inspected as time allows during the premise visit. These shipments <u>will not be included as "high-risk" shipments inspected</u>. High-risk shipments which should be inspected include such items as cut flowers and nursery stock from quarantine areas, any plant materials in unmarked parcels, and other plant material shipments which have a historical record of "A" and "Q" rated pest interceptions.

High-Risk Pathways: those facilities where high-risk shipments are regularly or frequently intercepted. The known high-risk pathways have been listed on the Estimate of High-Risk Pest Exclusion Activities, including U.S. Postal Distribution Centers, UPS (except local), Federal Express, Air Freight, Air Freight Forwarded, Truck Referrals (008a-Gypsy Moth, 008-Plants & 008-Other), Specialty Markets, Swap Meets, Post Entry Quarantine, and "Other" pathways identified in your work plans and approved by the Department.

Shipments Inspected: Shipments physically opened and examined. This is not packages or pots inspected. A shipment is one lot of plant material sent from one shipper to one receiver via one mode of transport.

Rejections: Number of state level rejection notices written. This does not include rejections of materials for failing to meet nursery standards of cleanliness, or materials rejected for B or C rated pests. Any time a live A or Q rated pest is found in a shipment a rejection notice should be issued.

Pest Interceptions: Number of "A" and "Q" pest interceptions. When more than one pest species is found in a single shipment, each different species is to be counted as an interception. Finding more than one pest of the same species does not equate to multiple interceptions.

U.S. Post Office: Postal distribution centers formerly known as sectional centers that sort mail sealed against inspection (first-class, priority, and express mail parcels).

United Parcel Service (except local service): Facilities which process parcels shipped via overnight or expedited service versus facilities that process only parcels moving locally.

Air Freight: Air cargo shipments inspected at the airport facility or at destination (see next item).

Air Freight/Forwarded: Shipments allowed to proceed to destination or another location for inspection within the same county or to another county and under a warning hold notice (blue tag) or by compliance agreement authorization.

Truck (008a): Shipments of historically high-risk household articles from historically high-risk areas that require inspection for gypsy moth.

Truck (008-Plants & 008-Other): High-risk shipments moving to destination under quarantine hold notice. This does not include blue-tagged intrastate shipments of nursery stock inspected for glassy winged sharpshooters.

Post-Entry Quarantine Inspections: These inspections include both site and plant inspections. A shipment should be recorded when plant material is inspected.

Other: This column is to be used to estimate the workload for any high-risk pathway not already listed on the form; these may include: pet stores or aquariums, express parcel carriers, sea freight forwarded or other special focus activities approved by the Department. Special focus activities are then to be described under "Special Focus Description".

ACCOUNTING GUIDELINES

Program cost estimates for high-risk exclusion activities conducted at optimal levels are to be estimated based upon the guidelines and definitions contained within the County Agricultural Commissioners' Annual Financial Statement Procedures Manual. This cost/hour figure is to be estimated from an average of the costs/hour for Fiscal Years 1997/98, 1998/99 and 1999/2000. A county may choose to use their established County Auditor approved hourly rate in lieu of the three- year average. This would be the rate charged an applicant for phytosanitary or other type of certification if such a rate is established.

PROGRAM GUIDELINES

- 1. All inspections of high-risk terminal points are to be conducted as close to optimal service levels as is fiscally possible.
- 2. Optimal service level inspections are those conducted during the sort time(s) or before the last critical dispatch(s) of the facility monitored.
- 3. All high-risk shipments are to be inspected. Shipments not presenting a high risk that are moving through a high-risk facility may be monitored and inspected as time permits but should not be included as a program cost or counted as a measure under this work plan.
- 4. <u>A shipment is any amount of agriculturally regulated product/packages/potted plants from</u> one specific shipper, in one shipment, sent to one specific consignee.

EXHIBIT D (Standard Agreement)

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Excise Tax

The State of California is exempt from federal excise taxes and no payment will be made for any taxes levied on employees' wages. The State will pay for any applicable State of California or local sales or use taxes on the services rendered or equipment or parts supplied pursuant to this Agreement. California may pay any applicable sales and use tax imposed by another state.

2. Settlement of Disputes

In the event of a dispute, Contractor shall file a "Notice of Dispute" with the CDFA within ten (10) days of discovery of the problem. Such Notice of Dispute shall contain the Agreement number. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such Notice of Dispute, the Agency Secretary, or Designee, shall meet with the Contractor and the CDFA project manager for the purpose of resolving the dispute. The decision of the Agency Secretary or Designee shall be final. In the event of a dispute, the language contained within this Agreement shall prevail over any other language including that of the bid proposal.

3. Evaluation of Contractor

Performance of the Contractor under this Agreement shall be evaluated. The evaluation shall be prepared on Contract/Contractor Evaluation Sheet (STD 4) and maintained in the Agreement file. For consultant agreements, a copy of the evaluation will be sent to the Department of General Services, Office of Legal Services, if it is negative and the agreement amount is over \$5,000.

4. Agency Liability

The Contractor warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Contractor for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, the State shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work actually performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

5. Potential Subcontractors

If Contractor subcontracts out a portion of the work required by this Agreement, nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between the State and any subcontractors, and no subcontract shall relieve the Contractor of his responsibilities and obligations hereunder. The Contractor agrees to be as fully responsible to the State for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the State's obligation to make payments to the Contractor. As a result, the State shall have no obligation to pay or to enforce the payment of any moneys to any subcontractor.

6. <u>Right To Terminate</u>

The State reserves the right to terminate this agreement subject to 30 days written notice to the Contractor. Contractor may submit a written request to terminate this agreement only if the State should substantially fail to perform its responsibilities as provided herein. However, the agreement can be immediately terminated for cause.

RESPONSE/CONTROL PROGRAM FOR PIERCE'S DISEASE AND ITS VECTORS

STANISLAUS COUNTY

May 15,2001

Objective

To implement an intergovernmental, coordinated state and community-wide plan to provide detection and delimitation of the glassy-winged sharpshooter (GWSS) in Stanislaus County and suppress or eradicate any populations as rapidly as possible.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Lead Agency

The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture (SCDA) is the lead agency and is designated by the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors as the local public entity to conduct the Pierce's Disease Control Program (PDCP) within the County. The California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) will work in cooperation with the SCDA, the State PDCP Science Advisory Panel, officials in affected counties, the Stanislaus County PDCP Task Force, and other interested parties in implementing this plan. The CDFA will provide biological control program guidance and support to Stanislaus County as favorable agents become available.

County Responsibilities

- Act as lead agency for the PDCP activities occurring within the jurisdiction of the county.
- Act as lead liaison to local City Councils, the County Board of Supervisors, county legal counsels, and other county agencies, regarding the PDCP activities.
- Promptly conduct all delimitation and intensive surveys in the county. Additional survey staff may be contracted from the California Conservation Corps. The CDFA will provide on-site expertise, as needed.
- Provide status reports on the results of all surveys, including detailed maps of the surveyed area and infested properties.
- Select appropriate treatments, notify residents, and identify any sensitive sites within the proposed treatment area.
- Direct and coordinate pesticide applications.
- Conduct post-treatment monitoring.

ELEMENTS

Delimitation Survey

The SCDA will immediately conduct a delimitation survey upon discovery of an infestation. The purpose of the survey is to quickly determine the extent of the infestation. The survey will be conducted in accordance with established CDFA protocols. Records of properties surveyed and results of the survey (both positive and negative) will be accurately kept.

Intensive (Property-by-Property Survey)

Following the delimitation survey, the SCDA will complete an intensive survey of all properties within the delimited area to identify the full extent of the infestation.

- Develop and maintain working host records during this intensive survey.
- Develop detailed maps or block folders (property-by-property) of the surveyed and infested area.

Treatment Options

The following treatment information is based on the option of treating all known infested properties. It is intended as a guideline and may be modified to adapt to local and/or changing situations. At all stages of the program, an assessment will be made as to the probability of success. For example, if GWSS is found to be infesting a very large area or is infesting wide areas of sensitive habitat, the SCDA will immediately consult with the CDFA to determine the preferred course of action.

Treatment Material Selection

A list of registered materials will be reviewed to determine the most appropriate to use based on: 1) registered use as a general treatment for residential plantings; 2) registered on most plant species known to be hosts (feeding and oviposition) for GWSS; and 3) known to control leafhoppers.

Threatened/Endangered Species/Environmentally Sensitive Areas

The SCDA and the CDFA will identify any threatened/endangered species and/or environmentally sensitive areas within the proposed treatment area before treatments begin. If needed, appropriate mitigation measures will be developed, in consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the California Department of Fish and Game, and the CDFA, for these sensitive areas. The SCDA will notify all registered beekeepers near the infested area of the GWSS treatment activities.

Public Outreach

The SCDA will act as lead spokesperson for the PDCP activities within the County. The SCDA, in cooperation with the CDFA, will generate press releases and distribute information to all affected communities.

- A telephone help line will be established and staffed to answer calls concerning the PDCP activities. Non-English speakers may be required to adequately staff this help line. The help line will also be coordinated to include public health and animal health information.
- Informational meetings will be held to advise homeowners and other interested parties of treatment activities.

The CDFA will develop technical information and provide technical support and training, assist in the development and dissemination of literature, and act as a clearinghouse for information to the public and the press.

Medical/Veterinarian Information

The SCDA will contact the Stanislaus County Health Officer (SCHO) with details of any proposed treatment. If the SCHO has questions about public health aspects of the program, Dr. Peter Kurtz, CDFA's Senior Medical Coordinator, can be contacted at (916) 654-1211.

Questions relating to Animal Health will be referred to CDFA's Animal Health and Food Safety Services at (916) 654-1447. A "Veterinary Fact Sheet" may be prepared and provided for questions relating to pets or livestock.

Pre-Treatment Notification

Pre-treatment notification will be conducted through the local news media and by door-to-door notification.

- Notices will be in languages appropriate to the affected community and will include information regarding material used, precautions, date of application, and a telephone number and contact for the PDCP staff.
- Notices will be given "door-to-door" to infested properties and adjacent properties.

General Treatment Procedures

Treatments will begin following the intensive survey and after all help lines and community relations measures have been taken. Maintenance of good community relations will be essential. All pesticide applications will be made by certified Pest Control Operators under the direction of the SCDA. Pesticides will be used according to registration and label directions. Sound pesticide safety procedures will be followed.

- Number of applications: Minimum of two.
- Interval: As allowed by label.
- Rate: Follow label directions.
- Post-treatment notice with re-entry statement and pre-harvest interval for treated fruits/vegetables.
- Treatment crews will be properly trained and equipped according to established CDFA protocols for treatment of residential properties.
- Property treatment records will be kept.
- The SCDA will ensure that all treatment activities are in compliance with all pesticide laws and regulations.

Environmental Monitoring

The CDFA, in cooperation with SCDA, will arrange for environmental monitoring to be conducted by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (CDPR), Environmental Monitoring/Pest Management Branch. The SCDA personnel will work closely with environmental monitoring personnel to identify suitable sites. The following may be monitored

- Surface water, turf, foliage, available fruits and vegetables, outside air and tank mix.
- Identified sensitive areas.

Additional monitoring may be necessary if needs are identified. However, if sufficient data are gathered indicating no adverse environmental impacts, the environmental monitoring may be modified or deleted from the program. This decision will rest with the CDFA and the SCDA.

Post-Treatment Monitoring

An assessment of the GWSS populations will be conducted on a limited number of selected properties throughout the treatment area to determine the overall effectiveness of the treatments.

- Pre-treatment sampling will be conducted and counts of the GWSS will be made to determine numbers of the GWSS life forms.
- Post-treatment sampling will be conducted using the same protocols to ascertain effectiveness of the treatment(s).

SURVEY PLAN

The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture will utilize the CDFA GWSS Statewide Survey Protocols as its survey protocol. These guidelines include minimum requirements to conduct a survey program. The county will submit a written justification (either via e-mail or correspondence) to the Branch Chief of the Pierce's Disease Control Program to request approval to deviate from the GWSS Statewide Survey Protocols.

ENFORCEMENT OPTIONS AND AUTHORITIES

The Pierce's Disease Control Program (PDCP) regulations establish the standards for the movement of nursery stock, bulk grapes, and citrus from infested areas to non-infested areas (Section 3658-3660, Title 3, California Code of Regulations). These regulations were established to prevent the artificial spread of glassy-winged sharpshooter (GWSS).

The statutory authority for these regulations is Sections 6045, 6046, and 6047, Food and Agricultural Code (FAC). To enforce these provisions, the Secretary or Agricultural Commissioner is empowered to conduct inspections and investigate any suspected violations; each Commissioner is an enforcing officer for all laws and regulations to prevent the spread of plant pests and to certify shipments of plant material as to its pest freedom.

The FAC provides several options for enforcement of the requirements of the PDCP regulations. This flexibility allows enforcement actions chosen as a result of a violation(s) to be proportionate to the nature/severity of the violation with progressive enforcement for repeat violators.

- Any violation of applicable provisions of FAC Division 4, Plant Quarantine and Pest Control, is an infraction punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 for the first offense and a misdemeanor for a second or subsequent offense within three years (Section 5309, FAC).
- Except where otherwise expressly provided, a violation of any provision of this division is a misdemeanor (Section 5027, FAC). In addition to other remedies provided, any person violating the PDCP regulation requirements can be civilly liable up to \$10,000 for each violation; in lieu of any civil action, the Secretary or Commissioner may level a civil penalty for up to \$2,500 for each violation (Section 5310, FAC).
- Anyone who negligently or intentionally violates a regulation and imports a GWSS-infested plant that results in an infestation, or the spread of an infestation may be civilly liable in an amount up to \$25,000 for each violation [Section 5028(c), FAC].
- It is unlawful to sell any nursery stock without a valid nursery license (Section 6721, FAC). The Secretary can revoke or suspend a nursery license if a nursery has willfully refused to comply with all laws and regulations relative to any pest that might be carried by nursery stock (Section 6761, FAC).
- It is unlawful for anyone to ship, sell, deliver or transport nursery stock in California without either a Hold for Inspection ("blue tag") or a valid nursery stock certificate (Sections 6922 and 6923, FAC). The Commissioner may revoke or suspend the right to use any nursery stock certificate or other shipping permit because of non-compliance (Section 6968, FAC). It is unlawful to alter or otherwise misuse any shipping permit or nursery stock certificate (Section 6927, FAC).
- > Any one receiving or moving any nursery stock must notify the Commissioner immediately upon arrival and hold the nursery stock for inspection unless it is accompanied by a valid

nursery stock certificate. Some counties have elected to waive that exemption and require GWSS host plant material entering the county (or non-infested area of a county) to be accompanied by a Warning Hold For Inspection certificate (Section 6505, FAC). In this case, it is unlawful even to move nursery stock within a county without forwarding a manifest specified by Section 6925 and 6926, FAC.

- To facilitate the investigation of violations, proof of ownership is required of any person buying, selling, or transporting a shipment of plant material intended for commercial sale and it is unlawful for any person to alter any proof of ownership document (Sections 5030 and 5031, FAC).
- Under the PDCP regulations, all host plants of GWSS moving from an infested area to a noninfested area must be certified free of GWSS (Section 5721, FAC; Sections 3060.2, 3060.4 and 3659, CCR). Certification can be based on surveys confirming non-infested status, inspection, or by approved treatment. It is unlawful to alter or otherwise wrongfully use a certificate (Section 5208, FAC).
- The Secretary or Commissioner may enter into compliance agreements to facilitate the movement of host plant material. The compliance agreement provides the survey, treatment, and handling requirements necessary to assure freedom from GWSS. Violation of the provisions of a compliance agreement is unlawful and any person that violates the provisions of a compliance agreement can also be held liable civilly for up to \$10,000. Remedies provided here do not supersede or limit any and all other remedies available to the State (Section 5705, FAC).
- If a shipment of nursery stock moving *intrastate* is found to be infested with GWSS, or there is reasonable cause to believe that the shipment may be infested, a warning hold order may be placed on the shipment (Section 6521, FAC) specifying the treatment, abatement or return requirements. Similarly, a warning hold may be placed on a shipment *entering* the state if it is found to be infested with GWSS, or there is reasonable cause to believe that the shipment may be infested, with GWSS. It is unlawful, except by written permission, to move or divert, any plant shipment placed under a warning hold order without written permission. It is unlawful to remove, destroy, or otherwise alter any warning hold order (Section 6303, FAC).
- If or when GWSS is found infesting any location, the Secretary or Commissioner may require that any plant, or other GWSS host, be held at that location, and may require any host within five miles of that location be held as well (Section 5701, FAC). It is unlawful to move any plant or host in violation of a hold order.
- Any location, plants, or other things found infested with GWSS can be considered a public nuisance and may be prosecuted as such and any remedies provided by law for the prevention and abatement of a public nuisance will apply. It is unlawful for any person to maintain a public nuisance. The remedies provided here are in addition to any other applicable remedies (Sections 5401 and 5402, FAC).

STANDARDS AND RESTRICTIONS

This workplan does not include any variations from the standards set by law. If the Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture (SCDA) and the Stanislaus County PDCP Task Force find that there is clear and convincing evidence to support a more stringent standard than is set by regulation, then the SCDA will notify the CDFA and provide detailed justification as to the need for the more stringent standard.

WORKPLAN ASSURANCES

- 1. The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture's planned producer outreach and training program in accordance with Food and Agricultural Code Section 6046(h)(1) will be coordinated with CDFA. The development and delivery of producer outreach information and training to local communities, groups, and individuals will be done through public meetings and the local PDCP task force. Efforts will be directed towards raising awareness regarding Pierce's disease and its vectors and workplan involvement through direct mailing, local media, and press releases.
- 2. The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture's training plan for the Agency's employees in accordance with Food and Agricultural Code Section 6046(h)(2) will be coordinated with CDFA. The biology, survey, and treatment of Pierce's disease and its vectors will be the basic components of the training. Scientific Advisory Panel discussions on GWSS and Pierce's disease will be included in this training for key Agency employees. The University of California Cooperative Extension will be a local resource for training and information for this program.
- 3. The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture plans to fully participate in the development and implementation of a data collection system in accordance with Food and Agricultural Code Section 6046(h)(5). These activities will be coordinated through CDFA. The data collection system will make it possible to track and report new infestations of Pierce's disease and its vectors in a manner respectful of property and other rights of those affected.
- 4. The Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture will provide monthly program reports via the internet and financial progress reports as per CDFA guidelines.

LOCAL APPEAL PROCESS

Pursuant to Section 3651 (c) (3) of the regulations, the Stanislaus County Department of Agriculture's Pierce's Disease Control Program Coordinator shall conduct a hearing if any application of the workplan is appealed in writing to him/her or his/her agency. Once the Coordinator receives an appeal, he/she or his/her agent will respond within 10 days to the appellant. The appellant will be given notice as to the date and time for the hearing. At the hearing, the appellant will be given the opportunity to be heard by the Coordinator and to present evidence on matters concerning the application of the workplan. The Coordinator will render a decision and respond to the appellant in writing within 30 days of the hearing. The results of said hearing will be transmitted to CDFA.

EXHIBIT B (Standard Agreement)

BUDGET DETAIL AND PAYMENT PROVISIONS

1. Invoicing and Payment

- A. For services satisfactorily rendered, and upon receipt and approval of the invoices, the State agrees to compensate the Contractor for actual expenditures incurred in accordance with the rates specified herein, which is attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement.
- B. Invoices shall include the Agreement Number and shall be submitted in triplicate not more frequently than monthly in arrears to the designated CDFA Contract Manager for this Agreement.

2. Budget Contingency Clause

- A. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the State shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Contractor or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement and Contractor shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- B. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State, or offer an agreement amendment to Contractor to reflect the reduced amount.

3. Prompt Payment Clause

Payment will be made in accordance with, and within the time specified in, Government Code Chapter 4.5, commencing with Section 927.

EXHIBIT D (Standard Agreement)

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Excise Tax

The State of California is exempt from federal excise taxes and no payment will be made for any taxes levied on employees' wages. The State will pay for any applicable State of California or local sales or use taxes on the services rendered or equipment or parts supplied pursuant to this Agreement. California may pay any applicable sales and use tax imposed by another state.

2. Settlement of Disputes

In the event of a dispute, Contractor shall file a "Notice of Dispute" with the CDFA within ten (10) days of discovery of the problem. Such Notice of Dispute shall contain the Agreement number. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such Notice of Dispute, the Agency Secretary, or Designee, shall meet with the Contractor and the CDFA project manager for the purpose of resolving the dispute. The decision of the Agency Secretary or Designee shall be final. In the event of a dispute, the language contained within this Agreement shall prevail over any other language including that of the bid proposal.

3. Evaluation of Contractor

Performance of the Contractor under this Agreement shall be evaluated. The evaluation shall be prepared on Contract/Contractor Evaluation Sheet (STD 4) and maintained in the Agreement file. For consultant agreements, a copy of the evaluation will be sent to the Department of General Services, Office of Legal Services, if it is negative and the agreement amount is over \$5,000.

4. Agency Liability

The Contractor warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Contractor for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, the State shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work actually performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

5. Potential Subcontractors

If Contractor subcontracts out a portion of the work required by this Agreement, nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between the State and any subcontractors, and no subcontract shall relieve the Contractor of his responsibilities and obligations hereunder. The Contractor agrees to be as fully responsible to the State for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the State's obligation to make payments to the Contractor. As a result, the State shall have no obligation to pay or to enforce the payment of any moneys to any subcontractor.

6. Right To Terminate

The State reserves the right to terminate this agreement subject to 30 days written notice to the Contractor. Contractor may submit a written request to terminate this agreement only if the State should substantially fail to perform its responsibilities as provided herein. However, the agreement can be immediately terminated for cause.

ANNUAL WORK PLAN for USDA, APHIS, WILDLIFE SERVICES (WS) in STANISLAUS COUNTY (Cooperator) July 1, 2001 - June 30, 2002

A. PURPOSE

The object of this plan is to provide for wildlife damage management on properties within the County of Stanislaus, State of California. All work will be in accordance with the terms of the Cooperative Agreement entered into on January 1, 1989.

B. SCOPE

Efforts will be made by assigned personnel to reduce, terminate, and prevent predation and damage to livestock, crops, and other property caused by damaging birds and mammals. The work will be accomplished using Wildlife Services Specialists (WSS) assigned to work within the County. All supervision and support costs necessary to accomplish the above work, will be provided by WS.

C. PROPOSED PROGRAM

The anticipated program includes one WSS positions for twelve (12) staff months to be based at Modesto. The Cooperator's share of the salary (excluding overtime), benefits and other support costs is \$32,100.
