FISCAL IMPACT:

development of a government Internet portal. Pacific Bell's contribution of \$5,000 is also recommended for the support of countywide government portal. The Workforce Investment Board also approved the use of 22 computers for placement in community technology centers.

DISCUSSION:

In the spring of 2000 the nine cities and the county, along with seven sectors from the community, created a steering committee to oversee an assessment of the county's advanced communications infrastructure. A published report entitled "Connecting Stanislaus" included results of the assessment and identified six initiatives designed to increase the community's awareness and use of the Internet. The Workforce Investment Board and the Board of Supervisors have adopted the six initiatives as a strategy for increasing the community's awareness and use of advanced communication technology.

Implementation of each of the initiatives is underway and a number of business results have been achieved. The results are as follows:

- County produced a communication infrastructure assessment and awareness report with distribution throughout the valley.
- County presented the results of the assessment to State Legislature at the Capital Rotunda. Presentations were also made at the San Joaquin Valley Supervisors Association Conference, the Great Valley Center Annual Conference and to the San Joaquin Valley Broadband Task Force. The seven other valley counties are using the Stanislaus County model.
- ◆ The Modesto Chamber and the Modesto Bee have joined with the County and others in the sponsorship of a two-day technology awareness fair on October 12 and 13th.
- Compaq provided six new computers for use in community technology centers.
- Pacific Bell contributed \$5,000 to the County to help increase the community awareness of the value in the use of the Internet.
- ♦ The County, in partnership with the Stanislaus County Superintendent of Schools, produced a Bi-lingual technology resource guide and 70,000 copies are distributed to all K-3rd grade children in Stanislaus County.
- The GIS development plan is created and implemented (Internet enabled).
- County staff assisted the Center for Senior Employment in establishing a technology learning center in the City of Modesto.
- Keyes Technology Center was opened in July.
- ♦ City of Newman Technology Center is in development.
- Grayson Community Technology Center is in development.
- ◆ Planning for Community Technology Center in Wesley, Oakdale and the Stanislaus County Ag Center is underway.
- ◆ The County's Chief Information Officer is initiating e-commerce practices throughout county programs and departments.

AUTHORIZATION TO APPROPRIATE STATE E-READINESS GRANT AND WORKFORCE INVESTMENT ACT FUNDS FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF "CONNECTING STANISLAUS" ADVANCED COMMUNICATION INITIATIVES.

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 County has submitted an application to the State Trade and Commerce for funding of targeted training for business, health, ag, etc.

County staff will work with the Workforce Investment Board, Stanislaus County Economic Development Corporation, the nine cities, charnbers of commerce and the public in the development of the Government Internet Portal. The portal will serve as an electronic "no wrong door" approach to acquiring information about the community as it relates to business practices and development, education, government, recreation and community services, etc. The development of the government portal will be inclusive and all government jurisdictions in the county will have an opportunity to participate. The Government Portal will link to Community Portal(s), some of which are already on line.

The county is partnering with other public agencies in helping communities establish technology learning centers for adults and children. Many individuals in the community do not have access to advanced technology and lack the opportunity to learn first hand the value of this new technology. Economic development, job training and performance are all becoming more dependent upon one's ability to use communication technology.

POLICY ISSUES:

The Board should decide if staff's recommendations advance the "Connecting Stanislaus" Initiatives and is consistent with their priorities of economic development, multi-jurisdictional cooperation and community leadership.

STAFFING ISSUES:

County staff will work with staff from other jurisdictions and agencies, including members of the Connecting Stanislaus Steering Committee to implement the six initiatives.

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS ADOPTED:

WHEREAS, the largest economic transformation since the industrial revolution is upon us, and electronic commerce is one of the fastest growing sectors of the global economy; and

WHEREAS, access to high speed services is an integral concern in business relocation; and

WHEREAS, in the Spring of the year 2000, Stanislaus County and its nine cities adopted visioning statements to guide growth and development efforts through the next 25 years; and

WHEREAS, one of those visioning statement is "The cities and County of Stanislaus will adopt policies and practices to take full advantage of advances in communication technologies." and;

WHEREAS, a Steering Committee was formed, consisting of approximately 100 representatives from major sectors of the economy, to determine the technology readiness of the County to enable it to fully participate in the globally-networked economy; and

WHEREAS, the assessment process revealed findings that led to the formation of six key initiatives to bring the community online with the opportunities of the new global economy, specifically: Expand And Target Technology Training Programs; Develop A Community Portal; Advance On-Line Procurement/Permitting For Business And The Public; Increase The Availability Of Computers In The Home And In Technology Centers; Create A Countywide On-Line Directory Of Governmental Services; and Establish A Centralized Geographic Information System For The Region; and

WHEREAS, the initiatives are collectively known as Connecting Stanislaus; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors approved the adoption of the *Connecting Stanislaus* plan on May 8, 2001; and

WHEREAS, Connecting Stanislaus is a important step toward strengthening our competitive position in the Information Age; and

WHEREAS, in celebration of technology, aConnecting Stanislaus Technology Fair will be held on October 12 and 13, 2001, at the Modesto Center Plaza, featuring 22 workshops, over 100 technology vendors and exhibits, contests, awards, and a Cyber Cafe.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the month of October, 2001, be proclaimed **Technology Month** in Stanislaus County.
