SUBJECT:

Approval to Receive and Expend Program Year 2008-2009 Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Funds in Accordance with the Approved Stanislaus County Strategic Five-Year Local Plan.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Authorize the Director of the Alliance Worknet or his designee to receive and expend Program Year 2008-2009 WIA funds in accordance with the approved Stanislaus County Strategic Five-Year Local Plan. These funds may exceed \$100,000.
2. Authorize the Director of the Alliance Worknet or his designee to enter into and sign agreements and contracts to expend Program Year 2008-2009 WIA funds.
3. Authorize the Director of the Alliance Worknet to sign all WIA-related sub-grant agreements, and any modifications or adjustments as required by the State of California.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Local WIA programs are funded from Federal and State sources. Stanislaus County will receive a total of \$8,366,888 in WIA funding for the 2008-2009 Program Year. Approval of this item will have no impact on the County General Fund.

DISCUSSION:

Workforce Investment Act Formula Funds:

The Workforce Investment Division of the California Employment Development Department (EDD), the designated State Grant Manager of the Department of Labor's Workforce Investment Act (WIA) funding, has announced allocations to Local Workforce Investment Areas for Program Year (PY) 2008-2009. This year's allocation for Stanislaus County is \$8,366,888.

The Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors must annually authorize the receipt of WIA funds and designate the fund administrator. With approval of these recommendations, the Alliance Worknet will serve as fiduciary agent on behalf of the Stanislaus Economic Development and Workforce Alliance (Local Workforce Investment Board) and the Board of Supervisors in administering these funds. The Alliance Worknet Director will administer the program based on Board approval.

The Alliance Worknet provides employment services to over 13,000 Stanislaus County residents annually at three locations. Services include access to job openings, resume and application assistance, job search workshops, skill assessment, career planning and counseling, and job training. In addition, Alliance Worknet staff provide "Rapid Response" assistance to workers who are being laid off due to business closures and downsizing.

Approval of staff's recommendation will allow the Alliance Worknet Director to enter into and sign contracts and expend 2008-2009 funds in the general administration of the program. These funds may exceed \$100,000.

Contracts will be approved by the Local Workforce Investment Board and will follow the Board of Supervisors policies regarding the approval and reporting of contracts and agreements.

POLICY ISSUE:

The Board is asked to determine if approval of this recommendation will support the Board of Supervisors' goals and priorities as follows:

A Strong Local Economy

WIA funds are invested in workforce development in coordination with economic development through the Alliance Board. This represents a unique approach to improving economic conditions in Stanislaus County.

Efficient Delivery of Public Services

Approval of the plan allows for the continued operation of the Alliance Worknet Resource Centers, which provide employment services to all county residents.

Effective Partnerships

Through this plan, the Alliance Worknet delivers employment and training services in cooperation with the following community partners:

The Stanislaus County Community Services Agency, the Employment Development Department, the Alliance, Modesto Junior College, California Department of Rehabilitation, Central Valley Opportunity Center, Area Agency on Aging, the Stanislaus Literacy Center, Disability Resources Agency for Independent Living, the Housing Authority, and the Stanislaus County Office of Education.

SUBJECT: FORMULA WIA ALLOCATIONS—PY 2008-09

This information notice announces the release of the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) formula funds to each Local Workforce Investment Area (LWIA) for the Adult, Youth and Dislocated Worker (DW) funding streams for Program Year (PY) 2008-09. These allocations are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) to the states (refer to DOL Training and Employment Guidance Letter (TEGL) 23-07 dated March 25, 2008).

As in previous years, the allocations for the Adult and Youth funding streams were calculated using the "hold-harmless" factor. Additionally, as approved by the California Workforce Investment Board on November 30, 2006, the DW funding now contains a "hold-harmless" factor. This hold-harmless provision for DW helps mitigate the year-to-year volatility by ensuring each LWIA receives no less than 90 percent of their average percentage share from the prior two years. The LWIAs that receive more than 100 percent of their average percentage share from the prior two years were proportionately reduced by an amount to total the funding necessary for those LWIAs that were below the 90 percent threshold.

Additionally, the DW allocation formula contains the following four factors and their weights:

- Long-Term Unemployment Insurance (UI) claims – weighted at 40 percent
- Mid-Term UI Claims – weighted at 30 percent
- Short-Term UI Claims – weighted at 10 percent
- Long-Term Civilian Unemployment – weighted at 20 percent

The allotments to California and the amounts available for formula allocation to the LWIAs are as follows:

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1. Compliance

In performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will fully comply with:

- a). The provisions of the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and all regulations, legislation, directives, policies, procedures and amendments issued pursuant thereto.
- b). All State legislation and regulations to the extent permitted by federal law and all policies, directives and/or procedures, which implement the WIA.
- c). The provisions of Public Law 107-288, Jobs for Veterans Act, as the law applies to Department of Labor (DOL) job training programs
- d). Subgrantee will ensure diligence in managing programs under this subgrant agreement, including performing appropriate monitoring activities and taking prompt corrective action against known violations of the WIA. Subgrantee agrees to conform to the provisions of the WIA and the contract requirements as referenced in 29 CFR Part 95, Appendix A and 29 CFR, Part 97.36(i) (1-13).

This subgrant agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes all negotiations, verbal or otherwise and any other agreement between the parties hereto. This subgrant agreement is not intended to and will not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. Subgrantee represents and warrants it is free to enter into and fully perform this subgrant agreement.

2. Certification/Assurances

Except as otherwise indicated, the following certifications apply to all Subgrantee's.

- a). Corporate Registration: The Subgrantee, if it is a corporation, certifies it is registered with the Secretary of State of the State of California.
- b). The Subgrantee agrees to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, which, prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to ADA. (42 U.S.C.12101 et seq.
- c). Sectarian Activities: The Subgrantee certifies that this subgrant agreement does not provide for the advancement or aid to any religious sect, church or creed, or sectarian purpose nor does it help to support or sustain any school, college, university, hospital or other institution controlled by any religious creed, church, or sectarian denomination whatsoever, as specified by Article XVI, Section 5, of the Constitution, regarding separation of church and state.
- d). National Labor Relations Board: The Subgrantee (if not a public entity), by signing this subgrant agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury, that no more than one final unappeasable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has been issued against the Subgrantee within the immediately preceding two-year period because of Subgrantee's failure to comply with an order of a federal court, which orders the Subgrantee to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board (PCC10296).
- e). Prior Findings: Subgrantee, by signing this subgrant agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury, that it has not failed to satisfy any major condition in a current or previous subgrant agreement with the DOL or the State of California and has not failed to satisfy conditions relating to the resolution of a final finding and determination, including repayment of debts.
- f). Drug-Free Workplace Certification: By signing this subgrant agreement the Subgrantee hereby certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the Subgrantee will comply with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 and will provide a drug-free workplace by taking the following actions:
 - (1). Publish a statement notifying employees that unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited and specifying actions to be taken against employees for violations.
 - (2). Establish a Drug-Free Awareness Program as required to inform employees about:
 - the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - the person's or organization's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - any available counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance programs; and,
 - penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations.
 - (3). Every employee who works on this subgrant agreement will:
 - receive a copy of the company's drug-free policy statement; and,
 - agree to abide by the terms of the company's statement as a condition of employment on the subgrant/contract.
- g). Child Support Compliance Act: In accordance with the Child Support Compliance Act, the

Subgrantee recognizes and acknowledges:

- (1). The importance of child and family support obligations and shall fully comply with applicable state and federal laws relating to child and family support enforcement, including, but not limited to, disclosure of information and compliance with earnings assignment orders, as provided in Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 5200) of Part 5 of Division 9 of the Family Code; and that to the best of its knowledge is fully complying with the earnings assignment orders of all employees and is providing the names of all new employees to the New Employee Registry maintained by the California Employment Development Department (EDD).
- h). Debarment and Suspension Certification: By signing this subgrant agreement, the Subgrantee hereby certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the Subgrantee will comply with regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspension, 29 CFR Part 98.510, that the prospective participant (i.e., grantee), to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals:
 - (1). Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transitions by any federal department or agency.
 - (2). Have not within a three-year period preceding this subgrant agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgement rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction, violation of federal or state antitrust statutes, or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification, or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property.
 - (3). Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (federal, state or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Section 2 of this certification.
 - (4). Have not within a three year period preceding this subgrant agreement had one or more public transactions (federal, state or local) terminated for cause of default.

Where the Subgrantee is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, such prospective participant shall attach an explanation to this agreement.

- i). Lobbying Restrictions: By signing this subgrant agreement the Subgrantee hereby assures and certifies to the lobbying restrictions which are codified in the DOL regulations at 29 CFR Part 93.
 - (1). No federal appropriated funds have been paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of an agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this federal contract, grant loan, or cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
 - (2). If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this subgrant agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying" in accordance with its instructions.
 - (3). The undersigned shall require that the language of the lobbying restrictions be included in the award documents for subgrant agreement transactions over \$100,000 (per OMB) at all tiers (including subgrant agreements, contracts and subcontracts, under grants, loan, or cooperative agreements), and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
 - (4). This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance is placed when this transaction is executed. Submission of the Lobbying Certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, and U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each failure.

j). Priority Hiring Considerations:

If this subgrant includes services in excess of \$200,000, the Subgrantee shall give priority consideration in filling vacancies in positions funded by the subgrant to qualified recipients of aid under Welfare and Institutions Section Code 11200 in accordance with Public Contract Code 10353.

k). Sweatfree Code of Conduct:

- 1). All Subgrantees contracting for the procurement or laundering of apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, or the procurement of equipment, materials, or supplies, other

than procurement related to a public works contract, declare under penalty of perjury that no apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, equipment, or supplies furnished to the state pursuant to the contract have been laundered or produced in whole or in part by sweatshop labor, forced labor, convict labor, indentured labor under penal sanction, abusive forms of child labor or exploitation of children in sweatshop labor, or with the benefit of sweatshop labor, forced labor, convict labor, indentured labor under penal sanction, abusive forms of child labor or exploitation of children in sweatshop labor. The Subgrantee further declares under penalty of perjury that they adhere to the Sweatfree Code of Conduct as set forth on the California Department of Industrial Relations website located at www.dir.ca.gov, and Public Contract Code Section 6108.

- 2). The Subgrantee agrees to cooperate fully in providing reasonable access to the subgrantees' records, documents, agents or employees, or premises if reasonably required by authorized officials of the Subgrantor, the Department of Industrial Relations, or the Department of Justice to determine the subgrantees' compliance with the requirements under paragraph a of the Sweatfree Code of Conduct.
- l). Unenforceable Provision: In the event that any provision of this subgrant agreement is unenforceable or held to be unenforceable, then the parties agree that all other provisions of this subgrant agreement have force and effect and shall not be affected hereby.
- m). Nondiscrimination Clause
 - 1). The conduct of the parties to this subgrant agreement will be in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and the Rules and Regulations promulgated there under and the provisions of WIA, Section 188.
 - a). As a condition to the award of financial assistance from the Department of Labor under Title I of WIA, the grant applicant assures that it will comply fully with the nondiscrimination and equal opportunity provisions of the following laws:

Section 188 of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (WIA), which prohibits discrimination against all individuals in the United States on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, disability, political affiliation or belief, and against beneficiaries on the basis of either citizenship/status as a lawfully admitted immigrant authorized to work in the United States or participation in any WIA Title I - financially assisted program or activity;

losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, materials persons, laborers and any other persons, firms or corporations, furnishing or supplying work, services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of this agreement, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any persons, firms or corporations which may be injured or damaged by the Subgrantee in the performance of this subgrant agreement.

Failure to comply with all requirements of the certifications in Section 2 may result in suspension of payment under this subgrant agreement or termination of this subgrant agreement or both, and the Subgrantee may be ineligible for award of future state subgrant agreements/contracts if the department determines that any of the following has occurred: (1) false information on the certifications, or (2) violation of the terms of the certifications by failing to carry out the requirements as noted above.

o). Salary and Bonus Limitations:

3. Standards of Conduct

The following standards apply to all Subgrantees.

- a). General Assurance: Every reasonable course of action will be taken by the Subgrantee in order to maintain the integrity of this expenditure of public funds and to avoid favoritism and questionable or improper conduct. This subgrant agreement will be administered in an impartial manner, free from efforts to gain personal, financial or political gain. Subgrantee agrees to conform to the nondiscrimination requirements as referenced in WIA, Section 188.
- b). Avoidance of Conflict of Economic Interest: An executive or employee of the Subgrantee, an elected official in the area or a member of the Local Board, will not solicit or accept money or any other consideration from a third person, for the performance of an act reimbursed in whole or part by the Subgrantee or Subgrantor: Supplies, materials, equipment or services purchased with subgrant agreement funds will be used solely for purposes allowed under this subgrant agreement. No member of the Local Board will cast a vote on the provision of services by that member (or any organization, which that member represents) or vote on any matter which would provide direct financial benefit to that member (or immediate family of the member) or any business or organization which the member directly represents.

4. Coordination

Subgrantee will, to the maximum extent feasible, coordinate all programs and activities supported under this part with other programs under the WIA, including the Wagner-Peyser Act, Title 38 of the United States Code, and other employment and training programs at the state and local level.

Subgrantee will consult with the appropriate labor organizations and/or employer representatives in the design, operation or modification of the programs under this subgrant agreement.

5. Subcontracting

- a). Any of the work or services specified in this subgrant agreement which will be performed by other than by the Subgrantee will be evidenced by a written agreement specifying the terms and conditions of such performance.
- b). The Subgrantee will maintain and adhere to an appropriate system, consistent with federal,

state and local law, for the award and monitoring of contracts which contain acceptable standards for insuring accountability.

- c). The system for awarding contracts will contain safeguards to insure that the Subgrantee does not contract with any entity whose officers have been convicted of fraud or misappropriation of funds within the last two years.

6. Insurance

Except for city and county governmental entities, Subgrantees must provide the Subgrantor evidence of the coverage specified in a, b, c and d below. The evidence of coverage shall include the registration number of the subgrant agreement for identification purposes.

- a). Subgrantee will obtain a fidelity bond in an amount of not less than N/A, prior to the receipt of funds under this subgrant agreement. If the bond is canceled or reduced, Subgrantee will immediately so notify the Subgrantor. In the event the bond is canceled or revised, the Subgrantor will make no further disbursements until it is assured that adequate coverage has been obtained.
- b). Subgrantee will provide general liability insurance with a combined limit of \$1,000,000 or public liability and property damage coverage with a combined limit of not less than \$1,000,000.
- c). Subgrantee will provide broad form automobile liability coverage with limits as set forth in (b) above, which applies to both owned/leased and non-owned automobiles used by the Subgrantee or its agents in performance of this subgrant agreement, or, in the event that the Subgrantee will not utilize owned/leased automobiles but intends to require employees, trainees or other agents to utilize their own automobiles in performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will secure and maintain on file from all such employees, trainees or agents a self-certification of automobile insurance coverage.
- d). Subgrantee will provide Worker's Compensation Insurance, which complies with provisions of the California Labor Code, covering all employees of the Subgrantee and all participants enrolled in work experience programs. Medical and Accident Insurance will be carried for those participants not qualifying as "employee" (Section 3350, et seq. of the California Labor Code) for Worker's Compensation.
- e). The Subgrantor will be named as "Certificate Holder" of policies secured in compliance with paragraphs a-d above and will be provided certificates of insurance or insurance company "binders" prior to any disbursement of funds under this subgrant agreement, verifying the insurance requirements have been complied with. The coverage noted in b and c above must contain the following clauses:

- (1). Insurance coverage will not be canceled or changed unless 30 days prior to the effective date of cancellation or change written notice is sent by the Subgrantee to:

- (2). State of California, its officers, agents, employees and servants are included as additional insured, but only insofar as the operations under this subgrant agreement are concerned.
- (3). The State of California is not responsible for payment of premiums or assessments on this policy

7. Resolution

A county, city, district or other local public body must provide the state with a copy of a resolution, order, motion, or ordinance of the local governing body which by law has authority to enter into an agreement, authorizing execution of this subgrant agreement. Preferably resolutions should authorize a designated position rather than a named individual.

8. Funding

It is mutually understood between the parties that this subgrant agreement may have been written before ascertaining the availability of congressional and legislative appropriation of funds, for the mutual benefit of both parties, in order to avoid program and fiscal delays which would occur if the subgrant agreement was executed after that determination was made.

This subgrant agreement is valid and enforceable only if (1) sufficient funds are made available by the State Budget Act of the appropriate state fiscal years covered by this subgrant agreement for the purposes of this program and; (2) sufficient funds available to the state by the United States Government for the fiscal years covered by this subgrant agreement for the purposes of this program. In addition, this subgrant agreement is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the Congress and Legislature or any statute enacted by the

Congress and Legislature which may affect the provisions, terms, or funding of this subgrant agreement in any manner.

- a). At the expiration of the terms of this subgrant agreement or upon termination prior to the expiration of this subgrant agreement, funds not obligated for the purpose of this subgrant agreement will be immediately remitted to the Subgrantor, and no longer available to the Subgrantee.
- b). The Subgrantor retains the right to suspend financial assistance, in whole or in part, to protect the integrity of the funds or to ensure proper operation of the program, providing the Subgrantee is given prompt notice and the opportunity for an informal review of the Subgrantor's decision. The Chief Deputy Director or his designee will perform this informal review and will issue the final administrative decision within 60 days of receiving the written request for review. Failure on the part of the Subgrantee or a Subcontractor of the Subgrantee to comply with the provisions of this subgrant agreement, or with the WIA or regulations, when such failure involves fraud or misappropriation of funds, may result in immediate withholding of funds.
- c). The local Chief Elected Official (CEO) of a unit of general local government designated as a Local Workforce Investment Area (LWIA) shall be liable to the EDD for all funds not expended in accordance with WIA, and shall return to the EDD all of those funds. If there is more than one unit of general local government in a LWIA, the CEO(s) will be the individual(s) designated under an agreement executed by the CEO(s) of the local units of government. The CEO(s) designated under the agreement shall be liable to the EDD for all funds not expended in accordance with the WIA, and shall return to the EDD all of those funds.

9. Accounting and Cash Management

- a). Subgrantee will comply with controls, record keeping and fund accounting procedure requirements of WIA, federal and state regulations and directives to ensure the proper disbursement of, and accounting for, program funds paid to the Subgrantee and disbursed by the Subgrantee, under this subgrant agreement.
- b). Subgrantee will submit requests for cash to coincide with immediate cash needs and assure that no excess cash is on deposit in their accounts or the accounts of any sub-contracting service provider in accordance with procedures established by the Subgrantor. Failure to adhere to these provisions may result in suspending cash draw down privileges and providing funds through a reimbursement process.
- c). The Subgrantor retains the authority to adjust specific amounts of cash requested if the Subgrantor's records and subsequent verification with the Subgrantee indicate that the Subgrantee has an excessive amount of cash in its account.
- d). Income (including interest income) generated as a result of the receipt of WIA activities, will be utilized in accordance with policy and procedures established by the Subgrantor. Subgrantee will account for any such generated income separately.
- e). Subgrantee shall not be required to maintain a separate bank account but shall separately account for WIA funds on deposit. All funding under this subgrant agreement, will be made by check or wire transfer payable to the Subgrantee for deposit in Subgrantee's bank account or city and county governmental bank accounts. To provide for the necessary and proper internal controls, funds should be withdrawn and disbursed by no less than two representatives of the Subgrantee. The Subgrantor will have a lien upon any balance of WIA funds in these accounts, which will take priority over all other liens or claims.

10. Amendments

This subgrant agreement may be unilaterally modified by the Subgrantor under the following circumstances:

- a). There is an increase or decrease in federal or state funding levels.
- b). A modification to the Subgrant is required in order to implement an adjustment to a Subgrantee's plan.
- c). Funds awarded to the Subgrantee have not been expended in accordance with the schedule included in the approved Subgrantee's plan. After consultation with the Subgrantee, the Subgrantor has determined that funds will not be spent in a timely manner, and such funds are for that reason to the extent permitted by and in a manner consistent with state and federal law, regulations and policies, reverting to the Subgrantor.
- d). There is a change in state and federal law or regulation requiring a change in the provisions of this subgrant agreement.
- e). An amendment is required to change the Subgrantees' name as listed on this subgrant agreement. Upon receipt of legal documentation of the name change the state will process the amendment. Payment of invoices presented with a new name cannot be paid prior to

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approval of said amendment.

Except as provided above, this subgrant agreement may be amended only in writing by the mutual agreement of both parties.

11. Reporting

Subgrantee will compile and submit reports of activities, expenditures, status of cash and closeout information by the specified dates as prescribed by the Subgrantor. All expenditure reports must be submitted upon the accrual basis of accounting. Failure to adhere to the reporting requirements of this agreement will result in funds not being released.

12. Termination

This subgrant agreement may be terminated in whole or in part for either of the two following circumstances:

- a). Termination for Convenience - Either the Subgrantor or the Subgrantee may request a termination, in whole or in part, for convenience. The Subgrantee will give a ninety- (90) calendar-day advance notice in writing to the Subgrantor. The Subgrantor will give a ninety (90) calendar-day advance notice in writing to the Subgrantee.
- b). Termination for Cause - The Subgrantor may terminate this subgrant agreement in whole or in part when it has determined that the Subgrantee has substantially violated a specific provision of the WIA regulations or implementing state legislation and corrective action has not been taken.
 - (1). All notices of termination must be in writing and be delivered personally or by deposit in the U. S. Mail, postage prepaid, "Certified Mail-Return Receipt Requested", and will be deemed to have been given at the time of personal delivery or of the date of postmark by the U. S. Postal Service.

13. Records

- a). If participants are served under this subgrant agreement, the Subgrantee will establish a participant data system as prescribed by the Subgrantor.
- b). Subgrantee will retain all records pertinent to this subgrant agreement for a period of three years from the date of final payment of this subgrant agreement. If, at the end of three years, there is litigation or an audit involving those records, the Subgrantee will retain the records until the resolution of such litigation or audit.
- c). The Subgrantor and/or the U. S. DOL, or their designee will have access to and right to examine, monitor and audit all records, documents, conditions and activities related to programs funded by this subgrant agreement. For purposes of this section, "access to" means that the Subgrantee shall at all times maintain within the State of California a complete set of records and documents related to programs funded by this agreement. The Subgrantee shall comply with this requirement regardless of whether it ceases to operate or maintain a presence within the State of California before the expiration of the subgrant. Subgrantee's performance under the terms and conditions herein specified will be subject to an evaluation by the Subgrantor of the adequacy of the services performed, timeliness of response and a general impression of the competency of the firm and its staff.

14. Audits

- a). The Subgrantee will maintain and make available to auditors, at all levels, accounting and program records including supporting source documentation and cooperate with all auditors. All governmental and non-profit organizations must follow the audit requirements of OMB (single audit or program-specific audit requirement) Circular A-133 (29 CFR 97.26 and 29 CFR 95.26).
- b). The Subgrantee and/or auditors performing monitoring or audits of the Subgrantee or its

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sub-contracting service providers will immediately report to the Subgrantor any incidents of fraud, abuse or other criminal activity in relation to this subgrant agreement, the WIA, or its regulations.

15. Disallowed Costs

Except to the extent that the state determines it will assume liability, the Subgrantee will be liable for and will repay, to the Subgrantor, any amounts expended under this subgrant agreement found not to be in accordance with WIA including, but not limited to, disallowed costs. Such repayment will be from funds (Non-Federal), other than those received under the WIA.

16. Conflicts

- a). Subgrantee will cooperate in the resolution of any conflict with the U. S. DOL that may occur from the activities funded under this agreement.
- b). In the event of a dispute between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee over any part of this subgrant agreement, the dispute may be submitted to non-binding arbitration upon the consent of both the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. An election for arbitration pursuant to this provision will not preclude either party from pursuing any remedy for relief otherwise available.

17. Grievances and Complaint System

Subgrantee will establish and maintain a grievance and complaint procedure in compliance with the WIA, federal regulations and state statues, regulations and policy.

18. Property

All property, whether finished or unfinished documents, data, studies and reports prepared or purchased by the Subgrantee under this subgrant agreement, will be disposed of in accordance with the direction of the Subgrantor. In addition, any tools and/or equipment furnished to the Subgrantee by the Subgrantor and/or purchased by the Subgrantee with funds pursuant to this subgrant agreement will be limited to use within the activities outlined in this subgrant agreement and will remain the property of the United States Government and/or the Subgrantor. Upon termination of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will immediately return such tools and/or equipment to the Subgrantor or dispose of them in accordance with the direction of the Subgrantor.

19. Intellectual Property Provisions

a). Federal Funding

In any subgrant funded in whole or in part by the federal government, Subgrantor may acquire and maintain the Intellectual Property rights, title, and ownership, which result directly or indirectly from the subgrant, except as provided in 37 Code of Federal Regulations part 401.14. However, pursuant to 29 CFR section 97.34 the federal government shall have a royalty-free, non-exclusive, irrevocable, paid-up license throughout the world to use, duplicate, or dispose of such Intellectual Property throughout the world in any manner for governmental purposes and to have and permit others to do so.

b). Ownership

- (1). Except where Subgrantor has agreed in a signed writing to accept a license, Subgrantor shall be and remain, without additional compensation, the sole owner of any and all rights, title and interest in all intellectual property, from the moment of creation, whether or not jointly conceived, that are made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement.
- (2). For the purposes of this subgrant agreement, Intellectual Property means recognized protectable rights and interest such as: patents, (whether or not issued) copyrights, trademarks, service marks, applications for any of the foregoing, inventions, trade secrets, trade dress, logos, insignia, color combinations, slogans, moral rights, right of publicity, author's rights, contract and licensing rights, works, mask works, industrial design rights, rights of priority, know how, design flows, methodologies, devices, business processes, developments, innovations, good will, any data or information maintained, collected or stored in the ordinary course of business by Subgrantor, and all other legal rights protecting intangible proprietary information as may exist now and/or hereafter come into existence, and all renewals and extensions, regardless of whether those rights arise under the laws of the United States, or any other state, country or jurisdiction.
 - (a). For the purposes of the definition of Intellectual Property, "works" means all literary works, writings and printed matter including the medium by which they are recorded or reproduced, photographs, art work, pictorial and graphic representations and works of a similar nature, film, motion pictures, digital

images, animation cells, and other audiovisual works including positives and negatives thereof, sound recordings, tapes, educational materials, interactive videos, computer software and any other materials or products created, produced, conceptualized and fixed in a tangible medium of expression. It includes preliminary and final products and any materials and information developed for the purposes of producing those final products. "Works" does not include articles submitted to peer review or reference journals or independent research projects.

- (3). In the performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee may exercise and utilize certain of its Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. In addition, under this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee may access and utilize certain of Subgrantor's intellectual property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Except as otherwise set forth herein, Subgrantee shall not use any of Subgrantor's Intellectual Property now existing or hereafter existing for any purposes without the prior written permission of Subgrantor. Except as otherwise set forth herein, neither the Subgrantee nor Subgrantor shall give any ownership interest in or rights to its Intellectual Property to the other Party. If, during the term of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee accesses any third-party Intellectual Property that is licensed to Subgrantor. Subgrantee agrees to abide by all license and confidentiality restrictions applicable to Subgrantor in the third-party's license agreement.
 - (4). Subgrantee agrees to cooperate with Subgrantor in establishing or maintaining Subgrantor's exclusive rights in the Intellectual Property, and in assuring Subgrantor's sole rights against third parties with respect to the Intellectual Property. If the Subgrantee enters into any agreements or subcontracts with other parties in order to perform this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall require the terms of the agreement(s) to include all Intellectual Property provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i). Such terms must include, but are not limited to, the subcontractor assigning and agreeing to assign to Subgrantor all rights, title and interest in Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by the subcontractor, subgrantee or subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement or any subcontract.
 - (5). Pursuant to paragraph nineteen (b) (4) of the Intellectual Property Provisions in Exhibit BB to this subgrant agreement, the requirement for the Subgrantee to include all Intellectual Property Provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i) of the Intellectual Property Provisions in all agreements and subcontracts it enters into with other parties does not apply to subgrant agreements or subcontracts that are for customized and on-the-job training as authorized under 20 CFR 663.700-730.
 - (6). Subgrantee further agrees to assist and cooperate with Subgrantor in all reasonable respects, and execute all documents and, subject to reasonable availability, give testimony and take all further acts reasonably necessary to acquire, transfer, maintain, and enforce Subgrantor's Intellectual Property rights and interests.
- c). Retained Rights / License Rights
- (1). Except for Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall retain title to all of its Intellectual Property to the extent such Intellectual Property is in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Subgrantee hereby grants to Subgrantor, without additional compensation, a permanent, non-exclusive, royalty free, paid-up, worldwide, irrevocable, perpetual, non-terminable license to use, reproduce, manufacture, sell, offer to sell, import, export, modify, publicly and privately display/perform, distribute, and dispose of Subgrantee's Intellectual Property with the right to sublicense through multiple layers, for any purpose whatsoever, to the extent it is incorporated in the Intellectual Property resulting from this subgrant, unless Subgrantee assigns all rights, title and interest in the Intellectual Property as set forth herein.
 - (2). Nothing in this provision shall restrict, limit, or otherwise prevent Subgrantee from using any ideas, concepts, know-how, methodology or techniques related to its performance under this subgrant agreement, provided that Subgrantee's use does not infringe the patent, copyright, trademark rights, license or other Intellectual Property rights of Subgrantor or third party, or result in a breach or default of any provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i) or result in a breach of any provisions of law relating to confidentiality.
- d). Copyright
- (1) Subgrantee agrees that for purposes of copyright law, all works (as defined in Ownership, paragraph nineteen (b) (2) (a) of authorship made by or on behalf of Subgrantee in connection with Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement shall be deemed "works made for hire." Subgrantee further agrees that the work of

each person utilized by Subgrantee in connection with the performance of this subgrant agreement will be a "work made for hire," whether that person is an employee of Subgrantee or that person has entered into an agreement with Subgrantee to perform the work. Subgrantee shall enter into a written agreement with any such person that:

(i) all work performed for Subgrantee shall be deemed a "work made for hire" under the Copyright Act and (ii) that person shall assign all right, title, and interest to Subgrantor to any work product made, conceived, derived from or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement.

- (2) All materials, including, but not limited to, computer software, visual works or text, reproduced or distributed pursuant to this subgrant agreement that include Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement may not be reproduced or disseminated without prior written permission from Subgrantor.

e). Patent Rights

With respect to inventions made by Subgrantee in the performance of this subgrant agreement, which did not result from research and development specifically included in the Subgrant's scope of work, Subgrantee hereby grants to Subgrantor a license as described under paragraph nineteen c) for devices or material incorporating, or made through the use of such inventions. If such inventions result from research and development work specifically included within the subgrant agreement's scope of work, then Subgrantee agrees to assign to Subgrantor, without addition compensation, all its right, title and interest in and to such inventions and to assist Subgrantor in securing United States and foreign patents with respect thereto.

f). Third-Party Intellectual Property

Except as provided herein, Subgrantee agrees that its performance of this subgrant agreement shall not be dependent upon or include any Intellectual Property of Subgrantee or third party without first: (i) obtaining Subgrantor's prior written approval; and (ii) granting to or obtaining for Subgrantor's, without additional compensation, a license, as described in paragraph nineteen c), for any of Subgrantee's or third-party's Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. If such a license upon these terms is unattainable, and Subgrantor determines that the Intellectual Property should be included in or is required for Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall obtain a license under terms acceptable to Subgrantor.

g). Warranties

(1). Subgrantee represents and warrants that:

- (a). It has secured and will secure all rights and licenses necessary for its performance of this subgrant agreement.
- (b). Neither Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement, nor the exercise by either Party of the rights granted in this subgrant agreement, nor any use, reproduction, manufacture, sale, offer to sell, import, export, modification, public and private display/performance, distribution, and disposition of the Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement will infringe upon or violate any Intellectual Property right, non-disclosure obligation, or other proprietary right or interest of any third-party or entity now existing under the laws of, or hereafter existing or issued by, any state, the United States, or any foreign country. There are currently no actual or threatened claims by any such third party based on an alleged violation of any such right by Subgrantee.
- (c). Neither Subgrantee's performance nor any part of its performance will violate the right of privacy of, or constitute a libel or slander against any person or entity.
- (d). It has secured and will secure all rights and licenses necessary for Intellectual Property including, but not limited to, consents, waivers or releases from all authors.
- (e). Of music or performances used, and talent (radio, television and motion picture talent), owners of any interest in and to real estate, sites locations, property or props that may be used or shown.
- (f). It has not granted and shall not grant to any person or entity any right that would or might derogate, encumber, or interfere with any of the rights granted to Subgrantor in this subgrant agreement.
- (g). It has appropriate systems and controls in place to ensure that state and federal

funds will not be used in the performance of this subgrant agreement for the acquisition, operation or maintenance of computer software in violation of copyright laws.

(h). It has no knowledge of any outstanding claims, licenses or other charges, liens, or encumbrances of any kind or nature whatsoever that could affect in any way Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement.

- (2). SUBGRANTOR MAKES NO WARRANTY, THAT THE INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RESULTING FROM THIS SUBGRANT AGREEMENT DOES NOT INFRINGE UPON ANY PATENT, TRADEMARK, COPYRIGHT OR THE LIKE, NOW EXISTING OR SUBSEQUENTLY ISSUED.

h). Intellectual Property Indemnity

- (1). Subgrantee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Subgrantor and its licensees and assignees, and its officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, successors, and users of its products, ("Indemnities") from and against all claims, actions, damages, losses, liabilities (or actions or proceedings with respect to any thereof), whether or not rightful, arising from any and all actions or claims by any third party or expenses related thereto (including, but not limited to, all legal expenses, court costs, and attorney's fees incurred in investigating, preparing, serving as a witness in, or defending against, any such claim action, or proceeding, commenced or threatened) to which any of the Indemnities may be subject, whether or not Subgrantee is a party to any pending or threatened litigation, which arise out of or are related to (i) the incorrectness or breach of any of the representations, warranties, covenants or agreements of Subgrantee pertaining to Intellectual Property; or (ii) any Intellectual Property infringement, or any other type of actual or alleged infringement claim, arising out of Subgrantor's use, reproduction, manufacture, sale, offer to sell, distribution, import, export, modification, public and private performance/display, license, and disposition of the Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement. This indemnity obligation shall apply irrespective of whether the infringement claim is based on a patent, trademark or copyright registration that was issued after the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Subgrantor reserves the right to participate in and/or control, at Subgrantee's expense, any such infringement action brought against Subgrantor.
- (2). Should any Intellectual Property licensed by the Subgrantee to Subgrantor under this subgrant agreement become the subject of an Intellectual Property infringement claim, Subgrantee will exercise its authority reasonably and in good faith to preserve Subgrantor's right to use the licensed Intellectual Property in accordance with this subgrant agreement at no expense to Subgrantor. Subgrantor shall have the right to monitor and appear through its own counsel (at Subgrantee's expense) in any such claim or action. 20. Confidentiality Requirements

County IV-D Directors Office of Child Support, the Office of the District Attorney, the California Department of Mental Health, the California Office of Community Colleges, the Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs, and individuals requesting program services.

The Subgrantor and Subgrantee agree that:

- a). Each party shall keep all confidential information that is exchanged between them in the strictest confidence and make such information available to their own employees only on a "need-to-know" basis.
- b). Each party shall provide security sufficient to ensure protection of confidential information from improper use and disclosures, including sufficient administrative, physical, and technical safeguards to protect this information from reasonable unanticipated threats to the security or confidentiality of the information.

Personal identifiers must be removed. Geographic identifiers should be specified only in large areas and as needed, and variables should be recorded in order to protect confidentiality.
 - iii. Minimum Data Cell Size: The minimum data cell size or derivation thereof shall be three participants for any data table released to outside parties or to the public.
- d). Each party agrees that no disaggregate data, identifying individuals or employers, shall be released to outside parties or to the public.
- e). The Subgrantee shall notify Subgrantor's Information Security Office of any actual or attempted information security incidents, within 24 hours of initial detection, by telephone at (916) 654-6231. Information Security Incidents include, but are not limited to, any event (intentional or unintentional), that causes the loss, damage, or destruction, or unauthorized access, use, modification, or disclosure of information assets.

- k). If the Subgrantor or Subgrantee enters into an agreement with a third party to provide WIA services, the Subgrantor or Subgrantee agrees to include these data and security and confidentiality requirements in the agreement with that third party. In no event shall said information be disclosed to any individual outside of that third party's authorized staff, subcontractor(s), service providers, or employees.
- l). The Subgrantee may, in its operation of the One-Stops, permit a One-Stop Operator to enter into a subcontract to manage confidential information. This subcontract may allow an individual to register for resume-distribution services at the same time the individual enrolls in CalJOBS. If a subcontractor receives client social security numbers or other confidential information in the course of business, for example a resume-distribution service that provides enrollment in CalJOBS, social security numbers must be destroyed within two days after the client registers for CalJOBS. If a subcontractor obtains confidential information as an agent of the subgrantee, the subcontract must specifically state the purpose for the data collection and the term of records retention must be stated, and directly related, to the purpose and use of the information. In accordance with 29 Code of Federal Regulations 97.42, social security numbers and other client specific information shall not be retained for more than three years after a client completes services. The subgrantee should extend this period, only if any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the end of the three-year retention period. 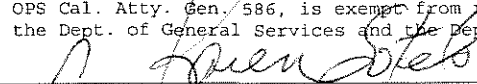

As the Subgrantee plans how their One-Stop systems will make immediate use of the ARRA funds, the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration (ETA) and the Subgrantor encourages them to take an expansive view of how the funds can be integrated into transformational efforts to achieve a new level of effectiveness throughout the public workforce system. In this system, the needs of workers and employers are equally important in developing thriving communities where all citizens succeed and businesses prosper. Successful implementation of the ARRA includes not only quick and effective provision of services and training for workers in need, but also leveraging changes in the system's basic operations to emerge as a strong, invigorated, innovative public workforce system capable of helping enable future economic growth and advancing shared prosperity for all Americans. Subgrantees are advised that the ARRA funds are intended to supplement, not supplant existing WIA Title I funds.
- 4. Limit on Funds:** None of the funds appropriated or otherwise made available in the ARRA may be used by any Subgrantee, local government, or any private entity, for any casino or other gambling establishment, aquarium, zoo, golf course, or swimming pool.

Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards:** Subgrantees agree to separately identify the expenditures for each subgrant award funded under ARRA on the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) and the Data Collection Form (SF-SAC) required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations." This identification on the SEFA and SF-SAC shall include the Federal award number (AA-17110-08-55-A-6), the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) number, the prefix "ARRA—" in the name of the Federal program, and the amount, such that separate accountability and disclosure is provided for ARRA funds by Federal award number consistent with any reports required by ARRA Section 1512(c).
- 7. Responsibilities for Informing Subrecipients:** Subgrantees agree to separately identify to each of their subrecipients and document at the time of the subgrant and at the time of disbursement of funds, the Federal award number (AA-17110-08-55-A-6), the CFDA number, and the amount of ARRA funds.
- 8. Reporting: Program Management and Financial Expenditure:** Accountability guidelines for the ARRA emphasize data quality, streamlining data collection, and collection of information that shows measurable program outputs. The ARRA also emphasizes transparency and frequent communication with the American public about the nature of the ARRA investments. Accordingly, the ETA is developing reporting guidelines that will minimize any new collection burdens yet provide timely accurate accounting of system performance and outcomes. The Subrantees shall collect and report information as conveyed in upcoming ARRA reporting instructions to be issued by the Subrantor, following the receipt by the Subgrantor of ETA instructions.
- 9. Applicable Authority:** ARRA funds provided under this subgrant agreement addendum must be expended in accordance with all applicable federal statutes, regulations, policies, and guidance, including those of the ARRA of 2009 and the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (*as presently in effect and as may become effective during the terms of this Agreement*). In addition, the ARRA funds must be spent in accordance with the applicable approved WIA State plan including approved modifications and amendments to the plan and with the applicable approved WIA Local plan including approved modifications and amendments to the plan.
- 10. Fund Expenditure Period:** Pursuant to the ARRA, the period of availability for funds between the ETA and the State of California (Subgrantor) is February 17, 2009 through June 30, 2011, in accordance with existing terms and conditions of the PY 2008-09 funding agreement. The availability of funds provided by the Subgrantor to the Subgrantee may vary; and will be stated for each subgranted funding amount on the WIA Subgrant Agreement Funding Detail Sheet of the applicable subgrant. It is the Congress' intent, as well as that of the Federal Administration, that the majority of these funds will be utilized within the first year of availability.
- 11. Fund Obligation:** ARRA funds shall be obligated, by the Subgrantor, via a unilateral subgrant modification to the existing PY 2008-09 WIA Title I annual subgrant funding agreement between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. If there is no existing PY 2008-09 WIA subgrant funding agreement, the ARRA funds will be obligated via a bilateral subgrant agreement between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee and thereafter modified, if necessary, by unilateral subgrant modifications. Obligations and costs may not exceed the amount obligated in the subgrant unless otherwise modified by the Subgrantor. The ARRA funds provided may be adjusted, if necessary, under the provisions of Section 8., Funding, of the PY 2008-09 WIA subgrant agreement.

12. Veterans' Priority Provisions: ARRA funds, as with the WIA funds that they supplement, funded by the U.S. Department of Labor, are subject to the provisions of the "Jobs for Veterans Act" (JVA), Public Law 107-288 (38 USC 4215), as implemented by the Final Rule published on December 19, 2008 at 73 Fed. Reg. 78132. The JVA provides priority of service to veterans and spouses of certain veterans for the receipt of employment, training, and placement services. In addition, in accepting these ARRA funds, the Subgrantee assures that they will comply with the Veterans' Priority Provisions established by the Jobs for Veterans Act (38 USC 4215).

13. General Provisions of ARRA, as applicable: The following clauses are specific to usage of ARRA funds and are intended to supplement, not replace any existing terms and conditions.

Wage Rate Requirements: Subject to further clarification issued by the Office of Management and Budget and notwithstanding any other provision of law and in a manner consistent with other provisions of the ARRA, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors and subcontractors on projects funded directly by or assisted in whole or in part by and through the Subgrantor pursuant to this award shall be paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing on projects of a character similar in the locality as determined by the Secretary of Labor in accordance with subchapter IV of chapter 31 of title 40, United States Code. With respect to the labor standards specified in this section, the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority and functions set forth in Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1267; 5 U.S.C. App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code. (ARRA Sec. 16064)

Whistleblower Protection: Each Subgrantee and their subrecipients awarded funds made available under the ARRA shall promptly refer to the Grantor Office of Inspector General any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subrecipient, subcontractor, or other person has submitted a false claim under the False Claims Act or has committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving those funds. (ARRA Sec. 1553)

Buy American – Use of American Iron, Steel, and Manufactured Goods: None of the funds appropriated or otherwise made available by the ARRA may be used for a project for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public building or public work unless all of the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used in the project are produced in the United States. See ARRA Section 1605 – Buy American Requirements. **NOTE:** WIA Title I prohibition on construction, in accordance with 20 CFR 667.260, remains applicable to Subgrantees.

14. Acceptance of Addendum: The Subgrantee's expenditure of any funds properly subgranted hereunder constitutes acceptance of the ARRA fund award, including any new or additional terms and conditions as may be attached hereto.

CA New Start – Prison-to-Employment program is a collaborative project that utilizes the resources and service delivery mechanisms of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR), Labor and Workforce Development Agency (LWDA), California Workforce Investment Board (CWIB), Employment Development Department (EDD), and Local Workforce Investment Boards (LWIB). In addition, the program attempts to enhance the employability of parolees and their access to employment opportunities in their home communities.

Purpose of Sub-Grant Addendum

The purpose of this sub-grant addendum is to specify the expected program activities to be conducted by LWIB's and their One-Stop Career Centers in relation to parolee clients. All requirements specified in the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) *Public Law 105-220, Chapter 5, Section 134(d)* apply to this addendum.

I. PROGRAM GOALS

The primary goal of *CA New Start – Prison-to-Employment* program is to improve the vocational aptitude of offenders while in custody and increase the likelihood of their secured employment upon release from prison. In addition, the program establishes partnerships with a network of local career centers and connects parolees to local employment opportunities. *CA New Start* will be vital in reducing prisoner recidivism and improving parolee reintegration by providing employment opportunities. The partnership between CDCR, EDD, CWIB, and the LWIBs provide a foundation for accomplishing this goal.

II. LOCAL WORKFORCE INVESTMENT BOARDS RESPONSIBILITIES

The Local Workforce Investment Board shall:

A. Provide funds to its One Stop Career Centers (Career Center) to serve the parolee population with core, intensive and training services as deemed appropriate for the parolee. Services to parolees may include:

1. Job search seminars;
2. Individual employment plans;
3. Assistance in obtaining I-9 Right-to-Work documents, as necessary;
4. Employment referrals;
5. Job development workshops;
6. Supportive services referrals; and
7. Job-retention follow-up.

B. Participate in Parole and Community Team local meetings coordinated by the CDCR Division of Adult Parole Operations (DAPO).

C. Market the employability of parolees to prospective employers. Develop flyers, brochures and other marketing tools to promote Career Centers employment services.

D. Participate in employer stakeholder forums with CDCR.

E. Create lists of employers ready to hire parolees and maintain the list as additional employers are identified.

F. Submit a 3-5 page plan by September 1, 2009 detailing how funding will be utilized to serve parolees. The plan must contain the following:

1. An overall plan for distributing funds to Career Center(s);
2. Description of the Career Center(s) plan to provide services to parolees; and
3. Name, address and point of contact of each Career Center(s) receiving funding.

III. CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION (CDCR) RESPONSIBILITIES

The CDCR shall:

- A. Provide the LWIBs with general operation procedures;
- B. Work collaboratively with the LWIBs as specified in the Interagency Agreement; and
- C. Distribute the Interagency Agreement to the LWIBs.

IV. PROGRAM DATA REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

The LWIBs shall submit reports as specified in accordance with WIA *Public Law 105-220*.

V. PROGRAM FUNDING

Funding is available until June 30, 2010. Future funding is contingent upon the availability of federal funding and the passing of the state budget.

- 2. BRAC IMPLEMENTATION SUBGRANT NARRATIVE

GENERAL NARRATIVE

This BRAC Implementation sub-grant will provide any of the Dislocated Worker Employment and Training Activities and Services that are allowable under the Workforce Investment Act, as needed by eligible workers/Dislocated Workers to qualify for jobs that help them retain or achieve economic self-sufficiency.

Within the context of WIA's central guiding principle of Customer Choice, to the maximum extent possible any Training Services provided under this sub grant will

- Be for jobs in high growth/high skills occupations in the local area or in a local area to which an enrollee plans relocate,
- Consider input from local economic development agencies, and
- To maximize cost-effective use of WIA resources and without arbitrarily limiting Customer Choice, attempt to link each enrollee's previous military-installation-based job skills with similar non-military occupations.

These Activities and Services will be provided directly or via sub-contract to clients who have been enrolled into the program based on the criteria and rules specified in the part of this Narrative entitled **PARTICIPANT ELIGIBILITY GUIDE FOR CALIFORNIA'S BRAC IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT.**

All enrollees will be employed at, employed related directly to, or have been laid-off/terminated from jobs with DoD or DoE at, or contractors of, only the following military installation: Riverbank Army Ammunition Plant.

The projected number of participants, the projected kinds and extent of Activities and Services they are likely to need/receive, and the projected schedule of these services are as stated in the attached BUDGET and EXPENDITURE AND PARTICIPANT PLAN. Deviations from these will be discussed with the State's Regional Advisor/Project Manager and, if approvable, will be memorialized via modification of this sub-grant if the sub-grantee and the State's Regional Advisor/Project Manager agree it is needed.

All enrollees may receive any and all Dislocated Worker Program Activities and Services at any time during their period of enrollment, based on their core-services-based case records showing that each Program Activity and Service is needed to achieve re-employment. As stated in the attached **Participant Eligibility Guide** (which is part of this sub-grant), the 180-day limitation stated at

section 101(9)(B)(ii) and (iii) regarding delivery of Core/Intensive/Training Services is not applicable to this project.

Due to the special characteristics of the BRAC project enrollees, Program Activities and Services may, but are not required to, be provided to them via the sub-grantee's One Stop system.

The following is a brief summary of any special aspects of how Program Activities and Services will be provided under this BRAC project: The BRAC funds will be used to provided training and supportive services to those eligible customers. Case management and job search services will be provided by co-enrollment into our dislocated worker formula grant.

Any planned sub-contractors and what each will do are stated below. WIA procurement requirements will be complied with to confirm the appropriateness of the selection of any sub-contractors to participate in the operation of this project. However, sole source selection of current sub-contractor(s) on the basis of their ongoing effectiveness in providing WIA Activities and Services will be appropriate, providing documentation of the reasons why the sub-contractor was approved by the sub-grantee's governing board to be selected on a sole source basis is placed on file with the sub-grantee before initiation of Activities and Services by that sub-contractor. The sub-grantee will retain all such sole source documentation on file for future review by federal and/or state monitors. If "no sub-contractors" is stated below, the sub-grantee will not initiate any sub-contracts relating to this project.

While the Customer Choice and Procurement requirements of the Workforce Investment Act will be complied with, providers of Training Services other than those included in California's Eligible Training Provider List (ETPL) may be utilized in serving this special participant population as long as doing so best meets their re-employment needs. The sub-grantee will maintain documentation on a participant-by-participant basis of any decisions to not utilize the ETPL.

If budgeted, relocation assistance may be provided, up to \$5,000 per enrollee, if the enrollee has previously demonstrated that s/he needs this assistance because his/her private resources do not suffice to fully cover the cost. Relocation Assistance will be an exceptional occurrence.

Needs Related Payments may be provided after an enrollee has been laid-off/terminated, but only to the extent s/he has previously demonstrated inability to meet these costs from private resources.

The military installation was the “employer” in respect to layoffs/terminations of ex-on-base civilian employees of DoD or DoE. The contractor was the “employer” in respect to layoffs/terminations of ex-contractor employees.

These workers will automatically be considered to be “unlikely to return to a previous industry or occupation.” The upcoming military installation closure will automatically be considered to be a “permanent closure of, or (a) substantial layoff at, a plant, facility, or enterprise” No documentation of these will need to be maintained.

The self-employment and dislocated homemaker criteria [WIA section 101(9)(C) and (D)] will not be used to determine enrollment eligibility for this project.

CURRENTLY EMPLOYED WORKERS

The NEG eligibility criteria at WIA section 173(c)(2)(A)(ii) and (iii) supersede/replace all of the parts of the Dislocated Worker eligibility criteria at WIA section 101(9) that relate to workers that have not yet been laid off/terminated. (No part of 101[9] is applicable to BRAC-impacted workers that are currently-employed.)

- DoD and DoE civilian employees [173(c)(2)(A)(ii)] may be enrolled and served while they continue to be employed on your military base up to 24 months before the triggered lay-off (i.e., final closure date of your military installation) occurs and may continue to be served through the end of your State sub-grant (which may extend throughout the duration of the BRAC Implementation grant from the Department of Labor to the State).

These enrollees may receive the full range of allowable WIA services (core, intensive, training, supportive services, relocation assistance, etc.) throughout their period of enrollment (up to 24 months), whenever needed (and doable per their working schedules) to accomplish their BRAC employability goals. However, for obvious reasons, these employed workers should generally not be provided Needs Related Payments until they are actually laid-off/terminated and continue to be served. If you find it's necessary to provide Needs Related Payments to currently-employed BRAC-impacted workers please consult first with your State Regional Advisor/Project Manager.

[The 180-day rule regarding the limitations of what services may be provided to employed workers stated at WIA section 101(9)(B)(ii) and (iii) is not applicable to this BRAC Implementation project. This is because

this rule is not included in the BRAC-specific eligibility criteria for currently employed workers at WIA section 173(c)(2)(A)(ii) and (iii).]

- Non-managerial employees of contractors [173(c)(2)(A)(iii)] who are working full-time at your military installation or full-time for your military installation at an off-base site may be enrolled and served up to 24 months before the final closure date of the military installation and may continue to be served through the end of your State sub-grant (which may extend throughout the duration of the BRAC Implementation grant from the Department of Labor to the State).

The same is true regarding such employees who are working part-time at your military installation. However, before enrolling such employees please contact your State Regional Advisor/Project Manager to discuss whether they may be enrolled. (If their part-time military installation work is part of their overall job with a contractor whose business includes off-military installation jobs [such as landscape maintenance or food service], these contractor employees generally should not be enrolled/served with BRAC funds.)

Enrolled non-managerial employees of contractors may receive the full range of allowable WIA services (core, intensive, training, supportive services, relocation assistance, etc.) throughout their period of enrollment (up to 24 months), as and whenever needed (and doable per their working schedules) to accomplish their BRAC employability service goals. These workers should not need Needs Related Payments until they are actually laid-off/terminated and continue to be served. If you find it's necessary, please consult first with your State Regional Advisor/Project Manager.

[See the italicized discussion, above, regarding the non-applicability of the 180 day rule in respect to non-managerial employees of contractors.]

Confirm with the base commander or an authorized representative that the contractor is a contractor and which workers are employed full-time/part-time in respect to the military installation. There is no need to document whether the contractor's employees are "at-risk of termination from employment as a result of reductions in defense expenditures" or that the contractor "is converting operations from defense to non-defense operations in order to prevent worker layoffs." These are known facts that are inherent in the military installation closure situation that the BRAC project is addressing.

DETERMINING 24 MONTHS TO CLOSURE

To establish when the 24 month pre-closure period begins, determine when the military installation will close and count back. This is how to determine when:

Secure an official letter on letterhead that is signed by the Base Commander, or the Base Commander's Executive Officer, or the base's Personnel Commander (Human Resources) saying clearly when the military installation will close. Keep this on file to show to reviewers and to document that the enrollees who were enrolled pursuant to WIA sections 173(c)(2)(A)(ii) and (iii) [these are the folks that had not yet been laid-off/terminated when they were enrolled] were enrolled not earlier than 24 months before the closure date.

If you have difficulty getting such an official letter: DOL has advised us that the "public release announcement from the Federal Government" about your military installation's closure would suffice. If you need to use this alternative, please first contact your State Regional Advisor/Project Manager to find this public release announcement and then determine whether it is specific enough, closure date-wise, in respect to your military installation to clearly establish the beginning of your military installation's 24-month pre-closure period.

NOT ELIGIBLE TO BE SERVED

Members of the Armed Forces [whose eligibility criteria are described in WIA section 173(c)(2)(A)(iv)] may not be served in this BRAC Implementation project.

WIA sections 101(9)(C) and (D) may not be used for determining eligibility for this BRAC project. This means that previously self-employed people and displaced homemakers may not be served in this BRAC Implementation project.

However, members of the Armed Forces, previously self-employed people, and displaced homemakers may be enrolled and served if they meet the criteria described under LAID-OFF/TERMINATED WORKERS or under CURRENTLY EMPLOYED WORKERS, above, may be served as long as they need help to become re-employed. Please discuss any such potential enrollees with your State Regional Advisor/Project Manager to confirm their eligibility. Please be guided by whether the applicant actually needs help to become re-employed.

Section I - Statement of Need and High Intensity Gang Activity Areas (HIGAA's)

1. Describe the geographical area the project will target and include the county/counties where services will be provided. Up to five bonus points will be awarded to projects serving one or more of the HIGAA's identified in Section 5 D of the SFP.

Geographical Area: This program will take place in Stanislaus County, one of the HIGAA's listed in the SFP. Located in the San Joaquin Valley, Stanislaus County (population 525,000) is bordered by the counties of San Joaquin on the north, Calaveras and Tuolumne on the east, Merced on the south and Santa Clara on the west, and is approximately 60 miles east of the greater San Francisco Bay metropolitan area. Stanislaus county includes nine cities and a substantial amount of unincorporated land, most of which is dedicated to our major industry; agriculture. The largest cities are Modesto (pop. 202,000), Turlock (67,000), Ceres (35,000) Oakdale (18,000) and Patterson (17,000). The agriculturally-based economy attracts a large number of unskilled workers from central and south America as well as a significant number of immigrants from southeast and southwest Asia.

2. Describe the unmet need of the youth in the area that the proposed project will target. Include an explanation of how the unmet need was determined and what factors have contributed to the unmet need. Provide the following statistical information that supports the need for this project and include data sources: gang-related homicides, number of youth on probation or parole, high school drop-out rates, high school academic performance index scores, poverty levels and total number of youth in service area.

For our gang-involved youth (and those at-risk of becoming gang-involved) Stanislaus County is desperately in need of positive activities and services that can lead youth away from gangs and toward success.

A profile of Stanislaus County youth issues reveals formidable challenges regarding youth, education and crime issues. The Stanislaus County Office of Education reports that 24.7% (26,622) of the county's 108,000 K-12 students speak a first language other than English. The California Department of Education, Demographics Office reports that Stanislaus County has a higher dropout rate (17.2%) than the state average (16.8%). Of those 17.2% (1,774 dropouts), 754 (42.5%) were Hispanic or Latino. It is noteworthy that Modesto City and Ceres Unified High Schools, which are located in areas of high gang activity, accounted for 413 of the Hispanic or Latinos dropouts.

The Stanislaus County Children's Council, in their "Condition of Children & Youth Report 2008" indicates that 20.1% of county youth live in poverty, and 24% of youth receive food stamps. According to the County Probation Department's most recent Annual Report (2007), of the estimated 3,800 gang members in Stanislaus County, about 1,150 are between the ages of 12 and 17. In 2007 there were 3,753 juvenile arrests, up 3.4% from the previous year. Juvenile Hall admissions in 2007 totaled 2,088 up only 83 from the prior year, due in large part to space

limitations. The Stanislaus County Sheriffs Department states there are now (in 2008) 5,496 documented gang members, an increase of 45% in one year! The County Probation Department is currently supervising 798 juvenile offenders, many of whom are gang-affiliated. For those minors who are arrested, but who do not represent a level of threat to the community that requires incarceration, the County Courts, Sheriffs Department, Juvenile Probation Department and city Police Departments operate "Diversion", or "Alternative to Custody" programs which impose community supervision and sanctions. In 2007, 392 juveniles were placed in these programs. On a typical day there are approximately 60 youth who are participating. While being closely supervised, these minors are allowed to attend school, counseling, and perform community service work. But because of other law enforcement priorities and limited budgets, there are few resources available to offer opportunities beyond community service, basic education or other publicly-funded services such a counseling, mental health treatment, etc. Stanislaus County's 93 Probation Officers (PO) case manage 798 juvenile offenders, each PO managing (on average) 9 youth and 35 adults. With these high caseloads, P.O.s cannot provide the same level of academic and vocational guidance as our proposed program. For youth who are already gang-involved, and those at-risk youth who are not yet involved in the legal system, there are no programs specifically designed and funded to guide them in a positive direction while provide funding to do so. It is these youth who are the primary target group of this program. In general, workforce development funds for youth are directed to eligible youth who have the most potential to benefit –i.e. to succeed in school and/or in the workforce. This approach bypasses youth who are known to have gang affiliations. It is these youth that this program will assist.

3. Explain why the need cannot be met with existing resources through the local or regional educational, employment and training service delivery infrastructures.

Simply put, the workforce delivery systems of Stanislaus County are taxed to their limits on a day-to-day basis due to current economic conditions, with more than 300 individuals visiting the local One-Stop Resource Centers each day. Employment and training services available to the community are in high demand by average, law-abiding citizens who have been negatively affected by the downturn economic conditions.

EDD's October 17, 2008 "Monthly Labor Force Data for Counties" report indicates an unemployment rate of 10.5% in Stanislaus County, which ranks as the 6th highest out of the 58 counties. This puts us well above the state (7.5%) and national (6.1%) unemployment rates. Economic conditions in the region have exhibited a sharp downturn over the last twelve months, driven by decreases in the construction and finance industries. Home foreclosure rates are among the highest in the country. According to the September 12, 2008 Business Journal, "California cities accounted for eight of the top 10 metro foreclosure rates out of the 230 metro areas tracked in the August report." Modesto was ranked number three in the nation! The agricultural sector – the primary economic driver in the region – has declined significantly in the food processing sector, resulting in more than 4,400 worker lay-offs since 2003. Despite the economic and employment challenges, the regional population has increased approximately 19% since 2000, with large numbers of people continuing to relocate to the Central Valley in search of lower cost housing.

These current economic conditions include poverty rates averaging near 20%. (BLS, 2006), slumping housing and financial markets and increasing foreclosures combined with increasing demand from employers for more highly skilled workers across all sectors, have sharply increased customer/job seeker demand for services. This demand cannot be

effectively addressed in light of the static level of workforce development resources (funding and staffing) available for operating the One-stop Centers.

Another important factor is that the gang/at-risk youth who would qualify for services under this grant program require more intense services than those that are generally offered with regular formula funding. Stanislaus County's dropout rate is higher than average, and most of those dropout youths have little or no work experience.

Receiving funds specifically aimed at serving youth at-risk of gang involvement will not only have long-term positive effects for the law enforcement community, but will also allow the local workforce system to provide a more rapid, robust, and comprehensive menu of services to all its customers.

Section II - Target Group

- 1. Describe the characteristics of the youth that will be served by this project including barriers and supportive service needs such as housing, drug and alcohol treatment, counseling, etc. Describe how you will determine whether a youth is a current gang member, gang involved or at-risk of gang involvement. The target group will be at-risk youth aged 14-18 and adults aged 19-24, and current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement. They will be low-income as defined by the Lower Living Standard Income Level (LLSIL), which is published by the Secretary of Labor. The participants, in addition to being low-income, will have other barriers such as, basic literacy skills deficient (not able to perform math and or reading and language at greater than the 9th grade level, high school dropouts, pregnant and/or parenting teens, current foster and former foster youth, and offenders. Many of the participants will need supportive services like transportation, records sealing, background checks, drug screening, GED testing fees, work and/or school clothing, temporary housing, personal or group counseling, drug and/or alcohol treatment, childcare and referral to local faith based free tattoo removal services. Probation, law enforcement, education agencies, and community-based organizations will identify participants as current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement. Also, participants may self identify themselves as current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement. Case management staff will also look at resident information and determine if a participant resides in neighborhoods identified by law enforcement as an at-risk gang neighborhood.

- 2. Identify the outreach and recruitment methods that will be used to contact and recruit current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement youth. Demonstrate how these methods will enable you to reach the targeted youth population.*

A StanGRIP Coordinator (.5 FTE) will be selected to coordinate the marketing, outreach and recruitment efforts of the two main case management agencies (Alliance Worknet and Ceres Unified School District). The coordinator will partner with case managers to perform outreach by connecting and partnering with community agencies that interact with youth as identified in Item 1. Outreach materials will be disseminated using established networks of youth service organizations in each local area through print materials, orientation sessions, group presentations, e-mail blasts, newsletters and the internet. Agencies that have been approached in order to fulfill the requirements of this grant are the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, County Probation, Stanislaus County Police Athletics League, Modesto Police Department/Safe Community Partnership, Ceres Unified School District, Friends Outside, The Weed & Seed Project, Center for Human Services, and the Ceres Collaborative. The County Probation Department will refer youth and young adults that meet our target group criteria. Alliance Worknet will partner with the Modesto Police Department /Safe Community

Partnership to refer 10 quality appropriate candidate. Alliance Worknet will asses the candidates to ensure they are appropraite for the program. If 10 quality candidates are not refered by March of 2010 spaces will not be reserved.

The StanGRIP program will participate in community events and also perform teacher and student presentations to the various high schools and alternative education schools located throughout Stanislaus County and Juvenile Hall. Many of our outreach It is expected that the higher gang populations will come from the communities of Modesto, Ceres, Patterson, and Riverbank. Because our youth programs have a track record of providing services throughout the county, and not in just one or two particular locations, a variety of public and private agencies have been willing to refer customers to our youth programs. Since Program Year 2006-2007, the Alliance Worknet's Careerquest Youth Program and Ceres Unified School District's Project YES Youth Program have connected with approximately thirty-five hundred (3500) youth and young adults and recruited/enrolled eight hundred and fifteen (815) at-risk youth and at-risk young adults into their respective programs. The clients served came from communities such as, Patterson, Newman, Oakdale, Riverbank, Turlock, Keyes, Hughson, Ceres, and Modesto. The big positive to these past recruitments/enrollments is that they included youth and young adults from communities throughout Stanislaus County.

Section III - Planned Approach

1. Describe the intervention and/or prevention strategy that will be used to achieve the planned goals and objectives. Include a service process flowchart. Demonstrate how this strategy is comprehensive and community focused providing a holistic approach to serving the target population.

As current youth and young adult gang members, gang involved, and those at-risk of gang involvement are identified, the CalGRIP coordinator will pre-assess the applicant to determine which service flow may work best for the client. The coordinator will determine to what level an applicant is gang involved and what educational or workforce skills the applicant is lacking. The coordinator will present an overview of the Integrated Service and Unified Service Models to the applicant. The applicant will determine which service flow suits them best. The determining factors may be; Geographic location, specialty services, program partnership with referring agency, prior knowledge of program, etc. The applicant will then enrolled into the CalGRIP program and will receive services in the manner depending upon their model of choice.

Integrated Service Model:

The Alliance Worknet's youth program is designed to provide workforce training services to eligible youth to prepare them for participation in the labor force. Program participants are referred to a variety of workforce preparation and personal growth services through a single case management team operated by the Alliance Worknet. The services are organized as a "menu" of offerings that are made available by multiple private and public agencies, each of which has agreed to provide their services on a fixed-fee or no-fee basis.

This consolidated system emphasizes holistic youth development. It appears seamless from the youth's perspective as referrals are coordinated and linked by the case management team. To further ensure maximum access to services for all eligible youth, the case management team operates from multiple locations within our county area and is responsible for developing individualized strategies for participating youth.

The Unified Service Model:

Ceres Unified School District's (CUSD) Educational Options Department facilitates a multitude of programs that range from after school recreation, academic intervention, adult education, family resources and referrals, youth employment services, summer school, English language development for adults and youth, family literacy, early childhood education, and much more. CUSD is able to provide a seamless delivery of comprehensive services to Stanislaus County youth and young adults. As a "one-stop" center, Ceres Project YES provides resources, referrals, and services, including access to: counseling services, a mini-computer lab that is internet accessible, and other supportive services for youth and families. With late afternoon and evening hours, clients will have a safe environment in which to accomplish their individual education and career goals.

CUSD operates an innovative "one-stop" center, in which education and employment partners are brought to the center to provide workshops and training to participating clients. The philosophy of the Ceres Unified Model is that all participants will demonstrate their dedication to self-improvement and program activities, and view the youth program as a comprehensive system, not a temporary job service.

- 2. Describe the specific types of services and training that will engage youth in positive community alternatives, increase their vocational and job readiness skills, link them to career pathways and reduce their risk of gang involvement. Identify who will provide the services and/or training. Demonstrate how your services and training relate to your planned performance benchmarks.*

This project will address the participant's need for academic instruction, vocational training, paid work experience, supportive services and other appropriate resources through a customized, personalized and accelerated program entry via direct referral from the Probation Department and law enforcement offices. A central feature of the program is the expert case management provided to each participant by the staffs of the Alliance Worknet and the Ceres Unified School District, which have a combined seven years of experience in managing highly successful Workforce Investment Act youth programs. As participants are identified, they will be directed through an intensified and personalized service process via one of the service delivery strategies as described in the Service Process Flow Chart. The initial process will include orientation, eligibility determination, needs assessment, career evaluation, and the development of a training or employment plan for each StanGRIP participant to be served. The initial process will be focused on the needs of the individual applicant, and is designed to identify the most appropriate mix of services, support, and training to assist the participant in obtaining a high school diploma or GED equivalent, increasing numeracy and literacy levels, entering post-secondary education, or advancing in a high-growth occupation.

Once enrolled, if a participant needs their high school diploma or GED, they will receive intense tutoring services and weekly stipends for regular attendance. The participant will also receive an incentive once they receive their diploma or GED. A work experience (WEX) will be obtained for those participants with diploma or GED. The WEX will be determined after a battery of assessments is completed. These assessments include basic skills such as, CASAS or TABE, WorkKeys that determines real world work skills aptitude levels, and Eureka/True Colors that is a personality-based career assessment tool. The WEX assignments will be career oriented and will include ongoing soft skills training that will increase the job retention rate. WEX's will be approximately 500 hours in length.

Some customers will be able to choose from appropriate training options offered in their local area, including On-the-Job Training (OJT) and occupational or vocational training using Individual

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Training Accounts, as well as any supportive services necessary and reasonable for successful program participation. Training will be consistent with established policies and procedures, for training providers and programs listed on the California State Eligible Training Provider List, which provides training in high-growth, high wage, and demand occupations. On-the-Job Training will also be made available to interested participants using established employer networks throughout the region. WorkKeys will be used to help determine the appropriate vocational training. The WorkKeys Assessment System tests participants in Applied Mathematics, Locating Information, and Reading for Information. The result of the assessment is a Work Readiness Certificate, which has been promoted to employers and connects works skills, training, and testing based on Occupational Profiles throughout the country. The Work Readiness Certificate is one tool that will enable participants to attain, retain, and advance in demand occupations. The WorkKeys assessments will provide participant and employers with real world skills evaluations and individual scores indicating their aptitude for the workplace. The WorkKeys Assessment System provides regional standards that are accepted by many employers. The certificate not only provides actual scores, but an in-depth analysis of skill levels are provided in order for employers to know precisely the level of skills each potential employee possesses. WorkKeys has been used regionally to assist employers in their decisions regarding advancement of their workers.

3. *Describe how your service plan will address the barriers of the targeted youth and prepare them to enter an education or training program, obtain employment in a high wage/high growth industry or in an occupation with future career advancement opportunity, attain a degree/certificate, achieve literacy/numeracy gains or return to/remain in secondary school.*

A critical step in the initial evaluation and assessment process will be the identification and resolution of any barriers to the StanGRIP program participation, completion, and successful entry into education, training, or employment in their chosen career path. Barrier identification, through assessment, counseling, and individual discussions with the assigned case manager, is the first step in resolving those barriers. Once identified, each barrier will be addressed through the provision of specific supportive services (record sealing, counseling, transportation, clothing, or child care assistance) or through referrals to one-stop and community partner agencies (tattoo removal, housing, health services), ensuring a holistic approach that maximizes the opportunity for success of each at-risk youth or young adult. As an additional service, the partners in this project have agreed to provide intense tutoring services to prepare participants for entry into education and/or training and to help them achieve literacy/numeracy gains. Having a strong math and reading foundation will allow participants to seriously consider post-secondary education, and vocational training. The resolution of each identified barrier increases the participant's chances for successful completion of education, training, entry into high wage/high growth employment, and retention.

The comprehensive assessment process includes an evaluation of basic academic skill levels, an analysis of work history and transferable skills, and the identification of interests, aptitudes, and abilities of each StanGRIP participant. Stanislaus County has implemented the WorkKeys assessment to evaluate skills in Applied Mathematics, Locating Information, and Reading for Information – the regionally recognized Central California Work Readiness Certificate will be issued to each participant completing this assessment and appropriate remediation activities, as needed. An analysis of transferable skills, in concert with the entire assessment process, will allow each participant to successfully identify areas in which they are already competitive in the local labor market, as well as areas that may require additional improvement, so that they can

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narrow their training and educational needs and maximize both their training time, and the effectiveness of training resources made available to them through the project.

Staff selection, project marketing and recruitment of participants will begin immediately upon notification of project award. Initial participant enrollments are anticipated in July 09'. As participants enter and complete the upfront orientation, eligibility determination, assessment, and career planning processes, they will be enrolled into project services. Initial participants may enter their selected training programs as early as July 2009, with training program entrants anticipated through March 2010. Participants may begin completing the program and enter education programs or unsubsidized employment as soon as December 2009, with program completions and placements anticipated through late 2010). Participants will remain in contact with their assigned case manager throughout program participation, completion, placement and follow-up/retention. Project evaluation and close-out will conclude in December 2010. (See SFP Form 2 – Proposal Work Plan).

Our "Placement in Employment, Education or Training" goal is aligned with the States measure, however, based on the past performance of our current youth programs, we anticipate that the project performance goals for the "Attained Recognized Certificate/Diploma/Degree" and "Literacy/Numeracy Gains" will be 56% and 46% respectively.

Outcomes and benefits for all program participants will be documented and reported using the State JTA participant reporting system. The Alliance Worknet will gather and review all participant documents, collect additional information from each program partner as needed and will insure that the information is entered into the JTA system in an accurate and timely fashion. Participant reports generated by the JTA system, specific to this project, will be reviewed on a quarterly basis, along with project reports, to insure accurate information regarding project and participant progress is shared with all partners.

To initiate this proposed program and the process of putting together this grant proposal, the Alliance Worknet (the WIA administrative entity of the Local Board) hosted a meeting of key players of local anti-gang efforts. Attendees included representatives from law enforcement, probation, education, economic development and workforce development. As a result of this meeting, our partner organizations assisted in the design of the proposed program. As illustrated by the enclosed letters of commitment, we have established a network of agencies that are positioned to identify gang youth, refer them to StanGRIP program and provide the counseling, guidance, support, services and training that can help youth to escape gang involvement.

Of the major players in the proposed StanGRIP Program, at present Alliance Worknet has contracts with two youth programs (Careerquest and Ceres Unified School Dist.) and a program that specializes in assisting the "offender/ex-offender" population (Friends Outside). These three experienced, proven programs form the core of StanGRIP in terms of providing case management and guidance to participants. The extensive list of partners shown on the the Partner Roles and Responsibilities Chart (SFP Form 4) are long-standing partners of the Alliance Worknet, most of whom have provided excellent service to WIA customers for many years. The commitments we have now received from law enforcement and probation offices ensure that the targeted at-risk youth will be referred to the proposed StanGRIP program.

In a very real sense, our partner organizations do not just compliment the services of the local board -they are central to the success of the program by providing the same excellent WIA participant services and training that they have provided for many years. Through our new formal partnerships with law enforcement, probation and the Police Activities League, the proposed StanGRIP program creates a pathway (and the resources) to provide WIA services to gang-involved youth and youth who are at risk of gang involvement.

Our Youth Council has a long-standing policy of reaching as many youth as possible, especially those most in need of services. The administrative staff of the Youth Council was directly involved in the design of the proposed StanGRIP program.

The County Sheriff's Department will refer participants via their deputy sheriff officers. The County Probation Department will refer those targeted offenders who are on active and informal probation for educational and workforce development services. The County PAL will refer targeted youth that access activities provided by PAL and will allow case management staff to meet with customers and provide outreach at the various PAL locations. CUSD will provide intensive WIA services to those youth that choose to participate in the Unified Service Model Delivery System. AW will provide intensive WIA services to those youth that choose to participate in the Integrated Service Model

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Delivery System. FOS will provide intensive WIA services to young adults who have been previously incarcerated. CUSD, AW, and FOS use the States Job Training Automation System (JTA) to ensure that participant's services are not being duplicated. Because of the relationships that are developed and the awareness of the services provided by each partner, it is expected that referrals and services that are provided will be sustained using the partner's regular funding streams.

The Alliance Worknet while administering highly successful federally funded projects for 25 years, is subject to and complies with the Single Audit Act and all pertinent OMB circulars related to fiscal management of Federal funds, and has a record of being able to meet the State's requirements for reporting performance data, cash requests, expenditure reports, and participant reports using the JTA system which is currently in place and in use.

2. Describe past or present accomplishments in working with youth programs and how these funds will build on these successes.

Since Program Year 2006-2007, the Alliance Worknet's Careerquest Youth Program and Ceres Unified School District's Project YES Youth Program have connected with approximately thirty-five hundred (3500) youth and young adults and recruited/enrolled eight hundred and fifteen (815) at-risk youth and at-risk young adults into their respective programs. The funds we are requesting will allow us to reach a segment of our local youth that we have been unable to target in the past.

3. Describe your organization's infrastructure including proposed staffing for this project that demonstrates your ability to achieve the project goals. Demonstrate that your staff have experience in working with the targeted youth population.

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The Alliance Worknet has administered highly successful federally funded projects for 25 years. The proposed StanGRIP program will be staffed with 3.6 FTEs which equals six case manager and two supervisors. These are the same experts who operate our existing WIA programs. All three of our primary operators (Alliance Worknt, Ceres Unified School District and Friends Outside) have worked with and achieved success with limited numbers of the the tartgeted youth population. The StanGRIP program will enable us to further contribute to the success gang-involved youth and, at the same time, contribute to the well-being of our community.

Section VIII – Budget Summary Narrative and Plan

1. Salary & Fringe Benefits:

Estimates were made of standard county reimbursement rates for salary and fringe benefits. School district (CUSD) rates are normally higher and non-profit (FOS) are normally lower. Each program has a manager and three staff, and the average should suffice for this estimated grant proposal budget. County rates were used for all staff salaries and are estimated at 44.9% of salaries. All fringe benefit charges follow the staff wages in being charged appropriately to either GRIP, WIA or other in-kind funding sources (GRIP 26% and WIA/Other74%).

2. Operational Costs:

Include small purchases and equipment. The \$40,000 estimate for these services will be charged in \$5,000 to GRIP and \$35,000 in-kind.

Program supplies (paper, special training tools, etc.) are estimated at \$5,000 to be charged in full to in-kind.

Travel reimbursements are made at the Federal rate of \$.55 cents per mile and will be charged 39% to GRIP and 61% to in-kind.

Other operational costs: Printing/Duplicating, Equipment Maintenance, Rent or use fees, utilities, equipment rentals will be charged in-kind from WIA funds.

Operational costs of telephone charges, postage and marketing will be charged to GRIP.

3. Supportive Services:

Include child care, weekly stipends (until client receives first paycheck), uniforms, tools, drug testing, DMV printouts, monthly bus passes, transportation reimbursements, personal necessities, training school fees, fingerprint and other fees, and other non-cash incentives and awards (\$25-\$50). Total of \$130,268 is split to GRIP \$65,268 (50%) and WIA \$65,000 (50%) following the total grant funding split.

4. Training:

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Work Experience from 400 to 600 hours per student at \$8 Ca. Minimum wage will be offered to 40 of the 75 proposed clients. Cost includes payroll taxes and worker's compensation insurance charges and will be split 62%-38% between GRIP \$165,000 and WIA \$100,000.

Vocational training is planned for up to 38 clients with costs ranging from estimated \$7,500 for higher skill technical training down to \$2,000 at ROP or Junior college classes, or any appropriate training in between. Case managers will look for any PELL or other grant opportunities for all clients. On-the-Job training (OJT) is planned with salaries ranging from \$8 to \$16 per hour. Reimbursement will be at 50% and will be available for up to 16 students. Total training cost of \$321,500 is split to GRIP at \$171,000 and to WIA at \$150,500. The split is appx. 53% GRIP, 47% WIA.

5. Indirect Costs/Other:

All normal WIA indirect costing and expenses will apply to both GRIP at an estimated \$59,936 for GRIP and WIA \$57,674. Alliance Worknet does not have an assigned indirect cost rate.

Average costs:

This \$1,009,520 program will serve 75 or more clients. This equates to an average cost of \$13,460 per client. Overall GRIP \$500,000 (49.5%) and WIA/Other In-kind \$509,520 (50.5%)

Section I - Statement of Need and High Intensity Gang Activity Areas (HIGAA's)

1. Describe the geographical area the project will target and include the county/counties where services will be provided. Up to five bonus points will be awarded to projects serving one or more of the HIGAA's identified in Section 5 D of the SFP.

Geographical Area: This program will take place in Stanislaus County, one of the HIGAA's listed in the SFP. Located in the San Joaquin Valley, Stanislaus County (population 525,000) is bordered by the counties of San Joaquin on the north, Calaveras and Tuolumne on the east, Merced on the south and Santa Clara on the west, and is approximately 60 miles east of the greater San Francisco Bay metropolitan area. Stanislaus county includes nine cities and a substantial amount of unincorporated land, most of which is dedicated to our major industry; agriculture. The largest cities are Modesto (pop. 202,000), Turlock (67,000), Ceres (35,000) Oakdale (18,000) and Patterson (17,000). The agriculturally-based economy attracts a large number of unskilled workers from central and south America as well as a significant number of immigrants from southeast and southwest Asia.

2. Describe the unmet need of the youth in the area that the proposed project will target. Include an explanation of how the unmet need was determined and what factors have contributed to the unmet need. Provide the following statistical information that supports the need for this project and include data sources: gang-related homicides, number of youth on probation or parole, high school drop-out rates, high school academic performance index scores, poverty levels and total number of youth in service area.

For our gang-involved youth (and those at-risk of becoming gang-involved) Stanislaus County is desperately in need of positive activities and services that can lead youth away from gangs and toward success.

A profile of Stanislaus County youth issues reveals formidable challenges regarding youth, education and crime issues. The Stanislaus County Office of Education reports that 24.7% (26,622) of the county's 108,000 K-12 students speak a first language other than English. The California Department of Education, Demographics Office reports that Stanislaus County has a higher dropout rate (17.2%) than the state average (16.8%). Of those 17.2% (1,774 dropouts), 754 (42.5%) were Hispanic or Latino. It is noteworthy that Modesto City and Ceres Unified High Schools, which are located in areas of high gang activity, accounted for 413 of the Hispanic or Latinos dropouts.

The Stanislaus County Children's Council, in their "Condition of Children & Youth Report 2008" indicates that 20.1% of county youth live in poverty, and 24% of youth receive food stamps. According to the County Probation Department's most recent Annual Report (2007), of the estimated 3,800 gang members in Stanislaus County, about 1,150 are between the ages of 12 and

17. In 2007 there were 3,753 juvenile arrests, up 3.4% from the previous year. Juvenile Hall admissions in 2007 totaled 2,088 up only 83 from the prior year, due in large part to space limitations. The Stanislaus County Sheriffs Department states there are now (in 2008) 5,496 documented gang members, an increase of 45% in one year! The County Probation Department is currently supervising 798 juvenile offenders, many of who are gang-affiliated. For those minors who are arrested, but who do not represent a level of threat to the community that requires incarceration, the County Courts, Sheriffs Department, Juvenile Probation Department and city Police Departments operate "Diversion", or "Alternative to Custody" programs which impose community supervision and sanctions. In 2007, 392 juveniles were placed in these programs. On a typical day there are approximately 60 youth who are participating. While being closely supervised, these minors are allowed to attend school, counseling, and perform community service work. But because of other law enforcement priorities and limited budgets, there are few resources available to offer opportunities beyond community service, basic education or other publicly-funded services such as counseling, mental health treatment, etc. Stanislaus County's 93 Probation Officers (PO) case manage 798 juvenile offenders, each PO managing (on average) 9 youth and 35 adults. With these high caseloads, P.O.s cannot provide the same level of academic and vocational guidance as our proposed program. For youth who are already gang-involved, and those at-risk youth who are not yet involved in the legal system, there are no programs specifically designed and funded to guide them in a positive direction while provide funding to do so. It is these youth who are the primary target group of this program.

In general, workforce development funds for youth are directed to eligible youth who have the most potential to benefit –i.e. to succeed in school and/or in the workforce. This approach bypasses youth who are known to have gang affiliations. It is these youth that this program will assist.

3. Explain why the need cannot be met with existing resources through the local or regional educational, employment and training service delivery infrastructures.

Simply put, the workforce delivery systems of Stanislaus County are taxed to their limits on a day-to-day basis due to current economic conditions, with more than 300 individuals visiting the local One-Stop Resource Centers each day. Employment and training services available to the community are in high demand by average, law-abiding citizens who have been negatively affected by the downturn economic conditions.

EDD's October 17, 2008 "Monthly Labor Force Data for Counties" report indicates an unemployment rate of 10.5% in Stanislaus County, which ranks as the 6th highest out of the 58 counties. This puts us well above the state (7.5%) and national (6.1%) unemployment rates. Economic conditions in the region have exhibited a sharp downturn over the last twelve months, driven by decreases in the construction and finance industries. Home foreclosure rates are among the highest in the country. According to the September 12, 2008 Business Journal, "California cities accounted for eight of the top 10 metro foreclosure rates out of the 230 metro areas tracked in the August report." Modesto was ranked number three in the nation! The agricultural sector – the primary economic driver in the region – has declined significantly in the food processing sector, resulting in more than 4,400 worker lay-offs since 2003. Despite the economic and employment challenges, the regional population has increased approximately 19% since 2000, with large numbers of people continuing to relocate to the Central Valley in search of lower cost housing.

These current economic conditions include poverty rates averaging near 20%. (BLS, 2006), slumping housing and financial markets and increasing foreclosures combined with increasing demand from employers for more highly skilled workers across all sectors, have sharply increased

customer/job seeker demand for services. This demand cannot be effectively addressed in light of the static level of workforce development resources (funding and staffing) available for operating the One-stop Centers.

Another important factor is that the gang/at-risk youth who would qualify for services under this grant program require more intense services than those that are generally offered with regular formula funding. Stanislaus County's dropout rate is higher than average, and most of those dropout youths have little or no work experience.

Receiving funds specifically aimed at serving youth at-risk of gang involvement will not only have long-term positive effects for the law enforcement community, but will also allow the local workforce system to provide a more rapid, robust, and comprehensive menu of services to all its customers.

Section II - Target Group

1. Describe the characteristics of the youth that will be served by this project including barriers and supportive service needs such as housing, drug and alcohol treatment, counseling, etc. Describe how you will determine whether a youth is a current gang member, gang involved or at-risk of gang involvement. The target group will be at-risk youth aged 14-18 and adults aged 19-24, and current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement. They will be low-income as defined by the Lower Living Standard Income Level (LLSIL), which is published by the Secretary of Labor. The participants, in addition to being low-income, will have other barriers such as, basic literacy skills deficient (not able to perform math and or reading and language at greater than the 9th grade level, high school dropouts, pregnant and/or parenting teens, current foster and former foster youth, and offenders. Many of the participants will need supportive services like transportation, records sealing, background checks, drug screening, GED testing fees, work and/or school clothing, temporary housing, personal or group counseling, drug and/or alcohol treatment, childcare and referral to local faith based free tattoo removal services. Probation, law enforcement, education agencies, and community-based organizations will identify participants as current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement. Also, participants may self identify themselves as current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement. Case management staff will also look as resident information and determine if a participant resides in neighborhoods identified by law enforcement as an at-risk gang neighborhood.

2. Identify the outreach and recruitment methods that will be used to contact and recruit current gang members, gang-involved, or at-risk of gang involvement youth. Demonstrate how these methods will enable you to reach the targeted youth population.

A StanGRIP Coordinator and StanGRIP Job Developer will be selected to coordinate the marketing, outreach, recruitment and job development efforts of the two main case management agencies (Alliance Worknet and Ceres Unified School District). The coordinator will partner with case managers to perform outreach by connecting and partnering with community agencies that interact with youth as identified in Item 1. Outreach materials will be disseminated using established networks of youth service organizations in each local area through print materials, orientation sessions, group presentations, e-mail blasts, newsletters and the internet. In order to receive appropriate referrals, Careerquest and Project YES has worked to develop a comprehensive referral partnership with Stanislaus County Probation (Probation), Modesto Police (MPD), Stanislaus County Office of Education (SCOE), Modesto City High District (MCH), El Concilio, and El Joven Noble.

Through this outreach and referral process, law enforcement officers hand out "CQ postcards" to youth on the "streets." CQ and Projec YES has been a partner with MPD and SCOE's gang intervention program "Project SAFE." In the program, law enforcement officers identify "gang youth" and have them attend regularly scheduled "call-ins." At the call-ins, youth are presented with and referred to various community services. It is the goal of the program to enroll 155 active gang members or those youth at-risk from gangs.

The StanGRIP program will participate in community events and also perform teacher and student presentations to the various high schools and alternative education schools located throughout Stanislaus County and Juvenile Hall. Many of our outreach It is expected that the higher gang populations will come from the communities of Modesto, Ceres, Patterson, and Riverbank. Because our youth programs have a track record of providing services throughout the county, and not in just one or two particular locations, a variety of public and private agencies have been willing to refer customers to our youth programs. Since Program Year 2006-2007, the Alliance Worknet's Careerquest Youth Program and Ceres Unified School District's Project YES Youth Program have connected with approximately thirty-five hundred (3500) youth and young adults and recruited/enrolled eight hundred and fifteen (815) at-risk youth and at-risk young adults into their respective programs. The clients served came from communities such as, Patterson, Newman, Oakdale, Riverbank, Turlock, Keyes, Hughson, Ceres, and Modesto. The big positive to these past recruitments/enrollments is that they included youth and young adults from communities throughout Stanislaus County.

Section III - Planned Approach

1. Describe the intervention and/or prevention strategy that will be used to achieve the planned goals and objectives. Include a service process flowchart. Demonstrate how this strategy is comprehensive and community focused providing a holistic approach to serving the target population.

As current youth and young adult gang members, gang involved, and those at-risk of gang involvement are identified, the CalGRIP coordinator will pre-assess the applicant to determine which service flow may work best for the client. The coordinator will determine to what level an applicant is gang involved and what educational or workforce skills the applicant is lacking. The coordinator will present an overview of the Integrated Service and Unified Service Models to the applicant. The applicant will determine which service flow suits them best. The determining factors may be; Geographic location, specialty services, program partnership with referring agency, prior knowledge of program, etc. The applicant will then enrolled into the CalGRIP program and will receive services in the manner depending upon their model of choice.

Integrated Service Model:

The Alliance Worknet's youth program is designed to provide workforce training services to eligible youth to prepare them for participation in the labor force. Program participants are referred to a variety of workforce preparation and personal growth services through a single case management team operated by the Alliance Worknet. The services are organized as a "menu" of offerings that are made available by multiple private and public agencies, each of which has agreed to provide their services on a fixed-fee or no-fee basis.

This consolidated system emphasizes holistic youth development. It appears seamless from the youth's perspective as referrals are coordinated and linked by the case management team. To further ensure maximum access to services for all eligible youth, the case management team

operates from multiple locations within our county area and is responsible for developing individualized strategies for participating youth.

The Unified Service Model:

Ceres Unified School District's (CUSD) Educational Options Department facilitates a multitude of programs that range from after school recreation, academic intervention, adult education, family resources and referrals, youth employment services, summer school, English language development for adults and youth, family literacy, early childhood education, and much more. CUSD is able to provide a seamless delivery of comprehensive services to Stanislaus County youth and young adults. As a "one-stop" center, Ceres Project YES provides resources, referrals, and services, including access to: counseling services, a mini-computer lab that is internet accessible, and other supportive services for youth and families. With late afternoon and evening hours, clients will have a safe environment in which to accomplish their individual education and career goals.

CUSD operates an innovative "one-stop" center, in which education and employment partners are brought to the center to provide workshops and training to participating clients. The philosophy of the Ceres Unified Model is that all participants will demonstrate their dedication to self-improvement and program activities, and view the youth program as a comprehensive system, not a temporary job service.

2. Describe the specific types of services and training that will engage youth in positive community alternatives, increase their vocational and job readiness skills, link them to career pathways and reduce their risk of gang involvement. Identify who will provide the services and/or training. Demonstrate how your services and training relate to your planned performance benchmarks.

This project will address the participant's need for academic instruction, vocational training, paid work experience, supportive services and other appropriate resources through a customized, personalized and accelerated program entry via direct referral from County Probation, Law Enforcement Agencies, Modesto City School's Outreach & Intervention Coordinator, El Concilio, Joven Noble and various community based organizations (CBOs). A central feature of the program will be the expert case management service provided to each participant by staff of the Alliance Worknet's Careerquest, Project YES and Friends Outside Programa. The program supervisor and lead case manager understand the pressures that the project-identified youth must deal with, as they were both at-risk from gangs while growing up. The project will include a gang specialist job developer to ensure linkages to employers and employment opportunities. Alliance Worknet has been highly successful in managing a Workforce Investment Act youth program.

As participants are identified, they will be directed through an intensified and personalized service process via one of the service delivery strategies as described in the Service Process Flow Chart. The initial process will include orientation, eligibility determination, needs assessment, career evaluation, and the development of a training or employment plan for each StanGRIP participant. The initial process will be focused on the needs of the individual applicant and is designed to identify the most appropriate mix of services, support, and training to assist the participant in obtaining a high school diploma or GED equivalent, increasing numeracy and literacy levels, entering post-secondary education, or advancing in a high-growth occupation.

Once enrolled, if a participant needs their high school diploma or GED, or basic skills remediation (math and reading), they will receive intensive tutoring services from vendors and weekly stipends for regular attendance. The participant will also receive an incentive once they receive their diploma

or GED. A paid work experience/internship (WEX) will be obtained for those participants with diploma or GED. The WEX will be determined after a battery of assessments is completed. These assessments include basic skills such as CASAS or TABE, WorkKeys (determines real world work skills aptitude levels), and Career Cruising that is a personality-based career assessment tool. The StanGRIP job developer will work with employers who have a strong inclination to work with "gang" youth. The WEX assignments will be career oriented and will include ongoing soft skills training that will increase the job retention rate. WEXs will be approximately 500 hours in length. The Job Developer will constantly monitor the interaction between the WEX site and WEX trainee and intervening as needed to overcome any issues that develop. This process has worked well with the "regular" WIA at-risk youth population. The placement rate from past WEX sites is approximately 35%.

Some customers will be able to choose from appropriate training options offered in their local area, including On-the-Job Training (OJT), and occupational or vocational training using Individual Training Accounts, as well as any supportive services necessary and reasonable for successful program participation. Training will be consistent with established policies and procedures for training providers and programs listed on the California State Eligible Training Provider List, which provides training in high-growth, high wage, and demand occupations. Stipends will be available to a student who is regularly attending training and meeting training benchmarks.

On-the-Job Training will also be made available to interested participants using established employer networks throughout the region. The length of the OJT training is determined by various factors, such as job complexity, prior work experience, and prior vocational training. WorkKeys will be used to help determine the appropriate vocational training. The WorkKeys Assessment System tests participants in Applied Mathematics, Locating Information, and Reading for Information. The result of the assessment is a Work Readiness Certificate, which has been promoted to employers and connects work skills, training, and testing based on Occupational Profiles throughout the country. The Work Readiness Certificate is one tool that will enable participants to attain, retain, and advance in high demand occupations. The WorkKeys assessments will provide participant and employers with real world skills evaluations and individual scores indicating their aptitude for the workplace. The WorkKeys Assessment System provides regional standards that are accepted by many employers. The certificate not only provides actual scores, but an in-depth analysis of skill levels are provided for employers to know precisely the level of skills each potential employee possesses. WorkKeys has been used regionally to assist employers in their decisions regarding advancement of their workers.

3. Describe how your service plan will address the barriers of the targeted youth and prepare them to enter an education or training program, obtain employment in a high wage/high growth industry or in an occupation with future career advancement opportunity, attain a degree/certificate, achieve literacy/numeracy gains or return to/remain in secondary school.

A critical step in the initial evaluation and assessment process will be the identification and resolution of any barriers to the StanGRIP program participation, completion, and successful entry into education, training, or employment in their chosen career path. Barrier identification, through assessment, counseling, and individual discussions with the assigned case manager, is the first step in resolving those barriers. Once identified, each barrier will be addressed through the provision of specific supportive services (record sealing, counseling, transportation, clothing, or child care assistance) or through referrals to one-stop and community partner agencies (tattoo removal, housing, health services), ensuring a holistic approach that maximizes the opportunity for

success of each at-risk youth or young adult. As an additional service, the partners in this project have agreed to provide intense tutoring services to prepare participants for entry into education and/or training and to help them achieve literacy/numeracy gains. Having a strong math and reading foundation will allow participants to seriously consider post-secondary education, and vocational training. The resolution of each identified barrier increases the participant's chances for successful completion of education, training, entry into high wage/high growth employment, and retention.

The comprehensive assessment process includes an evaluation of basic academic skill levels, an analysis of work history and transferable skills, and the identification of interests, aptitudes, and abilities of each StanGRIP participant. Stanislaus County has implemented the WorkKeys assessment to evaluate skills in Applied Mathematics, Locating Information, and Reading for Information – the regionally recognized Central California Work Readiness Certificate will be issued to each participant completing this assessment and appropriate remediation activities, as needed. An analysis of transferable skills, in concert with the entire assessment process, will allow each participant to successfully identify areas in which they are already competitive in the local labor market, as well as areas that may require additional improvement, so that they can narrow their training and educational needs and maximize both their training time, and the effectiveness of training resources made available to them through the project. In the project, staff has planned field trips to at least four universities and/or junior colleges in Northern California. The planned visits will be to Stanford, UC Davis, UC Merced, California State University, Modesto Junior College, and Delta College. These trips will allow the targeted youth to see life beyond their gangs and expose them to the possibilities of a higher education and a better, more productive life.

Staff selection, project marketing and recruitment of participants will begin immediately upon notification of project award. Initial participant enrollments are anticipated in July 09'. As participants enter and complete the upfront orientation, eligibility determination, assessment, and career planning processes, they will be enrolled into project services. Initial participants may enter their selected training programs as early as July 2009, with training program entrants anticipated through December 2010. Participants may begin completing the program and enter education programs or unsubsidized employment as soon as December 2009, with program completions and placements anticipated through late 2010). Participants will remain in contact with their assigned case manager throughout program participation, completion, placement and follow-up/retention. Project evaluation and close-out will conclude in June 2011 (See SFP Form 2 – Proposal Work Plan).

Our "Placement in Employment, Education or Training" goal is aligned with the States measure, however, based on the past performance of our current youth programs, we anticipate that the project performance goals for the "Attained Recognized Certificate/Diploma/Degree" and "Literacy/Numeracy Gains" will be 56% and 46% respectively.

Outcomes and benefits for all program participants will be documented and reported using the State JTA participant reporting system. Participant reports generated by the JTA system, specific to this project, will be reviewed on a quarterly basis, along with project reports, to insure accurate information regarding project and participant progress is shared with all partners.

Our Youth Council has a long-standing policy of reaching as many youth as possible, especially those most in need of services. The administrative staff of the Youth Council was directly involved in the design of the proposed StanGRIP program.

The County Probation Department will refer those targeted offenders who are on active and informal probation for educational and workforce development services. CUSD will provide intensive WIA services to those youth that choose to participate in the Unified Service Model Delivery System. AW will provide intensive WIA services to those youth that choose to participate in the Integrated Service Model Delivery System. FOS will provide intensive WIA services to young adults who have been previously incarcerated. Through our new formal partnerships with law enforcement, probation and El Concilio and Joven Noble, the proposed StanGRIP program creates a pathway (and the resources) to provide WIA services to gang-involved youth and youth who are at risk of gang involvement. Our Youth Council has a long-standing policy of reaching as many youth as

possible, especially those most in need of services. CUSD, AW, and FOS use the States Job Training Automation System (JTA) to ensure that participant's services are not being duplicated. Because of the relationships that are developed and the awareness of the services provided by each partner, it is expected that referrals and services that are provided will be sustained using the partner's regular funding streams.

1. Describe the organization's capability to conduct and administer a federally funded project including your ability to collect and report financial and participant performance data as required.

The Alliance Worknet while administering highly successful federally funded projects for 25 years, is subject to and complies with the Single Audit Act and all pertinent OMB circulars related to fiscal management of Federal funds, and has a record of being able to meet the State's requirements for reporting performance data, cash requests, expenditure reports, and participant reports using the JTA system which is currently in place and in use.

2. Describe past or present accomplishments in working with youth programs and how these funds will build on these successes.

Since Program Year 2006-2007, the Alliance Worknet's Careerquest Youth Program and Ceres Unified School District's Project YES Youth Program have connected with approximately thirty-five hundred (3500) youth and young adults and recruited/enrolled eight hundred and fifteen (815) at-risk youth and at-risk young adults into their respective programs. The funds we are requesting will allow us to reach a segment of our local youth that we have been unable to target in the past.

3. Describe your organization's infrastructure including proposed staffing for this project that demonstrates your ability to achieve the project goals. Demonstrate that your staff have experience in working with the targeted youth population.

The Alliance Worknet has administered highly successful federally funded projects for 25 years. The proposed StanGRIP program will be staffed with 3.6 FTEs which equals six case manager and two supervisors. These are the same experts who operate our existing WIA programs. All three of our primary operators (Alliance Worknet, Ceres Unified School District and Friends Outside) have worked with and achieved success with limited numbers of the the targeted youth population. The

StanGRIP program will enable us to further contribute to the success gang-involved youth and, at the same time, contribute to the well-being of our community.

Section VIII – Budget Summary Narrative and Plan

A. Staff Salaries: WIA 15% (GRIP) will pay for \$67,498 (49.7%) of the salaries of the StanGRIP staff. Cash/In-Kind is expected to total \$68,381 (50.3%).

B. Number of full-time equivalents: 3.5 FTE's was calculated by estimating how many hours CQ staff will charge out to GRIP and Cash/In-Kind for this project.

C. Staff Benefits: Estimates were made of standard county reimbursement rates for fringe benefits. All fringe benefit charges follow the staff wages in being charged appropriately to GRIP, WIA, or other in-kind funding sources (GRIP 54% and Cash/In-Kind 46%).

D. Staff Benefit Rate: County rates were used for all staff salaries and are estimated at 44.9% of salaries.

E. Staff Travel: County travel mileage reimbursements are made at the Federal rate of \$0.50 cents per mile and may include staff participation and project related conference(s). Expected travel is \$1575 (38.6%) to GRIP and \$2500 (61.4%) to Cash/In-Kind.

F. Operational Costs: The expected amount is \$25,000 and includes items such as, communications, facilities, utilities, maintenance, consumable supplies, audit, etc. that will support the project and will be covered by Cash/In-Kind.

G. Furniture and Equipment: \$5,000 for office re-configuration and charged to cash/in-kind.

H. Consumable Testing and Instructional Materials: Will purchase TABE and/or CASAS booklets and scoring sheets, GED prep books, etc., are estimated at \$9,250. \$4250 (46%) will be charged to GRIP and \$5000 (54%) to Cash/In-Kind.

I. Tuition Payments/Vouchers: Based on estimated training cost of \$500 to \$4,500. It's estimated that at least 50 project participants will receive training. \$50,000 (52.6%) charged to GRIP, \$45,000 (47.4%) charged to Cash/In-Kind.

J. On-the-Job training: Is planned with salaries ranging from \$8 to \$16 per hour. Reimbursement will be at 50% and will be available for up to 15 students. Total training cost of \$93,000 is split 50/50 to GRIP and Cash/IN-Kind.

K. Participant Wages and Fringe Benefits: Paid Work Experience (WEX) from 400 to 600 hours per student at \$8 (CA. Minimum wage). A WEX will be offered to approximately 100 the 155 proposed clients. The \$334,054 total cost includes payroll taxes and worker's compensation insurance charges and will be split GRIP (52.4%), Cash/In-Kind (47.6%).

L. Participant Supportive Services: Estimated that participants will average \$705 each in supportive services that can include stipends, tutoring, GED/CAHSEE examinations, weekly training and educational, counseling services, clothing, uniforms, tools, drug testing, DMV printouts, monthly bus passes, transportation reimbursements, personal necessities, training school fees, fingerprint and other fees, and other non-cash incentives and awards, GRIP \$65,268 (59.7%), and Cash/In-Kind is \$44,000 (40.3%).

M. Retention Services: Included in youth follow-up is estimated amount of \$10,000 for the time an Alliance Worknet case manager will work with exiting youth. Total will be charged to Cash/In-Kind.

O. Indirect Costs: Stanislaus County does not have an assigned indirect rate.

P. Other (describe): Includes all normal WIA indirect costing and expenses will apply to both GRIP at 10% and WIA at 10%, and some operational costs. Partner in-kind matches of \$23,620 (see Commitment Letters) are included in this line item.

Q. Total Funding: The total funding expected for this project is \$1,009,520 GRIP will fund \$500,000 (49.3%) and Cash/In-kind will fund \$509,520 (50.7%)
