Approval to Enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the City of Patterson for the Design, Development and Construction of an Intermodal Bus Transfer Facility in Patterson

DISCUSSION:

The Department of Public Works Transit Division recommends the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors approve entering into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the City of Patterson for the design, development and construction of an Intermodal Bus Transfer Facility Project (Project) in the city limits of Patterson.

With the increased population on the westside of Stanislaus County and as the need for transit services has grown, the need for an improved bus transfer facility has arisen. The current transfer facility consists of one shelter and is located on the curve of the Plaza Circle by North Park in downtown Patterson. Parking the forty-foot StaRT Route 40 transit bus in the curve and deploying the wheelchair lift has been difficult due to the slope and curve of the road. The current transfer facility can accommodate only one bus and there are times when there are three buses from either Routes 40 and 45 or Patterson and Newman Dial-a-Rides that need to be at the location for passengers to transfer to other buses. Currently, the smaller buses must park on adjoining side streets for passengers to load and unload.

The new facility is proposed to be located adjacent to South Park on South Salado Avenue between Plaza Circle and Highway 33. The current bus shelter will be relocated to this area, a second shelter will be added and the curb will be yellow-curbed to accommodate multiple buses and to allow for parking during times the buses are not operating. Due to the wideness of the corner of Highway 33 and South Salado Avenue, and to ensure pedestrian safety walking to the bus stop, a pedestrian island will be constructed as part of the project.

The Project will entail a final design of the proposed improvements, an encroachment permit from the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) for work on Highway 33, demolition and redesign of the southwest corner of Highway 33 and South Salado Avenue, new curb and gutter in this area, construction of the pedestrian island, minor street repairs, yellow-curbing the bus stop area, pouring a slab for the two bus shelters and the installation of the two bus shelters. The City shall act as Project Administrator providing oversight and responsibility for the design, bid and construction of the project. The County shall act as Contract Administrator for the project and shall approve payments for eligible project costs.

The Patterson City Council approved entering into the MOU with the County at its October 21, 2008 meeting.

The Project has a cost estimate of under \$132,000 and will be funded entirely with Proposition 1-B Transit funds. Proposition 1-B funds are derived from the State Proposition 1-B that was passed by State voters in November 2006 that provided funds for transit and road projects. These funds are from the Transit allocation. The tentative project completion date is June 2009.



Subject: Approval of Stanislaus County Transit Westside Transfer Facility Project Concept and Agreement

Discussion: At the September 16th City Council meeting this item was introduced. At that time Council had some questions about the impact to the intersection and the safety and feasibility of pulling back the curb return at South Park. The item was referred to the City's Traffic Safety Committee for further review.

The Traffic Safety Committee (including Cleve Morris, Bryan Whitemyer, Steve Hall, Pat Bodin, Tyrone Spencer, Adrienne Chaney, Ronnie Tafoya, Robert Andrade, Curtis Jorritsma, Mario Gouveia (design engineer from Boyle Engineering) and Mike Willett) met to review other potential locations as well as the challenges presented by the South Park location. The committee agreed that the South Park site was the best location, but also felt that a field review including our Traffic Engineer (Christopher Thnay from TJKM, Inc.) would be appropriate.

The field review meeting was held on October 7th with Brad Christian (Stanislaus County Public Works Transit Division), Christopher Thnay (TJKM), Adrienne, Ronnie, Curtis, and Mike attending. Two main options were considered, a midblock crosswalk and a pedestrian refuge island. Illustrations of both options are attached. After looking at the difficulties that a mid-block crosswalk would create, including the increased costs, the consensus was to proceed with the pedestrian refuge island. This is the recommended approach. Adding the pedestrian refuge island to the project is expected to raise the overall project cost, although the County agrees that having it in the design enhances pedestrian safety and helps reduce potential liability for the City due to pedestrians crossing Salado.

The revised project cost estimate is \$131,723. Stanislaus County will be providing up to \$175,000 in Prop. 1B transit funds and Local Transportation Funds for the project. Also attached to this staff report is a project agreement. The City Attorney and Public Works staff has reviewed this agreement. Upon Council approval of the project and agreement, this item is scheduled to be taken to the County Board of Supervisors for approval on November 18. Construction should be completed by June 2009.

should be completed by June 2009. A representative from the Stanislaus County Public Works Transit Division will be in attendance to answer any Council questions. Cost: The project cost is estimated at \$131,723.

Budget Impact: There is no budget impact associated with this item.





MEMORANMUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF PATTERSON AND STANISLAUS COUNTY FOR THE PATTERSON BUS STOP IMPROVEMENT PROJECT / TRANSFER FACILITY PROJECT

This Memorandum of Understanding is made and entered by and between the City of Patterson ("City"), and the County of Stanislaus ("County")" for the Patterson Bus Stop Improvement Project / Transfer Facility Project, on _____, 2008.

WHEREAS, The City of Patterson downtown Park Plaza has become the hub for Westside County residents utilizing public transit to make bus transfers to other parts of the County and region. The construction of a new, larger transfer facility is important to accommodate current and future transit ridership. This is a joint project between the County of Stanislaus and the City of Patterson envisioned and planned to address these critical needs; and

WHEREAS, This Bus Stop Improvement Project in the City of Patterson will serve to improve efficiency of service by improving accessibility to Stanislaus Regional Transit (StaRT) transit services for health care, shopping, education, employment, public services and recreation needs; and

WHEREAS, This project is designed to relocate the existing transfer point for all Westside services to a new bus stop location. The existing location is at the City's North Park, which is adjacent to Hwy 33 and is next to Plaza Circle.

WHEREAS, The plaza is designed on the concept of a roundabout with streets emanating from the central plaza "circle." Four StaRT bus services, Route 40 and 45 and Patterson and Newman Dial-a-Ride, use the bus stop for transfers that carry passengers east to Turlock, north to Westley, Grayson and Modesto and south to Newman, Crows Landing and Gustine. The County has been providing transit service to the Westside since the mid 1980s; and

WHEREAS, The current bus stop location has two problems, which directly affect accessibility and safety; being able to deploy the wheelchair ramp without scraping the cement because of the curvature of the roadbed and the ability of the bus to be able to pull up "square" with the curb for accessibility and safety; and

WHEREAS, Upon review of other potential locations in downtown Patterson, the proposed new location, also in the City Park Plaza but adjacent to South Park and sited on South Salado Avenue between Highway 33 and South El Circulo, has been chosen for bus accessibility and passenger safety reasons; and

WHEREAS, The construction aspect of the project will entail redesigning, reshaping and modifying the curb return at the referenced location to accommodate the right turn movement of a 42-foot bus from Highway 33 onto South Salado Avenue without encroaching onto the adjacent traffic lane. The park side of the stop will be red curbed to accommodate several buses for transfers. Bus shelters will be located at the stop for passenger convenience.

WHEREAS, This project has clear regional benefits to the residents of Stanislaus County in that it improves access to transit service to and from the Westside to transit centers in Modesto and Turlock that provide access to Greyhound and Amtrak services.

NOW THEREFORE, the County and City mutually agree as follows:

CITY OBLIGATIONS

1.0 The City shall act as Project Administrator providing oversight and responsibility for the design and construction of the project.

2.0 The City or its authorized designee will perform all aspects of planning and engineering including, but not limited to, securing right-of-way, preparation of right-ofway plans, clearance from all utilities, environmental certifications, if necessary, maps, securing a Caltrans encroachment permit, documentation, preliminary and final design drawings and related analysis.

3.0 The City or its' authorized designee shall perform all aspects of construction as related to the designated site including, but not limited to, demolition of existing and relocation and replacement of curb and gutter, minor street repair due to demolition, redcurbing of bus transfer area, striping of South Salado Avenue at Highway 33 as necessary to ensure safe traffic flow, removal and relocation of the existing StaRT (County) Transit Shelter Facility and the pick-up and installation of a second StaRT Shelter Facility at the designated site.

COUNTY OBLIGATIONS

4.0 The County shall act as Contract Administrator for the project. The County will provide funding for the project and shall pay only for approved costs directly associated with the project.

5.0 The County shall review and comment upon any and all aspects of the Project plans, specifications and designs and the City shall incorporate all reasonable requests to modify such plans, specifications and designs and work performed. An authorized County staff member shall sign the project plans, indicating County approval of the design, project plans, and specifications.

6.0 The County shall provide bus shelter facilities including the current bus shelter, bench and Map/Schedule holder and a new bus shelter, bench and Map/Schedule Holder. Contingent on finding availability, the County will pressure wash the shelter during the year. Contingent on finding availability, the County shall replace damaged bus shelters and benches.

7.0 The County will pay costs to repair existing park watering systems and replace existing lawn disturbed by demolition or construction for the project. Repairs and

replacement will be to the same standards as current watering systems and lawn. The County shall not be responsible for any additional amenities that the City may desire to include in the project such as garbage receptacles, plants, etc. These items shall be the sole responsibility of the City.

MUTUAL OBLIGATIONS OF THE CITY AND COUNTY

8.0 The County, in its capacity as Contract Administrator, will be responsible for the approval of all project expenditures in compliance with the requirements of the County's Proposition 1B Funds with which this project will be funded. As such, the County will reimburse the City for all actual expenses incurred and mutually agreed upon by both parties under the auspices of the County.

9.0 The County shall reimburse the City for expenses incurred. For each reimbursement to occur, the City shall submit to the County Public Works Department Transit Division a City invoice for reimbursement. Included with such City invoice shall be copies of all actual vendor invoices in support of the City's invoice and the invoices or support documentation necessary to pay for work performed directly by the City in the course of this project, including administrative overhead. Such invoices will be based on the time and materials necessary to complete the work.

10.0 The total amount of the project will not exceed the maximum funded under the Prop 1B GC 8879.55 (a) (3) & GC 8879.55 (a) (2) grant and the County local Transportation Funds (LTF) of \$175,000 which will include the County's Administrative overhead.

11.0 If the cost of the project exceeds the \$175,000 amount stated above, the additional costs shall be split evenly between the City and the County. If the cost of the project exceeds the \$175,000 stated above, neither agency shall receive any administrative overhead compensation.

12.0 The desired project completion date is June 1, 2009.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

13.0 <u>Additional Documents</u>: Each party shall, at the request of the other, acknowledge and deliver whatever additional instruments and do such other acts as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Agreement.

14.0 <u>Entire Contract</u>: This Agreement is the entire agreement of the parties. There are no understandings or agreements pertaining to this Agreement except as are expressly stated in writing in this Agreement or in any document attached hereto or incorporated herein by reference.

15.0 <u>Amendment</u>: Any amendment of this contract shall be in writing, signed by both parties hereto.

16.0 <u>Negotiated Contract</u>: This Agreement has been arrived at through negotiation between the parties. Neither party is to be deemed the party that prepared this Agreement within the meaning of California Civil Code Section 1654.

17.0 <u>Indemnity</u>: Neither party, nor any of its officers or employees, shall be responsible for any damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by the other party under or in connection with any work delegated to that party under this Agreement. The parties further agree, pursuant to Government Code section 895.4, that each party shall fully indemnify and hold harmless the other party and its agents, officers, employees and contractors from and against all claims, damages, losses, judgments, liabilities, expenses and other costs, including litigation costs and attorney fees, arising out of, resulting from, or in connection with any work delegated to or action taken or omitted to be taken by such party under this Agreement.

18.0 <u>Notices</u>: Any notices required herein shall be in writing and be given personally or by certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the respective parties as follows:

19.0 <u>Counterparts</u>: This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which so executed shall be deemed to be an original. The counterparts shall together constitute one Agreement.
