STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 2. Authorize the Project Manager to issue a notice to proceed contingent upon receipt of proper insurance and bonds.

FISCAL IMPACT:

On March 31, 2009, the Board of Supervisors approved the plans and specifications for the emergency power system improvements at the Stanislaus County Honor Farm. At that time it was estimated that the construction cost for the emergency power system improvements would be \$451,500,with a total estimated project cost of \$610,000 to be funded by Public Facility Fees (PFF). The Board at that time authorized the call for bids for the emergency power system improvements at the Stanislaus County Honor Farm Facilities.

- Authorize the Project Manager to negotiate and sign contracts and work authorizations necessary to manage the construction phase including construction management, professional services, and other related costs as long as the costs are within the project budget approved by the Board of Supervisors.
- 4. Approve the use of \$359,569 of Public Facility Fees (PFF) funds for funding of the Emergency Power System Improvements.
- 5. Direct the Auditor-Controller to increase appropriations and revenue in the amount of \$359,569 from Public Facility Fees (PFF) for this Capital Project budget as detailed in the attached Budget Journal form.

FISCAL IMPACT (CONTINUED):

On May 6, 2009 eight bids were received and opened. Bids were received from Collins Electrical Company, Inc. of Stockton, CA; Interstate Construction, Inc. of Roseville, CA; Elkins Electric Co. of Oakdale, CA; Layman Electric, Inc. of Modesto, CA; Modesto Industrial Electric Co., Inc. of Modesto, CA; Modesto Executive Electric, Inc. of Modesto, CA; Barnum & Celillo Electric, Inc. of Sacramento, CA; and Pullman Construction Inc. of Middletown, CA. The bids ranged from \$273,716 to \$498,900 for the base bid.

Through a blind bid process comprised of three sequestered team members, it was determined the lowest responsible bid from Collins Electrical Company, Inc. of Stockton, California. The bid alternate included in the bid documents, which is not recommended, was to provide a large capacity 450 Kilowatt (KW). The estimated cost for this alternate was \$200,675. The bid alternates ranged from \$370,000 to \$461,143. Staff does not recommend awarding the bid alternate and the basis of award was the base bid only.

At this time, the Chief Executive Office is returning to the Board for approval to award a construction contract for the emergency power system improvements at the Stanislaus County Honor Farm to Collins Electrical Company, Inc., for the lump sum amount of \$273,716. The lowest responsible bid of \$273,716 is within the budget previously approved by the Board.

The Board previously approved funding of \$53,073 in Public Facility Fees through the design phase of the project. The total project cost with the current bid is \$412,642. This is substantially less than the projected construction cost of \$451,500, and projected project cost of \$610,000 estimated for this project in

March 2009. The project is completely funded by Public Facility Fees (PFF) approved by the PFF Committee on May 15, 2008.

At this time, staff is recommending that the Board approve the use of Public Facility Fees and to direct the Auditor-Controller to increase appropriations in the amount of \$359,569 from Public Facility Fees (PFF) for this Capital Project budget as detailed in the attached Budget Journal form for the construction phase of the project.

This project was considered by the Board of Supervisors on May 20, 2008, and is listed in the Final Fiscal Year 2007-2008 Stanislaus County Capital Improvement Plan: Honor Farm Facility Emergency Backup Power, Project Number 2002.352.

DISCUSSION:

The Stanislaus County Honor Farm was constructed in the 1960's and is situated on the San Joaquin River near Grayson. The Honor Farm is a minimum-security facility for sentenced and qualifying un-sentenced adult male inmates. The existing emergency power distribution is limited to strictly command and control functions within the administration/cafeteria building. The emergency power supply consists of a Kohler diesel generator to power the "bare essentials" (i.e., interior lighting, radio and security equipment) within the building. In the event of a utility outage, all other buildings, including the barracks, area/security lighting, the domestic well pump, and sewer treatment plant are inoperable.

In June of 2007, the Board of Supervisors approved the Needs Assessment and Master Plan for the Public Safety Center. This report outlined the current and future facility, staffing and operational needs and cost estimates for expanded jail and law enforcement facilities at the County's Public Safety Center and future replacement of the Men's Jail and Honor Farm. The plan also outlines future jail expansion beyond 2010 and future closure of the Honor Farm and Downtown Jail. The initial plan done in 2007 suggested the full jail expansion would cost in excess of \$210.5 million in one-time construction/facility costs with an additional \$17.3 million in on-going staffing and operational costs. Considering the current economy, there is no adequate funding source to expand and replace all the facilities identified in the Needs Assessment Reports. Despite the current budget and economic conditions, it may be important to continue to focus on solutions that will realistically meet the County's needs, using a phased approach by maintaining and extending the life of certain existing facilities until the economic conditions improve.

In March 2008, the County contracted with Greg E. Miller and Associates, Inc. to conduct a study to analyze and further define and identify specific areas and critical functions performed within the facility which require emergency power

during an extended electrical power disruption. The study also encompasses an analysis of the existing emergency power system as well as various buildings and activities identified by staff as requiring emergency power. The existing emergency power distribution is strictly located at the control central building. In the event of a utility outage, all other buildings, including the barracks, and area/security lighting is inoperable as well as the domestic well pump and sewer treatment plant.

The needs for emergency power were identified by staff at the outset of the review and analysis. The loads/existing electrical services are outlined as follows:

- 1. Detention Barracks: A total of 3 barrack buildings served from the 1200A main switchboard; the entire building's electrical system should be connected onto emergency power.
- 2. Area Security Lighting: Various County owned poles with floodlights circle the entire compound area and is served from the 1200A main switchboard. Currently there is no exterior security lighting on emergency power.
- 3. Control Central Building: Currently has limited emergency power however additional support function such as the kitchen, offices, etc. are inoperable during an outage; this building is served from the 1200A main switchboard.
- 4. Medical Building: Inmate medical functions should be on emergency power; this building is served from the 1200A main switchboard.
- 5. Clothing Building: Inmate laundry/commissary functions should be on emergency power; this building is served from a 200A service from the Staff Break Building.
- 6. Staff Break Building: Staff break room facilities should be on emergency power; served from its own 200A service.
- 7. Staff Locker Building: Staff locker facilities should be on emergency power; this building is served from the 400A switchboard near maintenance.
- 8. Main Security Gate Entrance: The main gate is inoperable and a guard must manually operate the gate; the point of connection is unknown. Emergency Power Systems Improvements
- 9. Domestic Well Pump: Domestic well supply should be on emergency power; this facility has its own service.
- 10. Sanitary Sewer Treatment Plant: Sanity system should be on emergency power; this facility has its own service.

It should be noted the largest obstacle associated with this project is developing a centralized emergency power system that consolidates different utility feeds,

establishing new means of distribution, all the while maintaining full operations during construction.

The total estimated cost of the project is \$412,642 to connect emergency power at the Stanislaus County Honor Farm.

The contract duration to Collins Electrical is 180 calendar days. Staff expects completion of this project to be in December 2009.

POLICY ISSUES:

The project will continue the Board of Supervisors goal to provide *A safe community*.

STAFFING IMPACT:

Existing Chief Executive Office Capital Project and Sheriff's Office staff will work collaboratively to implement the improvements at the Stanislaus County Honor Farm.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, dated this 19th day of May, 2009, by and between Collins Electrical Company, Inc. ("Contractor"), and the COUNTY OF STANISLAUS ("County"), acting under and by virtue of the authority vested in the County by the laws of the State of California.

WHEREAS, County, by its Resolution No. <u>B-19</u> adopted on the 19th day of May, 2009 awarded to Contractor the following Contract:

MEN'S HONOR FARM EMERGENCY BACK UP POWER

at

8224 W. GRAYSON ROAD **MODESTO, CALIFORNIA**

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter set forth, Contractor and County agree as follows:

Article 1. Work

- 1.1 Contractor shall complete all Base Bid Work specified in the Contract Documents, in accordance with the Specifications, Construction Documents (as defined in Section 01100, Summary of Work), and all other terms and conditions of the Contract Documents.
- 1.2 The County elected **not** to award Alternate No. 1 under this contract

Article 2. Architect/Engineer and Project Manager

- 2.1 County has designated Patricia Hill Thomas as its Project Manager to act as County's Representative in all matters relating to the Contract Documents. The Project Manager shall have final authority over all matters pertaining to the Contract Documents and shall have sole authority to modify the Contract Documents on behalf of the County, to accept work, and to make decisions or actions binding on the County, and shall have sole signature authority on behalf of the County.
- 2.2 The County may assign all or part of the Project Manager's rights, responsibilities and duties to a Construction Manager.

Article 3. Contract Time and Liquidated Damages

3.1 **Contract Time**

Contractor shall commence Work on the date established in the Notice to Proceed. County reserves the right to modify or alter the Commencement Date of the Work.

Contractor shall achieve Substantial Completion of the entire Work within 180 Calendar Days from the date when the Contract Time commences to run as provided in Document 00700 (General Conditions). Contractor shall achieve Final Completion of the entire Work and be ready for Final Payment in accordance with Section 01770 (Contract Closeout) 60 Days from the date when the Contract Time commences to run as provided in Document 00700 (General Conditions).

3.2 Liquidated Damages

County and Contractor recognize that time is of the essence of this Agreement and that County will suffer financial loss in the form of Contract administration expenses (such as Project management and consultant expenses), if all or any part of the Work is not completed within the times specified above, plus any extensions thereof allowed in accordance with the Contract Documents. Contractor and County agree that because of the nature of the Project, it would be impractical or extremely difficult to fix the amount of actual damages incurred by County because of a delay in completion of all or any part of the Work. Accordingly, County and Contractor agree that as liquidated damages for delay Contractor shall pay County:

- 3.2.1 Five Hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each Day that expires after the time specified herein for Contractor to achieve Substantial Completion of the entire Work, until achieved.
- 3.2.2 Five Hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each Day that expires after the time specified herein for Contractor to achieve Final Completion of the entire Work, until achieved.

These measures of liquidated damages shall apply cumulatively and except as provided below, shall be presumed to be the damages suffered by County resulting from delay in completion of the Work.

3.3 Liquidated damages for delay shall only cover administrative, overhead, interest on bonds, and general loss of public use damages suffered by County as a result of delay. Liquidated damages shall not cover the cost of completion of the Work, damages resulting from Defective Work, lost revenues or costs of substitute facilities, or damages suffered by others who then seek to recover their damages from County (for example, delay claims of other contractors, subcontractors, tenants, or other third-parties), and defense costs thereof.

Article 4. Contract Sum

4.1 County shall pay Contractor the Lump Sum of Two Hundred Seventy-Three Thousand Seven Hundred Sixteen Dollars (\$273,716.00) for completion of Work in accordance with Contract Documents as set forth in Contractor's Proposal, attached hereto.

Article 5. Contractor's Representations

In order to induce County to enter into this Agreement, Contractor makes the following representations and warranties:

- 5.1 Contractor has visited the Site and has examined thoroughly and understood the nature and extent of the Contract Documents, Work, Site, locality, actual conditions, as-built conditions, and all local conditions, and federal, state and local laws and regulations that in any manner may affect cost, progress, performance or furnishing of Work or which relate to any aspect of the means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction to be employed by Contractor and safety precautions and programs incident thereto.
- 5.2 Contractor has examined thoroughly and understood all reports of exploration and tests of subsurface conditions, as-built drawings, drawings, products specifications or reports, available for proposing purposes, of physical conditions, including Underground Facilities, which have been made available for Proposers or which may appear in the Drawings. Contractor accepts the determination set forth in these Documents and Document 00700 (General Conditions) of the limited extent of the information contained in such materials upon which Contractor may be entitled to rely. Contractor agrees that except for the information so identified, Contractor does not and shall not rely on any other information contained in such reports and drawings.
- 5.3 Contractor has conducted or obtained and has understood all such examinations, investigations, explorations, tests, reports and studies (in addition to or to supplement those referred to in Section 5.2 of this Document 00520) that pertain to the subsurface conditions, as-built conditions, Underground Facilities and all other physical conditions at or contiguous to the Site or otherwise that may affect the cost, progress, performance or furnishing of Work, as Contractor considers necessary for the performance or furnishing of Work at the Contract Sum, within the Contract Time and in accordance with the other terms and conditions of the Contract Documents, including specifically the provisions of Document 00700 (General Conditions); and no additional examinations, investigations, explorations, tests, reports, studies or similar information or data are or will be required by Contractor for such purposes.

5.4 Contractor has correlated its knowledge and the results of all such observations, examinations, investigations, explorations, tests, reports and studies with the terms and conditions of the Contract Documents.

Article 6. Contract Documents

6.1 Contract Documents consist of the following documents, including all changes, Addenda, and Modifications thereto:

6.2 There are no Contract Documents other than those listed in this Document 00520, Article 6. The Contract Documents may only be amended, modified or supplemented as provided in Document 00700 (General Conditions).

Article 7. Miscellaneous

- 7.1 Terms and abbreviations used in this Agreement are defined in Document 00700 (General Conditions) and Section 01420 (References and Definitions) and will have the meaning indicated therein.
- 7.2 It is understood and agreed that in no instance are the persons signing this Agreement for or on behalf of County or acting as an employee, agent, or representative of County, liable on this Agreement or any of the Contract Documents, or upon any warranty of authority, or otherwise, and it is further understood and agreed that liability of the County is limited and confined to such liability as authorized or imposed by the Contract Documents or applicable law.
- 7.3 Contractor shall not assign any portion of the Contract Documents, and may subcontract portions of the Contract Documents only in compliance with the Subcontractor Listing Law, California Public Contract Code §4100 *et seq.*
- 7.4 The Contract Sum includes all allowances (if any).
- 7.5 In entering into a public works contract or a subcontract to supply goods, services or materials pursuant to a public works contract, Contractor or Subcontractor offers and agrees to assign to the awarding body all rights, title and interest in and to all causes of action it may have under Section 4 of the Clayton Act (15 U.S.C. §15) or under the Cartwright Act (Chapter 2 (commencing with §16700) of Part 2 of Division 7 of the Business and Professions Code), arising from purchases of goods, services or materials pursuant to the public works contract or the subcontract. This assignment shall be made and become effective at the time County tenders final payment to Contractor, without further acknowledgment by the parties.
- 7.6 Copies of the general prevailing rates of per diem wages for each craft, classification, or type of worker needed to execute the Contract, as determined by Director of the State of California Department of Industrial Relations, are deemed included in the Contract Documents and on file at County's Office, and shall be made available to any interested party on request. Pursuant to California Labor Code §1861, Contractor represents that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code, and Contractor shall comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the Work of the Contract Documents.

- 7.7 Should any part, term or provision of this Agreement or any of the Contract Documents, or any document required herein or therein to be executed or delivered, be declared invalid, void or unenforceable, all remaining parts, terms and provisions shall remain in full force and effect and shall in no way be invalidated, impaired or affected thereby. If the provisions of any law causing such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability may be waived, they are hereby waived to the end that this Agreement and the Contract Documents may be deemed valid and binding agreements, enforceable in accordance with their terms to the greatest extent permitted by applicable law. In the event any provision not otherwise included in the Contract Documents is required to be included by any applicable law, that provision is deemed included herein by this reference (or, if such provision is required to be included in any particular portion of the Contract Documents, that provision is deemed included in that portion).
- 7.8 This Agreement and the Contract Documents shall be deemed to have been entered into in the County of Stanislaus, State of California, and governed in all respects by California law (excluding choice of law rules). The exclusive venue for all disputes or litigation hereunder shall be in Stanislaus County Superior Court. Contractor accepts the Claims Procedure in Document 00700, Article 12, as a claims procedure by agreement under the California Government Code, Title 1, Division 3.6, Part 3, Chapter 5.
