Approval to Receive and Expend Program Year 2009-2010 Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Funds in Accordance with the Approved Stanislaus County Strategic Five-Year Local Plan

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Authorize the Director of the Alliance Worknet or his designee to receive and expend Program Year 2009-2010 WIA funds in accordance with the approved Stanislaus County Strategic Five-Year Local Plan. These funds may exceed \$100,000.
2. Authorize the Director of the Alliance Worknet or his designee to enter into and sign agreements and contracts to expend Program Year 2009-2010 WIA funds.
3. Authorize the Director of the Alliance Worknet to sign all WIA-related sub-grant agreements, and any modifications or adjustments as required by the State of California.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Local WIA programs are funded from Federal and State sources. Stanislaus County will receive a total of \$8,974,893 in WIA funding for the 2009-2010 Program Year. Approval of this item will have no impact on the County General Fund.

DISCUSSION:

Workforce Investment Act Formula Funds:

The Workforce Investment Division of the California Employment Development Department (EDD), the designated State Grant Manager of the Department of Labor's Workforce Investment Act (WIA) funding, has announced allocations to Local Workforce Investment Areas for Program Year (PY) 2009-2010. This year's allocation for Stanislaus County is \$8,974,893, an increase of \$600,000 over the previous year allocation. This is a result of a significant increase in the number of dislocated workers in Stanislaus County.

The Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors must annually authorize the receipt of WIA funds and designate the fund administrator. With approval of these recommendations, the Alliance Worknet will serve as fiduciary agent on behalf of the Stanislaus Economic Development and Workforce Alliance (Local Workforce Investment Board) and the Board of Supervisors in administering these funds. The Alliance Worknet Director will administer the program based on Board approval.

The Alliance Worknet provides employment services to over 13,000 Stanislaus County residents annually at six locations. Services include access to job openings, resume and application assistance, job search workshops, skill assessment, career planning and counseling, and job training. In addition, Alliance Worknet staff provides "Rapid Response" assistance to workers who are being laid off due to business closures and downsizing.

Approval of staff's recommendation will allow the Alliance Worknet Director to enter into and sign contracts and expend 2009-2010 funds in the general administration of the program. These funds may exceed \$100,000.

Contracts will be approved by the Local Workforce Investment Board and will follow the Board of Supervisors policies regarding the approval and reporting of contracts and agreements.

POLICY ISSUE:

The Board is asked to determine if approval of this recommendation will support the Board of Supervisors' goals and priorities as follows:

A Strong Local Economy

WIA funds are invested in workforce development in coordination with economic development through the Alliance Board. This represents a unique approach to improving economic conditions in Stanislaus County.

Efficient Delivery of Public Services

Approval of the plan allows for the continued operation of the Alliance Worknet Resource Centers, which provide employment services to all county residents.

Effective Partnerships

Through this plan, the Alliance Worknet delivers employment and training services in cooperation with the following community partners:

The Stanislaus County Community Services Agency, the Employment Development Department, the Alliance, Modesto Junior College, California Department of Rehabilitation, Central Valley Opportunity Center, Area Agency on Aging, the Stanislaus Literacy Center, the Housing Authority of Stanislaus, and the Stanislaus County Office of Education.

STAFFING IMPACT:

WIA SUBGRANT AGREEMENT

Subgrantee: STANISLAUS COUNTY

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1. Compliance

In performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will fully comply with:

- a). The provisions of the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and all regulations, legislation, directives, policies, procedures and amendments issued pursuant thereto.
- b). All State legislation and regulations to the extent permitted by federal law and all policies, directives and/or procedures, which implement the WIA.
- c). The provisions of Public Law 107-288, Jobs for Veterans Act, as the law applies to Department of Labor (DOL) job training programs
- d). Subgrantee will ensure diligence in managing programs under this subgrant agreement, including performing appropriate monitoring activities and taking prompt corrective action against known violations of the WIA. Subgrantee agrees to conform to the provisions of the WIA and the contract requirements as referenced in 29 CFR Part 95, Appendix A and 29 CFR, Part 97.36(i)(1-13).

This subgrant agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes all negotiations, verbal or otherwise and any other agreement between the parties hereto. This subgrant agreement is not intended to and will not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. Subgrantee represents and warrants it is free to enter into and fully perform this subgrant agreement.

2. Certification/Assurances

Except as otherwise indicated, the following certifications apply to all Subgrantee's.

- a). Corporate Registration: The Subgrantee, if it is a corporation, certifies it is registered with the Secretary of State of the State of California.
- b). The Subgrantee agrees to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, which, prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to ADA. (42 U.S.C.12101 et seq.
- c). Sectarian Activities: The Subgrantee certifies that this subgrant agreement does not provide for the advancement or aid to any religious sect, church or creed, or sectarian purpose nor does it help to support or sustain any school, college, university, hospital or other institution controlled by any religious creed, church, or sectarian denomination whatsoever, as specified by Article XVI, Section 5, of the Constitution, regarding separation of church and state.
- d). National Labor Relations Board: The Subgrantee (if not a public entity), by signing this subgrant agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury, that no more than one final unappeasable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has been issued against the Subgrantee within the immediately preceding two-year period because of Subgrantee's failure to comply with an order of a federal court, which orders the Subgrantee to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board (PCC10296).
- e). Prior Findings: Subgrantee, by signing this subgrant agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury, that it has not failed to satisfy any major condition in a current or previous subgrant agreement with the DOL or the State of California and has not failed to satisfy conditions relating to the resolution of a final finding and determination, including repayment of debts.
- f). Drug-Free Workplace Certification: By signing this subgrant agreement the Subgrantee hereby certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the Subgrantee will comply with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 and will provide a drug-free workplace by taking the following actions:
 - (1). Publish a statement notifying employees that unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited and specifying actions to be taken against employees for violations.
 - (2). Establish a Drug-Free Awareness Program as required to inform employees about:
 - the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - the person's or organization's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - any available counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance programs; and,
 - penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations.
 - (3). Every employee who works on this subgrant agreement will:
 - receive a copy of the company's drug-free policy statement; and,
 - agree to abide by the terms of the company's statement as a condition of employment on the subgrant/contract.
- g). Child Support Compliance Act: In accordance with the Child Support Compliance Act, the

Subgrantee recognizes and acknowledges:

- (1). The importance of child and family support obligations and shall fully comply with applicable state and federal laws relating to child and family support enforcement, including, but not limited to, disclosure of information and compliance with earnings assignment orders, as provided in Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 5200) of Part 5 of Division 9 of the Family Code; and that to the best of its knowledge is fully complying with the earnings assignment orders of all employees and is providing the names of all new employees to the New Employee Registry maintained by the California Employment Development Department (EDD).
- h). Debarment and Suspension Certification: By signing this subgrant agreement, the Subgrantee hereby certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the Subgrantee will comply with regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspension, 29 CFR Part 98.510, that the prospective participant (i.e., grantee), to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals:
 - (1). Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transitions by any federal department or agency.
 - (2). Have not within a three-year period preceding this subgrant agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgement rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction, violation of federal or state antitrust statutes, or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification, or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property.
 - (3). Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (federal, state or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Section 2 of this certification.
 - (4). Have not within a three year period preceding this subgrant agreement had one or more public transactions (federal, state or local) terminated for cause of default.

Where the Subgrantee is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, such prospective participant shall attach an explanation to this agreement.

- i). Lobbying Restrictions: By signing this subgrant agreement the Subgrantee hereby assures and certifies to the lobbying restrictions which are codified in the DOL regulations at 29 CFR Part 93.
 - (1). No federal appropriated funds have been paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of an agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this federal contract, grant loan, or cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
 - (2). If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this subgrant agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying" in accordance with its instructions.
 - (3). The undersigned shall require that the language of the lobbying restrictions be included in the award documents for subgrant agreement transactions over \$100,000 (per OMB) at all tiers (including subgrant agreements, contracts and subcontracts, under grants, loan, or cooperative agreements), and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
 - (4). This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance is placed when this transaction is executed. Submission of the Lobbying Certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, and U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each failure.

j). Priority Hiring Considerations:

If this subgrant includes services in excess of \$200,000, the Subgrantee shall give priority consideration in filling vacancies in positions funded by the subgrant to qualified recipients of aid under Welfare and Institutions Section Code 11200 in accordance with Public Contract Code 10353.

k). Sweatfree Code of Conduct:

- 1). All Subgrantees contracting for the procurement or laundering of apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, or the procurement of equipment, materials, or supplies, other

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than procurement related to a public works contract, declare under penalty of perjury that no apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, equipment, or supplies furnished to the state pursuant to the contract have been laundered or produced in whole or in part by sweatshop labor, forced labor, convict labor, indentured labor under penal sanction, abusive forms of child labor or exploitation of children in sweatshop labor, or with the benefit of sweatshop labor, forced labor, convict labor, indentured labor under penal sanction, abusive forms of child labor or exploitation of children in sweatshop labor. The Subgrantee further declares under penalty of perjury that they adhere to the Sweatfree Code of Conduct as set forth on the California Department of Industrial Relations website located at www.dir.ca.gov, and Public Contract Code Section 6108.

- 2). The Subgrantee agrees to cooperate fully in providing reasonable access to the subgrantees' records, documents, agents or employees, or premises if reasonably required by authorized officials of the Subgrantor, the Department of Industrial Relations, or the Department of Justice to determine the subgrantees' compliance with the requirements under paragraph a of the Sweatfree Code of Conduct.
- 1). Unenforceable Provision: In the event that any provision of this subgrant agreement is unenforceable or held to be unenforceable, then the parties agree that all other provisions of this subgrant agreement have force and effect and shall not be affected hereby.
- m). Nondiscrimination Clause
 - 1). The conduct of the parties to this subgrant agreement will be in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and the Rules and Regulations promulgated there under and the provisions of WIA, Section 188.
 - (a). As a condition to the award of financial assistance from the Department of Labor under Title I of WIA, the grant applicant assures that it will comply fully with the nondiscrimination and equal opportunity provisions of the following laws:

Section 188 of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (WIA), which prohibits discrimination against all individuals in the United States on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, disability, political affiliation or belief, and against beneficiaries on the basis of either citizenship/status as a lawfully admitted immigrant authorized to work in the United States or participation in any WIA Title I - financially assisted program or activity;

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin;

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, which prohibits discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities;

The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age; and

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in educational programs.

The grant applicant also assures that it will comply with 29 CFR part 37 and all other regulations implementing the laws listed above. This assurance applies to the grant applicant's operation of the WIA Title I-financially assisted program or activity, and to all agreements that grant applicant makes to carry out the WIA Title I-financially assisted program or activity. The grant applicant understands that the United States has the right to seek judicial enforcement of this assurance.
 - (b). This Subgrantee shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this clause in all subcontracts to perform work under the subgrant agreement.
 - (c). This Subgrantee agrees to conform to nondiscrimination provisions of the WIA and other federal nondiscrimination requirements referenced in 29 CFR, Part 37.
- n). Indemnification:
 - 1). The following provision applies only if the Subgrantee is a governmental entity:

Pursuant to the provision of Section 895.4 of the California Government Code, each party agrees to indemnify and hold the other party harmless from all liability for damage to persons or property arising out of or resulting from acts or omissions of the indemnifying party.
 - 2). The following provision applies only if the Subgrantee is a non-governmental entity:

The Subgrantee agrees to the extent permitted by law, to indemnify, defend and save harmless the Subgrantor, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims and

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losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, materials persons, laborers and any other persons, firms or corporations, furnishing or supplying work, services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of this agreement, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any persons, firms or corporations which may be injured or damaged by the Subgrantee in the performance of this subgrant agreement.

Failure to comply with all requirements of the certifications in Section 2 may result in suspension of payment under this subgrant agreement or termination of this subgrant agreement or both, and the Subgrantee may be ineligible for award of future state subgrant agreements/contracts if the department determines that any of the following has occurred: (1) false information on the certifications, or (2) violation of the terms of the certifications by failing to carry out the requirements as noted above.

o). Salary and Bonus Limitations:

3. Standards of Conduct

The following standards apply to all Subgrantees.

- a). General Assurance: Every reasonable course of action will be taken by the Subgrantee in order to maintain the integrity of this expenditure of public funds and to avoid favoritism and questionable or improper conduct. This subgrant agreement will be administered in an impartial manner, free from efforts to gain personal, financial or political gain. Subgrantee agrees to conform to the nondiscrimination requirements as referenced in WIA, Section 188.
- b). Avoidance of Conflict of Economic Interest: An executive or employee of the Subgrantee, an elected official in the area or a member of the Local Board, will not solicit or accept money or any other consideration from a third person, for the performance of an act reimbursed in whole or part by the Subgrantee or Subgrantor: Supplies, materials, equipment or services purchased with subgrant agreement funds will be used solely for purposes allowed under this subgrant agreement. No member of the Local Board will cast a vote on the provision of services by that member (or any organization, which that member represents) or vote on any matter which would provide direct financial benefit to that member (or immediate family of the member) or any business or organization which the member directly represents.

4. Coordination

Subgrantee will, to the maximum extent feasible, coordinate all programs and activities supported under this part with other programs under the WIA, including the Wagner-Peyser Act, Title 38 of the United States Code, and other employment and training programs at the state and local level.

Subgrantee will consult with the appropriate labor organizations and/or employer representatives in the design, operation or modification of the programs under this subgrant agreement.

5. Subcontracting

- a). Any of the work or services specified in this subgrant agreement which will be performed by other than by the Subgrantee will be evidenced by a written agreement specifying the terms and conditions of such performance.
- b). The Subgrantee will maintain and adhere to an appropriate system, consistent with federal,

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state and local law, for the award and monitoring of contracts which contain acceptable standards for insuring accountability.

- c). The system for awarding contracts will contain safeguards to insure that the Subgrantee does not contract with any entity whose officers have been convicted of fraud or misappropriation of funds within the last two years.

6. Insurance

Except for city and county governmental entities, Subgrantees must provide the Subgrantor evidence of the coverage specified in a, b, c and d below. The evidence of coverage shall include the registration number of the subgrant agreement for identification purposes.

- a). Subgrantee will obtain a fidelity bond in an amount of not less than N/A, prior to the receipt of funds under this subgrant agreement. If the bond is canceled or reduced, Subgrantee will immediately so notify the Subgrantor. In the event the bond is canceled or revised, the Subgrantor will make no further disbursements until it is assured that adequate coverage has been obtained.
- b). Subgrantee will provide general liability insurance with a combined limit of \$1,000,000 or public liability and property damage coverage with a combined limit of not less than \$1,000,000.
- c). Subgrantee will provide broad form automobile liability coverage with limits as set forth in (b) above, which applies to both owned/leased and non-owned automobiles used by the Subgrantee or its agents in performance of this subgrant agreement, or, in the event that the Subgrantee will not utilize owned/leased automobiles but intends to require employees, trainees or other agents to utilize their own automobiles in performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will secure and maintain on file from all such employees, trainees or agents a self-certification of automobile insurance coverage.
- d). Subgrantee will provide Worker's Compensation Insurance, which complies with provisions of the California Labor Code, covering all employees of the Subgrantee and all participants enrolled in work experience programs. Medical and Accident Insurance will be carried for those participants not qualifying as "employee" (Section 3350, et seq. of the California Labor Code) for Worker's Compensation.
- e). The Subgrantor will be named as "Certificate Holder" of policies secured in compliance with paragraphs a-d above and will be provided certificates of insurance or insurance company "binders" prior to any disbursement of funds under this subgrant agreement, verifying the insurance requirements have been complied with. The coverage noted in b and c above must contain the following clauses:

- (1). Insurance coverage will not be canceled or changed unless 30 days prior to the effective date of cancellation or change written notice is sent by the Subgrantee to:

- (2). State of California, its officers, agents, employees and servants are included as additional insured, but only insofar as the operations under this subgrant agreement are concerned.
- (3). The State of California is not responsible for payment of premiums or assessments on this policy

7. Resolution

A county, city, district or other local public body must provide the state with a copy of a resolution, order, motion, or ordinance of the local governing body which by law has authority to enter into an agreement, authorizing execution of this subgrant agreement. Preferably resolutions should authorize a designated position rather than a named individual.

8. Funding

It is mutually understood between the parties that this subgrant agreement may have been written before ascertaining the availability of congressional and legislative appropriation of funds, for the mutual benefit of both parties, in order to avoid program and fiscal delays which would occur if the subgrant agreement was executed after that determination was made.

This subgrant agreement is valid and enforceable only if (1) sufficient funds are made available by the State Budget Act of the appropriate state fiscal years covered by this subgrant agreement for the purposes of this program and; (2) sufficient funds available to the state by the United States Government for the fiscal years covered by this subgrant agreement for the purposes of this program. In addition, this subgrant agreement is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the Congress and Legislature or any statute enacted by the

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Congress and Legislature which may affect the provisions, terms, or funding of this subgrant agreement in any manner.

- a). At the expiration of the terms of this subgrant agreement or upon termination prior to the expiration of this subgrant agreement, funds not obligated for the purpose of this subgrant agreement will be immediately remitted to the Subgrantor, and no longer available to the Subgrantee.
- b). The Subgrantor retains the right to suspend financial assistance, in whole or in part, to protect the integrity of the funds or to ensure proper operation of the program, providing the Subgrantee is given prompt notice and the opportunity for an informal review of the Subgrantor's decision. The Chief Deputy Director or his designee will perform this informal review and will issue the final administrative decision within 60 days of receiving the written request for review. Failure on the part of the Subgrantee or a Subcontractor of the Subgrantee to comply with the provisions of this subgrant agreement, or with the WIA or regulations, when such failure involves fraud or misappropriation of funds, may result in immediate withholding of funds.
- c). The local Chief Elected Official (CEO) of a unit of general local government designated as a Local Workforce Investment Area (LWIA) shall be liable to the EDD for all funds not expended in accordance with WIA, and shall return to the EDD all of those funds. If there is more than one unit of general local government in a LWIA, the CEO(s) will be the individual(s) designated under an agreement executed by the CEO(s) of the local units of government. The CEO(s) designated under the agreement shall be liable to the EDD for all funds not expended in accordance with the WIA, and shall return to the EDD all of those funds.

9. Accounting and Cash Management

- a). Subgrantee will comply with controls, record keeping and fund accounting procedure requirements of WIA, federal and state regulations and directives to ensure the proper disbursement of, and accounting for, program funds paid to the Subgrantee and disbursed by the Subgrantee, under this subgrant agreement.
- b). Subgrantee will submit requests for cash to coincide with immediate cash needs and assure that no excess cash is on deposit in their accounts or the accounts of any sub-contracting service provider in accordance with procedures established by the Subgrantor. Failure to adhere to these provisions may result in suspending cash draw down privileges and providing funds through a reimbursement process.
- c). The Subgrantor retains the authority to adjust specific amounts of cash requested if the Subgrantor's records and subsequent verification with the Subgrantee indicate that the Subgrantee has an excessive amount of cash in its account.
- d). Income (including interest income) generated as a result of the receipt of WIA activities, will be utilized in accordance with policy and procedures established by the Subgrantor. Subgrantee will account for any such generated income separately.
- e). Subgrantee shall not be required to maintain a separate bank account but shall separately account for WIA funds on deposit. All funding under this subgrant agreement, will be made by check or wire transfer payable to the Subgrantee for deposit in Subgrantee's bank account or city and county governmental bank accounts. To provide for the necessary and proper internal controls, funds should be withdrawn and disbursed by no less than two representatives of the Subgrantee. The Subgrantor will have a lien upon any balance of WIA funds in these accounts, which will take priority over all other liens or claims.

10. Amendments

This subgrant agreement may be unilaterally modified by the Subgrantor under the following circumstances:

- a). There is an increase or decrease in federal or state funding levels.
- b). A modification to the Subgrant is required in order to implement an adjustment to a Subgrantee's plan.
- c). Funds awarded to the Subgrantee have not been expended in accordance with the schedule included in the approved Subgrantee's plan. After consultation with the Subgrantee, the Subgrantor has determined that funds will not be spent in a timely manner, and such funds are for that reason to the extent permitted by and in a manner consistent with state and federal law, regulations and policies, reverting to the Subgrantor.
- d). There is a change in state and federal law or regulation requiring a change in the provisions of this subgrant agreement.
- e). An amendment is required to change the Subgrantees' name as listed on this subgrant agreement. Upon receipt of legal documentation of the name change the state will process the amendment. Payment of invoices presented with a new name cannot be paid prior to

approval of said amendment.

Except as provided above, this subgrant agreement may be amended only in writing by the mutual agreement of both parties.

11. Reporting

Subgrantee will compile and submit reports of activities, expenditures, status of cash and closeout information by the specified dates as prescribed by the Subgrantor. All expenditure reports must be submitted upon the accrual basis of accounting. Failure to adhere to the reporting requirements of this agreement will result in funds not being released.

12. Termination

This subgrant agreement may be terminated in whole or in part for either of the two following circumstances:

- a). Termination for Convenience - Either the Subgrantor or the Subgrantee may request a termination, in whole or in part, for convenience. The Subgrantee will give a ninety- (90) calendar-day advance notice in writing to the Subgrantor. The Subgrantor will give a ninety (90) calendar-day advance notice in writing to the Subgrantee.
- b). Termination for Cause - The Subgrantor may terminate this subgrant agreement in whole or in part when it has determined that the Subgrantee has substantially violated a specific provision of the WIA regulations or implementing state legislation and corrective action has not been taken.
 - (1). All notices of termination must be in writing and be delivered personally or by deposit in the U. S. Mail, postage prepaid, "Certified Mail-Return Receipt Requested", and will be deemed to have been given at the time of personal delivery or of the date of postmark by the U. S. Postal Service.

13. Records

- a). If participants are served under this subgrant agreement, the Subgrantee will establish a participant data system as prescribed by the Subgrantor.
- b). Subgrantee will retain all records pertinent to this subgrant agreement for a period of three years from the date of final payment of this subgrant agreement. If, at the end of three years, there is litigation or an audit involving those records, the Subgrantee will retain the records until the resolution of such litigation or audit.
Refer to 29 CFR, Part 97.42(b)(2) or 29 CFR, Part 95.53(b)(1).
- c). The Subgrantor and/or the U. S. DOL, or their designee (refer to 29 CFR, Part 95.48(d) or 29 CFR Part 97.36(i)(10)) will have access to and right to examine, monitor and audit all records, documents, conditions and activities related to programs funded by this subgrant agreement. For purposes of this section, "access to" means that the Subgrantee shall at all times maintain within the State of California a complete set of records and documents related to programs funded by this agreement. The Subgrantee shall comply with this requirement regardless of whether it ceases to operate or maintain a presence within the State of California before the expiration of the subgrant. Subgrantee's performance under the terms and conditions herein specified will be subject to an evaluation by the Subgrantor of the adequacy of the services performed, timeliness of response and a general impression of the competency of the firm and its staff.

14. Audits

- a). The Subgrantee will maintain and make available to auditors, at all levels, accounting and program records including supporting source documentation and cooperate with all auditors. All governmental and non-profit organizations must follow the audit requirements of OMB (single audit or program-specific audit requirement) Circular A-133 (29 CFR 97.26 and 29 CFR 95.26).

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- b). The Subgrantee and/or auditors performing monitoring or audits of the Subgrantee or its sub-contracting service providers will immediately report to the Subgrantor any incidents of fraud, abuse or other criminal activity in relation to this subgrant agreement, the WIA, or its regulations.

15. Disallowed Costs

Except to the extent that the state determines it will assume liability, the Subgrantee will be liable for and will repay, to the Subgrantor, any amounts expended under this subgrant agreement found not to be in accordance with WIA including, but not limited to, disallowed costs. Such repayment will be from funds (Non-Federal), other than those received under the WIA.

16. Conflicts

- a). Subgrantee will cooperate in the resolution of any conflict with the U. S. DOL that may occur from the activities funded under this agreement.
- b). In the event of a dispute between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee over any part of this subgrant agreement, the dispute may be submitted to non-binding arbitration upon the consent of both the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. An election for arbitration pursuant to this provision will not preclude either party from pursuing any remedy for relief otherwise available.

17. Grievances and Complaint System

Subgrantee will establish and maintain a grievance and complaint procedure in compliance with the WIA, federal regulations and state statutes, regulations and policy.

18. Property

All property, whether finished or unfinished documents, data, studies and reports prepared or purchased by the Subgrantee under this subgrant agreement, will be disposed of in accordance with the direction of the Subgrantor. In addition, any tools and/or equipment furnished to the Subgrantee by the Subgrantor and/or purchased by the Subgrantee with funds pursuant to this subgrant agreement will be limited to use within the activities outlined in this subgrant agreement and will remain the property of the United States Government and/or the Subgrantor. Upon termination of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will immediately return such tools and/or equipment to the Subgrantor or dispose of them in accordance with the direction of the Subgrantor.

19. Intellectual Property Provisions

a). Federal Funding

In any subgrant funded in whole or in part by the federal government, Subgrantor may acquire and maintain the Intellectual Property rights, title, and ownership, which result directly or indirectly from the subgrant, except as provided in 37 Code of Federal Regulations part 401.14. However, pursuant to 29 CFR section 97.34 the federal government shall have a royalty-free, non-exclusive, irrevocable, paid-up license throughout the world to use, duplicate, or dispose of such Intellectual Property throughout the world in any manner for governmental purposes and to have and permit others to do so.

b). Ownership

- (1). Except where Subgrantor has agreed in a signed writing to accept a license, Subgrantor shall be and remain, without additional compensation, the sole owner of any and all rights, title and interest in all intellectual property, from the moment of creation, whether or not jointly conceived, that are made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement.
- (2). For the purposes of this subgrant agreement, Intellectual Property means recognized protectable rights and interest such as: patents, (whether or not issued) copyrights, trademarks, service marks, applications for any of the foregoing, inventions, trade secrets, trade dress, logos, insignia, color combinations, slogans, moral rights, right of publicity, author's rights, contract and licensing rights, works, mask works, industrial design rights, rights of priority, know how, design flows, methodologies, devices, business processes, developments, innovations, good will, any data or information maintained, collected or stored in the ordinary course of business by Subgrantor, and all other legal rights protecting intangible proprietary information as may exist now and/or hereafter come into existence, and all renewals and extensions, regardless of whether those rights arise under the laws of the United States, or any other state, country or jurisdiction.

- (a). For the purposes of the definition of Intellectual Property, "works" means all literary works, writings and printed matter including the medium by which they

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are recorded or reproduced, photographs, art work, pictorial and graphic representations and works of a similar nature, film, motion pictures, digital images, animation cells, and other audiovisual works including positives and negatives thereof, sound recordings, tapes, educational materials, interactive videos, computer software and any other materials or products created, produced, conceptualized and fixed in a tangible medium of expression. It includes preliminary and final products and any materials and information developed for the purposes of producing those final products. "Works" does not include articles submitted to peer review or reference journals or independent research projects.

- (3). In the performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee may exercise and utilize certain of its Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. In addition, under this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee may access and utilize certain of Subgrantor's intellectual property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Except as otherwise set forth herein, Subgrantee shall not use any of Subgrantor's Intellectual Property now existing or hereafter existing for any purposes without the prior written permission of Subgrantor. Except as otherwise set forth herein, neither the Subgrantee nor Subgrantor shall give any ownership interest in or rights to its Intellectual Property to the other Party. If, during the term of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee accesses any third-party Intellectual Property that is licensed to Subgrantor. Subgrantee agrees to abide by all license and confidentiality restrictions applicable to Subgrantor in the third-party's license agreement.
 - (4). Subgrantee agrees to cooperate with Subgrantor in establishing or maintaining Subgrantor's exclusive rights in the Intellectual Property, and in assuring Subgrantor's sole rights against third parties with respect to the Intellectual Property. If the Subgrantee enters into any agreements or subcontracts with other parties in order to perform this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall require the terms of the agreement(s) to include all Intellectual Property provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i). Such terms must include, but are not limited to, the subcontractor assigning and agreeing to assign to Subgrantor all rights, title and interest in Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by the subcontractor, subgrantee or subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement or any subcontract.
 - (5). Pursuant to paragraph nineteen (b) (4) of the Intellectual Property Provisions in Exhibit BB to this subgrant agreement, the requirement for the Subgrantee to include all Intellectual Property Provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i) of the Intellectual Property Provisions in all agreements and subcontracts it enters into with other parties does not apply to subgrant agreements or subcontracts that are for customized and on-the-job training as authorized under 20 CFR 663.700-730.
 - (6). Subgrantee further agrees to assist and cooperate with Subgrantor in all reasonable respects, and execute all documents and, subject to reasonable availability, give testimony and take all further acts reasonably necessary to acquire, transfer, maintain, and enforce Subgrantor's Intellectual Property rights and interests.
- c). Retained Rights / License Rights
- (1). Except for Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall retain title to all of its Intellectual Property to the extent such Intellectual Property is in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Subgrantee hereby grants to Subgrantor, without additional compensation, a permanent, non-exclusive, royalty free, paid-up, worldwide, irrevocable, perpetual, non-terminable license to use, reproduce, manufacture, sell, offer to sell, import, export, modify, publicly and privately display/perform, distribute, and dispose of Subgrantee's Intellectual Property with the right to sublicense through multiple layers, for any purpose whatsoever, to the extent it is incorporated in the Intellectual Property resulting from this subgrant, unless Subgrantee assigns all rights, title and interest in the Intellectual Property as set forth herein.
 - (2). Nothing in this provision shall restrict, limit, or otherwise prevent Subgrantee from using any ideas, concepts, know-how, methodology or techniques related to its performance under this subgrant agreement, provided that Subgrantee's use does not infringe the patent, copyright, trademark rights, license or other Intellectual Property rights of Subgrantor or third party, or result in a breach or default of any provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i) or result in a breach of any provisions of law relating to confidentiality.
- d). Copyright
- (1) Subgrantee agrees that for purposes of copyright law, all works (as defined in Ownership, paragraph nineteen (b) (2) (a) of authorship made by or on behalf of

Subgrantee in connection with Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement shall be deemed "works made for hire." Subgrantee further agrees that the work of each person utilized by Subgrantee in connection with the performance of this subgrant agreement will be a "work made for hire," whether that person is an employee of Subgrantee or that person has entered into an agreement with Subgrantee to perform the work. Subgrantee shall enter into a written agreement with any such person that:

(i) all work performed for Subgrantee shall be deemed a "work made for hire" under the Copyright Act and (ii) that person shall assign all right, title, and interest to Subgrantor to any work product made, conceived, derived from or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement. Refer to 29 CFR, Part 95, Appendix A 5 or Part 97.34.

- (2) All materials, including, but not limited to, computer software, visual works or text, reproduced or distributed pursuant to this subgrant agreement that include Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement may not be reproduced or disseminated without prior written permission from Subgrantor.

e). Patent Rights

With respect to inventions (refer to 29 CFR, 97.36(i)(8)) made by Subgrantee in the performance of this subgrant agreement, which did not result from research and development specifically included in the Subgrant's scope of work, Subgrantee hereby grants to Subgrantor a license as described under paragraph nineteen c) for devices or material incorporating, or made through the use of such inventions. If such inventions result from research and development work specifically included within the subgrant agreement's scope of work, then Subgrantee agrees to assign to Subgrantor, without addition compensation, all its right, title and interest in and to such inventions and to assist Subgrantor in securing United States and foreign patents with respect thereto.

f). Third-Party Intellectual Property

Except as provided herein, Subgrantee agrees that its performance of this subgrant agreement shall not be dependent upon or include any Intellectual Property of Subgrantee or third party without first: (i) obtaining Subgrantor's prior written approval; and (ii) granting to or obtaining for Subgrantor's, without additional compensation, a license, as described in paragraph nineteen c), for any of Subgrantee's or third-party's Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. If such a license upon these terms is unattainable, and Subgrantor determines that the Intellectual Property should be included in or is required for Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall obtain a license under terms acceptable to Subgrantor.

g). Warranties

- (1). Subgrantee represents and warrants that:

- (a). It has secured and will secure all rights and licenses necessary for its performance of this subgrant agreement.
- (b). Neither Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement, nor the exercise by either Party of the rights granted in this subgrant agreement, nor any use, reproduction, manufacture, sale, offer to sell, import, export, modification, public and private display/performance, distribution, and disposition of the Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement will infringe upon or violate any Intellectual Property right, non-disclosure obligation, or other proprietary right or interest of any third-party or entity now existing under the laws of, or hereafter existing or issued by, any state, the United States, or any foreign country. There are currently no actual or threatened claims by any such third party based on an alleged violation of any such right by Subgrantee.
- (c). Neither Subgrantee's performance nor any part of its performance will violate the right of privacy of, or constitute a libel or slander against any person or entity.
- (d). It has secured and will secure all rights and licenses necessary for Intellectual Property including, but not limited to, consents, waivers or releases from all authors.
- (e). Of music or performances used, and talent (radio, television and motion picture talent), owners of any interest in and to real estate, sites locations, property or props that may be used or shown.
- (f). It has not granted and shall not grant to any person or entity any right that would or might derogate, encumber, or interfere with any of the rights granted to Subgrantor in this subgrant agreement.

(g). It has appropriate systems and controls in place to ensure that state and federal funds will not be used in the performance of this subgrant agreement for the acquisition, operation or maintenance of computer software in violation of copyright laws.

(h). It has no knowledge of any outstanding claims, licenses or other charges, liens, or encumbrances of any kind or nature whatsoever that could affect in any way Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement.

- (2). SUBGRANTOR MAKES NO WARRANTY, THAT THE INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RESULTING FROM THIS SUBGRANT AGREEMENT DOES NOT INFRINGE UPON ANY PATENT, TRADEMARK, COPYRIGHT OR THE LIKE, NOW EXISTING OR SUBSEQUENTLY ISSUED.

h). Intellectual Property Indemnity

- (1). Subgrantee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Subgrantor and its licensees and assignees, and its officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, successors, and users of its products, ("Indemnities") from and against all claims, actions, damages, losses, liabilities (or actions or proceedings with respect to any thereof), whether or not rightful, arising from any and all actions or claims by any third party or expenses related thereto (including, but not limited to, all legal expenses, court costs, and attorney's fees incurred in investigating, preparing, serving as a witness in, or defending against, any such claim action, or proceeding, commenced or threatened) to which any of the Indemnities may be subject, whether or not Subgrantee is a party to any pending or threatened litigation, which arise out of or are related to (i) the incorrectness or breach of any of the representations, warranties, covenants or agreements of Subgrantee pertaining to Intellectual Property; or (ii) any Intellectual Property infringement, or any other type of actual or alleged infringement claim, arising out of Subgrantor's use, reproduction, manufacture, sale, offer to sell, distribution, import, export, modification, public and private performance/display, license, and disposition of the Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement. This indemnity obligation shall apply irrespective of whether the infringement claim is based on a patent, trademark or copyright registration that was issued after the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Subgrantor reserves the right to participate in and/or control, at Subgrantee's expense, any such infringement action brought against Subgrantor.
- (2). Should any Intellectual Property licensed by the Subgrantee to Subgrantor under this subgrant agreement become the subject of an Intellectual Property infringement claim, Subgrantee will exercise its authority reasonably and in good faith to preserve Subgrantor's right to use the licensed Intellectual Property in accordance with this subgrant agreement at no expense to Subgrantor. Subgrantor shall have the right to monitor and appear through its own counsel (at Subgrantee's expense) in any such claim or action. In the defense or settlement of the claim, Subgrantee may obtain the right for Subgrantor to continue using the licensed Intellectual Property or, replace or modify the licensed Intellectual Property so that the replaced or modified Intellectual Property becomes non-infringing provided that such replacement or modification is functionally equivalent to the original licensed Intellectual Property. Subgrantee acknowledges Subgrantor would suffer irreparable harm in the event of such breach and agrees Subgrantor shall be entitled to obtain equitable relief, including without limitation an injunction, from a court of competent jurisdiction, without restriction or limitation of any other rights and remedies available at law or in equity.

i). Survival

The provisions set forth herein shall survive any termination or expiration of this subgrant agreement or any project schedule.

20. Confidentiality Requirements

The State of California and the Subgrantee will exchange various kinds of information pursuant to this subgrant agreement. That information will include data, applications, program files, and information about specific clients receiving services. These data and information are confidential when they define an individual or an employing unit or when the disclosure is restricted or prohibited by any provision of law. Confidential information requires special precautions to protect it from unauthorized use, access, disclosure, modification, and destruction. The sources of information may include, but are not limited to, the Employment

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Development Department, the California Department of Social Services, the California Department of Education, the California Department of Corrections, the County Welfare Department(s), the County IV-D Directors Office of Child Support, the Office of the District Attorney, the California Department of Mental Health, the California Office of Community Colleges, the Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs, and individuals requesting program services.

The Subgrantor and Subgrantee agree that:

- a). Each party shall keep all confidential information that is exchanged between them in the strictest confidence and make such information available to their own employees only on a "need-to-know" basis.
- b). Each party shall provide security sufficient to ensure protection of confidential information from improper use and disclosures, including sufficient administrative, physical, and technical safeguards to protect this information from reasonable unanticipated threats to the security or confidentiality of the information.
- c). The Subgrantee agrees that information obtained under this subgrant agreement will not be reproduced, published, sold or released in original or in any other form for any purpose other than those specifically identified in this agreement.
 - i. Aggregate Summaries: All reports and/or publications developed by the Subgrantee based on data obtained under this agreement shall contain confidential data in aggregated or statistical summary form only. "Aggregated" refers to a data output that does not allow identification of an individual or employer unit.
 - ii. Publication: Prior to publication, Subgrantee shall carefully analyze aggregated data outputs to ensure the identity of individuals and/or employer units cannot be inferred pursuant to Unemployment Insurance Code section 1094(c). Personal identifiers must be removed. Geographic identifiers should be specified only in large areas and as needed, and variables should be recorded in order to protect confidentiality.
 - iii. Minimum Data Cell Size: The minimum data cell size or derivation thereof shall be three participants for any data table released to outside parties or to the public.
- d). Each party agrees that no disaggregate data, identifying individuals or employers, shall be released to outside parties or to the public.
- e). The Subgrantee shall notify Subgrantor's Information Security Office of any actual or attempted information security incidents, within 24 hours of initial detection, by telephone at (916) 654-6231. Information Security Incidents include, but are not limited to, any event (intentional or unintentional), that causes the loss, damage, or destruction, or unauthorized access, use, modification, or disclosure of information assets.

The Subgrantee shall cooperate with the Subgrantor in any investigations of security incidents. The system or device affected by an information security incident and containing confidential data obtained in the administration of this program shall be immediately removed from operation upon confidential data exposure or a known security breach. It shall remain removed from operation until correction and mitigation measures are applied.

If the Subgrantee learns of a breach in the security of the system which contains confidential data obtained under this Subgrant, then the Subgrantee must provide notification to individuals pursuant to Civil Code section 1798.82.
- f). The Subgrantee shall provide for the management and control of physical access to information assets (including personal computer systems, computer terminals, mobile computing devices, and various electronic storage media) used in performance of this Subgrant. This shall include, but is not limited to, security measures to physically protect data, systems, and workstations from unauthorized access and malicious activity; the prevention, detection, and suppression of fires; and the prevention, detection, and minimization of water damage.
- g). At no time will confidential data obtained pursuant to this agreement be placed on a mobile computing device, or on any form of removable electronic storage media of any kind unless the data are fully encrypted.
- h). Each party shall provide its employees with access to confidential information with written instructions fully disclosing and explaining the penalties for unauthorized use or disclosure of confidential information found in section 1798.55 of the Civil Code, section 502 of the Penal Code, section 2111 of the Unemployment Insurance Code, section 10850 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and other applicable local, state and federal laws.
- i). Each party shall (where it is appropriate) store and process information in electronic format, in such a way that unauthorized persons cannot reasonably retrieve the information by means of a computer.
- j). Each party shall promptly return to the other party confidential information when its use ends, or destroy the confidential information utilizing an approved method of destroying

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confidential information: shredding, burning, or certified or witnessed destruction. Magnetic media are to be degaussed or returned to the other party.

- k). If the Subgrantor or Subgrantee enters into an agreement with a third party to provide WIA services, the Subgrantor or Subgrantee agrees to include these data and security and confidentiality requirements in the agreement with that third party. In no event shall said information be disclosed to any individual outside of that third party's authorized staff, subcontractor(s), service providers, or employees.
- l). The Subgrantee may, in its operation of the One-Stops, permit a One-Stop Operator to enter into a subcontract to manage confidential information. This subcontract may allow an individual to register for resume-distribution services at the same time the individual enrolls in CalJOBS. Subgrantee shall ensure that all such subcontracts comply with the intellectual property requirements of paragraph 19 of this Subgrant, the confidentiality requirements of paragraph 20 of this Subgrant and any other terms of this Subgrant that may be applicable. In addition, the following requirements must be included in the subcontracts:
- (1) All client information submitted over the Internet to the subcontractor's databases must be protected, at a minimum, by 128-bit Secure Socket Layer (SSL) encryption. Clients' social security numbers must be stored in a separate database within the subcontractor's network of servers, and protected by a firewall and a secondary database server firewall or AES data encryption. If a subcontractor receives client social security numbers or other confidential information in the course of business, for example a resume-distribution service that provides enrollment in CalJOBS, social security numbers must be destroyed within two days after the client registers for CalJOBS. If a subcontractor obtains confidential information as an agent of the subgrantee, the subcontract must specifically state the purpose for the data collection and the term of records retention must be stated, and directly related, to the purpose and use of the information. In accordance with 29 Code of Federal Regulations 97.42, social security numbers and other client specific information shall not be retained for more than three years after a client completes services. The subgrantee should extend this period, only if any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the end of the three-year retention period. In this case the records should be maintained until completion of the action and resolution of all issues arising from it, or until the close of the three-year retention period, whichever is later. (29 CFR sec. 97.42 (b)(2).)
 - (2) Client information (personal information that identifies a client such as name and social security number) and/or demographic information of a client (such as wage history, address, and previous employment) shall not be used as a basis for commercial solicitation during the time the client or agency is using the subcontractor's services. Client information and/or demographic information shall not be used for any purposes other than those specific program purposes set forth in the subcontract.
 - (3) A One-Stop client must still be given the option to use the One-Stop's services, including CalJOBS, even if he or she chooses not to use any services of the subcontractor. This option shall be prominently, clearly, and immediately communicated to the client upon registration within the One-Stop or for CalJOBS, the subcontractor's resume-distribution services, or any other services subcontractor offers to the client or the One-Stop Operator.
 - (4) The subcontractor must clearly disclose all of its potential and intended uses of the client's personal and/or demographic information for the services the clients seeks and for any other services the subcontractor offers. The subcontractor shall not use a client's personal and/or demographic information without the client's prior permission. A link to the subcontractor's Privacy Policy shall appear prominently on the registration screens that list the potential and intended uses of the client's personal and/or demographic information.
 - (5) When the Subgrantor modifies State automated systems such as the State CalJOBS System, it shall provide reasonable notice of such changes to the Subgrantee. The Subgrantee shall be responsible to communicate such changes to the One-Stop Operator(s) in the local area.

In addition, the program attempts to enhance the employability of parolees and their access to employment opportunities in their home communities.

Purpose of Sub-Grant Addendum

The purpose of this sub-grant addendum is to specify the expected program activities to be conducted by LWIB's and their One-Stop Career Centers in relation to parolee clients. All requirements specified in the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) *Public Law 105-220, Chapter 5, Section 134(d)* apply to this addendum.

I. PROGRAM GOALS

II. LOCAL WORKFORCE INVESTMENT BOARDS RESPONSIBILITIES

The Local Workforce Investment Board shall:

A. Provide funds to its One Stop Career Centers (Career Center) to serve the parolee population with core, intensive and training services as deemed appropriate for the parolee. Services to parolees may include:

1. Job search seminars;
2. Individual employment plans;
3. Assistance in obtaining I-9 Right-to-Work documents, as necessary;
4. Employment referrals;
5. Job development workshops;
6. Supportive services referrals; and
7. Job-retention follow-up.

B. Participate in Parole and Community Team local meetings coordinated by the CDCR Division of Adult Parole Operations (DAPO).

C. Market the employability of parolees to prospective employers. Develop flyers, brochures and other marketing tools to promote Career Centers employment services.

D. Participate in employer stakeholder forums with CDCR.

E. Create lists of employers ready to hire parolees and maintain the list as additional employers are identified.

F. Coordinate any changes, additions or deletions to the LWIB service plans and all allocation of funds to one-stop career centers with CDCR, including but not limited to the following:

1. Distribution of funds to Career Center(s), for all new allocations.
2. Description of the Career Center(s) plan to provide services to parolees; and
3. Name, address and point of contact of each Career Center(s) receiving funding.
4. Coordinate Parole Unit referrals with Career Centers.

III. CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION (CDCR) RESPONSIBILITIES

The CDCR shall:

- A. Provide the LWIBs with general operation procedures;
- B. Work collaboratively with the LWIBs as specified in the Interagency Agreement; and
- C. Distribute the Interagency Agreement to the LWIBs.

IV. PROGRAM DATA REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

The LWIBs shall submit reports as specified in accordance with WIA *Public Law 105-220*, and as required by EDD and CDCR data reporting requirements.

V. PROGRAM FUNDING

Funding is available until September 30, 2010. Future funding is contingent upon the availability of federal funding and the passing of the state budget.

Responsibilities for Informing Subrecipients:** Subgrantees agree to separately identify to each of their subrecipients and document at the time of the subgrant and at the time of disbursement of funds, the Federal award number (AA-17110-08-55-A-6), the CFDA number, and the amount of ARRA funds.
- 8. Reporting: Program Management and Financial Expenditure:** Accountability guidelines for the ARRA emphasize data quality, streamlining data collection, and collection of information that shows measurable program outputs. The ARRA also emphasizes transparency and frequent communication with the American public about the nature of the ARRA investments. Accordingly, the ETA is developing reporting guidelines that will minimize any new collection burdens yet provide timely accurate accounting of system performance and outcomes. The Subgrantees shall collect and report information as conveyed in upcoming ARRA reporting instructions to be issued by the Subgrantor, following the receipt by the Subgrantor of ETA instructions.
- 9. Applicable Authority:** ARRA funds provided under this subgrant agreement addendum must be expended in accordance with all applicable federal statutes, regulations, policies, and guidance, including those of the ARRA of 2009 and the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (*as presently in effect and as may become effective during the terms of this Agreement*). In addition, the ARRA funds must be spent in accordance with the applicable approved WIA State plan including approved modifications and amendments to the plan and with the applicable approved WIA Local plan including approved modifications and amendments to the plan.
- 10. Fund Expenditure Period:** Pursuant to the ARRA, the period of availability for funds between the ETA and the State of California (Subgrantor) is February 17, 2009 through June 30, 2011, in accordance with existing terms and conditions of the PY 2008-09 funding agreement. The availability of funds provided by the Subgrantor to the Subgrantee may vary; and will be stated for each subgranted funding amount on the WIA Subgrant Agreement Funding Detail Sheet of the applicable subgrant. It is the Congress' intent, as well as that of the Federal Administration, that the majority of these funds will be utilized within the first year of availability.
- 11. Fund Obligation:** ARRA funds shall be obligated, by the Subgrantor, via a unilateral subgrant modification to the existing PY 2009-10 WIA Title I annual subgrant funding agreement between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. If there is no existing PY 2009-10 WIA subgrant funding agreement, the ARRA funds will be obligated via a bilateral subgrant agreement between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee and thereafter modified, if necessary, by unilateral subgrant modifications. Obligations and costs may not exceed the amount obligated in the subgrant unless otherwise modified by the Subgrantor. The ARRA funds provided may be adjusted, if necessary, under the provisions of Section 8., Funding, of the PY 2009-10 WIA subgrant agreement.

12. Veterans' Priority Provisions: ARRA funds, as with the WIA funds that they supplement, funded by the U.S. Department of Labor, are subject to the provisions of the "Jobs for Veterans Act" (JVA), Public Law 107-288 (38 USC 4215), as implemented by the Final Rule published on December 19, 2008 at 73 Fed. Reg. 78132. The JVA provides priority of service to veterans and spouses of certain veterans for the receipt of employment, training, and placement services. In addition, in accepting these ARRA funds, the Subgrantee assures that they will comply with the Veterans' Priority Provisions established by the Jobs for Veterans Act (38 USC 4215).

13. General Provisions of ARRA, as applicable: The following clauses are specific to usage of ARRA funds and are intended to supplement, not replace any existing terms and conditions.

With respect to the labor standards specified in this section, the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority and functions set forth in Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1267; 5 U.S.C. App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code. (ARRA Sec. 16064)

Whistleblower Protection: Each Subgrantee and their subrecipients awarded funds made available under the ARRA shall promptly refer to the Grantor Office of Inspector General any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subrecipient, subcontractor, or other person has submitted a false claim under the False Claims Act or has committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving those funds. (ARRA Sec. 1553)

Buy American – Use of American Iron, Steel, and Manufactured Goods: None of the funds appropriated or otherwise made available by the ARRA may be used for a project for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public building or public work unless all of the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used in the project are produced in the United States. See ARRA Section 1605 – Buy American Requirements. **NOTE:** WIA Title I prohibition on construction, in accordance with 20 CFR 667.260, remains applicable to Subgrantees.

14. Acceptance of Addendum: The Subgrantee's expenditure of any funds properly subgranted hereunder constitutes acceptance of the ARRA fund award, including any new or additional terms and conditions as may be attached hereto.

EXHIBIT B

Conditions and Limitations on the Use of WIA/ARRA 25% Funds under Grant Code 108

The California Workforce Investment Board (CWIB) adopted a temporary policy revision permitting the allocation of the remaining WIA/ARRA 25% Dislocated Worker (DW) funding on a formula allocation basis. This policy revision was formalized in WIA Directive WSD09-9. Consistent with this Directive, these funds are being provided to your organization under the following conditions and limitations:

- Although these funds can be used for either DW Rapid Response or DW Additional Assistance activities, the specific purpose of this funding is to substantially increase the number of dislocated workers trained.
- Grantees are encouraged to use these funds to integrate the Wagner-Peyser Act Re-Employment Services clients who need additional training and education services into WIA Title I via co-enrollment. Co-enrollment into other WIA or ARRA funded activities is also allowed as determined appropriate and necessary.
- These funds cannot be transferred to another fund category, i.e. Adult funding.
- Waivers provided to California's formula WIA DW funds, e.g., using dislocated worker funding for incumbent worker training as part of layoff aversion, are not applicable to these funds.

As the Subgrantee plans how their One-Stop systems will make immediate use of the ARRA funds, the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration (ETA) and the Subgrantor encourages them to take an expansive view of how the funds can be integrated into transformational efforts to achieve a new level of effectiveness throughout the public workforce system. In this system, the needs of workers and employers are equally important in developing thriving communities where all citizens succeed and businesses prosper. Successful implementation of the ARRA includes not only quick and effective provision of services and training for workers in need, but also leveraging changes in the system's basic operations to emerge as a strong, invigorated, innovative public workforce system capable of helping enable future economic growth and advancing shared prosperity for all Americans. Subgrantees are advised that the ARRA funds are intended to supplement, not supplant existing WIA Title I funds.
- 4. Limit on Funds:** None of the funds appropriated or otherwise made available in the ARRA may be used by any Subgrantee, local government, or any private entity, for any casino or other gambling establishment, aquarium, zoo, golf course, or swimming pool.
- 5. DUNS/CCR:** Subgrantees must have a Dun and Bradstreet Numbering System (DUNS) number (www.dnb.com) and must maintain active and current profiles in the Central Contractor Registration (CCR). (www.ccr.gov).

6. **Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards:** Subgrantees agree to separately identify the expenditures for each subgrant award funded under ARRA on the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) and the Data Collection Form (SF-SAC) required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations." This identification on the SEFA and SF-SAC shall include the Federal award number (AA-17110-08-55-A-6), the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) number, the prefix "ARRA-" in the name of the Federal program, and the amount, such that separate accountability and disclosure is provided for ARRA funds by Federal award number consistent with any reports required by ARRA Section 1512(c).
7. **Responsibilities for Informing Subrecipients:** Subgrantees agree to separately identify to each of their subrecipients and document at the time of the subgrant and at the time of disbursement of funds, the Federal award number (AA-17110-08-55-A-6), the CFDA number, and the amount of ARRA funds.
8. **Reporting: Program Management and Financial Expenditure:** Accountability guidelines for the ARRA emphasize data quality, streamlining data collection, and collection of information that shows measurable program outputs. The ARRA also emphasizes transparency and frequent communication with the American public about the nature of the ARRA investments. Accordingly, the ETA is developing reporting guidelines that will minimize any new collection burdens yet provide timely accurate accounting of system performance and outcomes. The Subgrantees shall collect and report information as conveyed in upcoming ARRA reporting instructions to be issued by the Subgrantor, following the receipt by the Subgrantor of ETA instructions.
9. **Applicable Authority:** ARRA funds provided under this subgrant agreement addendum must be expended in accordance with all applicable federal statutes, regulations, policies, and guidance, including those of the ARRA of 2009 and the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (*as presently in effect and as may become effective during the terms of this Agreement*). In addition, the ARRA funds must be spent in accordance with the applicable approved WIA State plan including approved modifications and amendments to the plan and with the applicable approved WIA Local plan including approved modifications and amendments to the plan.
10. **Fund Expenditure Period:** Pursuant to the ARRA, the period of availability for funds between the ETA and the State of California (Subgrantor) is February 17, 2009 through June 30, 2011, in accordance with existing terms and conditions of the PY 2008-09 funding agreement. The availability of funds provided by the Subgrantor to the Subgrantee may vary; and will be stated for each subgranted funding amount on the WIA Subgrant Agreement Funding Detail Sheet of the applicable subgrant. It is the Congress' intent, as well as that of the Federal Administration, that the majority of these funds will be utilized within the first year of availability.
11. **Fund Obligation:** ARRA funds shall be obligated, by the Subgrantor, via a unilateral subgrant modification to the existing PY 2009-10 WIA Title I annual subgrant funding agreement between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. If there is no existing PY 2009-10 WIA subgrant funding agreement, the ARRA funds will be obligated via a bilateral subgrant agreement between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee and thereafter modified, if necessary, by unilateral subgrant modifications. Obligations and costs may not exceed the amount obligated in the subgrant unless otherwise modified by the Subgrantor. The ARRA funds provided may be adjusted, if necessary, under the provisions of Section 8., Funding, of the PY 2009-10 WIA subgrant agreement.

12. Veterans' Priority Provisions: ARRA funds, as with the WIA funds that they supplement, funded by the U.S. Department of Labor, are subject to the provisions of the "Jobs for Veterans Act" (JVA), Public Law 107-288 (38 USC 4215), as implemented by the Final Rule published on December 19, 2008 at 73 Fed. Reg. 78132. The JVA provides priority of service to veterans and spouses of certain veterans for the receipt of employment, training, and placement services. In addition, in accepting these ARRA funds, the Subgrantee assures that they will comply with the Veterans' Priority Provisions established by the Jobs for Veterans Act (38 USC 4215).

13. General Provisions of ARRA, as applicable: The following clauses are specific to usage of ARRA funds and are intended to supplement, not replace any existing terms and conditions.

Wage Rate Requirements: Subject to further clarification issued by the Office of Management and Budget and notwithstanding any other provision of law and in a manner consistent with other provisions of the ARRA, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors and subcontractors on projects funded directly by or assisted in whole or in part by and through the Subgrantor pursuant to this award shall be paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing on projects of a character similar in the locality as determined by the Secretary of Labor in accordance with subchapter IV of chapter 31 of title 40, United States Code. With respect to the labor standards specified in this section, the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority and functions set forth in Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1267; 5 U.S.C. App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code. (ARRA Sec. 16064)

Whistleblower Protection: Each Subgrantee and their subrecipients awarded funds made available under the ARRA shall promptly refer to the Grantor Office of Inspector General any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subrecipient, subcontractor, or other person has submitted a false claim under the False Claims Act or has committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving those funds. (ARRA Sec. 1553)

Buy American – Use of American Iron, Steel, and Manufactured Goods: None of the funds appropriated or otherwise made available by the ARRA may be used for a project for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public building or public work unless all of the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used in the project are produced in the United States. See ARRA Section 1605 – Buy American Requirements. **NOTE:** WIA Title I prohibition on construction, in accordance with 20 CFR 667.260, remains applicable to Subgrantees.

14. Acceptance of Addendum: The Subgrantee's expenditure of any funds properly subgranted hereunder constitutes acceptance of the ARRA fund award, including any new or additional terms and conditions as may be attached hereto.

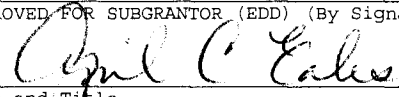

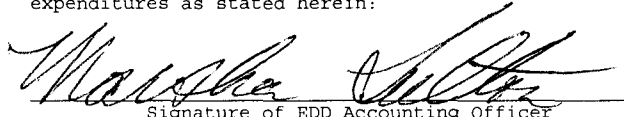

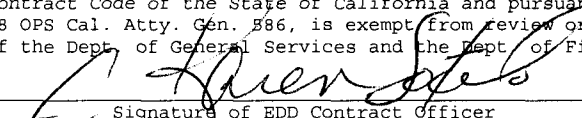

This grant encumbers Workforce Investment Act (WIA), National Emergency Grant (NEG) funds to defray costs incurred by the subgrantee during the period beginning April 1, 2010, and ending March 31, 2012. These funds are to provide WIA allowable employment and training services to eligible dislocated workers who have been laid off from the New United Motor Manufacturing Incorporated (NUMMI) automobile manufacturing plant, and eligible dislocated workers (secondary workers) who are or were employed by secondarily-impacted firms and suppliers to NUMMI.

Additional funding may be awarded if the subgrantee's operation of this program and the needs of remaining dislocated workers warrant additional funds. Such award will also be contingent on the release of additional NEG funds by DOL to the subgrantor. The subgrantee accepts that the subgrantor retains unrestricted authority to deobligate and redirect any of these grant funds in order to promote effective statewide program operations and timely fund utilization. Additionally, the subgrantee agrees to adhere to all project reporting requirements, including weekly reporting as required by the DOL.

The subgrantee agrees to provide a detailed project plan to the subgrantor no later than the close of business July 15, 2010. This detailed project plan will include at a minimum a Project Narrative, a Budget, a quarterly cumulative Participant Plan of service, and a quarterly cumulative Expenditure Plan, arrayed on standard formats to be provided by the subgrantor. Failure to provide an acceptable plan by July 15, 2010, could result in access to grant monies being suspended until this requirement is met.

As a condition of this grant, the subgrantee agrees to exert maximum efforts to promptly outreach to and enroll all potential participants so that 90 percent of all potential participants are enrolled within the first six months of this NEG-funded project. The detailed project plan specified above will need to reflect these enrollment goals. The subgrantee agrees it will coordinate to the maximum extent possible with those of its neighboring Local Workforce Investment Areas which are also operating parts of the NUMMI dislocated worker project.

In respect to this NEG program, the sub-grantee and program participants are not limited to the training providers specified in California's Eligible Training Provider list.

The subgrantee agrees it will coordinate to the maximum extent possible with the Employment Development Department's Trade Adjustment Assistance specialists to ensure that NUMMI dislocated worker participants are afforded all the resources and services which may be available to them through co-enrollment and co-case-management to ensure seamless service delivery.

NEG funds awarded for training may be used to fill a temporary gap where Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) petitions are pending to ensure that workers have access to training as soon as possible after dislocation. Once a worker is determined eligible for TAA assistance, those services authorized under the trade program should be TAA funded to the extent those funds are available. The primary purpose of NEG funds as they relate to trade certified workers is to provide workers with wrap-around services that are not available through the TAA program and state formula Dislocated Worker program funds. The subgrantee is also reminded that some costs of Case Management Services (e.g. assessment, testing, prevocational services, etc. can be covered by TAA funds (See TEGL 22-08).

Subgrantee will co-enroll participants who receive benefits under this NEG subgrant into Grant Code (GC) 768 (which identifies the funding source) and into either GC 766 or GC 767, per Information Bulletin WSIN09-52 dated March 26, 2010. Accordingly, subgrantee will use GC 766 to identify participants who were previously employed by NUMMI or one of its subsidiary corporations and will use GC 767 to identify participants who were previously or are employed by secondarily impacted firms (including suppliers to NUMMI) which have been certified by the subgrantor as being project-eligible firms/workers.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS OF THE AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT OF 2009

The grant agreement addendum addresses additional requirements applicable to funds appropriated in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA or the Recovery Act, P.L. 111-5).

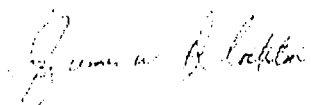

Section I – Target Group

1. Describe the characteristics of the at-risk youth population that will be served by this project including barriers, supportive services needs, basic and occupational skill needs. Explain how the targeted youth population was identified.

The characteristics of the at-risk youth population to be served (16 and 18 year olds) by this project include those with barriers such as: youth with a wide variety of disabilities, youth who are homeless, youth in the foster care system, youth that have been criminal offenders, youth that are basic skills deficient, in-school youth that are potential high school drop outs, youth that are parents or pregnant teens, youth from low-income families, out-of-school youth that have earned high school credits but have not passed the California High School Exit Exam, and out-of-school youth that have not earned a high school diploma or GED.

Supportive service and occupational skills needs of the targeted youth population include: high school diploma/GED attainment, successful attainment of employment, solutions to other barriers that include transportation, health care needs, clothing, post secondary education attainment, financial aid for college, creating an effective resume, WorkKeys Training, work experience, soft skill development for successful job retention, mental health counseling, community service, occupational skills training, leadership opportunities and so much more.

The targeted youth population was identified through an assessment of the characteristics of the youth served by the current WIA youth service provider (Project YES) over the past six years, through an assessment of the characteristics of the at-risk youth attending local alternative education programs and comprehensive high schools, as well as an assessment of the characteristics of the at-risk youth served by local community-based organizations.

2. Identify the outreach and recruitment methods that will be used to contact and recruit the target population. Demonstrate how these methods will enable you to reach the targeted youth population.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet in partnership with Project YES (a Ceres Unified School District based program) has established a long-standing relationship in serving at-risk youth in Stanislaus County. For the past six years Project YES has successfully served over 1150 at-risk youth in attaining educational and employment related goals.

The outreach and recruitment methods that will be used in this project will be those that have been proven effective in reaching this targeted youth population. Methods include: high school referrals, walk-ins, probation and law enforcement referrals, community and faith based organizations referrals, etc. Potential clients are recruited from the alternative education programs throughout Stanislaus County and from local school districts such as, Patterson Unified School District, Hughson Unified School District, Oakdale Unified School District, and Ceres Unified School District

and others. The Student Attendance Review Boards (SARB) of these districts also refer students that are struggling with attendance or who have dropped out of school.

Clients are also referred by community based organizations that include: Stanislaus County Foster Care, Stanislaus County Mental Health, Modesto Junior College, Grayson Community Center, Stanislaus County Probation Department, Sierra Vista Children's Center, Foster Youth Service agencies and other partnering agencies of the Ceres Community Collaborative (CCC).

The success of Project YES over the past six years is its own recruitment tool! Current and past participants, themselves, are active recruiters of the program, spreading the word to their friends, family and neighbors, about the program, what it offers, and how dramatically it helps turn the lives of at-risk youth around!

Project YES staff also participant in a variety of community and secondary school events that focus on youth related issues, including employment, education, and barriers to success.

These methods and sources of recruitment have, and will continue to enable the Project YES staff to obtain direct contact with the targeted youth, in which an informal one-on-one eligibility determination can take place.

3. Priority will be given to programs that assist at least 50% of the total participants who have insufficient credits for graduation, are deficient in basic skills, and/or who are in need of a GED or high school completion. Describe how youth meeting these criteria will be recruited and provide an estimated number that will be served.

Youth meeting these criteria will be recruited through the alternative education partners, school district truancy boards, as well as through the other partners described above. It is estimated that at least 78 youth (60%) with these characteristics will be served by this program.

Given the fact that the local alternative education school sites invite Project YES staff to their campuses to discuss the benefits of the Project YES program with the identified 18 year olds that are credit deficient and who will not meet graduation requirements, it is anticipated that a large number of youth will be recruited through this process.

Section II – Planned Approach

1a. Describe the specific type(s) of services that will enable youth to attain, retain or advance in the academic environment, increase their vocational and job readiness skills and link them to career pathways with specific industries participating in the program. Identify who will be providing the services. Include a service process flowchart.

Project YES has been innovative in providing program services to at-risk youth in Stanislaus County. Project YES offers its clients many program features that include: a comprehensive resource center model, employability skills classes and seminars, parent involvement, mentoring, training opportunities, supportive services, incentives for achievement, and leadership building opportunities. Project YES also provides an objective assessment of the academic levels, skill levels, and service needs of each participant through a comprehensive assessment process.

Project YES has developed policies and procedures that ensure all clients are served with the highest quality services and programs, while also maintaining compliance with WIA standards.

Alliance Worknet guidelines are followed and common sense is used to ensure that program performance is at or above the established standards. When each participant's Individual Service Strategy (ISS) is completed, a map of services is then identified that best responds to the client's individual educational and career needs. Initial assessments are thorough and accurate to ensure goals set for clients are reasonable and attainable, within the program period. For out-of-school youth, program services are targeted to maximize employability and earnings gain once the client has exited the program. The **52 out-of-school youth and 28 in-school youth participating in the Bridges to Success program will also be concurrently enrolled in Project YES**, under the existing, comprehensive and innovative youth employment services program that has been successfully implemented for the past six years.

Project YES establishes strong links between academic and occupational learning as part of each participant's Individual Service Strategy. These links can better be described as the process of assessing a participant's academic strengths and weakness and connecting each to an appropriate occupational learning environment. In-school youth are guided to take advantage of the educational opportunities that would best prepare them for their chosen career path. In-school youth are also required to maintain a 2.5 GPA with no failing grades to qualify for work experience. Out-of-school youth's academic needs are assessed, and when determined appropriate receive academic remediation to enhance their employability. Each participant is administered the Eureka Program Career Path assessment that outlines the academic preparation necessary for the individual participant's chosen field.

Tutoring, study skills, and dropout prevention programs are available on-site through a partnership with the CUSD Foundation, Monday through Friday, with some Saturday appointments also available. Bilingual tutors are available to assist students that speak English as a second language. Participants who are struggling academically are assigned a tutoring schedule and are required to attend as a condition of other program participation. Alternative education and out-of-school participants receive tutoring and study skills through the Modesto Junior College remedial education program, as well as through a Project YES Academic Advisor.

Drop-out prevention is conducted by Project YES Youth Advisors administering case management for each participant. In-school youth will be counseled on the benefits of staying in school and communication will occur between the Youth Advisor and the Attendance Department of the districts in which the students are attending (Ceres, Turlock, Keyes, Modesto, Patterson, etc). Project YES will also coordinate supportive services for these students to assist them with staying in school (including, housing, counseling, mental health, etc). A student incentive program is also utilized through reward system and more.

Project YES provides alternative school placement resources to clients. These resources can include local alternative high schools, adult education programs and community schools. Within walking distance of Project YES are three alternative programs, including Ceres Adult School, Argus High School and Endeavor Alternative Center. Students attending Argus and Endeavor are able to receive their education through independent study, or in small classroom settings with a minimized schedule that allows for increased flexibility. Additionally, participating youth will also have the option of earning a high school diploma through web-based Kaplan College high school diploma program.

Also through this program, participating youth with children may receive subsidized child care costs as a supportive service, in an effort to eliminate this barrier to attaining education or job placement goals. A Service Process Flowchart is provided as **Attachment 1**.

1b. Bonus points will be given to applicants that focus on career pathways in Allied Health or Skilled Trades industries. Describe how the career pathways in the program represent the Allied Health or Skilled Trades industries.

Over the past six years Project YES has established highly effective working relationships with representatives of each of the public and private technical training providers throughout the region. Specifically, this program will focus on those providers of career pathways in the Allied Health and Skilled Trade industries. Project YES has proven successes in placing youth in each of these career sectors on annual basis, based on the youth's career interest inventory, abilities, skills and so forth.

Specifically, the career pathways in Allied Health in which local employers have indicated a high demand for skilled, qualified individuals include: EMT, phlebotomist, medical assistant, certified nursing assistant, medical office transcription and pharmacy technician.

Additionally, the career pathways in the Skilled Trade area in which local employers have indicated a high demand for skilled labor include: manufacturing industry line operator, industrial maintenance, and welding.

As stated above, each participating youth is provided an Individual Service Strategy (ISS) that identifies his/her educational and career needs, in which Project YES utilizes to create the map of services that best meets his/her needs and goals. For example, the ISS will guide the staff and client in determining the most appropriate secondary education goal (i.e. high school diploma vs. GED) and secondly, to directly link each youth with postsecondary technical training and/or employment opportunities.

2. Describe how and what STEM fields will be integrated into your summer employment program. Demonstrate how you will identify applicable STEM content from existing academic programs and how your program will connect in-school learning experiences to real-life work activities and career pathways.

The following STEM fields will be integrated into the summer employment program: Science and Technology. These fields will be integrated as a result of the types of employers and occupations that participating youth will be placed with. Given that in-school and out-of-school youth will be served, an analysis of the current secondary level ROP and CTE (career and technical education) programs throughout the county will be conducted to determine the most appropriate county-wide ROP and CTE programs the in-school youth may attend. All ROP and CTE programs are designed to provide students with real-life work activities, while also meeting existing academic requirements. Several CTE Academies exist in Stanislaus County in which the academic course within the CTE pathway are provided in a school-within-a-school setting allowing for the academic instruction to be delivered in a manner that is directly involving the CTE pathway. We will link our participating youth to the employers that are direct partners in these pathways. For out-of-school youth, their academic instruction and training will be directly linked to their Individual Service Strategy (ISS) goals. For instance, youth meeting the entrance eligibility requirements will be enrolled in technical educational and training programs in the region.

3. Describe the summer work experience jobs that youth will participate in and how this will increase their knowledge and skills through hands on applied learning. Describe the specific industries/employers participating in the program.

Having been a previous recipient/grantee of ARRA Summer Youth funding in 2009, Project YES fully understands the importance of linking youth to summer work experience that provides each youth with hands-on learning experiences in the career path of their choosing. Project YES staff make every effort to place each participating youth in jobs that are directly related to their interests and to their preparation and training, and those that have a greater potential to lead to future permanent employment. Participating youth will be able to experience first-hand (through summer and year-round work experience) what it takes to perform these jobs and the opportunity to learn the industry language that is needed to gain experience and confidence in that specific trade or industry. Conversely, as youth are placed on work experience job sites, this may be the first opportunity the youth has had to gain a better understanding of the career path. As such, the youth is then better equipped to decide if this particular career path is truly the direction he/she wants to pursue.

Examples of the types of summer work experience jobs include those in the Skilled Trades and Allied Health employment sectors such as: pharmacy clerk, manufacturing warehouse assistant, manufacturing stock clerk/order filling, nursing assistant, first aide attendant, manufacturing line worker, medical office clerk/reception, and more than can be listed in this application.

The specific industry employers participating in this program include those that Project YES continues to place youth for work experience as listed in **Attachment 2**.

4. Describe the transition and the services that will be provided at the end of the summer program that will lead youth to either return to school or other training or job placement.

Participating youth are provided summer employment opportunities through public and private sector placements, as appropriate based on their employment goal outlined on his/her individual ISS. These youth will be receiving the following transition services that will return them to school, or to other training or job placement.

- In-school youth will transition back to high school and receive access to ROP classes, supportive services, academic tutoring, case management, and pre-employment and job retention workshops.
- Occupational skills training is available through district ROP classes for in-school youth (at no cost to the program), and through ROP or training facilities from the state Eligible Training Provider Listing for out-of-school youth. This vocational training allows participants to gain specific job skills that could then be practiced and perfected through work experience.
- Participants are referred to external training programs only after they have had a thorough needs assessment and only if the training coincides with their stated employment goal.
- Additionally, paid and unpaid work experience, including internships and job shadowing are available to all participants as deemed appropriate in their ISS. All participants are encouraged to participate in job shadowing experiences and to complete a minimum of 50 hours of community service (volunteer work).
- Pre-employability Skills and Job Retention Classes; are provided in the form of weekly workshops facilitated by the Program Manager, with guest speakers providing relevant and in-

depth information on various employment related topics. Out-of-school youth also attend employability skills classes as deemed appropriate. Employability skills classes will address many issues that participants may have with successful employment, such as lack of work ethic, lack of knowledge about the world of work, expectations of employers, and other limitations.

- Supportive Services; include bus passes, clothing, tools, equipment, and other items allowed within WIA policy, and are provided as needed to prepare clients for successful unsubsidized employment acquisition and retention.
- Counseling Services; are available to participants who have challenges needing to be addressed prior to successful job placement. These services are provided by the Center for Human Services in collaboration with Ceres Healthy Start and are housed in the Project YES facility for convenient access and availability to participants and their families. Participating youth residing outside the Ceres community can also obtain these services through satellite service locations throughout the county.

These occupations were determined based on the statistical and anecdotal evidence obtained from a variety of sources that substantiate the need of local employers for qualified, eligible employees. Specifically, sources of data included labor market information from the California Employment Development Department’s (EDD) report, the *Fastest Growing Occupations through 2014*; EDD report, *Projections of Employment by Industry and Occupation through 2014*; and EDD report, the *Top 100 Fastest Growing Occupations in the San Joaquin Valley*. Additional data was obtained from Bureau of Labor Statistics, Occupational Outlook Handbook, 2008-2009 Edition; the Central California Economic Development Corporation report, *Central California – Your West Coast Address for Success*, 2008; and the California Job Journal report, *The Central Valley – Jobs in the Heartland*.

Lastly, anecdotal evidence of the job outlook for the Central Valley was acquired through in-formal interviews of the business representatives of the Ceres Unified School District Career and Technical Education Advisory Committee that is comprised of over 85 local business and industry employers.

6. Describe how your service delivery plan will achieve the goals and objectives of the project in a timely manner. As the planned lead facilitator of program services for the Bridges to Success program, Project YES has established a successful program model that results in effective services for youth while meeting the needs of local employers. As such, the service delivery plan developed for this program (as indicated in SFP Form 1) will be achieved due to Project YES’ proven capacity with at-risk youth programs. Project YES is administered and managed by the Ceres Unified School District. The organizational structure ensures that all program staff members are appropriately supervised and accountable to District administrators for program and job performance.

Specifically, the Assistant Superintendent of Student Support Services for Ceres Unified is responsible for directing all 2nd level administrators in the division, including Dustin Pack, Program Manager of Project YES. Dustin is responsible for the implementation of all program related activities and must ensure program outcomes as specified and appropriate. Dustin is also responsible for coordinating and supervising program support staff. All staff members are fully qualified and competent to serve in their designated positions. Specifically, Dustin Pack has more than eleven years of direct experience in WIA funded programs, with an additional five years of experience in social service work with youth.

The management and staff of Project YES implement the policies and procedures of the Youth Advisory Council and the Alliance Worknet, as well as those of WIA, to ensure proper application of youth employment services in the community. Internal program procedures have also been adopted to provide the best possible services available to the youth of Ceres and surrounding communities. Project YES staff have received training and have successfully used the county's Forms Training Handbook and the state's WIA Eligibility Technical Assistance Guide. Project YES staff have successfully met the WIA tracking and performance requirements for six consecutive years, through the use of the policies and procedures of WIA programs.

The planned project goals are above the State goals specified for this program (Bridges to Success) due to the fact that Project YES anticipates greater performance on the stated goals as a result of their prior and current successes with serving at-risk, in and out-of-school school with the same characteristics as those to be served through Bridges to Success. Given the success of Project YES in placing over 300 youth in summer work experience positions in the summer of 2009, is evidence of their ability to meet the goals of this program.

- 2. Provide a description of how the project goals will be measured and provide further clarification to demonstrate their impact on the community and participants.*

Project goals will be measured through a comprehensive, multi-tiered process that involves all staff in providing up-to-date information on project outcomes and performance measures to the Project Director, district administration, the Alliance Worknet and the local Youth Advisory Council. Formal and informal meetings occur on a regular basis to ensure that clients are on-track to meet their individual goals and that the program is making gains toward goal achievement. Strategies are identified and implemented to address any barriers that the clients or the program may have encountered toward goal achievement. Evaluation of the program's progress is a built-in function of the day-to-day oversight and management of the program activities and staff.

The success of Project YES is due to the staff's diligence in the facilitation of complete, well maintained, organized and thoroughly documented case files for each individual participant. The Program Manager and Youth Advisors maintain on-going case notes, ensuring that an accurate record of client activity is continually documented. Participant eligibility documents are created and maintained utilizing the SAMsoft software application system. Participants' eligibility applications, Individual Service Strategy, goals and enrollment are maintained and transmitted to the Alliance Worknet through this system, in a timely manner.

Participants of Project YES can expect to gain a multitude of individual benefits from successful program participation. The two targeted areas in which participants will benefit are education and employment. The expected individual benefits include: high school diploma/GED attainment, successful attainment of employment, solutions to other barriers that include transportation, health care needs, clothing, post secondary education attainment, financial aid for college, creating an effective resume, WorkKeys Training, work experience, soft skill development for successful job retention, mental health counseling, community service, occupational skills training, leadership opportunities and so much more. Here are some examples of how Project YES has positively affected the lives of its youth participants. The majority of Project YES participants have had successful work experience opportunities in the public and private business sector. To date, over 423 youth hold unsubsidized positions with local employers as a direct result of participation in Project YES training and job placement assistance. Additionally, 188 out-of-school-youth have received certificates of completion from local accredited ETPL training providers in Stanislaus County. Currently, 235 youth are actively receiving program services during the 2009-2010 year. Through Project YES these youth were able to obtain permanent employment opportunities that allowed them to ultimately become self-sufficient, productive members of the community.

Project YES has also had positive effects on the attendance rates of its participants each year. For example, at-risk students on the verge of dropping out of school or being expelled were referred to Project YES by the Ceres Police Department Diversion Program and the Ceres Unified School District Expulsion and Attendance Review Board. These students improved in attendance, motivation and commitment to complete the school year and continue their education, in order to maintain eligibility to participate in the opportunities provided by Project YES.

Through Project YES students have also developed improved relationships with their parents and family members. For many participants, Project YES is the first program that their families support and consider a value to their future. Participants are able to develop confidence and self-esteem (skills for a lifetime) that will result in their ability to successfully pursue future endeavors.

The expected community benefits include: increased pool of qualified candidates for employers, fewer youth heading down the wrong path in life, increased numbers of youth entering postsecondary education, paid and unpaid internships for youth throughout the community (free staff time for local employers), and much more.

Project YES provides a beneficial return on the public's investment, by providing quality comprehensive services for the participants that have successfully led them to education attainment and employment. As a result, there are fewer youth spending their teen years as high school drop outs, being unemployed, being unproductive, committing crimes, contributing to the teen pregnancy rate, etc. While many of the participating youth are identified as at-risk, with many barriers to success, these individuals have experienced life changing opportunities and increased their potential to be the best they can be, in spite of their circumstances or those of their families.

During the past six years Project YES and its participants have experienced many successes that have resulted in a direct return on the public's investment in this program. During the 2008-2009 year, 82% of in-school youth earned a high school diploma or a GED. 100% of clients attended one or more workshops provided by Modesto Junior College, California State University, Stanislaus, Merced Community College, Delta Community College and the University of California, Merced on

topics that included information on enrollment and financial aid. For many participants, this was their first introduction and visit to a college campus. Of the 2008-2009 participants, 67 in-school and out-of-school youth have enrolled in Modesto Junior College this year with plans to continue their education.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet has successfully formed an effective partnership with the Ceres Unified School District (local education agency) and it's Project YES (youth employment services) program in serving at-risk youth in Stanislaus County. Formal agreements currently exist between the Alliance and the Ceres Unified School District, as the result of the currently funded WIA youth program that is facilitated by Project YES.

Project YES has established effective partnerships with over 200 employers throughout the San Joaquin Valley. A list of these employers is provided as an attachment. Formal agreements have been established with these employers as part of the year-round Project YES program, as well as the Summer Youth program.

Project YES is continually developing effective connections with local and county wide agencies that have strong links to the job market and employers in the area. These connections are facilitated through formal and informal communication including telephone, fax, and email, as well as attendance at Chamber of Commerce events, Career Fairs, Open Houses and through individual invitations to employers to visit the Project YES facility. Project YES staff provide each participating youth with an exist interview, upon successful completion of the program. In this exit interview clients are provided a variety of employment resources available in the community that will continue to provide them links to information about the current job market and employment opportunities.

Over the past six years Project YES has worked diligently and consistently to build a wide ranging collaboration with local businesses, post-secondary training providers, referral and resources agencies and local officials, to create a database of partners that can best serve the needs of youth today. The majority of partners represent businesses that are willing to provide Project YES clients with subsidized and unsubsidized work experience opportunities. In most cases, these opportunities have led to long term employment for our youth. Employers now seek out Project YES daily, to inquire if more youth are ready for their work experience and/or are seeking employment opportunities. These employers know that giving these youth a chance at a better life is the best reward.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet intends to contract with the Ceres Unified School District's Project YES program to provide the proposed Bridges to Success program services to the targeted 16-18 year old youth. Therefore, the contracted amount of \$450,000 is indicated on the Budget Summary Plan Form 4 in row N (Contractual Services), as well as listed on Supplemental Budget Form 5. A description of the expenses planned as part of the \$450,000 contact is provided below.

Contracted Services – Ceres Unified School District – Project YES - **\$450,000**

- **Staff Salaries: \$90,497.70** for three youth advisors and one administrative assistant II. Provide case management to assigned youth, tracking participant data, providing referral and resources, addressing barriers to educational and employment success; recruit economically eligible applicants, including high school drop-outs, single parents, handicapped youth, and ex-offenders; interpret child/family eligibility and programmatic issues; ensure participants meet the requirements of federal and state contracts and guidelines; systematically visit school sites, training sites, and vocational classes for purpose of monitoring participants' achievement in relation to their individualized service strategies; attend meetings and in-service training sessions as assigned; maintain current knowledge of current trends and assigned program.
- **Staff Benefits: \$20,537.38** for three youth advisors and one admin. assistant(22.39% includes **standard benefits (FICA, Medi-CA, SUI, Workman's Comp, PERS etc.)**)
- **Operating Expenses: \$27,732** for the costs associated with such expenses that include; copy machine lease and maintenance, staff supplies, staff travel, communications costs for office and youth advisor staff.
- **Occupational Skills Training: \$54,000** for occupational skills training for 12 youth @ \$4,500 per youth
- **On-the-Job Training (OJT): \$7,500** estimated for 3 youth @ \$2,500 per youth
- **Participant Wages: \$176,995.15** cost of summer youth employment
- **Participant Support Services: \$63,587.64**

- Indirect cost allowance at 4.52% is **\$9,150.13** for Ceres Unified

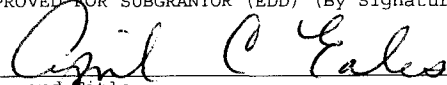

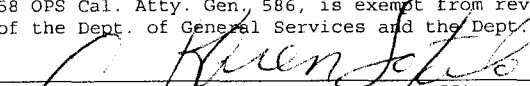

Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet will provide a number of service elements to those impacted by the NUMMI closure: These service element will consist of a skill assessment, supportive services, workshops, vocational training, one-the-Job training, paid internships (work experience) and job search assistance.

Skill Assessments:

Our Workforce investment Board has adopted WorkKeys as our sole assessment tool for our Adult/Dislocated customers. Workkeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success.

WorkKeys measures the proficiency level in Applied Mathematics (AM), Reading for Information (RI) and Locating Information (LI).

These skills are valuable for any occupation-skilled or professional-and at any level of education. Over 17,000 jobs throughout all industries have been "profiled" by WorkKeys and assigned a minimum level indicating proficiency. Assessment scores indicate the individual has the capacity to learn the skills required in a particular job. Participants who do not score at the required levels will be enrolled in remediation to help them improve their basic skills.

Supportive Services:

Supportive Services will be available to impacted customers based on need. These services include, but not limited to mileage reimbursement, uniforms, tools, licenses, and other work related expenses. Childcare and emergency assistance will also be provided as needed. We project that 131 participants would benefit for an average cost per supportive service of \$400.

Workshops:

We understand that many of those impacted by the NUMMI closure are not prepared to re-enter the workforce. Our work preparation workshops will assist them in creating a resume, preparing for a job interview, understanding the employer expectations, or unlocking the mystery of on-line applications. Those impacted by the NUMMI closure will also have the opportunity to attend a workshop on "how to deal with the loss of a job" offered by a local Health Service Agency.

Vocational Training Opportunities:

In partnership with our local Employment Development Department through the TAA process, 116 participants will access vocational training through this initiative.

Participants will be allowed to select trainings that fall under the Stanislaus County Workforce Investment Board approved Top 25 In-Demand Occupation list. Some of these occupations consist of Warehouse and Logistics, Allied Health, Transportation, Office/administrative, Industrial Maintenance, Home Weatherization and Solar.

On-the Job Training (OJT):

One-the-Job Training provides an opportunity for employers to recover the extraordinary cost of training a new employee; those who might otherwise hire only experienced help are given the opportunity to hire and train a new employee to their own specifications. The majority of OJT's developed will be strategically aligned with our Top-25 In-Demand Occupations in Stanislaus County.

Paid Internships (Work Experience):

Paid Internships offer trainees a hands-on opportunity to learn skills that are relevant to local and regional employers who do not have any current employments openings, but are willing to offer training. Trainees gain current, relevant work experience needed to compete for jobs in the new or growing industry sectors.

Job Search Assistance:

Job Search assistance will be provided to participants through our Career Resource Center (self-directed) and through individualized and Group Workforce Consultation (staff-assisted). Targeted employment search will be once again aligned to our Workforce Investment Board 's Top 25 In-Demand Occupations. Industries/occupations such as Healthcare, Warehouse/Logistics, Manufacturing/Maintenance/Installation/Repair, Clerical/Administrative, Transportation and Accounting/Finance/Booking will be targeted for many of those impacted by the NUMMI closure.

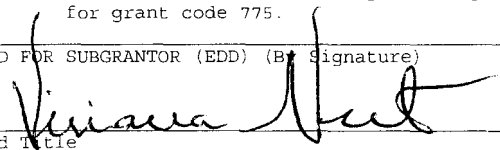

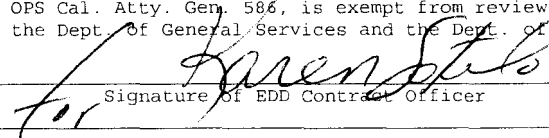

a) According to Employment Development Departments Labor Market Information, total industry employment, which includes Self-Employment, Unpaid Family Workers, Private Household Workers, Farm, and Non-Farm Employment, is expected to reach 204,300 between 2006 and 2016 in Stanislaus County. This increase represents a gain of 12,100 jobs. Nonfarm employment, which makes up 83% of total employment, is expected to grow at about 0.7% annually. Approximately 10,800 new jobs are forecasted to occur in Education Services, Health Care, and Social Assistance (3,900); Professional and Business Services (1,600); Manufacturing (1,500); Retail Trade (1,300); Leisure and Hospitality (1,300); and Transportation, Warehousing, and Utilities.

b) Due in-part to the housing/construction-related industry losses within the Central Valley, a large segment of our unemployed workers need training and skill upgrades to compete for limited new opportunities within their field or to enter new occupations. Examples include new focus on weatherization, and Photo-voltaic energy occupations, for which there are identified skills gaps. OJT offers the opportunity to apply their current transferable work skills in new and developing occupations. OJT also offers unemployed workers the opportunity to learn updated skills on their new jobs, thus allowing them to become more competent and competitive in occupations and industry sectors for which growth is projected.

B. Target Population**(I) Participant Identification and Outreach**

Participants will be identified through two methods:

Internal Case Management – Through our Intake, assessment and service delivery process, appropriate participants will be referred to the OJT program. Participants resume's will be prescreened and for those who meet the qualifications of the OJT Job Order will be forwarded to employer for final review, interviews and selection.

Employer Reverse Referral – In the case of lack of qualified WIA-enrolled candidates for referral, employers will be allowed to forward potential participants to the OJT program through our Reverse Referral process. Reverse Referral participants will be pre-assessed, including eligibility determination. If appropriate, participants will be fast-tracked through the process for placement with referred employer. Allowing for reverse referrals can result in improved customer satisfaction for our business customers, resulting in the business continuing to hire employers through our program.

Once selection has been made, the OJT writer/monitor will draft agreements, schedule appointment with employer and participant and have contracts signed.

2. Describe any specialized outreach activities that go beyond normal operations of the state and local workforce area. If affected industries (i.e., where layoffs have occurred) have labor unions representation, the local unions should be part of the outreach effort.

Within the construction industry, we have collaborated with our local Community College, County's and Cities' Planning and Development staff, Housing Authority (HUD services), and local immersing employers (such as 1st Light Energy) to target laid off construction workers to provide tailored vocational training. The training includes emerging weatherization and energy efficiency skills and Photo-voltaic installation techniques. The partnership includes hands-on experience on the job, supervised by partner employers, using housing units identified through the Cities' and County's regional planning staff to impact our low-income residents. Union involvement has been provided via a union representative on our local Workforce Investment Board. All participants in this program have been invited to join the local IBEW union.

C. Project Design

(I) Overall Project Design

Effective June 6, 2010, we implemented a new Re-Design service strategy. We went from providing individual case management services to group/networking meetings. Also in order to expedite and provide improved service to the large number of customer accessing and/or requesting our services, we divided our service delivery into three functions/teams.

Core Services Team – The Core Services Team is responsible for staffing the Career Resource Centers, providing job preparation workshops to the general public and for conducting WorkKeys Assessment and KeyTrain registration. The Course Services Team can also identify potential OJT candidates and refer/schedule them for orientation.

Eligibility/Suitability Team - The Eligibility/Suitability team is responsible for facilitating group orientations, determining customer eligibility, and making the initial determination if customer is appropriate for enrolled services, including OJT placement. If customer is appropriate for enrolled services, the Eligibility/Suitability Team member will transfer customer/case file to Job Placement Team member.

Job Services Team - The Job Services Team is responsible for determining if Job Services is appropriate for customer and if so, what service. Job Services Team is also responsible for completion of enrollment including the development of the IEP. The Team has the following specific assignments within their team:

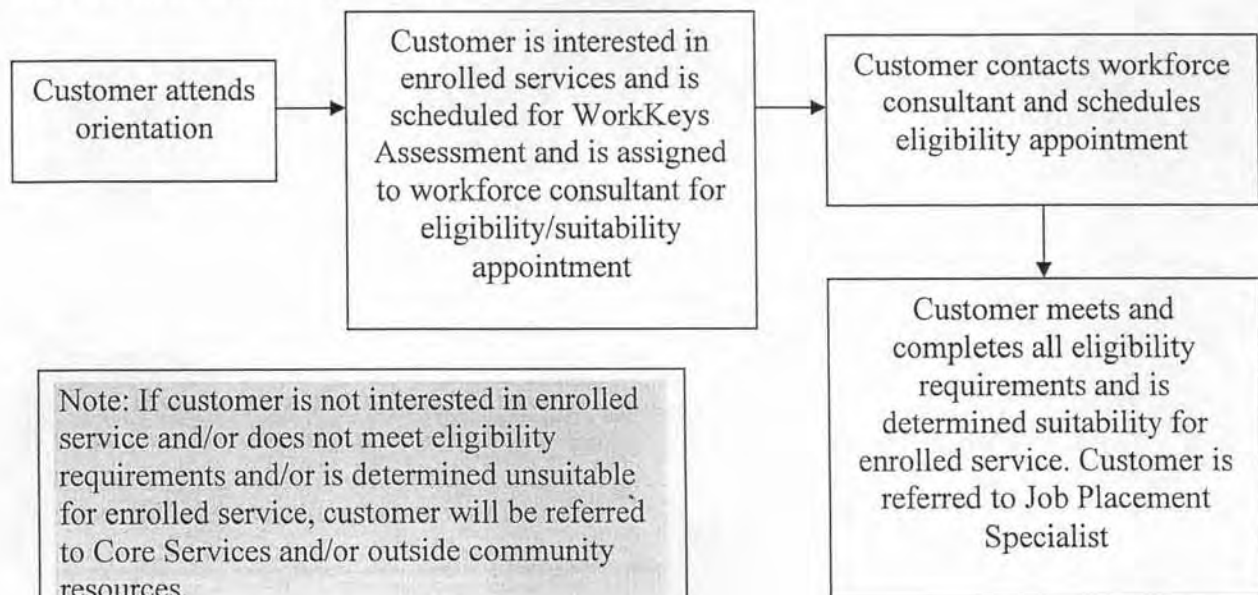
Job Placement Specialist (JPS) determine if customer is ready for Job Services and if so, what specific service(s). Main responsibility of JPS is to provide employment readiness skills and Job Search Assistance. The Specialist is responsible for referring appropriate customers to OJT opportunities.

Vocational Training Specialist is responsible for working with assigned customers in completing Vocational research Packets, developing ITA's, monitoring customers while in training and monitoring training providers services and performance.

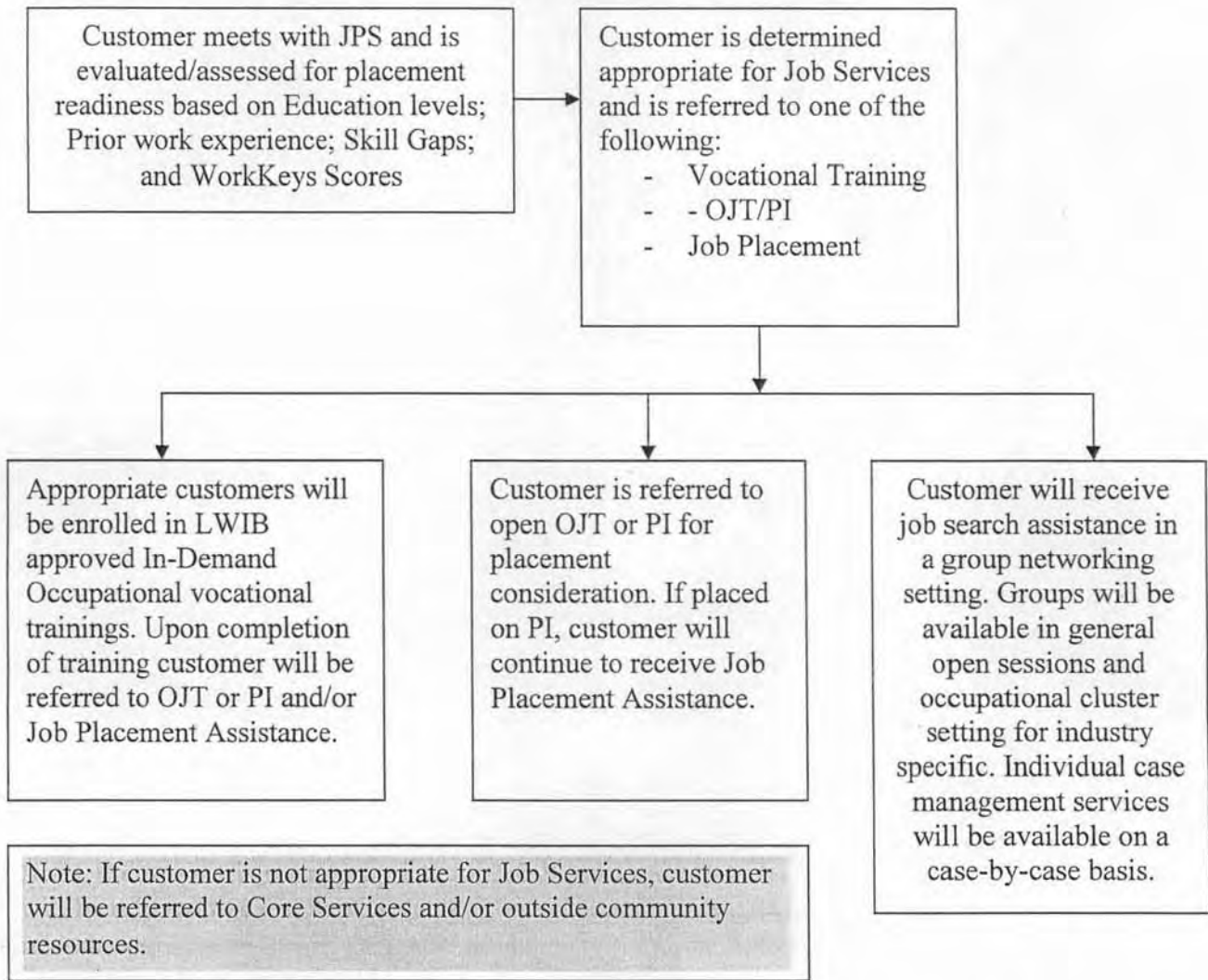
On-the-Job Training (OJT) / Paid Internship (PI) Specialist is responsible for writing OJT & PI agreements, communicating with employers and customers, monitoring job sites, and completing any paperwork requirements.

Job Placement Screeners serve as screeners to assist JPS's in referring appropriate job seekers and resumes to job orders and HIP/OJT/PI opportunities.

Specific service strategies to assist those who are experiencing prolonged unemployment, include: a) OJT marketing card will be offered to specific customers who are job ready and are appropriate for OJT-targeted occupations. The card identifies the customer as being eligible for OJT wage reimbursement, provides general information about the OJT program, and provides a phone # they can call to get more information about the program; b) On-Line Application Workshop to assist job seekers to better utilize internet related job search techniques, c) Understanding Employer Expectations workshop, specifically to view the Interview/Selection process from the perspective of an employer d) Interviewing with Confidence workshop, to empower customers to remain focused on interviewing techniques, in spite of the frustration of prolonged unemployment; e) Mock Interviewing is available to provide direct feedback from an interview panel to identify areas for improvement.

2. Describe how this service delivery strategy supports both employers and dislocated workers

in the impacted area(s)?

The service delivery strategy was designed with both the employer and job seeker (Dislocated worker) in mind. Through the Re-Design model, we modified our screening/appropriateness and placement process that leads to better decisions on who is defined as "Job Ready" which leads to quicker referrals to employers looking for direct hires and or candidates for an OJT. Customers are directed to specialist who focus on key areas of their employment plan and progress toward gainful employment. Employers will benefit based on reduction in recruitment, selection and training by receiving higher level, job ready candidates through the Alliance Worknet.

3. Describe how the proposed OJT service delivery strategies differ from existing practices.

As stated in (C) (1), the Re-Design Service Strategy is different than past practice, function teams were developed to better assess and refer customers to appropriate services. In addition, OJT marketing cards will be offered to specific customers who are job ready and are appropriate for OJT-targeted occupations. In addition, we adjusted our reverse referral process requiring employers to interview WIA enrolled customers before considering outside candidates (reverse referrals).

4. If OJT is planned to be provided in conjunction with classroom training, describe the additional need and benefit of OJT in terms of both labor market conditions and the expected employment barriers of participants.

Many of our dislocated workers who are experiencing prolonged unemployment have used this opportunity to obtain vocational training to enter new occupational fields. OJT provides these customers with the opportunity to apply their newly learned skills while at the same time learning new skills that are specific to their new employer. The OJT provides same incentive for employer to hire and continue to train a new inexperienced trainee when otherwise they may not.

5. Identify support services to be available, including any limits on the amount that can be received by an individual, and how the need for support services by an individual will be determined.

We project that 20 individuals will receive supportive Service assistance averaging \$500.00 per person. Supportive Services will range from but not limited to travel reimbursement, clothing, childcare, eyeglasses and tools. Individuals will be required to justify need by completing a Needs-Based Budget.

(II) Employer Recruitment and Selection

1. Describe specific sources of information *and* criteria that will be used to identify potential employers for OJT positions. Description should provide a clear link between growth areas and/or the employers who have been/will be recruited and selected for OJT partnerships.

One of the criteria utilized in identifying employers for OJTs is analyzing the employment goals of current job seekers enrolled in the WIA program who are good candidates for OJTs. This information will be used to target employers who are hiring individuals with the same goals as those of our job seekers. This is directly attached to high growth areas because we only send customers to vocational trainings in areas of expected growth. These job seekers will have

access to OJT training cards they can directly provide to employers that market the OJT program.

We also operate on a business demand driven system and respond to employers who are hiring and interested in OJTs. This also relates to growth areas because typically employers who are hiring in this economy are expanding or are in an industry that is growing.

2. Identify specific business organizations and other partnerships that have agreed to assist in recruiting employers for participation.

We work closely with local State EDD offices, vocational schools, community colleges, and state colleges. We also partner with Chamber of Commerce's and past employers who refer employers to our OJT program. Another source of referrals is our Small Business Development Center who work with Business Start ups and Expanding Companies

3. Describe the outreach strategy for employer recruitment. The strategy should include such key components as: 1) the generation and use of a standard pitch, which conveys the concept and potential benefits for an employer partner, couched in correct language to describe an OJT (i.e. is a training program not a wage subsidy program); and 2) a description of outreach materials to be used.

As mentioned above in questions 1 and 2, our outreach strategy is based current inventory of customers who are good candidates for OJTs, a business demand driven system, partnerships, and employer referrals.

When an employer has been identified, a Business Service Representative will meet with the employer to provide information regarding our various services. If applicable, we will discuss OJTs and let the employer know OJTs help them recoup the cost of training a new employee. We also emphasize the employer's responsibility for training the new employee. When an employer commits to an OJT we will have them complete the Employer Certification Form mentioned in question 4.

Our current marketing consist of an OJT Frequently Asked Question flyer, and the OJT cards mentioned in Question 1.

4. Describe criteria to define appropriate and inappropriate employers.

Currently we have all employers interested in participating in our OJT program complete an employer certification form. This form explains the WIA regulations related to OJT's. The employer is required to sign, verifying they understand and will not violate WIA requirements. This form also outlines what is required of the employer and sets the groundwork for disqualifying inappropriate employers.

We also track successful OJTs and have the ability to refuse OJTs to employers who have a record of unsuccessful OJTs.

5. Describe the process to orient employers to their training responsibilities and any technical assistance anticipated.

After the Business Service Representative has provided the employer with a basic overview of the available services and the Employer Certification form verifying that the employer qualifies

to participate in the OJT process, a Contract Writer/Monitor meets with the employer. At this meeting, the Writer/Monitor provides an orientation for the employer which includes: a) development of the tailored job duties/training outline; b) identification of MQs required by the employer for the specific job position; c) clarification of training methods and identification of lead trainer; d) explanation of the basic monitoring schedule, to review/verify the success of the OJT employee; e) training for preparing invoices used for reimbursement, including federal requirements of maintaining personnel-related records, f) obtaining required business documentation, such as verification of Workers' Comp, IIPP, W-9; g) review of the exit requirements, including completion of the Training Outline Verification form and Employer Satisfaction Survey.

(III) Service Deliver Management Structure

1. Provide a description of how the service-delivery system will be operated. What entity or entities will be responsible for participant assessment; developing contracts with businesses; gathering information and data reporting; monitoring the project; and assuring fiscal accountability? Stanislaus County LWIB will be fully operating the OJT NEG Grant program. Our Business Services Unit will be responsible for the initial connection/communication with local Business. If business has interest in the OJT program, our Business Services staff will refer employer to our OJT Writer/Monitor. Our OJT writer/monitor will be responsible for defining specifics about the OJT program and for clarifying employer requirements and expectations. Furthermore, the OJT writer/monitor will be responsible to monitor job sites to ensure contract compliance and performance.

Communication between employer, OJT writer/monitor and/or our Business Services representatives will be continuous noted in our internal data management system (DETNET) as well as in our contracted employer data base system (Executive Pulse).

Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet has provided US Department of Labor Workforce Investment Act (WIA) services since the Act was written in August of 1998. For approximately 20 years previous to these services, the Department operated the Job Training Partnership Act programs for the County. Alliance Worknet operates approximately a dozen contracts and grants at any given time. The majority are federally funded programs with some affiliation with the Workforce Investment Act. Current funding programs include the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, two NEG grants (NUMMI and CCWC-Regional Economic Impact), and Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC). Past NEG funding included for Mortgage related downsizing.

(IV) Assessment Procedures

1. Provide a description of the assessment procedures that will allow the Grantee to determine dislocated worker skill levels and gaps (this may include one-on-one comprehensive assessments and/or software tools, as applicable). Include specific assessment tools that will be used.

The assessment process consists of a review of the dislocated workers education and training background as well as work history. This combined with WorkKeys assessment and customer interview provides for a thorough determination of the customers skill levels and gaps. For those customers referred and selected for an OJT, a One-on-One comprehensive Closing Workshop is conducted to review the job description, in order to tailor the training outline to address the individual's skills gap, to review workplace expectations, and provide tips for successful transition to a new job.

(V) Matching Training Needs with Employer Needs

The employer's job description and MQs are compared to the participant's assessment information before making a referred to the employer. Once the employer selects the participant for the OJT, the trainee's skills and work history are evaluated against the job description to address any skills gap and finalize the training outline. Employers include: Allstate Insurance, California RV Rentals, Casey Moving Co., Central Valley Ag Grinding, Harder's Print Shop, HPL Contract, Hughes Commercial Real Estate, Joe's Landscaping & Concrete, Miller Automotive, Nordic Tool & Saw, Rim Hospitality, Robert Hicks Insurance, Tenny Norquist, Xavier Farm Services Inc.

2. Identify the specific types and sources of information that will be used to identify the scope of the skills gap and to develop the individual participant's training plan. Describe the role to be played by both project staff and the employer in developing and approving the training plan. Project staff must play an active role and ensure that the training plan goes beyond skills and experience that are currently possessed by the participant, based on the results of the skills assessment.

Staff works with the employer to develop a list of items that the employer is willing to train on. The standard Vocational Preparation (SVP) code is used to establish the maximum number of hours available to allocate to training. At this point, the participant's prior work history and skills are compared against the training outline and the hours necessary for each training item are established. From this process the total number of reimbursement OJT hors is determined. The maximum time allowable per local policy is 6 months. The historical average per OJT is 4.5 months.

Stanislaus County's LWIB (Alliance Worknet) Fiscal Unit will be responsible for processing all OJT employer reimbursement. We recommend that employers process and remit their invoices as they process their regular payroll.

While obtaining the employer's job description and MQ information, the Contract Writer/Monitor requests a copy of the employer's pay rate schedule for the specific job or similar position.

Our Business Service Representative will be obtaining the signed employer certification form. Question #7 states "I will not use an AW trainee to displace any current employee or terminate the employment of an employee with the intent of filling the vacancy with a AW trainee." Question #8 states "I will not use a AW trainee to replace a regular employee who was impacted by a layoff from the same or any substantially equivalent job within the past 90 days."

Performance guidelines have been set to track successful completion and retention of an OJT participant. Employers not meeting guidelines will either be warned, put on hold for future OJT's and/or removed as a participating employer in OJT program.

Cost per participant was derived by multiplying our historical average OJT length by our average OJT wage multiplied by the projected average reimbursement rate.

720 hrs each participant (4.5 month OJT) x \$12.00 (Hourly wage) = \$8,640 x 80% (employer reimbursement) = \$6,912 (cost per participant) x 45 participants (OJT's) = \$311,040 (OJT Service cost)

Contract Writer/Monitor has periodic checkpoints during the OJT contract to ensure successful match of the participant for the employer (conducted within the first two weeks of placement), successful progress of training (conducted at the midpoint of the OJT contract period), and attainment of knowledge and skills (conducted at the completion of the OJT contract). The Contract Writer/Monitor is available, as needed, to assist during the OJT with any problems that may arise. Upon the completion of the OJT contract, the employer is requested to complete a

review of the skill and knowledge attainment of the employee and to complete an Employer Satisfaction Survey. The results from these performance measures are used for program continuous improvement efforts.

In conformance with the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and Federal, State and local Welfare to Work Laws and regulations, the goals of the Alliance Worknet OJT are: 1) to provide Trainees with the skills essential to the full and adequate performance of the job; 2) to reimburse employers up to 50% of the wage rate of a participant, for the extraordinary costs of providing and supervising training; 3) to be of limited duration appropriate to the occupation being trained.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet (hereafter, County); and ABC Company (hereafter, Employer) enter into this agreement on in the city of Modesto, County of Stanislaus.

County and Employer agree to the terms and conditions outlined below:

1. The term of this agreement is from 12/10/2010 through 3/30/2011.
2. Employer shall employ and train Alliance Worknet referred employee: Joe Browne, SSN# 000-12-5452 (hereafter, trainee) in the occupation(s) and in accordance with the OJT training outline(s) attached as Exhibit A.
3. This is a cost-reimbursement contract. Based on Employer size of 45 employees, the County will reimburse Employer up to 50% of the agreed wage rate for the time the Trainee actually works. Employer may invoice the County on a weekly, bi-weekly, monthly or other basis as arranged at contract signing. Reimbursement cannot exceed the "hourly rate" or "total cost" identified in Exhibit A. County will reimburse Employer at the agreed hourly rates only. Any differential (for overtime, holiday time, etc.) is the responsibility of the employer.
4. The Employer shall not subcontract any portion of the OJT training
5. During the training, the Employer shall insure that each Trainee: 1) is on the Employer's payroll; 2) receives all benefits that accrue to other employees in the same or similar work; 3) receives compensation as outlined in Exhibit A; 4) receives appropriate company orientation, clothing, tools and safety training afforded to other employees performing the same or similar work.
6. If the OJT is provided to one of the Employer's current employees, the Employer verifies that the OJT will relate to the introduction of new technologies, introduction to new production or service procedures, or is an upgrade to a new job that requires additional skills, and that the OJT position will provide the OJT Trainee with additional wages, hours or benefits.
7. The Employer shall hire the Trainee as a regular member of the work force and shall continue to employ the Trainee after successful completion of the training, subject to the same conditions of employment as all other employees
8. Employer certifies that the company is financially solvent on the date of this agreement, and the Employer's best projection is that they will remain financially able to meet contract obligations at the end of the training period, including OJT Trainee's retention period.
9. Employer agrees that wage and labor standards will be adhered to and to pay the OJT Trainee at the same rates, including increases, and benefits as trainees or employees who are situated in similar jobs. Such rates shall be in accordance with applicable law, but in no event less than the higher rated specified in section 6(a)(1) of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 or the applicable state or local minimum way law. WIA sect. 181(a)(1)(A)
10. Conditions of employment and training will be in full accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and ordinances (including but not limited to anti-discrimination, labor and employment laws, environmental laws or health and safety laws). 29 CFR 37.38(b)
11. The County has the right to observe and monitor the performance of this agreement and has the right to verify costs or charges invoiced according to the agreement. County may do this by examining the Employer's books, records or documents solely pertaining to this agreement during the Employer's normal business hours.
12. Training location will be: 1111 Brown Ave. Modesto, CA 95354

13. Training Supervisor will be: John Doe

14. Either party may terminate this agreement upon a ten-day written notice or in the event that funding is not available to Alliance Worknet to carry out the agreement. No alteration or variation of the terms of this agreement shall be valid and/or binding unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto; no oral understandings or agreements are a part of this agreement. Pages one, two and Exhibit A on page three, constitute the entire agreement.

15. The Employer's federal identification number is: 94-111156

16. Employer assures that the OJT Trainee has not been hired into or will remain working in any position when any other person is on layoff from the same or a substantially equivalent job within the same organizational unit or has been bumped and has recall rights to that position, nor if the OJT is created in a promotional line that infringes on opportunities of current employees. 20 CFR 667.270

17. The Employer shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and ordinances in the conduct of this training agreement.

18. Employer certifies that no member of the OJT Trainee's immediate family directly supervises or is directly supervised by this individual. For the purpose of this contract, immediate family is defined as spouse, children, parents, grandparents, grandchildren, brothers, sisters or person bearing the same relationship to the OJT Trainee's spouse. 20 CFR 667.200(g)

In the performance of this agreement, the Employer, its agents and employees, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees, or agents of the County, nor the State of California.

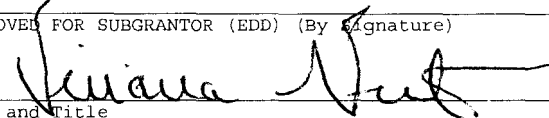
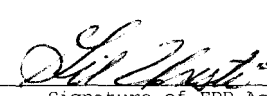
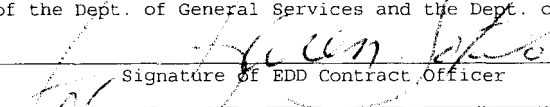

Statement of Need

1. Describe the targeted region and why the region was selected in developing the industry sector strategy.

The Stanislaus Valley Alliance was chosen as the fiscal and administrative entity with the intention of serving the greater Central Valley in the development and implementation of a green industry sector initiative. As one of the hardest hit by the recession unemployment rates in the Central Valley are far higher than the State and National averages. At the same time there is a lack of regional planning around the green economy, despite some great opportunities.

The San Joaquin Valley Regional Project proposal will entail the following activities:

- Research and analyses of one or more green regional industry clusters of opportunity;
- Joint priority setting to design and implement a collaborative industry cluster engagement based upon results of a cluster analysis;
- Identify and connect specific investments and other commitments among public and private entities to advance the regional competitive position;
- Design of educational programs that compliment the career opportunities identified;
- Recruit target populations for enrollment into industry relevant training programs and support trainees with wrap-around supportive services and placement assistance, with the goal of serving a minimum of 200 participants and;
- Support the long-term sustainability and growth of regional clusters of opportunity. This activity should produce transformational changes to advance, sustain, and expand regional clusters of opportunity strategies.

2. Describe the energy and/or water efficiency or renewable energy industry sector that will be targeted. Demonstrate how this industry was selected. Include employer involvement and how it will contribute to the economic recovery and stability of the region. Cite sources of data.

The Stanislaus Valley Alliance will work with the technical assistance provider Collaborative Economics Inc. to perform research and analyses of one or more green regional industry clusters of opportunity. The San Joaquin Valley Regional team, with the Stanislaus Valley Alliance as the lead will undertake a process of joint priority setting to design and implement a collaborative industry cluster engagement strategy. The Regional Team will also identify and connect specific investments and other commitments among public and private entities to advance the regional competitive position, design educational programs that compliment the career opportunities identified, recruit target populations for enrollment into

industry relevant training programs and support trainees with wrap-around supportive services and placement assistance, with the goal of serving a minimum of 200 participants.

The energy, water, or renewable industry of focus for the Stanislaus Valley Alliance will arise from the Diagnostic phase of their Regional Industry Clusters Planning process. Early results show that there may be an opportunity in biofuels or transportation, however, a more in depth look is still needed.

3. *Using supported data and analysis, describe the current and projected employment opportunities in the targeted industry sector and the skills gap between what is needed by the industry and the skill levels of job seekers. If possible, provide number of jobs available in the targeted industry.*

The employment opportunities in the San Joaquin Valley will be determined after the industry cluster diagnostic is performed and the cluster employers are engaged. From this engagement a greater understanding of the skills necessary and career ladders available will be used to inform the training program design.

PROGRAM NARRATIVE

The purpose of this modification is to extend the term end date of the Stanislaus County State Energy Sector Partnership to June 30, 2013 and to add revised exhibits to reflect changes in the project because of the extended term.

TECHNICAL PROPOSAL

Section I - Statement of Need

California is a recognized leader in the development and implementation of environmental and energy efficiency policies and climate change management practices. The State and its workforce community are focusing on the industries that make up California's green/clean economy as they are believed to hold opportunity to improve both the economic health of the State and the physical well being of its' citizens. In order to address the workforce needs of the green/clean economy, the workforce system must understand the implications of California's environmental and energy policy framework. Since 2003, California's energy agencies have used an energy resource loading order to guide their energy decisions. This loading order consists of decreasing electricity demand by increasing energy efficiency and demand response, and meeting new generation needs first with renewable and distributed generation resources, and second with clean fossil-fueled generation.

Responding to the challenge of climate change, in 2006 California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger and the State Legislature passed Assembly Bill 32, the Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 (AB 32), capping California's greenhouse gas emissions at the 1990 level by 2020. Achieving that goal requires an approximate 29 percent cut in emissions below projected 2020 levels.

Assembly Bill 118, the Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program (AB118) authorizes the Energy Commission to develop and deploy alternative and renewable fuels and advanced transportation technologies to help attain the state's climate change policies. The Energy Commission has an annual program budget of approximately \$100 million to support projects that achieve a wide range of advancements in the areas of clean fuel, vehicle

technology, infrastructure, establishing of workforce training programs, conducting public education and promotion, and creation of technology centers in accordance with AB 118. On April 22, 2009, the Energy Commission adopted its first Investment Plan, as required by statute, which includes recommendations for expending \$176 million appropriated for the first two years of the program.

Additionally Senate Bill 1, the California Solar Initiative, (SB 1) implements portions of Governor Schwarzenegger's Million Solar Roofs plan including expanding the program to cover customers of the municipal-owned utilities such as Sacramento Municipal Utilities District and Los Angeles Department of Water and Power. SB 1 established credits for customers who produce excess power, and makes solar power a standard item on new homes beginning January 1, 2011.

These policies not only benefit California's climate but provide a strong incentive for investment in the Golden State. California's leadership in environmental and energy efficiency policy has already helped attract a growing share of the nation's venture capital investment in the area of green technologies. As California continues to improve on its environmental record with programs under AB 32, this is very likely to continue.

These investments in building a new clean tech sector translate directly into job growth. A study by U.C. Berkeley's Energy and Resources Group and Goldman School of Public Policy found that investments in green technologies produce jobs at a higher rate than investments in comparable conventional technologies.

In response to the policy, economic, and workforce impacts of California's growing green economy, Assembly Bill 3018, the Green Collar Jobs Act, was passed and signed into law by Governor Schwarzenegger in September of 2008. In doing so, the Governor established the

Green Collar Jobs Council (Council) under the California Workforce Investment Board (State Board) and set the stage for the State Board to utilize Sector Strategies as the framework for a statewide workforce development plan.

Data and analysis of the current and projected employment opportunities

California has the largest clean energy economy of the 50 states. Jobs in this sector grew at a faster rate than total jobs in the Golden State between 1998 and 2007. California's clean energy economy has been driven by significant venture capital investment, attracting more than \$6 billion in venture capital in the past three years. This represents one-half of all clean tech venture capital investment made in the U.S. This, along with public policy development discussed earlier in this proposal, continue to be the drivers of clean energy economic growth. According to the California Green Innovation Index (2008), between 1990 and 2006 green technology businesses in California grew by 84 percent. Much of this growth came in the solar energy, energy efficiency and green transportation sectors. This growth supports the premise that creating a policy landscape which favors low-carbon energy and efficient technology can spur and even accelerate growth of a sector.

According to a U.C. Berkeley report that reviewed 13 studies examining the impact of renewable energy on job creation, "The renewable energy sector generates more jobs per megawatt of power installed, per unit of energy produced, and per dollar of investment, than the fossil fuel-based energy sector." Looking specifically at the impact of AB 32, the results of the macroeconomic analysis, prepared by the Air Resources Board, indicate that by 2020 the State would reap a \$74 billion increase in GDP and would generate 89,000 new jobs.

A study done by California's Economic Strategy Panel, *Clean Technology and the Green Economy*, reported the following in regards to California's Green Sector.

Energy generation represents the largest segment of California's green businesses. It includes businesses with primary activities in manufacturing, design, installation, system management, consulting and various business services, as well as associations focused on energy generation or specific forms of renewable energy such as solar or wind. Specific employers targeted in this sector include: Chico Electric Company, Redding Electrical Utilities, and Horizon Solar Systems. To insure California realizes the promise that new energy generation will bring requires comprehensive infrastructure upgrades and the development of a workforce skilled in installing, operating and maintain this new infrastructure. In part, this will require transmission line workers, electricians, electrician's helpers, and meter installers to get homes and businesses linked to this smart grid system. Energy efficiency makes up 31 percent of green business. Forty percent of these firms are in energy conservation consulting; however, the bulk of employment is in the manufacturing, design and sales of low-wattage or zero-wattage lighting products. The energy efficiency sector will require engineers and construction managers with knowledge in sustainability planning and practices. Several Regional Teams described in this application will work with Energy Efficiency employers such as NWD Construction Incorporated, Build it Green, Valley Contractors, VSI Meter Services, Onsite Energy Corporation, and many more. Transportation accounts for seven percent of green businesses. Forty-eight percent of these businesses are focused on alternative fuels, and represent 33 percent of employment in that sector. The main activities of these businesses are related to maintenance of electric vehicles. One such employer targeted in this sector is Wal-Mart Distribution Center. Green building and energy storage each account for 3 percent of green firms. Two-thirds of these firms are involved in design and/or construction, while 21 percent are focused on manufacturing and sales of green building materials. The activities of the vast majority of

energy storage firms are in the design, manufacturing, and distribution of various battery technologies.

Environmental consulting, water & wastewater, and finance & investment each account for 2 percent of the State's green businesses. Environmental consulting firms help other firms assess, manage and monitor their environmental impact and often manage their related public relations campaigns. Water & wastewater firms specialize in the design and manufacture of water purification products and consulting services. Finance & investment includes businesses providing project financing specifically for large and small-scale renewable energy projects.

Targeted Skills and Competencies for Industries Outlined

In response to California's energy policy *loading order*, the SESP has selected Regional Teams whose principal focus is on the energy efficiency sector. These Regional teams will: create opportunities for energy efficiency upgrades and renewable energy installations, prepare workers for these opportunities, and achieve the State's goal of lowering the total consumption of electricity and natural gas.

The San Diego Green Building Apprenticeship Readiness Partnership will prepare individuals for jobs in the green building and energy efficiency industry sector, by offering courses in basic construction principles, environmental literacy, energy fundamentals, retrofits and energy efficiency, solar hot water installation, and design principles.

The Sacramento Employment and Training Agency will prepare individuals using three programs. The Sacramento Region Green Initiative will focus on the energy and water efficiency sector with upgrade skills training in several green career clusters including: solar power, green construction, energy efficiency, green plumbing, water efficiency and sustainability. In addition the Sacramento Region Green Building Pre-Apprenticeship Training

Partnership will prepare participants with little or no prior construction experience for registered apprenticeship programs and jobs in the building retrofit field. The Sacramento Regional Alternative Vehicle and Fuel Workforce Training Program will provide industry and entry-level training to prepare technicians to work with alternative vehicles, fuel systems, diagnostic tools, and technical software.

The Northern Rural Training and Employment Consortium, Green Building Training Partnership's program at Butte College will be part of an articulated, sequenced pathway from the ROP/High School to Butte College to California State University.

The Los Angeles City Workforce Investment Board Apprenticeship Program has two areas of focus. The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) Electrical Tester Apprenticeship Program (ETAP) will train new Electrical Testers to maintain and test renewable and conventional resource control equipment. LADWP is embarking on a Smart Grid Program that will require technicians with needed skills to maintain and test the exciting new Smart Grid Technologies. Los Angeles Green Building Pre-Apprenticeship Academy will offer the target population career focused short-term training programs that integrate industry awareness and skill attainment, academic and basic skills remediation and supportive wrap-around services. The goal is to train low-income participants for entry-level positions, including those as registered apprentices in the Green Building sector.

The Alameda County Workforce Investment Board's East Bay Green Building Careers Pathway Initiative's effort will lead to immediate job placement in the green retrofit industry through training classes taught by Build It Green, California Building Performance Contractors Association, and Green Plumbers USA, in conjunction with four community colleges in the East Bay.

Data and analysis of the characteristics of California labor force

California is the nation's most populous state, with the California Department of Finance estimating 38.3 million state residents as of January 1, 2009. The 2000 census reported that 47 percent of California's residents were white, 33 percent Hispanic, 11 percent Asian, and 6.5 percent black. California also has the nation's largest labor force and working-age population. In April 2009, EDD reported a working-age population (civilian, non-institutional, persons age 16 years and over) of 28.1 million, of which 18.5 million were in the labor force – 16.9 million employed and 1.6 million unemployed (all figures are 12-month moving averages, not seasonally-adjusted). This translates into a labor force participation rate of just under 66 percent. The demographic composition of California's labor pool differs in two main respects from the nation as a whole. First, it is slightly younger than the national average, and second, it has a substantially larger percentage of Hispanics. These two differences are projected to continue into the next decade. California also has a highly skilled labor force, but one that contains a large number of foreign born and non-English speaking residents. There are challenges that a diverse labor force uniquely presents. For example, foreign immigrants often lack English-language skills, which can initially limit their opportunities. Moreover, they sometimes have difficulties adapting to American culture.

With a projected growth of 147 percent over the next four years, California's existing pipeline for skilled craft workers in the fields of electric power, construction, and engineering is unprepared to meet the future challenges as the state seeks to transition to a low-carbon economy¹.

¹ Based on general trends observed in the National Academy of Sciences' "Rising Above the Gathering Storm: Energizing and Employing America for a Brighter Economic Future," the New Commission on the Skills of the American Workforce's "Tough Choices or Tough Times,"

The pipeline for developing these workers needs to begin in the K-12 education system and continue along clearly articulated pathways into high school, apprenticeship, community colleges, and at 4-year institutions. California's enrollment in career technical education programs and its graduation rates from these programs has steadily declined. In 1987, 73.8 percent of high school students were enrolled in a career technical education path. In 2008, this number had declined to 29.4 percent. In actual numbers, enrollments in CTE went from 952,097 students in 1987 to 362,864 students in 2008².

While California will likely have a younger and more diverse labor pool than other states in the next decade, it will still have to deal with an aging labor force, and the challenges that the retirement of this demographic will present.

California's unemployment rate was 12.2 percent in August of 2009, 4.5 percent more than that of a year ago, and well above the current national unemployment rate of 9.7 percent. There are regions in California that are facing starker rates of unemployment and poverty. The average unemployment rate in San Joaquin Valley is 15.4 percent. Across the eight counties of the San Joaquin Valley, unemployment ranges from 17.6 percent in Merced, to 13.9 percent in Madera. Moreover, in the recent rankings compiled by Brookings' Metropolitan Policy Program, three San Joaquin Valley cities ranked among the bottom ten "weakest performing" metropolitan regions nationwide.

Section II - State Energy Sector Partnership

In September of 2008, the California Workforce Investment Board (State Board) adopted Sector Strategies as the framework for organizing workforce development efforts across the state. In

February of 2009, responding to Governor Schwarzenegger's signing of the Green Jobs Act, the State Board formed the Green Collar Jobs Council (Council). The Council was tasked with developing the strategy which would be used to meet the needs of California's changing economy as it adapted to climate change policies, more stringent air quality standards and changing energy efficiency standards across a broad spectrum of industries. The Council will serve as the core membership of the State Energy Sector Partnership (SESP) (See attached charter for list of members). In order to ensure the participation of businesses representing the industries of focus, the SESP has begun assembling a pool of SESP advisors that represent the Clean Energy Industry.

The Council, consistent with its SESP role, will continue to bolster its membership by extending ten additional invitations to industry leaders and researchers to serve as advisors. Additionally, to enhance its capacity to serve veterans and coordinate with community based organization, the Council has extended an invitation for membership to the leadership of the California Department of Veterans Affairs and California Volunteers.

Sector Plan

The Council was established to develop a strategy which would respond *"to industry sector workforce and economic development needs and ensure industry has a qualified workforce and can offer opportunities for employment, training, and career advancement for all Californians"*. The Council convened for the first time on February 11th, 2009, and adopted the following vision statement: *"Over the next 18 to 24 months the Council will identify and facilitate the development of the framework, funding, strategies, programs policies, partnerships and opportunities necessary to address the need for a highly skilled and well-trained workforce in support of California's green businesses and economy. Through its work, the Council will serve*

as a catalyst for the creation of sustainable regional sector strategies that will be managed through regional partnerships.”

With the mission clearly identified, the Council began to develop its State level Sector Plan consisting of several parts. The first was the formation of the state level partnership which includes representatives from California’s energy agencies, education, local Workforce Investment Boards, business, labor organizations and community based organizations. The second step in developing the state level sector plan was to establish a set of shared strategies and objectives in regards to California’s Green/Clean economy. These strategies include: assuming the role of neutral broker and statewide hub, incentivizing data driven planning and measuring results, ensure the creation of meaningful and sustainable sector strategies, foster strong regional partnerships, map career pathways and match these with educational pathways, connect underserved populations with economic opportunity, work with small business to train entrepreneurs to ensure they are able to create jobs, invest in technology to improve data collection, bridge systems, facilitate communication with partners, and measure results as key to a state sector strategy.

With the establishment of a common perspective, the third phase of development was to assess the opportunities and needs of the state through in depth data analysis. Presentations from the Collaborative Economics, Inc. (CEI), the California Energy Commission (CEC), the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), and the Environmental Protection Agency’s Air Resources Board (EPA/ARB) provided information on the economic profile of the state, and the loading order being used as regulations are developed and implemented to support California’s progressive polices, such as AB 32 and AB 118. The Council directed staff to identify opportunities for alignment of the initiatives/scoping plans of the various state agencies, to look

at how planned investments in workforce development initiatives from multiple funding sources could be leveraged, and to identify existing mechanisms within state government that could be used to implement a statewide green jobs training initiative. The result of this work is California's Green Workforce Initiative.

California's Green Workforce Initiative is a multi faceted project that implements a sector strategy approach, creates and fosters regional partnerships, supports the development of regionally relevant training programs, supports regional capacity development, and seeks to ensure sustainability of effective regional sector strategies. The initiative is a three pillared approach to this emerging economic opportunity, organized as follows:

The Clean Energy Workforce Training Program (CEWTP) funds 34 regional and local training projects to meet the needs of the Clean Energy sector. Key to this project is the development of a thorough understanding of the career pathways present in the Green Economy and design of complimentary educational pathways to move unemployed, low-wage and dislocated workers in to these careers. These projects consist of regional partnerships titled, Green Employer Councils that will serve as Regional Teams. The local Green Employer Councils are required to consist of local WIBs, community colleges, other education partners (Adult Ed, Regional Occupation Programs, etc), business representatives from the industry for which training is being delivered, economic development organizations and organized labor. The Green Employer Council will provide oversight and ensure that the project is responsive to the industry's workforce needs and results in relevant training for real world jobs. The CEWTP is funded by Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds, AB 118 and WIA Governor's Discretionary funding. This \$27 million investment required a 1:1 match, netting an additional \$27 million in match funding to support activities in three areas:

1. Training and Education Program Development and Delivery

Working with local Workforce Investment Boards (WIBs)/One-Stop Career Centers, State agencies, educational institutions, employers and organized labor, the CEWTP will support the expansion and development of workforce training programs that provide both technical and soft-skill training. The partnerships funded under this program will deliver education through local educational entities, recognized pre-apprenticeship and apprenticeship programs and training networks. The CEWTP is funding programs with the following focus throughout California:

- Green Building Re-Training Partnerships: Dislocated construction workers provide the State with the greatest opportunity for rapid deployment of a low carbon workforce because they already have a base of experience and well-developed skill sets relevant to the construction industry. With an 18.5 percent job loss in the construction industry within the last year, these re-training projects will target, in part, skill upgrade training for dislocated construction workers in energy and water efficiency techniques and technology and renewable energy skills training, along with job placement services.
- Green Building / Clean Energy Pre-apprenticeship Training Partnerships: Funds under this category support industry-focused sector partnerships that provide pre-apprenticeship training for potential workforce entrants, unemployed or underemployed workers with little or no construction experience. Training delivered will include industry specific energy, and water efficiency, renewable energy and integrated “soft” job skills curriculum, as well as job placement services.
- Green Building Career Advancement Training for Incumbent Workers: Projects funded in this category will deliver training in energy and water efficiency and renewable energy

practices for incumbent and new hire workers, adding new “clean/green” skills to their professional toolbox. On August 26th, 2009, the CEC approved the Interagency agreement solidifying its intent to provide \$10 million in funding to the Employment Training Panel to dramatically scale up training efforts already underway for apprentice and journey-level construction workers. This program will ease the transition of California’s businesses and workers towards a low carbon construction industry.

- Clean Transportation Employment Training Partnerships: Projects funded will use regional partnerships to provide potential dislocated workers, new workforce entrants and incumbent workers with transportation industry and clean transportation skills training and job placement services. The workforce resulting from projects funded under this category will represent a new cohort of workers tasked with building the Golden State’s low/no emission public and private vehicles and low carbon fuel infrastructure.
- Clean Energy Workforce Education Program: The California Energy Commission, the California Community Colleges Chancellor’s Office (CCCCO) and California Department of Education (CDE) will jointly invest to create programs and curricula to provide energy and water efficiency and renewable energy, utility scale renewable energy development, and clean transportation educational opportunities for California’s community college and secondary school students. The CCCCCO’s Advanced Transportation Technologies and Energy Institute and the Center’s of Excellence will produce regional workforce information for community college resource planning. The CEC and the CDE will fund 61 green technology partnership academies in school districts across the Golden State. The CEC funded academies will work in conjunction with clean technology and energy businesses to provide cutting-edge training for students

that will prepare them for careers in water conservation, renewable energy, pollution reduction, and other green sectors.

2. Develop and Implement Regional Industry Cluster(s) of Opportunity Grants: The CEC will co-fund with the State Board the production of regional sector workforce development plans. These plans will be developed with cross-disciplinary regional teams, including industry partners, organized labor, education, workforce and economic development entities. The State Board is promoting this planning strategy as it allows local, regional, state and federal agencies to most efficiently plan future funding of workforce development efforts based on sound data analysis and collaborative priority setting. The model for this regional planning initiative utilizes the work of the California Economic Strategy Panel under the California Regional Economies Project. Leveraged against the State Board's adoption of Sector Strategies as the framework for aligning statewide workforce development efforts with sound economic data, the planning initiative will promote data driven, cross-disciplinary regional planning and investment. The State Board will utilize ARRA funding to support this initiative. In addition the CEC will use AB 118 funds to support planning projects directly linked to the needs of the clean energy sector.

3. Labor Market Information

The EDD has begun a comprehensive State-wide survey of industries associated with the clean/green economy in order to learn more about the general characteristics of these businesses and their changing workforce needs. Building upon this early survey work the CEC will collaborate with the EDD and the Community College Centers of Excellence in order to develop industry and occupation-specific labor market information. This information

will be widely disseminated and used to guide the development of curriculum and training programs offered in the future.

The actions described above serve as the pillars, supporting California's Green Workforce Initiative. The State Energy Sector Partnership Application is a critical component to the advancement of this initiative and it will further advance this strategy by utilizing the funding commitments already made under California's Green Workforce Initiative. With this work as a foundation to build upon, new members of the SESP were invited to the September 22, 2009 meeting of the Green Collar Jobs Council. At that time, the Charter for the SESP was reviewed and its relationship to the work of the State Board and the Council were outlined.

Selecting Regional Project Teams

On August 6th, 2009 the Employment Development Department released the CEWTP Solicitation for Proposal (SFP). Fifty-two applications were received in response to the SFP by the September 16th, 2009 deadline. All applications were reviewed and scored on a competitive basis. Thirty-four of the proposals were deemed competitive and awarded funding. With the goal of creating a well coordinated energy sector strategy, the regional projects submitted in response to the SFP were subjected to a second review for the purpose of aligning selected projects with the State Energy Sector Partnership proposal. This secondary review focused on identifying regional projects which demonstrated strong a collaborative approach to designing workforce solutions, bringing together broad partnerships with business, economic, workforce, education and labor organization for the purpose of designing demand responsive training programs and connecting trainees to employment upon completion. On October 8, 2009, the SESP was convened to consider State Board staff recommendations of partnerships for inclusion in the SESP proposal. At that time, the SESP adopted the staff recommendation of five regional

projects for inclusion as the Regional Teams under the State Energy Sector Partnership Solicitation for Grant Application. It also accepted the recommendation of the State Board staff to include the development of a San Joaquin Valley regional project. The rationale for this project was based on the high unemployment rates present in this region, the prominence of auto industry suppliers that will be affected by the NUMMI closure, and the desire to expand the reach of the SESP.

Contributing and Oversight of Implementation

Critical to the implementation of effective sector strategies is the regional alignment of partners, initiatives, policies and systems. Each of the selected regional projects will be required to formalize Regional Project Teams that include representatives from local WIBs, community colleges, business, economic development, and organized labor. Business and organized labor will be representative of the targeted clean energy industry sectors. The SESP will work closely with the Regional Teams to monitor progress, identify challenges and engage in a cycle of continuous improvement. To facilitate this work, the SESP will require each regional team to participate in a minimum of two Action Clinics per year. The Action Clinics will be held in various locations throughout the state. The SESP projects that up to twelve Action Clinics will be held over the 36 month duration of this project. Action Clinics will be organized to provide opportunity to educate Regional Teams on the fundamentals of Sector Strategies, to share information as it becomes available on the green/clean job projections by region, to deliver issue specific technical assistance, allow for trouble-shooting while projects are underway, and serve as the platform for a community of learning to advance the knowledge and implementation of the State's Energy Sector Strategy. The SESP membership, as signatories to the attached charter, are committed to ensuring that their respective agencies provide the necessary support and

information to ensure full engagement with the regional teams. By leveraging the components of the Green Workforce Initiative, the SESP will have the capacity to broker critical technical assistance, such as that which will be provided under the Regional Industry Clusters of Opportunity Grants; publish best practices allowing non-participating regions to learn and adopt effective strategies as they are identified; and publish and disseminate the cutting-edge curriculum which will come out of the projects, allowing for rapid sharing of instructional materials to bring new projects on line more quickly and effectively. These measures are viewed as the key to support sector strategy based transformational initiatives. Through consistent application of this approach, the State Board anticipates that the existing regional capacity of participating teams will be deepened and can be used as a model to speed the development of additional regional collaborations and sector initiatives.

California's Green Workforce Initiative

This project will leverage nearly \$60 million already invested in California's Green Workforce Initiative (CGWI). Currently, this initiative consists of the following components:

- Clean Energy Workforce Training Program (CEWTP): \$27 million in Recovery Act, WIA, and AB 118 funding augmented by \$27 million of match funding, providing:
 - Initial funding that establishes regional teams which will be augmented with SESP funding to support action clinics, continuous improvement, and issue specific technical assistance.
 - Mandated Green Employer Council's: Formed to insure that industry is providing the private sector insight needed to insure trainees receive the job specific and soft skills needed to obtain and retain employment in the industry. As part of the regional teams, these employer councils replicate a regional energy sector partnership.

- Industry focused Regional Sector Initiatives: In keeping with the premise of Sector Strategies, these initiatives serve as the statewide foundation for the State Energy Sector Strategy, will be implemented by regionally based broad partnerships as mandated in CEWTP SFP, and will serve as models as the State Board encourages sector based, demand driven workforce solutions.
- Regional Industry Cluster(s) of Opportunity Grants: \$3.5 million in WIA funding, which will provide local Workforce Investment Boards with resources and technical assistance to diagnose economic and workforce trends present in a region through the application of the Industry Clusters of Opportunity methodology, engage in cross-system collaborative priority-setting, design an investment strategy which leverages resources, organizational capacity and partnerships among critical regional stakeholders; and, establish a sustainability plan that addresses ongoing funding, memorializes relationships between stakeholders and institutionalizes a proactive approach to addressing a region's economic competitiveness through sector strategies. The action clinic model will also be used in this project as a way to build learning communities, share experience and disseminate promising practices.

Section III - Strategy and Project Work Plan

The State Board, through its Green Collar Jobs Council is leading a statewide partnership made up of government agencies, educational institutions, local workforce investment boards, organized labor, community organizations, industry leaders and researchers, and focused on delivering industry relevant green/clean energy training programs to a range of trainees. The Council remains consist with California's Workforce Investment Act Strategic Plan, which calls for the use of data and sector strategies as the basis for workforce and economic strategic

planning, policy development and investment decisions. As a result California's Green Workforce Training Initiative was launched with the Clean Energy Workforce Training Program; a collaborative effort of the California Energy Commission, the Employment Development Department, the Employment Training Panel, and the California Workforce Investment Board. This workforce development program has at its core, Regional Teams convened to identify the workforce training needs and number of jobs available in the following industries: energy efficiency, water efficiency, renewable energy (distributed generation and utility-scale), and alternative and renewable transportation technologies.

This collaborative effort combines \$27 million in funding from a variety of state and federal sources with \$27 million in match funding from private and public local and regional sources. A total of 34 grantees throughout California were chosen to receive program funding through this competitive process. They anticipate training 5,600 participants for clean jobs in weatherization and building retrofit construction, solar installation, green plumbing and energy auditing among others.

Grantees under the CEWTP will be connected to the SESP. Specifically, five proposals submitted under the CEWTP will be provided with additional resources and used in a learning community setting to establish the functional delivery system for the State Energy Sector Strategy. The SESP requests \$6 million in funding under the DOL/ETA State Energy Sector Partnership Solicitation for Grant Application. This funding will support activities which augment the project design of selected Regional Teams under the CEWTP. Activities eligible for augmented funding will include:

- Development of training programs that teach workers the skills required in emerging energy efficiency and renewable energy industries;

- Development of bridge curriculum leading to the next level of career advancement along a career/education continuum, including bridging from traditional education setting to pre-apprenticeship and registered apprenticeship programs;
- Publication of all curriculum developed under the SESP and the CEWTP using the California Department of Education’s Career Technical Education website as the official curriculum repository;
- Outreach materials targeting businesses green workforce needs, providing them with information on the training programs available in the regions;
- Outreach materials informing individuals from the target population groups identified as priorities in each of the program plans, informing them of the career opportunities and training programs available in their regions; and
- Funding of Regional Industry Clusters of Opportunity research for the purpose of identifying the concentration of energy/green/clean industries in a given region and producing career pathway information connected to these industries for future training program development.

The table below shows the number of jobs available, targeted industry sectors, and proposed training activities of the Regional Project Teams.

The projects summarized above target dislocated construction workers, displaced auto workers from the NUMMI plant, veterans, unemployed and underemployed workers, low-income youth and adults, new workforce entrants including special populations (veterans, those with language or education barriers, homeless, ex-offenders, individuals with disabilities, etc.) In addition, some projects will focus on employed technicians with a need for re-skilling in the advanced transportation fields in order to maintain employment and advance in the industry. It is expected that through the intensive services provided by the Regional Teams, the recruitment and retention of workers in the green industries of focus will increase, and the goals for training completion, employment and retention will be exceeded.

The proposed San Joaquin Valley Regional Project proposal will entail the following activities:

- Research and analyses of one or more green regional industry clusters of opportunity;
- Joint priority setting to design and implement a collaborative industry cluster engagement based upon results of a cluster analysis;
- Identify and connect specific investments and other commitments among public and private entities to advance the regional competitive position;

- Design of educational programs that compliment the career opportunities identified;
- Recruit target populations for enrollment into industry relevant training programs and support trainees with wrap-around supportive services and placement assistance, with the goal of serving a minimum of 200 participants and;
- Support the long-term sustainability and growth of regional clusters of opportunity. This activity should produce transformational changes to advance, sustain, and expand regional clusters of opportunity strategies.

Fiscal, administrative, and performance management capacity

The project will be managed by a collaborative team of experts that have significant experience and a high level of knowledge related to the design and implementation of workforce training programs. The State Board’s Executive Director, in collaboration with various organizations, will manage the SESP and oversee regional project teams in the implementation of State Energy Sector Plan. The Employment Development Department’s (EDD) will be responsible for administering the grant including fiscal and participant reporting.

In addition, the State Board will use its existing resources to provide one half-time staff in the development and implementation of the Sector Plan. EDD staff, in coordination with State Board, will devote time to grant management activities including fiscal and participant reporting, contracting, and tracking performance for Regional Project Teams. Many of the programs that EDD currently operates are similar to this proposal giving EDD the experience and management capacity to successfully manage and operate this project. The statewide system used for reporting expenditures and participant data, the Job Training Administration system, will be used to track and report data related for this project. The use of this system will ensure the data will be consistent, accurate and reported timely, in compliance with ARRA reporting requirements.

Section IV- Implementation Timeline and Projected Outcomes

Implementation Timeline

The State Board along with other partners have been planning and coordinating services to address the emerging green economy needs. Several of the training partners have long-standing experience in providing quality training for customers. To insure timely and proactive performance, Regional Project Team Leaders will provide the partners technical assistance on recruitment, eligibility and program performance requirements. It is expected that through the

intensive services provided by partnership, the recruitment and retention of workers in the green/clean energy industry will increase. Through collaborative partnerships, a pipeline of new workforce will be prepared to enter the green industry. Section V - Suitability for Evaluation

The overarching goal of this project is successful implementation of a sector based approach to the development of a green/clean energy workforce, the formation of effective regional partnerships involved in collaborative research and priority setting and engagement in continuous improvement of the workforce development delivery system. Effective communication, relationship building between regional partners, shared learning through action clinics and documentation of promising practices represent some of the long-term strategies that will be established during the implementation of this project. State Board and partners will coordinate recruitment efforts to maximize the training and placement of target populations. Some of the recruitment methods that will be used are distribution of flyers, direct mailings, and referrals which include distribution of public service announcements and print advertisements.

Regional project teams will rely heavily on community partners as a method for connecting to the target populations identified for service. The State Board in collaboration with its partners will monitor the progress by conducting structured interviews and surveys – collecting the right quantitative and qualitative data that captures the impact of a sector partnership. In addition, all Regional Project Teams will provide a narrative description of the outcomes during the reporting period. Outcomes may be in the form of reports, skills gap analyses, asset maps, skills standards, newly developed curricula, marketing strategies and related materials, career awareness efforts (job fairs, websites, etc.) number of employees / students enrolled, strategic plans, etc.

Finally, the State Board will focus on five areas of evaluation that have been identified as core to effective Sector Strategy approaches. The following evaluation criteria has been adopted from the collaborative work undertaken by the National Governor’s Association, the National Network of Sector Partners and the Corporation for a Skilled Workforce.

Evaluation of the SESP will address:

1. How has the Regional Team met the needs of Jobseekers and workers for relevant training and employment?
2. Impact on Employers and Industry: How has the sector partnership met the needs of employers for skilled workers?
3. Impact on the Community: How has the sector partnership changed how the “community” works together to meet worker and employer needs?
4. Effectiveness of the Partnership: Is there evidence that the partnership itself is organized, effective and efficient?
5. Systems Change: Has the sector partnership changed the behavior of education systems, workforce development programs/policies, industry Human Resource policies?
