Approval to Proceed with the Non-Potable Water Well Project at Wincanton, Segesta, and Murphy Parks Located Within County Service Area 10 in Salida and Related Actions

FISCAL IMPACT (Continued):

Project costs include:

- \$ 20,400 Public Works, Project Management/Design Oversight
- \$ 7,600 Parks Labor (estimated)
- \$ 30,000 Engineering and Design Services (estimated)
- \$112,000 Construction (estimated)
- \$ 25,500 Contingency

The Department of Parks and Recreation entered into agreement with the Department of Public Works for Project Management/Design Oversight, which includes issuing a Request for Proposal and Fee for Design Services. Upon an award of a contract for design services and completion of the design phase, the Department of Parks and Recreation in conjunction with the Department of Public Works, or General Services Agency, will initiate an Invitation for Bid for construction services in accordance with General Services Agency's Purchasing Policy and Public Contracting Code. The Department will return to the Board of Supervisors for approval to award the contract if it exceeds \$100,000.

DISCUSSION:

In December 1988, the Board of Supervisors approved the original Salida Community Plan, encompassing approximately 700 acres of land. The plan included a mix of land uses including residential, commercial, industrial, and public lands for schools, neighborhood parks, and storm drainage facilities. The plan to complete the development of the County Service Area 10 (CSA 10) was a success. Funding sources for this development came from Mello-Roos bonds, a one-time Environmental Impact Report Mitigation Fee, a one-time Transportation Improvement Coordination Fee, and a one-time California Department of Transportation Fee.

On December 16, 2008, the Board approved the first pilot well to be installed at Countrystone Park in County Service Area 10 in Salida. Despite the issues concerning electrical, plumbing, and installation, the installed well was operational in its first year. The total cost of utilities at Countrystone Park from January through December 2008 was \$14,903.26. The total cost of utilities at Countrystone Park from January through December 2009 was \$3,882.24. This resulted in a 74% savings of approximately \$11,000 in decreased use of utilities.

Additional projects for CSA 10 include the construction of alternate water supply components for parks and streetscapes. The alternate water supply components are a part of water conservation efforts using non-potable water for irrigational purposes and the use of non-potable wells for alternate water supply. The irrigational improvements are still needed for four parks—Countrystone, Wincanton, Murphy, and Segesta, and, over six miles of streetscape within CSA 10.

Water conservation projects include, but are not limited to, the use of Smart controllers, irrigation heads, web-based monitoring systems, and landscape re-designs. Potable water

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meets the drinking water standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) as water that is suitable for drinking, cooking, and personal bathing. EPA and CDPH standards control the level of contaminants and ensure proper treatment for safe tap water. Non-potable water is nondrinking water quality mainly used for outdoors. Types of non-potable water such as storm water runoff, dam or creek water, rainwater and groundwater can be used for purposes of park and streetscape irrigation. Due to the cost of the current potable water system and such savings from the piloted well in Countrystone Park, the installation of non-potable wells is projected to significantly reduce utility cost within the CSA.

Many organizations are investing in their infrastructure to ensure that parks and facilities become more energy efficient and are using non-potable water sources to reduce utility costs. With utility costs on the rise, costs have doubled in CSA 10 since Fiscal Year 2003-2004. The following chart details the utility costs over the past six fiscal years.

The decrease in Fiscal Year 2008-2009 can be attributed to the installation of a non-potable well at Countrystone Park and turning off all water during the winter months along streetscapes and in parks. The Department's utility costs for Fiscal Year 2009-2010 are projected to continue to decrease as the previous year with the addition of the recommended non-potable water wells. As the Department moves toward investing in a non-potable water well infrastructure for CSA 10 and combining other water conservation efforts, savings in utility costs most likely will decrease as seen in Fiscal Year 2008-2009.

The Department of Parks and Recreation will be partnering with the Department of Public Works in project management and design oversight for the non-potable water well project at Wincanton, Segesta and Murphy Parks. Parks and Recreation staff will be responsible for construction inspection. Planned components of the project include design, well drilling, pumps, plumbing, electrical work, concrete work, monitoring systems, and fencing.

A Request for Proposal and Fee for Design Services, overseen by the Department of Public Works will be utilized. Upon an award of a contract for design services and completion of the design phase, the Department of Parks and Recreation in conjunction with the Department of Public Works, or the General Services Agency, will initiate an Invitation for Bid for construction services in accordance with General Services Agency's Purchasing Policy and Public Contracting Code. The anticipated total cost for the construction of the four non-potable wells is \$112,000. If the actual cost of the contract exceeds \$100,000, the Department will return to the Board of Supervisors for approval to award the contract.

Approval to Proceed with the Non-Potable Water Well Project at Wincanton, Segesta, and Murphy Parks Located Within County Service Area 10 in Salida and Related Actions

The following chart details the annual expense for utilities at Wincanton, Murphy, and Segesta parks. It is anticipated that a cost savings of approximately 50%, or \$22,393, will be achieved in the first full year of operation.
