Approval to Apply for a State of California Off-Highway Vehicle Grant Program in the Amount of \$417,146 for the Operations and Maintenance of the Off-Highway Vehicle Areas at Frank Raines and La Grange Regional Parks for Fiscal Year 2010-2011

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The State of California Natural Resources Agency, Department of Parks and Recreation, administers the Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) Grant Program that provides funding to cities, counties, districts, and non-profit organizations delivering OHV recreational opportunities and related activities. An OHV is defined in the California Vehicle Code as a motorcycle, snowmobile, all-terrain vehicle, jeep, sand buggy or dune buggy, and any street licensed motor vehicles being used off-highway.

The Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Act of 2003 authorizes the allocation of grant funds for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, managing and rehabilitating OHV areas, trails, and facilities in California. For the OHV Grant Period 2010-2011, Stanislaus County Department of Parks and Recreation would submit a grant request for its managed OHV areas located within Frank Raines and La Grange Regional Parks.

Unlike most other counties within the State of California, Stanislaus County owns and operates not one, but two OHV areas totaling over 2,000 acres of available and dedicated land for all types of off-road recreational opportunities for County residents and visitors alike. OHV enthusiasts come from Stanislaus County and routinely from the Bay Area, Sacramento, Fresno, and the Sierra Foothills. Both La Grange and Frank Raines OHV parks are open to the use of all registered and California Vehicle Code compliant vehicles such as, but not limited to, 4-wheel drive vehicles (4WD), all-terrain vehicles (ATV), sand-rails, motorcycles, and buggies.

The Off-Highway Vehicle Grant Program offers a variety of funding types including operations and maintenance. Funds can be used for restoration, law enforcement, education, safety and ground operations. The Department of Parks and Recreation will be applying for a Ground Operations (GO) Grant that will provide funding for operations and maintenance at the Frank Raines and La Grange OHV areas. The grant will cover funding for cleaning bathrooms, mowing, volunteer support, rules enforcement and trash collection. Certain projects like water system maintenance and testing, waste water system upgrades, and campground improvements will also be funded. This grant enables Stanislaus County to enhance its existing OHV areas while protecting its natural resources.

Frank Raines Regional Park is located approximately 17 miles west of Patterson, California, in Del Puerto Canyon's rugged slopes of the Coastal Range. The park is divided functionally into two units separated by several miles of road. The north section encompasses over 1,600 acres of developed and undeveloped areas including off-road vehicle trails, overnight camping, and a day-use area for passive recreation. The OHV trails are rated for beginners with stock OHVs to advanced and well-equipped OHVs in very steep terrains. Additionally, rock crawling and mud bogging are also available. The types of vehicles used in this park are trucks, motorcycles, 4WD vehicles, and dune buggies. Visitors who use the park will meet challenges like hill climbing, water hazards, and challenging trails.

The OHV area includes the Deer Creek Campgrounds which consists of a day-use parking area, 34 full hook-up campsites, a recreation hall, restrooms and showers, and a group picnic shelter. The Park's resources are in fair condition after the fire that occurred on July 22, 2003. The campgrounds, buildings and maintenance facilities were not damaged by the fire. The trails in the lower and upper 800 acres of the OHV park suffered significant fire damage. The entire park was closed down temporarily to assess the damage until October 17, 2003, when approximately 200 acres of the OHV Park were re-opened to the public. Since October 2006, the Park's lower 800 acres have been open for OHV use to the public.

La Grange Regional Park is located on South Old La Grange Road in La Grange, California. This OHV area offers undeveloped camping and over 150 acres of land open for recreational riding. The trails are rated for beginners to intermediate riders. There is a motocross style course and a track dedicated for the younger beginners with OHVs under 90cc.

The GO Grant, in this case, will provide funding for the operations and maintenance at La Grange Regional Park and its OHV area. The grant will help fund labor, supplies, construction materials, trash/litter collection service, mowing, sign replacement, maintenance and testing of water system, safety issues, electrical repairs, volunteer support, fencing repairs, upgrading amenities, and utility costs.

Visitors of the La Grange OHV area will encounter challenges such as soft sandy soils, water hazards, and hill climbs. A recent addition of an intermediate track for users between the ages of ten and fifteen is now open to the public. An OHV user can expect to enjoy groomed trails, groomed competitive tracks, camping, restrooms, benches, shade trees, and barbeques. The types of vehicles used in this park include, but are not limited to, dune buggies, dirt bikes, ATV's, and miscellaneous 4WD vehicles.

Some of the groups who enjoy our OHV Areas include: the Over the Hill Gang, Modesto 4WD, California Motocross Association, East Bay High Tailers, American Motocross Promotions, Mutant Motor Sports, A.M.P. Racing, Merced Dirt Riders, and many members of the California Off Road Vehicle Association.

This grant opportunity allows the Department to provide service level priorities of safety, customer service, and accountability to the OHV community. Service level priorities are staff presence, janitorial and custodial duties, maintenance of OHV trails, and meeting mandated requirements for drinking water compliance. The Grantor has requested that Stanislaus County submit a grant application for both OHV parks as a single application.

### **POLICY ISSUE:**

The Board of Supervisors should determine if applying for the State of California Off-Highway Vehicle GO Grant is consistent with the Board's priorities of effective partnerships, a well-planned infrastructure, and the efficient delivery of public services. The Department of Parks and Recreation strives to establish partnerships with organizations that strengthen our

#### 1. Project Description

#### A. Statement of GO Activity

La Grange Regional Park is the most diverse of all the regional parks with approximately 730 acres. The park offers 147 acres of exciting off-road vehicle recreation. La Grange Regional Park resources are in fair condition considering the prior use of land (quarry) before it became an OHV Park. Continued conservation efforts are needed on the swale system that leads down to the main OHV trails area.

This grant application is for a Ground Operations (GO) for La Grange OHV Park. The grant would help keep the park in operation for the motocross races that are held each year. It would also assist the County in meeting the needs of users who frequent the park on weekends and holidays. The grant funds would assist the County in servicing the facility in the following areas:

Entrance Station collection/support

Cleaning restrooms

Volunteer support and coordination

Trash Collection

Physical barriers for traffic control

Fencing Repairs

Regulatory and directional signage

Maintaining trees

Site and program management

Electrical repairs

With the operational funding for Park Maintenance staff, the County would be able to provide a greater level of service to our constituents that use the facility. The County staff will be available to assure a clean, wellgroomed, and positive recreational experience for our OHV users by keeping the bathrooms clean and grading the motor cross track. Should significant changes in the terrain or environment develop, staff will be present to assess and address these important issues. Without operational funding, staff presence will be reduced. The current peak season for this park is roughly from October 15 through May 15. With our present staff, we are able to grade the track for scheduled motocross races during the peak season. On the off-season, the park is

maintained sporadically.

There is presently 2 wells at the park. Well number #2 is used for the maintenance of the track and well #1 waters the trees, and

provides water to the restrooms. The County received an OHV grant that paid for the electrical source for the well #2 which is a source for the pumps, water lines, and water tanks. Due to the location of well #2, a fence was constructed to protect the holding tanks, since the location of the area is so remote. The water tanks currently hold 15,000-gallons of water to be used primarily for grooming the motocross track at the La Grange OHV Park.

#### **B. Relation of Proposed Project to OHV Recreation**

The project will address protection and enhancement of OHV opportunity and provide continued access to OHV enthusiast and racers. La Grange Off- Highway Vehicle Park is located in a remote area of La Grange. Approximately 2.5 miles south of the town

of La Grange on J-59 the County owns 147 acres of abandoned dredge and quarry area that is dedicated for off road vehicle use. The

OHV Park currently includes an overnight use area with parking lot and restrooms. Due to the isolated nature of this site, all site furnishings need to be made of long lasting, vandal resistant materials. A consistent program of track and trail maintenance and erosion control needs to be maintained to protect the environment and enhance the OHV users riding experience.

The crew responsible for the La Grange OHV Park is also the same crew that maintains Modesto Reservoir Regional Park.

This regional park is approximately 6,040 acres – of this amount, 2,800 acres provides opportunities for water skiing, jet skiing, sailing, swimming fishing and duck hunting. Currently there are three full time employees and 7 part time employees that work from April to September (during the height of the season) for both the reservoir and the La Grange Regional Park. This crew is also responsible for several La Grange historical sites (two historical cemeteries, museum, and school house). As you can see the workload is enormous with the current limited staff.

This project enhances and protects the current OHV opportunity by providing additional staff that would be focused on OHV opportunities and tasks. Each year during the high use season for OHV enthusiast, which is from October through June, full time staff is redirected to La Grange OHV park to gear up for the special events and day to day use of the park. Due to a lack of sufficient staff, most of the maintenance begins a month before the OHV season. This Ground Operations Grant would enable the County to dedicate additional people to the area thus giving the park the attention it needs to offer our clients the best riding experience possible. Having a presence at the park, because of its remote location, also helps eliminate illegal riding and trespassing and prevents off-route travel.

Without the grant funding the Park is maintained sporadically, and without a presence, there is increased theft and vandalism at the park. This year alone the County has repaired the entrance station several times. On one occasion the entrance station was set on fire, the locks were tampered with and the windows were broken. The bathrooms suffer a great amount of graffiti and the fences are cut. Quite frequently we find bullet holes in our buildings and signs. With a presence at the park, the Park Maintenance workers could report more of these incidents to the sheriff's office and reduce the amount of vandalism by simply being there since most incidents occur when no one is present.

#### C. Describe the size of the specific Project Area(s) in acres and/or miles

La Grange Regional Park is the most diverse of all the regional parks with approximately 730 acres. The park offers 147-acres of exciting off-road vehicle recreation. La Grange Regional Park resources are in fair condition considering the prior use of land (quarry) before it became on OHV Park.

#### D. Location and description of OHV opportunities

Visitors who go to the La Grange OHV area will meet challenges like soft sandy soil, water hazards, and hill climbs. There was a recent addition of an intermediate track for users between the ages of ten and fifteen years old. The user of the park can expect to enjoy trails, groomed competitive tracks, camping, restrooms, tables, and barbeques.

The groups who enjoy the park are the Over the Hill Gang, Modesto 4-wheel drive, CMA Racing, East Bay High Tailers, Merced Dirt Riders, and CORVA. The types of vehicles used here are dune buggies, motorcycles and ATV's and miscellaneous 4 wheel drives.

In the past, The Modesto Ridge runners have volunteered time to accomplish litter and debris removal as well as assisting with irrigation installation. Partnerships with CMA Racing for motocross events have also helped bring awareness of the recreational opportunities at La Grange OHV Park. As part of the race promoters' responsibility, the motocross track is

groomed before each event. Attendance has been excellent. Each event has approximately two to five hundred riders and several hundred spectators. With

this current contract we have 10 scheduled races per year for the next four years. The promoter is responsible to maintain the proper care of the facility, including provision of additional restrooms, garbage collection, and grading of the motocross track.

La Grange Off-Highway Vehicle Park is located in a remote area outside of La Grange. With this Ground Operations (GO) grant we can offer the public additional coverage at the park to maintain the recreational facility as well as to answer any questions or address any problems that might arise. The grant would help to keep the park maintained for our park users as well as our scheduled race events.

#### 1. Project Description

#### A. Statement of GO Activity

This project would be for Frank Raines Off-Highway Vehicle Park. It is located on Del Puerto Canyon Road approximately 18 miles west of the City of Patterson. There is approximately 750 acres in the lower OHV Park that encompasses the park entrance station, a full hook up campground, recreation hall, restroom/showers, and a group picnic shelter. There is an additional 482 acres in the upper area, which has been officially closed to OHV use pending further studies. The types of vehicles used at the park are Quad's/Atv's, motorcycles, 4-wheel drive vehicles and dune buggies.

Stanislaus County, Department of Parks and Recreation, is requesting a Ground Operations (GO) Grant for Frank Raines Regional Off-Highway Vehicle Park, for routine maintenance and improvements to the existing facilities. Customer service including health and safety for the visitors of the park is one of our main goals.

For on-going operations and maintenance at the Frank Raines OHV Park, the County needs to fund a full-time Maintenance Worker III and seasonal maintenance workers. Their responsibilities are as

The Ground Operations (GO) grant would enable Stanislaus County to enhance and protect the existing OHV opportunity as well as provide new opportunities and protect resources.

#### B. Relation of Proposed Project to OHV Recreation

This project relates to OHV opportunity by maintaining the existing areas of recreation, keeping the campsites functional and clean, maintaining the landscaping, providing clean bathrooms, supporting the efforts of our volunteers, answering questions regarding usage of the OHV park, and repairing areas that need attention. The Department of Parks and Recreation is responsible for all management and maintenance such as fixing sewage pumps, the Recreation Hall usage/rental, any repairs that needs to be done to the stove, locks on the door or cleaning and stocking the rest rooms.

We also maintain trails and road tread, erosion control features and enforcing traffic control.

There are numerous private property owners who border the park. On going, long term projects could be scheduled and completed eliminating the need for costly, one-time clean-ups. The park is located in a remote area and in the past when we have not had coverage, we experienced a lot of vandalism. There are broken windows in the Recreational Hall, locks that are jammed on purpose, graffiti in the bathrooms and broken hose bibs. This grant funding would help reduce the vandalism at the park and continue special projects that would enhance the riding pleasure of our customers.

There is approximately 750 acres that are open for riding in the lower OHV Park in addition to the full hook up campground that encompasses the park entrance station, undeveloped campsites, day use areas, emergency heli-pad, recreation hall, restrooms/showers, and a group picnic shelter. There is an additional 750 acres in the upper area, which has been officially closed to OHV use pending further studies, although we must still maintain Fire Roads and easment accesses.

Frank Raines OHV Park and Deercreek Campgrounds is located approx. 18 miles west of the City of Patterson. There are approximately 750 acres that are open for riding in the lower OHV Park in addition to the full hook up campground that encompasses the park entrance station, undeveloped campsites, day use areas, emergency heli-pad, recreation hall, restrooms/showers, and a group picnic shelter. We offer a multi-use, non-segregated OHV opportunity that includes 4x4's, Buggies, Quad's and ATV's as well as Motorcycles. We also offer a unique riding terrain with varying difficulties. We have a fully fenced beginner flat track. This area provides a location for kids to learn the basics without them riding around in the campground which creates safety concerns. It has a covered barn for parents to relax under while still watching and coaching their children in a controlled environment. Once the kids no longer need training wheels, and have some experience

under their belts, they can ride on the Fire Road that is wide and well groomed to one of our two plateau areas. Both wide open with plenty of room, one offers a junior track, still for beginners. Beyond that, we have lower areas of the park that are fairly flat with some rolling hills. For the thrill seekers in the crowd, we offer a couple of mud pits, steep hill climbs and some trails that are quite treacherous and exciting.

Maintenance of the trail and road tread are currently performed with a 1990 CAT D3, and a borrowed 1999 New Holland 545 w/box scrapper and the help of a volunteer. We are looking into new equipment to be more efficient and more productive. Current erosion control features include culverts, bridge and water bars, all of which need constant maintenance to remain functional. Past O&M grants have provided us the opportunity to replace damaged and faded traffic control and educational signage. Continued grant funding will help maintain a safe and healthy environment for our guests.

Frank Raines prides itself on being a multi-use OHV experience. Many of the families come here because this is one of the few parks that allows different vehicle types to ride together. The park offers varying levels of riding difficulty, for example; steep treacherous trails, hill climbs, large flat plateaus, a well-groomed fire road, and fenced flat track for beginners.

### B. Public Comments

Briefly summarize public comments received that are relevant to each project or the Grant Application as a whole.

We held our Public Meeting for Off-Highway Vehicle enthusiast on March 15, 2010 from 6:00pm – 8:00pm. There were approximately 25 people present in the meeting. The agenda for the meeting was to discuss both grants in detail, focusing on the purpose of the Ground Operation Grant for both Frank Raines and La Grange.

The County also wanted to know if anything needed to be added to the grant or if something was questionable – perhaps it should be deleted. Last but not least, we discussed the service level at both parks and asked our constituents if there was any feedback they could give us so we could better service them.

The comments and feedback we received are as follows:

- The comment was made that Carnegie might be shutting their doors Would that mean more traffic for Frank Raines and La Grange? The answer was yes We have already seen more visitors to our park since the controversy at Carnegie began.
- One of our constituents asked if we could ask for monies for law enforcement I called the State and was informed that there were separate Law Enforcement grants that could be requested. I was also told that on a case by case basis LE requests would be considered under a different kind of grant but the explanation would have to be clear about why you would need it and how it goes with the particular grant you are writing.
- We discussed equipment how we maintain it and keep it from getting stolen. We explained that we have an equipment database and all the equipment has a County number on it.
- · We were asked if we could count the inmate time towards the county match? I am waiting for an answer from the state.
- The question was asked How come we don't let the volunteers stay in our parks for \$0.00 when they donate their time. It was explained that we need to go to the Board any time someone is making a request not to pay the fees. We can not simply grant this over the phone because it would be seen as a gift of public funds.

# FRANK RAINES ISSUES:

There was a request to replace the stolen quad.

Another request asked for phone tours at this location to get better reception. The phone booth at the site only works ½ the time

There was a complaint that lights on the walkway were not working. This had been taken care of as of March 8, 2010.

A strong request was made to open more acres for riding - especially the upper 40.

There was a statement about how difficult it is to become a volunteer for the County. We discussed simplifying the process. They can do one time events without all the paperwork of becoming a United Way volunteer.

They also wanted more Organized Volunteer Days.

### LA GRANGE ISSUES

There was feedback regarding the mud puddles at La Grange OHV Park – The water in the puddles is sometimes sucked out and there have been complaints. Our Manager was present at the meeting and said that they sometimes take the water truck and fill them back in for the riders who enjoy that experience.

Both grants were read out loud. The focus was of course the cost sheet. First, we asked for any feedback regarding what we had proposed in the preliminary grant. There was discussion around using cameras at the sight to fend off vandalism and crime. There was one comment about hiring security guards. The County decided not to change the grant because of the high cost of security guards.

I also asked the group if there was anything that they thought I should add to the grant to make the park better. There was no comment.

Something positive occurred when the group decided to volunteer differently. They were going to organize day events with the assistance of the County. This would cut through a lot of paperwork. This might not have changed the grant but it might increase the level of volunteerism at both sites.
