Approval to Accept the 2010 California Multi-jurisdictional Methamphetamine Enforcement Team Recovery Act Program Funding from the California Emergency Management Agency

FISCAL IMPACT (continued):

The grant will provide \$181,508 in Federal funding to Stanislaus County. The Probation Department's 2010-2011 Adopted Proposed Budget includes total appropriations and revenue to fund a Deputy Probation Officer. There is no additional cost to the General Fund as a result of the acceptance of this grant.

# DISCUSSION:

Funding in the amount of \$181,508 is available from the JAG program for use in Stanislaus County. This grant period is a two year cycle beginning March 1, 2010 and ending February 28, 2012. The Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department was identified as the fiscal agent and submitted an application for the total grant amount of \$181,508. On April 6, 2010 the Sheriff's Department received notification that the application was approved for \$181,508 in funding.

The focus of the Cal-MMET Recovery Act Program is to ensure the multi-disciplinary participation of each task force to include a police officer, a deputy sheriff, a deputy district attorney, a probation officer and/or a child protective services worker for the duration of this grant.

The Probation Department will use the awarded amount of \$181,508 to fund a Deputy Probation Officer. The Probation Officer will assist law enforcement in apprehending drug offenders and coordinating activities between the Probation Department and the Cal-MMET task force. The Cal-MMET team works together as a joint task force with two other anti-drug agencies, Stanislaus County Drug Enforcement Agency (SDEA) and Central Valley California High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA). These three agencies are located in the same building allowing them to efficiently work together by sharing information, resources and equipment. The three agencies work as one team in order to combat the production and distribution of methamphetamines and other narcotics.

The ongoing Cal-MMET grant currently funds one Sergeant, two Deputy Sheriffs and a Legal Clerk in the Sheriff's Department, one Modesto Police Department Officer and one District Attorney Investigator. The Recovery Act Program will provide a Deputy Probation Officer to the Cal-MMET unit to help meet task force goals and objectives.

The Sheriff's Department recommends the County take advantage of this funding opportunity and approve the Staff Recommendation to accept the funding from Cal-EMA.

# POLICY ISSUES:

Utilization of this funding will enhance criminal justice processes in our community to combat the production and distribution of methamphetamines and other narcotics consistent with the Board's stated priorities of ensuring A Safe Community and Effective Partnerships.

Law enforcement personnel may seize as evidence and remove any bottles, cans, jugs and other containers, as well as contaminated apparatus and chemical samples from a clandestine drug site, however, law enforcement agencies are not responsible for the cleanup/remediation of any rooms, buildings or surrounding environments, including septic systems, rivers, streams or contaminated soils. Recipient will enter into a written agreement with the local Social Services Department to notify the local Social Services Department whenever a minor is found at a clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site, and, if determined to be necessary, require that qualified personnel be dispatched to the site and, if determined to be necessary:

Respond to the minor's health needs that relate to methamphetamine toxicity;

 Take the minor into protective custody unless the minor is criminally involved in the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory activities or is subject to arrest/detention for other criminal violations;

(iii) Arrange for medical testing for methamphetamine toxicity; and

(iv) Arrange for any follow-up medical tests, examinations, or health care made necessary as a result of methamphetamine toxicity.

OR

Will accept the Recovery JAG funds for the period of March 1, 2010-Feb 28, 2012 , and comply with Federal, State, and local environmental, health, and safety laws and regulations applicable to the **seizure and/or removal** of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories. Said compliance will include the following mitigation measures:

Certification of Assurance of Compliance - Recovery JAG, Cal EMA 2-104j (10/27/2009)

- 1. Recipient will provide medical screening of personnel assigned or to be assigned by the recipient to the seizure and/or removal of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories;
- 2. Recipient will provide Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) required initial and refresher training for law enforcement officials and all other personnel assigned to the seizure and/or removal of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories;
- 3. Recipient will equip personnel, as determined by their specific duties, with OSHA required protective wear and other required safety equipment;
- Recipient will send written notification to the property owner of record, and the local Environmental Management and/or Public Health Department whenever a clandestine methamphetamine laboratory is seized;
- 5. Recipient will enter into a written agreement with the local Social Services Department to notify the local Social Services Department whenever a minor is found at a clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site, and, if determined to be necessary, require that qualified personnel be dispatched to the site and, if determined to be necessary.
  - Respond to the minor's health needs that relate to methamphetamine toxicity;
  - (vi) Take the minor into protective custody unless the minor is criminally involved in the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory activities or is subject to arrest/detention for other criminal violations;
  - (vii) Arrange for medical testing for methamphetamine toxicity; and
  - (viii) Arrange for any follow-up medical tests, examinations, or health care made necessary as a result of methamphetamine toxicity.
- 6. Recipient will assign properly trained personnel to prepare a Hazard Assessment and Recognition Plan (HARP) for the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site;
- Recipient or DTSC will utilize qualified disposal personnel to remove the chemicals, associated glassware, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes from the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site;
- Recipient or DTSC will dispose of the chemicals, associated glassware, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes at properly licensed disposal facilities or, when allowable, at properly licenses recycling facilities; and
- Recipient or DTSC will monitor the records involving the transport, disposal and recycling components of subparagraphs numbered 7 and 8 immediately above in order to ensure proper compliance.

All appropriate documentation must be maintained on file by the project and available for Cal EMA or public scrutiny upon request. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in suspension of payments under the grant or termination of the grant or both and the Recipient may be ineligible for award of any future grants if the Cal EMA determines that any of the following has occurred:

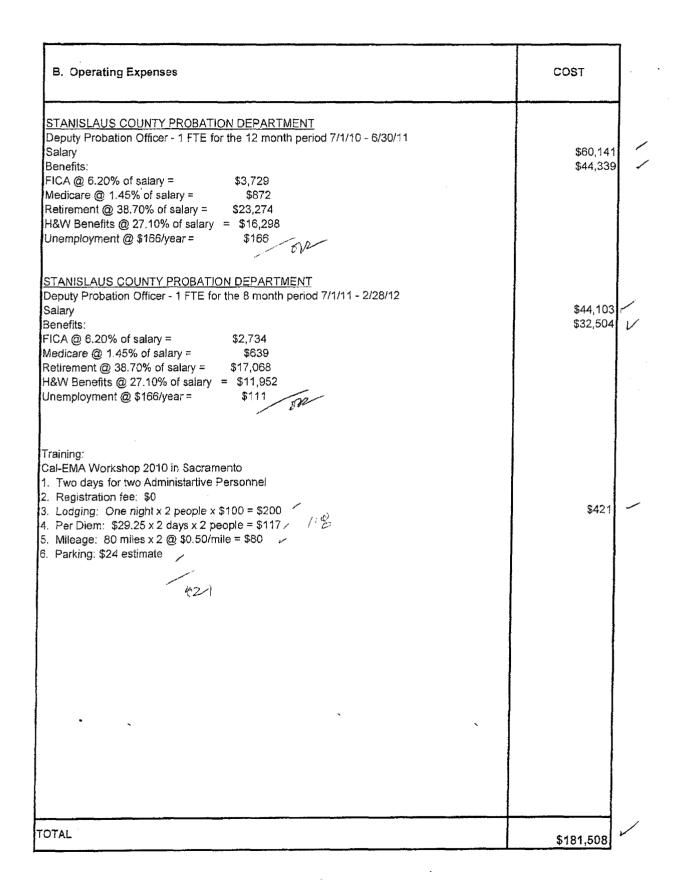

### **Budget Narrative**

The following budget for the Stanislaus California Multi-Jurisdictional Methamphetamine Enforcement Team (Cal-MMET) Recovery Act Program includes funding for a Deputy Probation Officer from July 1, 2010 through February 28, 2012.

This Probation Officer will assist law enforcement in apprehending drug offenders and coordinating activities between the Probation Department and the Cal-MMET task force. The Probation Officer will identify probationers with search and seizure conditions of probation and will serve as a resource for the task force members by providing information and assistance on probation cases and issues. The Probation Officer will have direct access to the department's component of the Integrated Criminal Justice Information System database in order to provide critical intelligence and case file information. The Probation Officer will coordinate, participate in, and record the number of probation searches conducted by the task force as well as participate in surveillance activities for probationers suspected of trafficking or selling drugs. The Probation Officer will augment the services of law enforcement and prosecution by targeting and arresting probationers who are in violation of probation. Written violation of probation reports will be completed by the Probation Officer and submitted to the court. The Probation Officer will also determine whether drug testing should be performed concerning probationers suspected of drug-related violations. This Probation Officer position will support the objectives and activities of the multi-jurisdictional task force.

The CAL-MMET team works together as a joint task force with two other anti-drug agencies, Stanislaus County Drug Enforcement Agency (SDEA) and Central Valley California High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA). The three agencies are located in the same building allowing them to efficiently work together by sharing information, resources, and equipment.

The three agencies work as one team in order to combat the production and distribution of methamphetamines and other narcotics.

The ongoing Cal-MMET grant is currently funding one Sheriff's Department Sergeant, two Sheriff's Department Deputy Sheriffs (one who is a pilot), one Sheriff's Department Legal Clerk, one Modesto Police Department Officer, and one District Attorney Investigator. The Recovery Act Program funding will provide a Deputy Probation Officer to the Cal-MMET unit to help meet task force goals and objectives.

Training expenses have been included in the grant to fund the attendance of two people at the Cal-EMA Workshop in Sacramento which will focus on reporting requirements.

#### **Project Narrative**

The Stanislaus Cal-MMET Unit is committed to sponsoring and working in support of local and regional programs geared toward the elimination of the manufacturing and trafficking of methamphetamine. The expected outcome of the program is the arrest and successful prosecution of methamphetamine manufacturers, distributors, and traffickers as well as the protection of children who have been endangered by exposure to illicit drug environments.

The ongoing Cal-MMET Program is a multi-jurisdictional task force program that integrates federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, prosecutors and probation for the purpose of enhancing inter-agency coordination and intelligence and facilitating multi-jurisdictional investigations. In addition, Cal-MMET maintains a Drug Endangered Children (DEC) protocol with the cooperation of all participants in addition to Child Protective Services to ensure the safety of all drug endangered children.

The CAL-MMET team works together as a joint task force with two other anti-drug agencies, Stanislaus County Drug Enforcement Agency (SDEA) and Central Valley California High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA). The three agencies are located in the same building allowing them to efficiently work together by sharing information, resources, and equipment. The three agencies work as one team in order to combat the production and distribution of methamphetamines and other narcotics.

The law enforcement component includes a Modesto Police Department Lieutenant (non-grant funded) who manages the CAL-MMET Unit. He/she is responsible for the coordination of all agency operations. The Sergeant (funded by the ongoing Cal-MMET grant) provides direct supervision to the personnel who do the law enforcement work of the multi-jurisdictional task force and conducts briefings.

The law enforcement officers funded by the ongoing Cal-MMET grant include two Deputy Sheriffs (one who is a pilot) and one Modesto Police Officer. These officers initiate cases, conduct surveillance, undercover operations, wiretaps, gathering and analyzing criminal intelligence, conducting probation searches on subjects with prior drug convictions, serving search warrants, utilizing informants, and arresting and prosecuting the responsible(s) involved in mid to large-scale methamphetamine manufacturing and distribution organizations. A Legal Clerk (funded by the ongoing Cal-MMET grant) types reports and search warrants, and prepares case files for prosecution. He/she is responsible for the maintenance of statistics and records.

The Prosecution Component's District Attorney's Investigator (funded by the ongoing Cal-MMET grant) works directly with the law enforcement officers, including responding to crime scenes and assisting with the Drug Endangered Children (DEC) cases. He/she acts as a liaison between the CAL-MMET Unit and the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office.

The Probation Component will be comprised of a Deputy Probation Officer funded by the Cal-MMET Recovery Act Program. The Probation Officer will assist law enforcement in apprehending drug offenders and coordinating activities between the Probation Department and the Cal-MMET task force. The Probation Officer will identify probationers with search and seizure conditions of probation and serve as a resource for the task force members by providing information and assistance on probation cases and issues. Written violation of probation reports will be completed by the Probation Officer and submitted to the court. The Probation Officer will also determine whether drug testing should be performed concerning probationers suspected of drug-related violations. Currently a Probation Officer working on the SDEA task force is available to the Cal-MMET team when needed. Having a Probation Officer on the Cal-MMET Task Force working with agents will effectively enhance enforcement operations and allow more active participation by the Probation Department on Cal-MMET cases.

Funding a Deputy Probation Officer through the Cal-MMET Recovery Act Program will allow the Stanislaus County Probation Department to retain a position identified for elimination as of July 1, 2010.

The Child Protection component includes cooperation from Community Services Agency (CSA) on an as needed basis. Cal-MMET agents notify a CSA liaison when children are found where drugs, hazardous conditions, or an unfit home exists. The social worker will take the steps necessary to protect the children. The District Attorney will review and prosecute the cases. Cal-MMET, CSA, and the District Attorney will exchange information and work cooperatively in order to provide protection for the children and prosecute the cases. A memorandum of understanding between CSA, Health Services Agency, SDEA, Cal-MMET and Stanislaus County District Attorney is in place to comply with the Drug Endangered Children and Elderly Dependant Adults policy.

## CALIFORNIA MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL METHAMPHETAMINE ENFORCEMENT TEAM OPERATIONAL AGREEMENT

This California Multi-Jurisdictional Methamphetamine Enforcement Team Operational Agreement stands as evidence that the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office ("DA"), the Stanislaus County Probation Department ("Probation") and the City of Modesto Police Department (herein called "Law Enforcement") will work together toward the mutual goal of methamphetamine manufacturing and trafficking suppression, under the Stanislaus CAL-MMET Task Force (CAL-MMET).

#### Law Enforcement

The law enforcement component is represented by the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department and the City of Modesto Police Department and is administered under this Operational Agreement.

The law enforcement component contains years of invaluable experience of narcotics enforcement in the communities of Stanislaus County. Stanislaus CAL-MMET fosters the highly efficient use of all law enforcement resources and thus forms a foundation for the use of grant funds to the maximum benefit of the citizens of local communities.

CAL-MMET staff is experienced in all aspects of drug related investigations. Grant funds provide the opportunity to expand those skills. A Modesto Police Department Lieutenant is the commander of the CAL-MMET Unit (non-grant funded).

Grant funds will be utilized to enhance the law enforcement component by funding the following personnel:

1 Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department Sergeant

- 2 Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department Deputies
- 1 Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department Legal Clerk
- 1 Police Officer from Modesto Police Department

The Sergeant, three Law Enforcement Officers, and the Legal Clerk, will be physically located in the current office of the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department CAL-MMET Unit. The Lieutenant (non-grant funded) supervises the daily operations of the Stanislaus CAL-MMET. All of the above personnel will perform the activities specified in the law enforcement component.

#### Prosecution

The District Attorney's Office of Stanislaus County represents the prosecution component. The prosecution component will provide the following personnel:

1 District Attorney Investigator

The District Attorney Investigator (DAI) will interface with law enforcement through his/her communication with CAL-MMET agents and support personnel. The DAI maintains an office at the Sheriff's Department CAL-MMET Unit. The assigned DAI will continue to report to the Stanislaus County District Attorney, thereby ensuring that vital information flows between the prosecution component and the Stanislaus CAL-MMET. Grant funds shall be used to enhance the prosecution component by funding the above position.

#### Probation

The Probation Department of Stanislaus County represents the probation component. The probation component will be comprised of a Deputy Probation Officer funded through the Cal-MMET Recovery Act. Currently a Probation Officer working on the SDEA task force is available to the Cal-MMET team on an as needed basis.

The Deputy Probation Officer will work with Stanislaus CAL-MMET agents and will perform duties within the scope of his/her assignment. The Deputy Probation Officer will be physically located in the Sheriff's Department CAL-MMET Unit. He/She will continue to report to the Chief Probation Officer, thereby ensuring that vital information flows between the probation component and the CAL-MMET Unit.

#### **Transfer of Funds**

The Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department will reimburse the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office per the budget limits using ongoing Cal-MMET funds: Salary-\$65,926, benefits-\$48,091 for the fiscal year 2008-09 and Salary-\$72,150, benefits-\$56,540 for the fiscal year 2009-10. The Sheriff's Department will also reimburse the Modesto Police Department per the budget limits: Salary-\$11,021, benefits-\$5,874, and overtime-\$4,908 for the 2008-09 fiscal year and Salary-\$73,535, benefits-\$47,183, and overtime-\$11,488 for the 2009-10 fiscal year. The Sheriff's Department will reimburse the Probation Department per the budget limits using the Cal-MMET Recovery Act funding: Salary-\$60,141, benefits-\$44,339 for the fiscal year 2010-11 and Salary-\$44,103 and benefits-\$32,504 for the fiscal year 2011-12. The reimbursements will be completed after invoices with backup documentation are received, usually on a quarterly basis (September, December, March, June). In addition to the above salary reimbursement, the CAL-MMET Unit will pay for officer's training that is pertinent to the grant activities. In addition, CAL-MMET will provide specialized equipment needed along with the required annual medical examination.

#### Shared Equipment

Cooperating agencies share equipment in support of our investigations. The CAL-MMET shares a specialized equipment pool in a central location with HIDTA and Stanislaus Drug Enforcement Agency (SDEA) to maximize the efficiency of CAL-MMET investigations.

#### Agreement

The parties hereto declare their commitment to a comprehensive effort to combat drug abuse in Stanislaus County, and the parties hereby agree to support that effort with the coordinated performance of specific responsibilities by law enforcement, prosecution, and probation components as set forth in this agreement. This agreement will be effective through February 28, 2012.

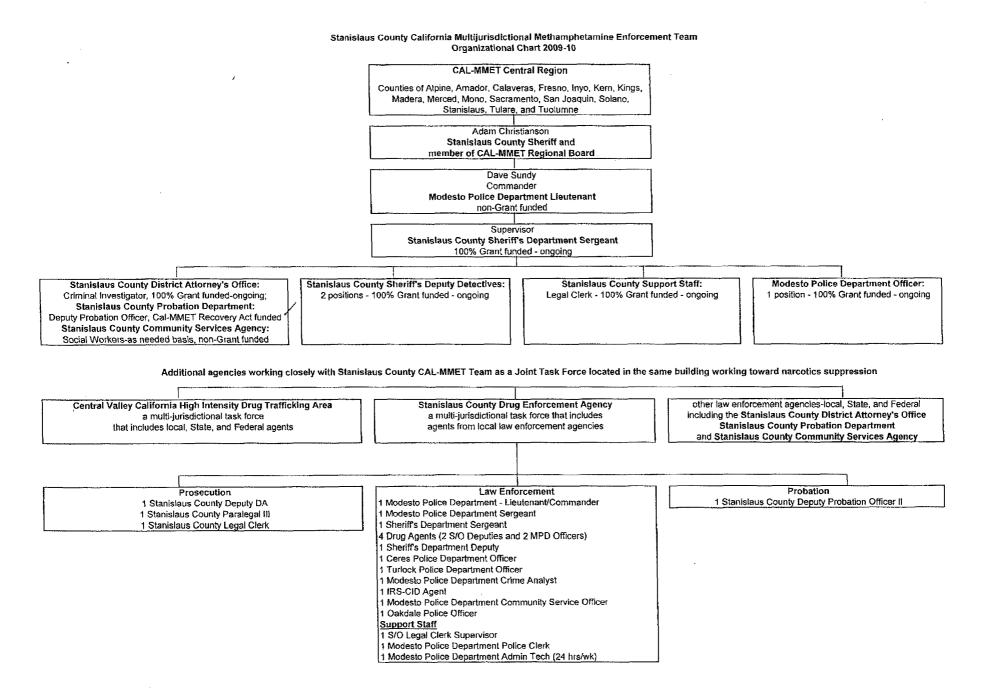
