# **DISCUSSION:**

# Workforce Investment Act Formula Funds:

The Workforce Investment Division of the California Employment Development Department (EDD), the designated State Grant Manager of the Department of Labor's Workforce Investment Act (WIA) funding, has announced allocations to Local Workforce Investment Areas for Program Year (PY) 2012-2013. This year's allocation for Stanislaus County is \$6,920,136, a decrease of \$277,764 or approximately 4% in comparison to the prior year allocation. This decrease in funding is due to an allocation formula that drives funding to local areas with relatively higher increases in unemployment rates. Stanislaus County's unemployment rate as of April 2012 was 16.4%.

The Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors must annually authorize the receipt of WIA funds and designate the fund administrator. With approval of this recommendation, the Alliance Worknet will serve as fiduciary agent on behalf of the Stanislaus Economic Development and Workforce Alliance (Local Workforce Investment Board) and the Board of Supervisors in administrating these funds. The Alliance Worknet Director will administer the program based on Board direction and approval.

The Alliance Worknet provides employment services to over 15,780 Stanislaus County residents annually at the following four locations: 629 12<sup>th</sup> St., Modesto, 1405 West F St. #I, Oakdale, 125 N. Broadway, Turlock, 66 N. El Circulo Ave., Patterson. Services include access to job openings, résumé and application assistance, job search workshops, skill assessment, career planning and counseling, and job training. In addition, Alliance Worknet staff provides "Rapid Response" assistance to workers who are being laid off due to business closures and downsizing in the effort to quickly re-establish them in the workforce. To date, Alliance Worknet has offered Rapid Response assistance to 1,169 workers this fiscal year.

Approval to Receive and Expend Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Funds in Accordance with the Approved Stanislaus County Strategic Five-Year Local Plan and Contracted StanWORKS Funds as Authorized by the Director of the Community Services Agency in Program Year 2012-2013

Approval of staff's recommendation will allow the Alliance Worknet Director to enter into and sign contracts and expend 2012-2013 WIA funds in the general administration of the program. Individual contract amounts for the provision of these employment and training services are expected to exceed \$100,000. Contracts will be approved by the Local Workforce Investment Board and will follow the Board of Supervisors policies regarding the reporting of contracts and agreements.

# Contracted StanWorks Funds:

Alliance Worknet has provided employment services to StanWORKS participants under contract with the Community Services Agency (CSA) for over 15 years. For the upcoming 2012-2013 Program Year, CSA is providing Alliance Worknet additional funding targeted for subcontracts with local community based organizations (CBOs) to provide ancillary services necessary for these clients to obtain employment.

With approval of this recommendation, the Alliance Worknet will serve as fiduciary agent on behalf of the Stanislaus County Community Services Agency and the Board of Supervisors in administrating these funds. The Alliance Worknet Director will administer the program based on Board direction and approval.

Approval of staff's recommendation will allow the Alliance Worknet Director to enter into, sign contracts and expend 2012-2013 contracted StanWORKS funds with local CBOs. Individual contract amounts for the provision of these ancillary employment and training services are expected to exceed \$100,000 and will follow the Board of Supervisors policies regarding the reporting of contracts and agreements.

# **POLICY ISSUE:**

The recommended action supports the Board of Supervisors' goals and priorities as follows:

# A Strong Local Economy

WIA funds are invested in workforce development in coordination with economic development through the Alliance Board. This represents a unique approach to improving economic conditions in Stanislaus County

# Efficient Delivery of Public Services

Approval of the recommendations allows for contracts for employment and training services to be implemented expeditiously in response to the needs of employers and job seekers alike. Approval of the recommendations also allows for the continued operation of the Alliance Worknet One-Stop Resource Centers which provide employment services to Stanislaus County residents.

The Stanislaus County Community Services Agency, the Employment Development Department, the Stanislaus Economic Development and Workforce Alliance, Modesto Junior College, California Department of Rehabilitation, Central Valley Opportunity Center, Area Agency on Aging, the Stanislaus Literacy Center, and the Stanislaus County Office of Education.

There are no additional staffing impacts associated with this item. Funding provided through the Workforce Investment Act and Community Services Agency support staffing levels as contained in the Recommended Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2012-2013.

The purpose of this Information Notice is to announce the release of Workforce Investment Act (WIA) formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Investment Area (LWIA) for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker (DW) funding streams for Program Year (PY) 2012-13. These allocations are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) to the states (refer to DOL Training and Employment Guidance Letter [TEGL] 19-11 dated March 16, 2012).

Please note that this notice is being issued for LWIA planning and budgeting purposes only because the state has not yet received the federal notice of obligations (NOO's) for any of the funding streams. Once the NOO's have been received, Youth allocations will be released to LWIAs immediately. The Adult and Dislocated Worker allocations will be released as soon as we receive federal and state spending authority for these funds.

As in previous years, the allocations for the Adult and Youth funding streams were calculated using the "hold-harmless" factor. Additionally, as approved by the California Workforce Investment Board on November 30, 2006, the DW funding now contains a "hold-harmless" factor. This hold-harmless provision for DW helps mitigate the year-to-year volatility by ensuring each LWIA receives no less than 90 percent of their average percentage share from the prior two years. The LWIAs that receive more than 100 percent of their average percentage share from the prior two years were proportionately reduced by an amount to total funding necessary for those LWIAs that were below the 90 percent threshold.

Additionally, the DW allocation formula contains the following four factors and their weights:

- Long-Term Unemployment Insurance (UI) claims—weighted at 40 percent
- Mid-Term UI Claims—weighted at 30 percent
- Short-Term UI Claims—weighted at 10 percent
- Long-Term Civilian Unemployment—weighted at 20 percent

The allotments to California and the amounts available for formula allocation to the LWIAs are listed below. Attachment 1 reflects the total amounts each LWIA will receive

#### 1. Compliance

In performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will fully comply with:

- a). The provisions of the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and all regulations, legislation, directives, policies, procedures and amendments issued pursuant thereto.
- b). All State legislation and regulations to the extent permitted by federal law and all policies, directives and/or procedures, which implement the WIA.
- c). The provisions of Public Law 107-288, Jobs for Veterans Act, as the law applies to Department of Labor (DOL) job training programs
- d). Subgrantee will ensure diligence in managing programs under this subgrant agreement, including performing appropriate monitoring activities and taking prompt corrective action against known violations of the WIA. Subgrantee agrees to conform to the provisions of the WIA and the contract requirements as referenced in 29 CFR Part 95, Appendix A and 29 CFR, Part 97.36(i)(1-13).

This subgrant agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes all negotiations, verbal or otherwise and any other agreement between the parties hereto. This subgrant agreement is not intended to and will not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. Subgrantee represents and warrants it is free to enter into and fully perform this subgrant agreement.

## 2. Certification/Assurances

Except as otherwise indicated, the following certifications apply to all Subgrantee's.

- a). Corporate Registration: The Subgrantee, if it is a corporation, certifies it is registered with the Secretary of State of the State of California.
- b). The Subgrantee agrees to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, which, prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to ADA. (42 U.S.C.12101 et seq.
- c). Sectarian Activities: The Subgrantee certifies that this subgrant agreement does not provide for the advancement or aid to any religious sect, church or creed, or sectarian purpose nor does it help to support or sustain any school, college, university, hospital or other. institution controlled by any religious creed, church, or sectarian denomination whatsoever, as specified by Article XVI, Section 5, of the Constitution, regarding separation of church and state.
- d). National Labor Relations Board: The Subgrantee (if not a public entity), by signing this subgrant agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury, that no more than one final unappeasable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has been issued against the Subgrantee within the immediately preceding two-year period because of Subgrantee's failure to comply with an order of a federal court, which orders the Subgrantee to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board (PCC10296).
- e). Prior Findings: Subgrantee, by signing this subgrant agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury, that it has not failed to satisfy any major condition in a current or previous subgrant agreement with the DOL or the State of California and has not failed to satisfy conditions relating to the resolution of a final finding and determination, including repayment of debts.
- f). Drug-Free Workplace Certification: By signing this subgrant agreement the Subgrantee hereby certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the Subgrantee will comply with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 and will provide a drug-free workplace by taking the following actions:
  - (1). Publish a statement notifying employees that unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited and specifying actions to be taken against employees for violations.
  - (2). Establish a Drug-Free Awareness Program as required to inform employees about:
    - the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
    - the person's or organization's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
    - any available counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance programs; and,
    - penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations.
  - (3). Every employee who works on this subgrant agreement will:
    - receive a copy of the company's drug-free policy statement; and,

Failure to comply with all requirements of the certifications in Section 2 may result in suspension of payment under this subgrant agreement or termination of this subgrant agreement or both, and the Subgrantee may be ineligible for award of future state subgrant agreements/contracts if the department determines that any of the following has occurred:

(1) false information on the certifications, or (2) violation of the terms of the certifications by failing to carry out the requirements as noted above.

#### o). Salary and Bonus Limitations:

## 3. Standards of Conduct

The following standards apply to all Subgrantees.

- a). General Assurance: Every reasonable course of action will be taken by the Subgrantee in order to maintain the integrity of this expenditure of public funds and to avoid favoritism and questionable or improper conduct. This subgrant agreement will be administered in an impartial manner, free from efforts to gain personal, financial or political gain. Subgrantee agrees to conform to the nondiscrimination requirements as referenced in WIA, Section 188.
- b). Avoidance of Conflict of Economic Interest: An executive or employee of the Subgrantee, an elected official in the area or a member of the Local Board, will not solicit or accept money or any other consideration from a third person, for the performance of an act reimbursed in whole or part by the Subgrantee or Subgrantor: Supplies, materials, equipment or services purchased with subgrant agreement funds will be used solely for purposes allowed under this subgrant agreement. No member of the Local Board will cast a vote on the provision of services by that member (or any organization, which that member represents) or vote on any matter which would provide direct financial benefit to that member (or immediate family of the member) or any business or organization which the member directly represents.

# 4. Coordination

Subgrantee will, to the maximum extent feasible, coordinate all programs and activities supported under this part with other programs under the WIA, including the Wagner-Peyser Act, Title 38 of the United States Code, and other employment and training programs at the state and local level.

Subgrantee will consult with the appropriate labor organizations and/or employer representatives in the design, operation or modification of the programs under this subgrant agreement.

# 5. Subcontracting

- a). Any of the work or services specified in this subgrant agreement which will be performed by other than by the Subgrantee will be evidenced by a written agreement specifying the terms and conditions of such performance.
- b). The Subgrantee will maintain and adhere to an appropriate system, consistent with federal,

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state and local law, for the award and monitoring of contracts which contain acceptable standards for insuring accountability.

c). The system for awarding contracts will contain safeguards to insure that the Subgrantee does not contract with any entity whose officers have been convicted of fraud or misappropriation of funds within the last two years.

#### 6. Insurance

Except for city and county governmental entities, Subgrantees must provide the Subgrantor evidence of the coverage specified in a, b, c and d below. The evidence of coverage shall include the registration number of the subgrant agreement for identification purposes.

- a). Subgrantee will obtain a fidelity bond in an amount of not less than \_\_\_\_\_\_, prior to the receipt of funds under this subgrant agreement. If the bond is canceled or reduced, Subgrantee will immediately so notify the Subgrantor. In the event the bond is canceled or revised, the Subgrantor will make no further disbursements until it is assured that adequate coverage has been obtained.
- b). Subgrantee will provide general liability insurance with a combined limit of \$1,000,000 or public liability and property damage coverage with a combined limit of not less than \$1,000,000.
- c). Subgrantee will provide broad form automobile liability coverage with limits as set forth in (b) above, which applies to both owned/leased and non-owned automobiles used by the Subgrantee or its agents in performance of this subgrant agreement, or, in the event that the Subgrantee will not utilize owned/leased automobiles but intends to require employees, trainees or other agents to utilize their own automobiles in performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will secure and maintain on file from all such employees, trainees or agents a self-certification of automobile insurance coverage.
- d). Subgrantee will provide Worker's Compensation Insurance, which complies with provisions of the California Labor Code, covering all employees of the Subgrantee and all participants enrolled in work experience programs. Medical and Accident Insurance will be carried for those participants not qualifying as "employee" (Section 3350, et seq. of the California Labor Code) for Worker's Compensation.
- e). The Subgrantor will be named as "Certificate Holder" of policies secured in compliance with paragraphs a-d above and will be provided certificates of insurance or insurance company "binders" prior to any disbursement of funds under this subgrant agreement, verifying the insurance requirements have been complied with. The coverage noted in b and c above must contain the following clauses:
  - (1). Insurance coverage will not be canceled or changed unless 30 days prior to the effective date of cancellation or change written notice is sent by the Subgrantee to:

- (2). State of California, its officers, agents, employees and servants are included as additional insured, but only insofar as the operations under this subgrant agreement are concerned.
- (3). The State of California is not responsible for payment of premiums or assessments on this policy

### 7. Resolution

A county, city, district or other local public body must provide the state with a copy of a resolution, order, motion, or ordinance of the local governing body which by law has authority to enter into an agreement, authorizing execution of this subgrant agreement. Preferably resolutions should authorize a designated position rather than a named individual.

# 8. Funding

It is mutually understood between the parties that this subgrant agreement may have been written before ascertaining the availability of congressional and legislative appropriation of funds, for the mutual benefit of both parties, in order to avoid program and fiscal delays which would occur if the subgrant agreement was executed after that determination was made.

This subgrant agreement is valid and enforceable only if (1) sufficient funds are made available by the State Budget Act of the appropriate state fiscal years covered by this subgrant agreement for the purposes of this program and; (2) sufficient funds available to the state by the United States Government for the fiscal years covered by this subgrant agreement for the purposes of this program. In addition, this subgrant agreement is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the Congress and Legislature or any statue enacted by the

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Congress and Legislature which may affect the provisions, terms, or funding of this subgrant agreement in any manner.

- a). At the expiration of the terms of this subgrant agreement or upon termination prior to the expiration of this subgrant agreement, funds not obligated for the purpose of this subgrant agreement will be immediately remitted to the Subgrantor, and no longer available to the Subgrantee.
- b). The Subgrantor retains the right to suspend financial assistance, in whole or in part, to protect the integrity of the funds or to ensure proper operation of the program, providing the Subgrantee is given prompt notice and the opportunity for an informal review of the Subgrantor's decision. The Chief Deputy Director or his designee will perform this informal review and will issue the final administrative decision within 60 days of receiving the written request for review. Failure on the part of the Subgrantee or a Subcontractor of the Subgrantee to comply with the provisions of this subgrant agreement, or with the WIA or regulations, when such failure involves fraud or misappropriation of funds, may result in immediate withholding of funds.
- c). The local Chief Elected Official (CEO) of a unit of general local government designated as a Local Workforce Investment Area (LWIA) shall be liable to the EDD for all funds not expended in accordance with WIA, and shall return to the EDD all of those funds. If there is more than one unit of general local government in a LWIA, the CEO(s) will be the individual(s) designated under an agreement executed by the CEO(s) of the local units of government. The CEO(s) designated under the agreement shall be liable to the EDD for all funds not expended in accordance with the WIA, and shall return to the EDD all of those funds.

# 9. Accounting and Cash Management

- a). Subgrantee will comply with controls, record keeping and fund accounting procedure requirements of WIA, federal and state regulations and directives to ensure the proper disbursal of, and accounting for, program funds paid to the Subgrantee and disbursed by the Subgrantee, under this subgrant agreement.
- b). Subgrantee will submit requests for cash to coincide with immediate cash needs and assure that no excess cash is on deposit in their accounts or the accounts of any sub-contracting service provider in accordance with procedures established by the Subgrantor. Failure to adhere to these provisions may result in suspending cash draw down privileges and providing funds through a reimbursement process.
- c). The Subgrantor retains the authority to adjust specific amounts of cash requested if the Subgrantor's records and subsequent verification with the Subgrantee indicate that the Subgrantee has an excessive amount of cash in its account.
- d). Income (including interest income) generated as a result of the receipt of WIA activities, will be utilized in accordance with policy and procedures established by the Subgrantor. Subgrantee will account for any such generated income separately.
- e). Subgrantee shall not be required to maintain a separate bank account but shall separately account for WIA funds on deposit. All funding under this subgrant agreement, will be made by check or wire transfer payable to the Subgrantee for deposit in Subgrantee's bank account or city and county governmental bank accounts. To provide for the necessary and proper internal controls, funds should be withdrawn and disbursed by no less than two representatives of the Subgrantee. The Subgrantor will have a lien upon any balance of WIA funds in these accounts, which will take priority over all other liens or claims.

### 10. Amendments

This subgrant agreement may be unilaterally modified by the Subgrantor under the following circumstances:

- a). There is an increase or decrease in federal or state funding levels.
- b). A modification to the Subgrant is required in order to implement an adjustment to a Subgrantee's plan.
- c). Funds awarded to the Subgrantee have not been expended in accordance with the schedule included in the approved Subgrantee's plan. After consultation with the Subgrantee, the Subgrantor has determined that funds will not be spent in a timely manner, and such funds are for that reason to the extent permitted by and in a manner consistent with state and federal law, regulations and policies, reverting to the Subgrantor.
- ${\tt d})$  . There is a change in state and federal law or regulation requiring a change in the provisions of this subgrant agreement.
- e). An amendment is required to change the Subgrantees' name as listed on this subgrant agreement. Upon receipt of legal documentation of the name change the state will process the amendment. Payment of invoices presented with a new name cannot be paid prior to

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approval of said amendment.

Except as provided above, this subgrant agreement may be amended only in writing by the mutual agreement of both parties.

#### 11. Reporting

Subgrantee will compile and submit reports of activities, expenditures, status of cash and closeout information by the specified dates as prescribed by the Subgrantor. All expenditure reports must be submitted upon the accrual basis of accounting. Failure to adhere to the reporting requirements of this agreement will result in funds not being released.

#### 12. Termination

This subgrant agreement may be terminated in whole or in part for either of the two following circumstances:

- a). Termination for Convenience Either the Subgrantor or the Subgrantee may request a termination, in whole or in part, for convenience. The Subgrantee will give a ninety- (90) calendar-day advance notice in writing to the Subgrantor. The Subgrantor will give a ninety (90) calendar-day advance notice in writing to the Subgrantee.
- b). Termination for Cause The Subgrantor may terminate this subgrant agreement in whole or in part when it has determined that the Subgrantee has substantially violated a specific provision of the WIA regulations or implementing state legislation and corrective action has not been taken.
  - (1). All notices of termination must be in writing and be delivered personally or by deposit in the U. S. Mail, postage prepaid, "Certified Mail-Return Receipt Requested", and will be deemed to have been given at the time of personal delivery or of the date of postmark by the U. S. Postal Service.

# 13. Records

- a). If participants are served under this subgrant agreement, the Subgrantee will establish a participant data system as prescribed by the Subgrantor.
- b). Subgrantee will retain all records pertinent to this subgrant agreement for a period of three years from the date of final payment of this subgrant agreement. If, at the end of three years, there is litigation or an audit involving those records, the Subgrantee will retain the records until the resolution of such litigation or audit. Refer to 29 CFR, Part 97.42(b)(2) or 29 CFR, Part 95.53(b)(1).
- c). The Subgrantor and/or the U. S. DOL, or their designee (refer to 29 CFR, Part 95.48(d) or 29 CFR Part 97.36(i)(10)) will have access to and right to examine, monitor and audit all records, documents, conditions and activities related to programs funded by this subgrant agreement. For purposes of this section, "access to" means that the Subgrantee shall at all times maintain within the State of California a complete set of records and documents related to programs funded by this agreement. The Subgrantee shall comply with this requirement regardless of whether it ceases to operate or maintain a presence within the State of California before the expiration of the subgrant. Subgrantee's performance under the terms and conditions herein specified will be subject to an evaluation by the Subgrantor of the adequacy of the services performed, timeliness of response and a general impression of the competency of the firm and its staff.

## 14. Audits

a). The Subgrantee will maintain and make available to auditors, at all levels, accounting and program records including supporting source documentation and cooperate with all auditors. All governmental and non-profit organizations must follow the audit requirements of OMB (single audit or program-specific audit requirement) Circular A-133 (29 CFR 97.26 and 29 CFR 95.26).

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b). The Subgrantee and/or auditors performing monitoring or audits of the Subgrantee or its sub-contracting service providers will immediately report to the Subgrantor any incidents of fraud, abuse or other criminal activity in relation to this subgrant agreement, the WIA, or its regulations.

#### 15. Disallowed Costs

Except to the extent that the state determines it will assume liability, the Subgrantee will be liable for and will repay, to the Subgrantor, any amounts expended under this subgrant agreement found not to be in accordance with WIA including, but not limited to, disallowed costs. Such repayment will be from funds (Non-Federal), other than those received under the WIA.

#### 16. Conflicts

- a). Subgrantee will cooperate in the resolution of any conflict with the U. S. DOL that may occur from the activities funded under this agreement.
- b). In the event of a dispute between the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee over any part of this subgrant agreement, the dispute may be submitted to non-binding arbitration upon the consent of both the Subgrantor and the Subgrantee. An election for arbitration pursuant to this provision will not preclude either party from pursuing any remedy for relief otherwise available.

#### 17. Grievances and Complaint System

Subgrantee will establish and maintain a grievance and complaint procedure in compliance with the WIA, federal regulations and state statues, regulations and policy.

#### 18. Property

All property, whether finished or unfinished documents, data, studies and reports prepared or purchased by the Subgrantee under this subgrant agreement, will be disposed of in accordance with the direction of the Subgrantor. In addition, any tools and/or equipment furnished to the Subgrantee by the Subgrantor and/or purchased by the Subgrantee with funds pursuant to this subgrant agreement will be limited to use within the activities outlined in this subgrant agreement and will remain the property of the United States Government and/or the Subgrantor. Upon termination of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee will immediately return such tools and/or equipment to the Subgrantor or dispose of them in accordance with the direction of the Subgrantor.

# 19. Intellectual Property Provisions

### a). Federal Funding

In any subgrant funded in whole or in part by the federal government, Subgrantor may acquire and maintain the Intellectual Property rights, title, and ownership, which result directly or indirectly from the subgrant, except as provided in 37 Code of Federal Regulations part 401.14. However, pursuant to 29 CFR section 97.34 the federal government shall have a royalty-free, non-exclusive, irrevocable, paid-up license throughout the world to use, duplicate, or dispose of such Intellectual Property throughout the world in any manner for governmental purposes and to have and permit others to do so.

## b). Ownership

- (1). Except where Subgrantor has agreed in a signed writing to accept a license, Subgrantor shall be and remain, without additional compensation, the sole owner of any and all rights, title and interest in all intellectual property, from the moment of creation, whether or not jointly conceived, that are made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement.
- (2). For the purposes of this subgrant agreement, Intellectual Property means recognized protectable rights and interest such as: patents, (whether or not issued) copyrights, trademarks, service marks, applications for any of the foregoing, inventions, trade secrets, trade dress, logos, insignia, color combinations, slogans, moral rights, right of publicity, author's rights, contract and licensing rights, works, mask works, industrial design rights, rights of priority, know how, design flows, methodologies, devices, business processes, developments, innovations, good will, any data or information maintained, collected or stored in the ordinary course of business by Subgrantor, and all other legal rights protecting intangible proprietary information as may exist now and/or hereafter come into existence, and all renewals and extensions, regardless of whether those rights arise under the laws of the United States, or any other state, country or jurisdiction.
  - (a). For the purposes of the definition of Intellectual Property, "works" means all literary works, writings and printed matter including the medium by which they

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are recorded or reproduced, photographs, art work, pictorial and graphic representations and works of a similar nature, film, motion pictures, digital images, animation cells, and other audiovisual works including positives and negatives thereof, sound recordings, tapes, educational materials, interactive videos, computer software and any other materials or products created, produced, conceptualized and fixed in a tangible medium of expression. It includes preliminary and final products and any materials and information developed for the purposes of producing those final products. "Works" does not include articles submitted to peer review or reference journals or independent research projects.

- (3). In the performance of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee may exercise and utilize certain of its Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. In addition, under this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee may access and utilize certain of Subgrantor's intellectual property in existence prior to the effective date of this subgrant agreement. Except as otherwise set forth herein, Subgrantee shall not use any of Subgrantor's Intellectual Property now existing or hereafter existing for any purposes without the prior written permission of Subgrantor. Except as otherwise set forth herein, neither the Subgrantee nor Subgrantor shall give any ownership interest in or rights to its Intellectual Property to the other Party. If, during the term of this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee accesses any third-party Intellectual Property that is licensed to Subgrantor. Subgrantee agrees to abide by all license and confidentiality restrictions applicable to Subgrantor in the third-party's license agreement.
- (4). Subgrantee agrees to cooperate with Subgrantor in establishing or maintaining Subgrantor's exclusive rights in the Intellectual Property, and in assuring Subgrantor's sole rights against third parties with respect to the Intellectual Property. If the Subgrantee enters into any agreements or subcontracts with other parties in order to perform this subgrant agreement, Subgrantee shall require the terms of the agreement(s) to include all Intellectual Property provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i). - (5). - (6). Subgrantee further agrees to assist and cooperate with Subgrantor in all reasonable respects, and execute all documents and, subject to reasonable availability, give testimony and take all further acts reasonably necessary to acquire, transfer, maintain, and enforce Subgrantor's Intellectual Property rights and interests.

- (2). Nothing in this provision shall restrict, limit, or otherwise prevent Subgrantee from using any ideas, concepts, know-how, methodology or techniques related to its performance under this subgrant agreement, provided that Subgrantee's use does not infringe the patent, copyright, trademark rights, license or other Intellectual Property rights of Subgrantor or third party, or result in a breach or default of any provisions of paragraph nineteen a) through nineteen i) or result in a breach of any provisions of law relating to confidentiality.

# d). Copyright

(1) Subgrantee agrees that for purposes of copyright law, all works (as defined in Ownership, paragraph nineteen (b) (2) (a) of authorship made by or on behalf of

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Subgrantee in connection with Subgrantee's performance of this subgrant agreement shall be deemed "works made for hire." Subgrantee further agrees that the work of each person utilized by Subgrantee in connection with the performance of this subgrant agreement will be a "work made for hire," whether that person is an employee of Subgrantee or that person has entered into an agreement with Subgrantee to perform the work. Subgrantee shall enter into a written agreement with any such person that:
(i) all work performed for Subgrantee shall be deemed a "work made for hire" under the Copyright Act and (ii) that person shall assign all right, title, and interest to Subgrantor to any work product made, conceived, derived from or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement. Refer to 29 CFR, Part 95, Appendix A 5 or Part 97.34.

(2) All materials, including, but not limited to, computer software, visual works or text, reproduced or distributed pursuant to this subgrant agreement that include Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Subgrantee or Subgrantor and which result directly or indirectly from this subgrant agreement may not be reproduced or disseminated without prior written permission from Subgrantor.

#### e). Patent Rights

If such inventions result from research and development work specifically included within the subgrant agreement's scope of work, then Subgrantee agrees to assign to Subgrantor, without addition compensation, all its right, title and interest in and to such inventions and to assist Subgrantor in securing United States and foreign patents with respect thereto.

There are currently no actual or threatened claims by any such third party based on an alleged violation of any such right by Subgrantee.



# Workforce Investment Act Employment Development Department Proposal Narrative Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet in Partnership with Project Yes

# Part A: Required Project Elements

1. Partnership with an established Career Technical Education Pathway Programs.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet in partnership with Project YES (a WIA funded program) has established a long-standing relationship in serving at-risk youth in the region. For the past nine years Project YES has successfully served over 1,250 at-risk youth in attaining educational and employment related goals. Through this project The Alliance Worknet will be partnering with the existing WIA funded youth service provider in the area, Project Yes and the existing Manufacturing high school based training programs in the cities of Ceres, Modesto and Patterson.

The manufacturing industry in Stanislaus County is in high demand for trained, skilled employees who are ready to enter the industry and have the potential to learn additional skills and advance to other positions within the industry. Even with the current economic recession negatively affecting the labor market throughout California, the manufacturing industry has held steady the number of people it employs. With a large number of highly skilled workers set to retire in the next five to ten years, employers are seeking to employee youth and young adults that have a basic knowledge of manufacturing and basic welding skills that can be trained over the next few years to replace those that are retiring. The skills gap will be met through college level manufacturing courses offered while still in high school, with additional courses taken at Modesto Junior College or a local trade college to qualify the student to earn an industry related certificate.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet is the working entity of the local Workforce Investment Board and therefore has a built-in relationship with the WIB. Additionally, the Alliance Worknet has successfully formed effective partnerships with Modesto Junior College and other post–secondary training providers throughout the San Joaquin Valley. The Alliance Worknet partnered with the Project Yes in 2004 in response to the unmet need of the at-risk youth in the community. This partnership resulted in the successful creation of an integrated and comprehensive workforce and education service model, serving thousands of at-risk youth through high-quality services in Stanislaus County. Lastly, the formal agreements have been established with over 200 employers as part of the WIA year-round youth and the Careers in Manufacturing programs. Many of these employers also serve on the Career Technical Education Advisory Committee (*Attachment 1*), providing their expertise of their industries, skills required, and jobs available.

Additionally, this effort will link with the existing Careers in Manufacturing Program which serves as a partnership between the Manufacturer's Council of the Central Valley, Stanislaus Economic Development & Workforce Alliance and the Stanislaus Partners in Education (SPIE). The CIM brings together industry related employers, educators and workforce development professionals. The CIM increases the awareness of young people considering careers in manufacturing, promotes industrial training programs offered at Modesto Junior College, fills current and projected openings in the manufacturing industry, and reduces the drop-out rate at area high schools.

Through this effort will be partnering with the high school manufacturing programs in Ceres, Modesto and Patterson. Specifically, Ceres High School's Green and Clean Manufacturing Academy was developed in 2009. This Academy was developed in response to the need to formalize the manufacturing training that was occurring, and bring into the Academy the industry commitment to internships, mentoring and instructional support, as well as concurrent course enrollment with Modesto Junior College.

2. Clear plan for implementing "Earn and Learn" or other "bridges" to employment in advanced manufacturing.

The Alliance Worknet and Project YES are committed to providing youth with the best possible advantages and training to enter the workforce prepared for success. Specifically, we have successfully **increased** linkages between secondary and postsecondary educational institutions that include the following activities: a) Expanded concurrent credit course offerings with Modesto Junior College; b) Provided college level courses on high school campuses through Modesto Junior College, California State University Stanislaus, Merced Community College, Delta College, and UC Merced; c) Created partnerships with higher education institution's Outreach Programs; d) Promoted educational and career transition information to high school sites, provided by various college School-to-Career programs; and e) Increased awareness among high school counselors of the vocational opportunities offered through local community colleges.

As part of the Alliance Worknet's efforts to work with all education stakeholders and relevant agencies for employment and training, the Alliance is continually expanding existing partnerships and developing new ones with these groups and entities with the goal to create CTE programs that are comprehensive and do not duplicate others in the area.

Participating youth (in- and out-of-school) will participate in work experience opportunities that are directly related to their career path that provides practical job experience – bridging what is learned through Career Technical Education to post-secondary training and then to a living - wage job.

The difference that makes this program partnership unique above all others in the area, is the direct involvement of the local employers and Modesto Junior College in the design of the content and skills being taught in the CTE courses, alongside the services provided by Project YES. This ensures that the employers can be confident that our students are ready and have the necessary skill sets to be successful within their companies.

Youth in the region have direct access to CTE programs that meet their needs to be employed shortly out of high school with a living-wage job. The Alliance provides the <u>direct</u> link between K-12 education, college and employment. The Alliance and its partners bridge the historical gap between education and industry by actively involving local employers, such as Gallo Winery, Con-Agra Foods, JM Equipment, and other manufacturing industry employers.

Additionally, the Ceres High Manufacturing Academy is a <u>unique</u> program that is designed to provide students with education, skills and employment opportunities with well-known local companies. The element that makes this program so unique is the level of involvement and commitment by not only educators and employers, but also by the local economic development agencies. Students in this program will obtain college level credit while attending high school

through a <u>concurrent credit</u> program with Modesto Junior College, and then after one year of continued training at MJC will be qualified to earn an industry accepted certificate in a specific field and then have opportunities for employment with the industry partners beginning at "entry level" wages that range from \$15 to \$25 per hour or higher.

Academy students explore various career options during their participation in the Academy, as a result of the specific skills they are learning that can result in successful employment in the manufacturing field. Students also participate in internships following their 11<sup>th</sup> grade year to gain real-world experience. Additionally, students are earning college credits while attending the Academy and are being prepared to continue their education and training at Modesto Junior College, to ensure their readiness to enter the workforce. Each of the CTE teachers currently providing instruction are approved by Modesto Junior College to provide instruction that meets the postsecondary concurrent credit requirement. Academy students are also provided opportunities for internships and work-based learning experiences following the 11<sup>th</sup> grade year, by our CTE business partners and CTE teachers. These internships are scheduled during the summer months, as well as the senior year, after school and on weekends. The work hours of these internships do not exceed those established as part of the District's existing Work Permit restrictions, to ensure the student and internship provider are in compliance with state and local child labor laws. All students participate in a job readiness workshop seminar prior to being approved for an internship opportunity. This seminar series provides basic skills training students will need to be successful on a job: appropriate attire, punctuality, communicating effectively with others, working in a team, manners and attitude, and so much more.

Our WIA partnering program, Project YES, has successfully developed and implemented proven service strategies for participants. Service strategies for each participant are developed through the use of an Individual Service Strategy plan (ISS), utilizing available benchmark data. The Innersight Experience assessment is used to assist participants in identifying a specific career goal that coincides with their individual interests and abilities. Resources, such as the Stanislaus County Occupational Outlook Report, inform participants of potential earnings and employability in their chosen field.

Project YES also provides preparation opportunities for post-secondary education, when it is the stated goal for a participant. All Project YES participants are required to attend at least one college information session or workshop. CUSD's comprehensive high school program provides preparation for postsecondary educational services for in-school youth. Argus High School is a continuation high school that offers academic support programs in which students receive remediation in core subject areas and credits for attendance. Out-of-school youth that are basic skills deficient or lacking a high school diploma, are provided with GED preparation and tutoring through direct services and partners services in multiple locations throughout Stanislaus County, including Stanislaus Literacy Center (Turlock location) and Ceres Adult School (Ceres location). Other older youth demonstrating need for remediation are referred to Modesto Junior College for early college and remediation services. Project YES also provides on-site tutoring for participants that need one-on-one assistance with their course work.

Project YES establishes strong links between academic and occupational learning as part of each participant's Individual Service Strategy. These links can better be described as the process of assessing a participant's academic strengths and weakness and connecting each to an

appropriate occupational learning environment. In-school youth are guided to take advantage of the educational opportunities that would best prepare them for their chosen career path. In-school youth are also required to maintain a 2.5 GPA with no failing grades to qualify for work experience. Out-of-school youth's academic needs are assessed, and when determined appropriate receive academic remediation to enhance their employability.

# Participants are prepared for unsubsidized employment through varied methods:

- ROP Programs: This vocational training allows participants to gain specific job skills that could then be practiced and perfected through work experience.
- Subsidized work experience is anticipated for 80% of program participants. This work experience may take place in the summer or year round, depending on the needs of the individual.
- Employability Skills Classes; are provided in the form of weekly workshops facilitated by the Program Manager, with guest speakers providing relevant and in-depth information on various employment related topics. Out-of-school youth also attend employability skills classes as deemed appropriate. Employability skills classes will address many issues that participants may have with successful employment, such as lack of work ethic, lack of knowledge about the world of work, expectations of employers, and other limitations.
- Supportive Services; include bus passes, clothing, tools, equipment, and other items allowed within WIA policy, are provided as needed to prepare clients for successful unsubsidized employment.

Counseling Services are available to participants who have challenges needing to be addressed prior to successful job placement. These services are provided by the Center for Human Services in collaboration with Ceres Healthy Start and are housed in the Project Yes facility for convenient access and availability to participants and their families.

# 3. Collaboration with a skills credentialing entity.

It is anticipated that participants will obtain needed skills and competencies that will be provided through the Manufacturing Skills Standards Council's (MSSC) Certified Production Technician (CPT) curriculum. This training leads to an industry recognized credential in manufacturing that is highly desirable in the current advanced manufacturing environment. The credential includes modules in four core curriculum areas; Safety, Quality Practices & Measurement, Manufacturing Processes & Production, and Maintenance Awareness. Each learning module is taught individually and when all four modules are complete, the participant earns a full Certified Production Technician industry recognized credential. Ceres Unified School District plans to train the Manufacturing Academy instructor to be a certified MSSC CPT instructor and staff will be able to administer the certification proctoring on-site, or use Modesto Junior College proctors, to ready participants for employment.

The federal National Skill Standards Board formally recognized MSSC as the standards and certification "Voluntary Partnership" for all manufacturing sectors in 1998 and officially endorsed MSSC's industry-led, nationally validated standards in 2001. MSSC has since been used by the U.S. Departments of Labor, Education, Defense and Veterans Affairs, Job Corps and the Federal Prison System. MSSC's delivers these tools through a nationwide network of over 630 authorized

instructors and 397 authorized test sites in 39 states. To date, MSSC has given over 52,000 assessments and issued 42,000 credentials.

This planned approach will enable participating youth to obtain industry recognized certifications that are relevant to local manufacturers, portable, and in-demand on a national scale. In-school youth will begin their skills training while attending Ceres High School's Manufacturing Program, while out-of-school youth will receive academic remediation to enable them to meet the conditions of employers for hiring, and complete the MSSC CPT curriculum. Case management ensures that each participant will continue on to further training, through a training provider or an employer (work experience, on-the-job training) as part of the Individual Service Strategy designed for each participant at the beginning of the program and with the goal of obtaining unsubsidized employment. Additionally, barriers to success are addressed to enable each youth the opportunity to succeed.

# 4. Broad stakeholder buy-in.

The Alliance Worknet and its partners are continually developing effective connections with local and county-wide agencies that have strong links to the job market and employers in the area. These connections are facilitated through formal and informal communication including telephone, fax, and email, as well as attendance at the Career Technical Education Advisory Committee meetings, Chamber of Commerce events, Career Fairs, Open Houses and through individual invitations to employers to visit the youth programs.

The Alliance Worknet has worked diligently and consistently to build a wide ranging collaboration with local businesses, post-secondary training providers, referral and resources agencies and local officials, to create a database of partners that can best serve the needs of youth today. The majority of partners represent businesses that are willing to provide youth participants with subsidized and unsubsidized work experience opportunities. In most cases, these opportunities have led to long term employment for our youth. Employers now directly contact Alliance Worknet, to inquire if more youth are ready for their work experience and/or are seeking employment opportunities.

Business partners from Central Valley and the surrounding area that include: Gallo, Kraft, Con Agra, Frito Lay, Racor, and the Manufacturers Council of the Central Valley have participated in identifying industry needs and employment opportunities. Representatives of these companies have committed to continue their partnerships with the Alliance Worknet and its partners in providing employment opportunities to participating youth that successfully complete the program and obtain skills that result in an industry recognized certificate. Evidence of the commitment of all stakeholders to the Regions Manufacturing programs is demonstrated in their continued involvement in the program since the beginning phases of each program site (Ceres High, Patterson High, Johansen High (Modesto). The authentic process undertaken for program development involved the long-standing CTE instructors, site and district administration, local business industry representatives, and the Industrial Technology Dept. staff of Modesto Junior College, including Director, Pedro Mendez.

Post-secondary commitment is evidenced by the fact that MJC continues to provide resources and funding to support on-going CTE and core teacher collaboration to evolve the integrated curriculum in all classes. The purpose of this integration is to provide CTE students with industry related instruction while still meeting the California State Common Core Standards and CTE Model Curriculum Standards for student achievement. The resulting outcome has been the development

of curriculum that is problem or themed-based that promotes an understanding of the applications of academic knowledge and skill in the manufacturing industry.

Additionally, the Alliance works closely with local industry to insure that CTE teachers effectively use applied learning to contribute to the academic, career and technical knowledge of students. CTE teachers are provided opportunities to work as interns during the summer months with the manufacturing business partners, as well as receive additional training from the Modesto Junior College's Industrial Technology instructors to ensure that a "real world" perspective and appropriate connected instruction can be provided at the high school level of the program.

Further examples of stakeholder "buy in" are provided through the Manufacturing Academy program at Ceres High School that involved members of the Career Technical Education Advisory Committee. The function of this Committee is to provide understanding between participating schools, the Ceres community, and business and industry. The CTE Advisory Committee and the individual pathway subcommittees consist of individuals representing the school district, school administrators, lead teachers, local industry businesses, community colleges, private sector, parents and students that provide ongoing development, implementation, and evaluation of the programs. Given that experts in each pathway serve on the CTE Advisory Committee, it is their direct perspectives and knowledge of their industry that is most beneficial in guiding the Committee's comprehensive and realistic discussions of the direction of the CTE Programs. experiences of placed students, their parents, employers of our youth and CUSD staff are highly valued as critical components in the process of determining effectiveness and relevancy of the program services and pathways to this community. Ceres Unified School District is committed to continuing the pursuit of representatives from the community to serve on the CTE Advisory Committee and provide continued guidance and support to the youth of the Ceres community. All partners of this Committee formally commit to participate on an annual basis, with informal agreements for a minimum of five years.

In addition, the Alliance Worknet representatives also serve on the Career Technical Education Advisory Committee of Ceres, solidifying the Alliance's partnerships with local manufacturing employers that provide job opportunities and work experience to the graduates of the Careers In Manufacturing Program. The Alliance continually seeks representatives from the local manufacturers to serve on this Committee in an effort to support the expansion of the representation of this career sector and to improve long-term opportunities for all CTE students in Ceres and throughout the county.

As part of the commitment to providing quality Career Technical Education programs in the region, students, parents and the community are invited to participate as key stakeholders in the planning, development, articulation, review and approval of each district's Career Technical Education Plan. Through a comprehensive review process, the key stakeholders have designed each district's plan to complement other similar CTE programs in Stanislaus County.

Annually, plans are reviewed by the members of the Career Technical Advisory Committee in collaboration with additional district administrators and leaders. Recommendations for modifications to the Plan, based on industry information, local labor needs, economic forecasts and education requirements, are presented to each district's Board of Trustees for approval and implementation.

# 5. Development of an industry sector partnership in advanced manufacturing.

The Alliance Worknet Director, Jeff Rowe serves as the Chair of the Career Technical Education Advisory Committee, solidifying the Alliance's partnerships with local manufacturing employers that provide job opportunities and work experience to the graduates of the *Careers in Manufacturing Program*. The Alliance continually seeks representatives from the local manufacturers to serve on this Committee in an effort to support the expansion of the representation of this career sector and to improve long-term opportunities for all CTE students in Ceres and throughout the county.

Business partners from the region include: Gallo, Kraft, Con Agra, Frito Lay, Racor and the Manufactures Council of the Central Valley have participated in the development of the design of the Manufacturing Programs in the region. Representatives of these companies are committed to continuing to partner with local school districts and Modesto Junior College in providing employment opportunities to students that successfully complete the program after one additional year of education and skill development (that leads to a certificate) from MJC. As an example, *Attachment 4, Green Manufacturing Program Academy* chart provides a summary view of the program from elementary through college, to industry certificate and employment opportunities, as designed for Ceres High's Manufacturing Academy.

# 6. Matching Funds.

The Stanislaus County Alliance Worknet is the working entity of the local Workforce Investment Board and therefore has a built-in relationship with the WIB. Additionally, the Alliance Worknet has successfully formed effective partnerships with Modesto Junior College and other post —secondary training providers throughout the San Joaquin Valley. The Alliance Worknet (partnered with Project YES in 2004 in response to the unmet need of the at-risk youth in the community. This partnership resulted in the successful creation of an integrated and comprehensive workforce and education service model, serving thousands of at-risk youth through high-quality services in Stanislaus County. Lastly, the formal agreements have been established with over 200 employers as part of the WIA year-round youth and the Careers in Manufacturing programs. Many of these employers also serve on the *Career Technical Education Advisory Committee (Attachment 1)*, providing their expertise of their industries, skills required, and jobs available.

Given the fact that Ceres Unified has implemented the Manufacturing Academy Program at Ceres High School, the district level in-kind contributions are numerous and far exceed the 33% match requirement. Just as significant, is the fact that the current industry partners have committed sufficient in-kind contributions that also exceed the 33% match requirement. An example of how the district provides substantial support for the program is through the district's commitment to renovate and modernize the third CTE shop building on the campus. This \$2 million dollar project will provide the final and third state-of-the-art training center for students in the Manufacturing Pathway Program. An example of business/industry partners' commitment to meaningful and ongoing support for the Academy is evidenced by Modesto Junior College's contribution of the use of eight training modules, valued at approximately \$58,000 for the Manufacturing Program. The estimated in-kind value of internships is approximately \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year.

# Part B: Proposed Activities and Services

The Alliance Worknet (AW) has been innovative in providing program services to at-risk youth in Stanislaus County. Through a partnership with Project YES the successful creation of an integrated and comprehensive workforce and education service model resulted that includes: a comprehensive resource center model, employability skills classes and employer seminars regarding skills needed and jobs available, parent involvement, mentoring, Career Fairs, training opportunities, supportive services, incentives for achievement, job shadowing and leadership building opportunities. Project YES also provides an objective evaluation of the academic deficiencies, occupational skill levels, and service needs of each participant through a comprehensive assessment process.

Project YES provides an objective assessment of the academic levels, skill levels, and service needs of each participant through a comprehensive assessment process.

Academic skill level in the areas of reading and math are assessed using the Comprehensive Adult Student Assessment System (CASAS). During the eligibility determination process, the academic skill level of a participant is initially assessed to determine the most appropriate strategy of services for the client. Interpersonal skill levels and service needs are determined through the use of the Individual Service Strategy (ISS) document, and through discussions with referring teachers, counselors, and family members. Vocational skills are determined through certificates of completion of course work or training records. The Program Manager and Youth Advisors develop a close relationship with participants that enable the identification of barriers and needs. At the completion of training, post tests are administered to determine if participants have met their program goals.

All ROP and CTE programs are designed to provide students with real-life work activities, while also meeting existing academic requirements. Several CTE Academies exist in Stanislaus County in which the academic course within the CTE pathway are provided in a school-within-a-school setting allowing for the academic instruction to be delivered in a manner that is directly involving the CTE pathway. We will link our participating youth to the employers that are direct partners in these pathways. For out-of-school youth, their academic instruction and training will be directly linked to their Individual Service Strategy (ISS) goals. For instance, youth meeting the entrance eligibility requirements will be enrolled in technical educational and training programs in the region.

Project YES develops service strategies for each participant that identifies an employment goal. Service strategies for each participant are developed through the use of the ISS, utilizing available benchmark data. The Innersight Experience assessment is used to assist participants in identifying a specific career goal that coincides with their individual interests and abilities. Resources, such as the Stanislaus County Occupational Outlook Report, inform participants of potential earnings and employability in their chosen field.

**Tutoring, study skills, and dropout prevention** programs are available on-site through a partnership with the CUSD Foundation, Monday through Friday, with some Saturday appointments. Bilingual tutors are available to assist students that speak English as a second language. Participants who are struggling academically are assigned a tutoring schedule and are required to attend as a condition of other program participation. Alternative education and out-of-school participants receive tutoring and study skills through the Modesto Junior College remedial education program, as well as through a WIA Youth Adviser.

**Drop-out prevention** is conducted by Youth Advisors administering case management for each participant. In-school youth will be counseled on the benefits of staying in school and communication will occur between the Youth Advisor and the Attendance Department of the districts in which the students are attending (Ceres, Turlock, Keyes, Modesto, Patterson, etc.). The Alliance Worknet will also coordinate supportive services for these students to assist them with staying in school (including, housing, counseling, mental health, etc.). A student incentive program is also utilized through a reward system and more.

Alternative school placement resources are also provided to clients. These resources can include local alternative high schools, adult education programs and community schools. Within walking distance to Ceres Unified School District's One-Stop Resource Center, there are three alternative education programs, including Ceres Adult School, Argus High School and Endeavor Alternative Center. Students attending Argus and Endeavor are able to receive their education through independent study, or in small classroom settings with a minimized schedule that allows for increased flexibility.

Also through this program, participating youth with children may receive subsidized child care as a supportive service, in an effort to eliminate this barrier to attaining education or job placement goals.

## Youth to be served

The Alliance Worknet in partnership with Project YES is proposing to serve 50 qualifying WIA eligible youth throughout the region. This population represents youth who are identified as those having an education barrier and an additional barrier to employment and success. These youth will be recruited from the existing CTE Manufacturing Programs at Ceres High, Johansen High and Patterson High, as well as through peer-to-peer referral, county-based Adult Schools and alternative education schools, county-wide foster agencies, local school counselors, and many other social service agencies serving at-risk youth. The philosophy of Project YES is that all participants will demonstrate their dedication to self-improvement and program activities, and view Project YES as a comprehensive program, not a temporary job service.

# Goals of the Program

Project YES program goals include: 1) exceeding the performance standards set for participating youth in the area of education, getting an industry recognized credential and employment attainment. 2) Identifying specific individual goals for each participant based on his/her assessed needs, including current education levels and skills and/or job readiness. 3) Assisting youth in independence, quality life, obtaining financial improved of relationships/social skills, as well as an improved sense of belonging and community, broadening their horizons of what is possible, and meeting the basic needs of the youth. 4) The final goal is to continue to build a network of support for disconnected youth to support the professional and personal growth. This involves continuing to expand employer relationships (paid and up-paid work experience), identifying appropriate community service opportunities, linking youth participants with mentors and positive adult role models, as well as empowering youth to lead a life of selfsufficiency.

# Benefits of the Program

Participants of Project YES gain a multitude of individual benefits from successful program participation. The two targeted areas in which participants benefit are education and employment.

# **Individual Benefits**

The individual benefits of participation in Project YES include: attainment of high school diploma/GED; attainment of successful long-term employment; identified solutions to barriers such as transportation, health care, clothing, and housing; enrollment and completion of post-secondary education; qualification for financial aid for college; development of (soft) skills to create an effective resume and retention of employment; acquisition of WorkKeys Training; participation in work experience; receipt of mental health counseling; and occupational skills training leading to a recognized credential in manufacturing. An additional benefit for in-school youth is improved attendance, motivation and commitment to attaining a high school diploma resulting in increased opportunities for post-secondary education and employment. During the past eight years Project YES and its participants have experienced many successes that have resulted in a direct return on the public's investment in this program. Of the over 1,600 youth served since 2004, 72% of youth were identified with education/employment attainment as a goal, of which over 90% achieved this goal, far exceeding the state common measurement of 67%.

# Management of the Program

The staff of Project YES currently includes a Program Manager, Youth Advisors, and secretarial support. The Program Manager facilitates all aspects of the program and participates with the Youth Advisors, as case managers. These program staff members facilitate the identification of potential participants, determination of applicant eligibility, conduct assessments, facilitate weekly employability skills classes, supervise work experience, and refer participants to Youth Training Referral Agreements. The Lead Secretary tracks the payroll database of participants, organizes and processes all necessary documents to the Alliance Worknet as required, and conducts general office duties. The Program Manager is directly accountable to the Alliance for all aspects of program services. Project YES is directly supervised by the Ceres Unified School District (CUSD) Assistant Superintendent of Student Support Services. The Assistant Superintendent reports to the Superintendent and the District Board of Trustees. Fiscal management support is provided by the CUSD Business Services Division Budget Analyst, who is supervised by the Director of Business Services. The Assistant Superintendent of Business Services provides final oversight of the Business Services Division.

# **Need for Program Services**

A profile of Stanislaus County youth issues reveals formidable challenges regarding youth, education and crime issues. According to the California Department of Education Dataquest information database, the dropout rate of students in Stanislaus County as of June 2010 was 19.6%, June 2011 was 16.7% and June 2012 was 14.6%. According to the 2010 US Census, 18.2% of families with children under 18 years old live under the poverty level. Moreover, about a quarter of the population has attained less than a high school diploma with only 1.5% of households attaining a bachelor degree or higher. According to the Department of Labor - Bureau of Labor Statistics the documented unemployment rate of 16 to 19 year olds in California is 34.4%. There is a great need in the San Joaquin Valley to provide youth with skills that can lead to living-wage jobs in the area. Not only do our youth need stable incomes, and employers need qualified workers to replace the large amount of workers who are scheduled to retire in the next few years.

Project YES has served at-risk youth with multiple barriers to education and employment over the past nine years with 42% residing in Ceres, and 58% residing in other areas of the county. The table below provides the percentage of youth served who demonstrated barriers upon enrollment, as evidenced by participant reports submitted to the Alliance Worknet.

# **Delivery of Program Services**

The needs of the youth participants are met through a comprehensive matrix of services Project Yes has successfully designed and implemented over the past eight years, as provided in the figure at

Project YES has developed policies and procedures that ensure all clients are served with the highest quality services and programs, while also maintaining compliance with WIA standards.

Alliance Worknet guidelines are followed with fidelity to ensure that program performance is at or above the established standards. When each participant's Individual Service Strategy (ISS) is completed, a map of services is identified that best responds to the client's individual educational and career needs. Struggling clients are provided additional assistance to ensure that attainment skill rates. diploma attainment rates. school and retention rates fall within the set standards. Initial assessments are

thorough and accurate to ensure goals set for clients are reasonable and attainable, within the program period.

For out-of-school youth, program services are targeted to maximize employability and earnings gain once the client has exited the program. Further program detail on the required six WIA required program service and design elements, as well as all nine activity elements are provided in this narrative response. Youth Advisors provide each participating youth with an exit interview, upon successful completion of the program. In this exit interview clients are provided a variety of employment resources available in the community that will continue to provide them links to information about the current job market and employment opportunities.

# **Innovation in Providing Services**

Project YES has provided several innovative services for many years. Many of the innovative services are now imbedded as part of the Activity Elements, including: mentoring, training opportunities, supportive services, incentives for achievement, leadership building opportunities, community service and summer jobs for youth promotion. Innovative services continue to include: a comprehensive resource center model, employability skills classes and seminars, and subsidized housing through a private sector partnership.

Comprehensive One-Stop Resource Center: Since July 1, 2004, Project YES has been located on the Ceres Unified School District compound. Project YES is centrally located in the Ceres community, just two blocks from the downtown area. Project YES provides flexible office hours to accommodate the wide ranging scheduling needs of its clients. As a "one-stop" center, Project YES provides resources, referrals, and services, including access to: counseling services, a computer lab that is internet accessible, and other supportive services for youth and families. With late afternoon and evening hours scheduled, clients have a safe environment in which to accomplish their individual education and career goals. Project YES began implementing this innovative "one-stop" center model during the 2005-2006 year, at which time education and employment partners began providing workshops and training to participating youth on the Project YES compound. Additional partners, including Ceres Healthy Start, Ceres Partnership for Healthy Children (CPHC) and Ceres Adult School also provide services on the compound to participants based on identified needs. For example, Ceres Adult School provides GED preparation courses, Keytrain courses, high school diploma courses, and a series of Job Readiness workshops.

Employability Skills Classes: These classes are scheduled by the Project YES Program Manager. All participants are required to attend these classes before and during any work experience or related activity. The philosophy of Project YES is that all participants will demonstrate their dedication to self-improvement and program activities, and view Project YES as a comprehensive program, not a temporary job service. Class topics include: effective work habits, personal responsibility, taking initiative, educational issues, budgeting, introduction to the Workforce Skills Series: Communication/Teamwork in the workplace, and other related topics as deemed appropriate by the Program Manager. Guest presenters from partnering agencies provide participants with in-depth knowledge and diverse perspectives on various topics. For example, local banks have hosted seminars for Project YES participants to receive an introduction to financial literacy and the importance of managing income effectively.

**Subsidized Housing**: Project YES developed partnerships with private entities to offer a much needed housing component for youth participants that are homeless. These partners provide housing at drastically reduced rental rates and have eliminated the barriers at-risk youth have in seeking other housing opportunities. Additionally, these partners regularly communicate with Project YES youth advisors to support each youth's progress toward meeting his/her established goals. Youth also receive life-skills training (household management, bill paying, etc.) upon participation in this housing program.

Training Opportunities: As youth participants progress through the program, eligible youth ready for career training are given a career interest inventory evaluation that provides a good appraisal of the career path the participant may be most successful at pursuing. Upon meeting all prerequisite educational requirements, youth participants will be trained in the Manufacturing Skills Standards Council's Certified Production Technician (CPT) curriculum. Those wishing to move to a more academically enriching experience may be referred to Modesto Junior College for additional training in manufacturing skills. In most cases, since the post-secondary education takes longer than one year to complete, Project YES staff assist every youth in completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FASFA) and Cal Grant Applications. This provides youth the ability to apply and possibly qualify for student financial aid to pay for the continuing costs of their education.

Supportive Services: Program supportive services include but are not limited to the following: subsidized childcare costs, clothing, tools needed for employment, work related uniforms, emergency food, shelter/housing, automotive repair, subsidized cost of physical exams and drug tests for employment, TB test required for employment, fingerprint clearance fee, vision care (glasses), GED test fee and re-test fee subsidy, tutoring services, school related test fees, subsidized cost of educational books and supplies, resume development, mental health counseling, transportation (busing) and so many more items that assist youth in overcoming education and social barriers. Due to the limited budget of this grant, Supportive Services will be used only on a last-resort basis.

Leadership Building: While it is not the focus of this grant, Project YES will continue to coordinate multiple leadership building opportunities for participants when it is deemed necessary for the success of the participant. These opportunities have previously included, locally sponsored leadership conferences through the Young Workers Leadership Academy, state and national youth conferences, workshops, group team building activities, peer mentoring, volunteer services, and project based team building. Topics included: transition from youth to adult responsibilities; from high school to college; life issues that encourage leadership roles among youth; and promoting community involvement and service. Youth leaders are encouraged to actively communicate the skills and information they learn with their Project YES peers through youth-led model of workshops and activities.

#### Work Experience

Having been a previous recipient/grantee of ARRA Summer Youth funding in 2009, Project YES fully understands the importance of linking youth to work experience that provides each youth with hands-on learning experiences in the career path of their choosing. Project YES staff make every effort to place each participating youth in jobs that are directly related to their interests and to their preparation and training, and those that have a greater potential to lead to future permanent employment. Participating youth will be able to experience first-hand (through summer and year-round work experience) what it takes to perform these jobs and the opportunity to learn the industry language that is needed to gain experience and confidence in that specific trade or Industry. Conversely, as youth are placed on work experience job sites, this may be the first opportunity the youth has had to gain a better understanding of the career path. As such, the youth is then better equipped to decide if this particular career path is truly the direction he/she wants to pursue.

Project YES is continually developing effective connections with local and county wide agencies that have strong links to the job market and employers in the area. These connections are facilitated through formal and informal communication including telephone, fax, and email, as well as attendance at Chamber of Commerce events, Career Fairs, Open Houses and through individual invitations to employers to visit the Project Yes facility. Project YES staff provide each participating youth with an exist interview, upon successful completion of the program. In this exit interview, clients are provided a variety of employment resources available in the community that will continue to provide them links to information about the current job market and employment opportunities.

#### Part C: Anticipated Outcomes

Alliance Worknet has established a successful program model that results in effective services for youth while meeting the needs of local employers. As such, the *Performance Goals Matrix* (*Attachment 2*) developed for this program will achieve the goals and objectives of this program due to the proven capacity of Project YES with at-risk youth programs.

Policies and procedures have been developed that ensure all clients are served with the highest quality services and programs, while also maintaining compliance with WIA standards. Guidelines are followed to ensure that program performance is at or above the established standards. Each participant will have an Individual Service Strategy (ISS) developed by a Youth Advisor. A map of services is then identified that best responds to the client's individual educational and career needs. Initial assessments are thorough and accurate to ensure goals set for clients are reasonable and attainable, within the program period. For out-of-school youth, program services are targeted to maximize employability and earnings gain once the client has exited the program.

**Project YES** will serve students recruited through the Stanislaus County Careers In Manufacturing Program, and in-school youth attending Ceres High's Manufacturing Program, Johansen High School's Manufacturing Program, and Patterson High School's Manufacturing Program.

Project goals will be measured through a comprehensive, multi-tiered process that involves all staff in providing up-to-date information on project outcomes and performance measures to the Project Director, district administration, and the Alliance Worknet. Formal and informal meetings occur on a regular basis to ensure that clients are on-track to meet their individual goals and that the program is making gains toward goal achievement. Strategies are identified and implemented to address any barriers that the clients or the program may have encountered toward goal achievement. Evaluation of the program's progress is a built-in function of the day-to-day oversight and management of the program activities and staff.

The success of the project is due to the staff's diligence in the facilitation of complete, well maintained, organized and thoroughly documented case files for each individual participant. The Program Manager and Youth Advisors maintain on-going case notes, ensuring that an accurate record of client activity is continually documented. Participant eligibility documents are created and maintained utilizing the Job Automated Training (JTA) system. Participants' eligibility applications, Individual Service Strategy, goals and enrollment are maintained and transmitted to the State through this system, in a timely manner. Youth Advisors receive "feedback" from employers on what traits and skills they want in an employee – and as such these are translated directly to the youth.

Participants can expect to gain a multitude of individual benefits from successful program participation. The two targeted areas in which participants will benefit are education and employment. The <u>expected individual benefits</u> include: a nationally recognized credential in manufacturing as a Certified Production Technician, high school diploma/GED attainment, successful attainment of employment, solutions to other barriers that include transportation, health care needs, clothing, post-secondary education attainment, financial aid for college, creating an effective resume, WorkKeys Training, work experience, soft skill development for successful job retention, mental health counseling, community service, occupational skills training, leadership opportunities and so much more. Here are some examples of how the Alliance Worknet and Project YES have positively affected the lives of its youth participants. The majority of participants have had successful work experience opportunities in the public and private business sector. To date, over 615 youth hold unsubsidized positions with local employers as a direct result of participation in Alliance Worknet training and job placement assistance. Additionally, 757 out-of-school-youth have received certificates of completion from local accredited ETPL training providers in Stanislaus County.

The Alliance Worknet has also had positive effects on the attendance rates of its participants each year. For example, at-risk students on the verge of dropping out of school or being expelled were referred to the Alliance Worknet by the Ceres Police Department Diversion Program Stanislaus County Probation, Modesto Police Project Safe Program and the Ceres Unified School District Expulsion and Attendance Review Board., and Modesto City Schools' Outreach and Intervention Coordinator. These students improved in attendance, motivation and commitment to complete the school year and continue their education, in order to maintain eligibility to participate in the opportunities provided by the Alliance Worknet. Additionally, due to direct interaction with Program Youth Advisors, students have also developed improved relationships with their parents and family members. Participants are able to develop confidence and self-esteem (skills for a lifetime) that will result in their ability to successfully pursue future endeavors.

The <u>expected community benefits</u> include: increased pool of qualified candidates for local manufacturers employers, fewer youth heading down the wrong path in life, increased numbers of youth entering postsecondary education, paid and unpaid internships for youth throughout the community (free staff time for local employers), and much more.

Outcomes and benefits for all program participants are documented and reported using the State JTA participant reporting system. The Alliance Worknet gathers and reviews all participant documents, collects additional information, as needed and insures all performance information is entered into the JTA system, in an accurate and timely manner. Participant reports generated by the JTA system, specific to this project, will be reviewed on a monthly basis, along with project reports, to ensure accurate information regarding project and participant progress is shared with all partners.

The participants of Project YES gain a multitude of individual benefits, while the community gains positive outcomes from the program (including a trained labor force, community service, and increased citizenship). Additionally, common performance measures are identified and outcomes are measured monthly to determined progress toward meeting these performance measures. Historically, Project YES has consistently met the annual established performance measures in each of these areas.

Beyond these statistical measurements, are the outcomes that are considered life changing for program participants: identified solutions to barriers such as transportation, health care, clothing, and housing; qualification for financial aid for college; development of (soft) skills to create an effective resume and retention of employment; acquisition of WorkKeys Training; participation in work experience; receipt of mental health counseling; participation in community service and occupational skills training, as well as opportunities for leadership development. An additional benefit for in-school youth is improved attendance, motivation and commitment to attaining a high school diploma resulting in increased opportunities for post-secondary education and employment. Project YES has also had positive outcomes on the attendance rates of its participants each year. For example, at-risk students on the verge of dropping out of school or being expelled were referred to Project Yes by the Ceres Police Department Diversion Program and the Ceres Unified School District Expulsion and Attendance Review Board. These students improved in attendance, motivation and commitment to complete the school year and continue their education, in order to maintain eligibility to participate in the opportunities provided by Project YES.

The management and staff of Project YES implement the policies and procedures of the Youth Advisory Council and the Alliance Worknet, as well as those of WIA, to ensure proper application of youth employment services in the community. Internal program procedures have also been adopted to provide the best possible services available to the youth of the region. Project YES staff have received training and have successfully used the county's Forms Training Handbook and the state's WIA Eligibility Technical Assistance Guide. Project YES staff have successfully met the WIA tracking and performance requirements for six consecutive years, through the use of the policies and procedures of WIA programs.

#### Part D: Timeline of Activities

As noted in the table below, the Alliance Worknet will solidify contract agreement with Project YES and review project activities with the Project YES Director, upon notification of the funding award. The budget for the program will be finalized and approved by both parties.

The Alliance Worknet in partnership with Project YES will market the project and recruit youth participants from area high schools providing manufacturing training programs (Ceres High, Johansen High, and Patterson High).

Initial participant enrollments are anticipated in September 2013 as the new school year begins. As participants enter and complete the eligibility determination, assessment, and career planning processes, they will be enrolled into project services. Initial participants may enter their selected training programs as early as September, with training program entrants anticipated through October 2014. Participants may begin completing the program and enter education programs or unsubsidized employment as soon as December, with program completions and placements anticipated through December, 2014.

Participants will remain in contact with their assigned Youth Advisor/Case Manager throughout program participation, completion, placement and follow-up/retention. Project evaluation and close-out activities will conclude by March, 2015.

- Participant Support Services: \$4942. for ancillary costs anticipated to meet client needs to be successful in this program. Costs may include haircuts, limited work clothes and GED and/or other testing fees.
- Indirect cost allowance at 3.33% is \$2,919.08 for Project YES/Ceres Unified per Department of Education published Indirect Rate for Ceres Unified School District.


