SUBJECT:

Approval for the Sheriff to Accept the California Office of Emergency Services Grant for the Law Enforcement Specialized Units Program for Calendar Years 2015-2017

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. Authorize the Sheriff to accept the grant from the California Office of Emergency Services for the Law Enforcement Specialized Units Program totaling \$566,925 for calendar years 2015-2017.
- 2. Authorize the Sheriff to negotiate, enter into, and sign a contract with Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Grant funds for the Law Enforcement Specialized Units Program will total \$566,925 from the California Office of Emergency Services over three years. The grant is based on calendar years January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017. The grant will fund 100% of the salary and benefits of a Domestic Violence Victim Advocate (Haven), 90% of a Domestic Violence Investigator (Sheriffs Office), 5% of a Criminal Investigator (District Attorney), office space rental, video camcorder, office supplies, laser printer with toner cartridges, a cell phone and service, laptop computers, telephone and internet service, training and training materials.

In the past this grant has been automatically funded by the State if the County met certain criteria and as such when the Sheriff's Department created its budget for this year it was anticipated that the grant would be received again. As a result there is no fiscal impact with this Agenda Item. Estimated revenue and appropriations were included in the 2014-2015 Recommended Final Budget that was passed by the Board of Supervisors on September 5, 2014.

The Department has received the California Office of Emergency Services Grant for three years, 2011-2012, 2012-2013, 2013-2014 at a total of \$469,818, this year being a \$97,107 increase for the last grant funding award.

DISCUSSION:

The Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department has established partnerships with local agencies including the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office, Stanislaus County Probation, Stanislaus County Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Memorial Medical Center, Stanislaus County Community Services Agency Adult Protective Services, Stanislaus County's 211 Program, and others. The Department leverages public/private partnerships through community awareness and public education to help reduce the number of domestic violence (DV) cases in the jurisdiction.

Although there is an established working relationship between the partners described, there is more that can be done. All partners fulfill their respective responsibilities in serving victims of violence, but at times the agencies operate independently of each other and are not seen as approaching investigations as a "team." Consequently, there is a delay between the time a victim is initially contacted by patrol officers and the follow-up contact made by Haven, the District Attorney's Office and a detective. The flow of police reports and the physical separation of the agencies can sometimes create gaps in service to the victims.

Building and strengthening relationships between Haven and law enforcement contributes to the decrease in domestic violence incidents and homicides. When there is a specialized unit that collaborates to handle domestic violence cases, it also decreases the rate of DV incidents and DV homicides. In Stanislaus County, we need to restore effective domestic violence units that were disbanded due to loss of funding. When planning began for the Stanislaus Family Justice Center in 2006, most of the law enforcement agencies in the County committed to having an officer or detective co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center (SFJC) at least on a part-time basis. However, the economy took a downturn and law enforcement agencies had to withdraw their commitments to co-locate staff at the SFJC. With the grant funds, a specialized unit will be established to provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children and will be co-located at the SFJC. The specialized unit will include personnel from the following agencies: Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, Modesto Police Department, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, and the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office.

This grant will allow the Sheriff's Department to maintain one investigator dedicated to domestic violence and to also contract with Haven Women's Center for a Domestic Violence Victim Advocate positions. The Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office will continue to commit one full-time Victim Advocate and 5% of a Criminal Investigator to serve as members of the specialized unit. Major services that will be provided to victims by the unit include advocacy, basic needs, counseling, crisis intervention, housing and shelter assistance, law enforcement and prosecution, legal assistance, life skills, chaplaincy, and translation services.

POLICY ISSUES:

Acceptance of this grant will assist the Sheriff's Department in meeting the Board's priorities of A Safe Community and Effective Partnerships by providing funds for domestic violence investigations and leveraging partnerships to streamline investigations, prosecutions, and victim's services.

• Filing Costs for Criminal Charges and Protection

Its laws, policies, and practices do not require, in connection with the prosecution of any misdemeanor or felony domestic violence offense, or in connection with the filing, issuance, registration, or service of a protection order, or a petition for a protection order, to protect a victim of

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domestic violence, stalking, or sexual assault, that the victim bear the costs associated with the filing of criminal charges against the offender, or the costs associated with the filing, issuance, registration, or service of a warrant, protection order, petition for a protection order, or witness subpoena, whether issued inside or outside the state, tribal, or local jurisdiction.

Forensic Medical Examination Payment Requirement for Victims of Sexual Assault

The state or territory, Indian tribal government, unit of local government, or another governmental entity incurs the full out-of-pocket cost of forensic medical exams for victims of sexual assault. The state or territory, Indian tribal government, unit of local government, or another governmental entity does not require a victim of sexual assault to participate in the criminal justice system or cooperate with law enforcement in order to be provided with a forensic medical exam, or to be reimbursed for charges incurred on account of such an exam.

Judicial Notification

The state's judicial administrative policies and practices include notification to domestic violence offenders of the requirements delineated in section 922(g)(8) and (g)(9) of title 18, Unites States Code, and any applicable related Federal, State, or local laws.

Polygraph Testing Prohibition

The state or local unit of government's laws, policies, or practices ensure that no law enforcement officer, prosecuting officer or other government official shall ask or require an adult, youth, or child victim of an alleged sex offense as defined under Federal, tribal, state, territorial, or local law to submit to a polygraph examination or other truth telling device as a condition for proceeding with the investigation of such an offense.

• Under 42 U.S.C. 3796gg-8(b), the refusal of a victim to submit to a polygraph or other truth telling examination shall not prevent the investigation, charging, or prosecution of an alleged sex offense by a state, Indian tribal government, territorial government, or unit of local government.

Nondisclosure of Confidential or Private Information Regarding Services for Victims

Recipients and subrecipients may not disclose personally identifying information about victims served with Violence Against Women funds without a written release, unless the disclosure of the information is required by a statute or court order. "Personally identifying information" means individually identifying information for or about an individual including information likely to disclose the location of a victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Releases must be written, informed and reasonably time-limited and signed by the victim unless the victim is an un-emancipated minor or a person with disabilities.

• Consultation and Documentation with Local Victim Services Programs (Applies only to law enforcement, prosecution and the courts)

Tribal, territorial, State, or local prosecution, law enforcement, and courts must consult with tribal, territorial, State or local victim service programs during the course of developing their grant applications. This will ensure that proposed activities and equipment acquisitions are designed to promote the safety, confidentiality, and economic independence of victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking and dating violence.

All appropriate documentation must be maintained on file by the project and available for Cai OES or public scrutiny upon request. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in suspension of payments under the grant or termination of the grant or both and the Recipient may be ineligible for award of any future grants if the Cal OES determines that any of the following has occurred:

(1) the Recipient has made false certification, or (2) violates the certification by falling to carry out the requirements as noted above.

Project Narrative

1. Problem Statement (Maximum 10 double-spaced pages)

a. <u>Describe the department's history of involvement and collaboration with domestic violence</u> service providers in the department's jurisdiction.

Overview of Lead Agency and Proposal Partners

The specialized unit that will be enhanced with grant funding from Cal OES includes personnel from the following agencies: <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u> (lead), <u>Modesto</u> <u>Police Department</u>, <u>Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus</u> (Cal OES-funded Domestic Violence (DV) and Rape Crisis Program recipient), <u>Stanislaus Family Justice Center</u>, and <u>Stanislaus</u> <u>County District Attorney's Office</u> (Cal OES-funded Victim/Witness Assistance Program).

The specialized unit will provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children and will be co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center, 1625 I Street in Modesto. Starting in 2006, more than 50 community leaders worked together to form the center. The governing body is the Stanislaus Family Justice Center Foundation, which is a 501(c)(3) organization that was initially formed as the CAIRE Center Foundation in July 2003. The Foundation's Board of Directors sets strategy and policy, provides fiscal oversight and fund development management, and gives guidance to the Executive Director. The agency's mission statement is <u>"to offer victims and survivors residing in Stanislaus County a path to safety and hope through compassion and coordinated services</u>".

The Family Justice Center model is identified as an evidence-based practice in the field of domestic, family violence and sexual assault intervention, and prevention services. The working partners are Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, CAIRE Center, Community Services Agency, Stanislaus County District Attorney, Memorial Medical Center, Haven Women's Center, Stanislaus county and city law enforcement agencies, Stanislaus County Probation, Stanislaus County CEO's office, Stanislaus County Office of Education, Stanislaus Elder Abuse Prevention Alliance, and Stanislaus County Superior Court.

Lead Agency History of Collaboration with Domestic Violence Service Providers

The Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department has established partnerships with local agencies including the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office, Stanislaus Family Justice Center, Stanislaus County Probation, Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Memorial Medical Center, Adult Protective Services, 211, and others. The department leverages public/private partnerships through community awareness and public education to help reduce the number of domestic violence cases in the jurisdiction. Currently, the Sheriff's Department has Detective Jesse Ruelas co-located full-time at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center (SFJC) as the lead investigator for the Domestic Violence Response Team currently funded through Cal-OES Law Enforcement Specialized Units Program Funding (formerly Cal EMA LE11, LE12, LE13) grant funding, which will end on December 31, 2014.

In the 1990's, Haven Women's Center had a full-time Victim Advocate stationed at the Sheriff's Office and she would go out on domestic violence calls with the deputies. The advocate was grant funded but due to drastic budget cuts, that position was brought back into Haven's administrative office after a few years. Currently, Haven has a full-time Domestic Violence Victim Advocate co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center as a member of the Domestic Violence Response Team currently funded through Cal-OES Law Enforcement Specialized Units Program Funding (formerly Cal EMA LE11, LE12, LE13) grant funding, which will end on December 31, 2014.

Currently, the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office, and Modesto Police Department have an Operational Agreement with Haven Women's Center for the Domestic Violence Response Team (DVRT) through the current Cal-OES grant. All members of the DVRT are co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center.

In the 1990's, the Modesto Police Department received a grant to start a program where officers responding to domestic violence calls would videotape the victim's statement at the

scene. It was a powerful tool that helped keep victims cooperative with prosecution when it came time to testify, and when the tape was shown to the defendant and his defense attorney, the case was more likely to resolve. It was a very aggressive and proactive program. At the same time, pursuant to a grant, the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office established a Domestic Violence Unit comprised of one very experienced prosecutor, an investigator and a victim advocate who were assigned exclusively to target the most serious and chronic domestic violence cases. Currently, in spite of the elimination of the grant, there remains one domestic violence attorney and one domestic violence advocate. However, a single district attorney investigator now bears the burden of follow up investigation for domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, and elder abuse cases. The domestic violence advocate and investigator are both co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center.

The Stanislaus County Family & Domestic Violence Coordinating Council was established in the mid-1990's to provide effective coordination between agencies, departments, existing services, and the courts for individuals affected by family and domestic violence and abuse; and prevention, intervention and treatment techniques accomplished through education, research and data collection. All partners in this proposal are members of the FDVCC, which meets monthly and brings together all the agencies that work with victims of domestic violence.

b. <u>Describe the need for expansion of collaborative efforts with domestic violence service</u> providers in the department's jurisdiction.

Although there is an established working relationship between the partners as members of the Stanislaus County Domestic Violence Response Team (DVRT) described in Question 1a, there is more that can be done.

By continuing to enhance and strengthen relationships between Haven and law enforcement contributes to the decrease in DV incidents and homicides. We know that when there is a specialized unit that collaborates to handle domestic violence cases, it decreases the rate of DV incidents and DV homicides. In Stanislaus County, we need to continue our effective domestic

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violence unit that was developed with the initial round of funding from CalEMA. With the DVRT in place, there is the ability to coordinate county-wide in a concerted effort to work more sensitively and aggressively with domestic violence cases.

c. <u>Describe the need for a more effectively coordinated response to domestic violence victims</u> and their children in the department's jurisdiction.

The key to a coordinated response is co-location and timeliness. Through the DVRT, law enforcement investigators are housed in the same facility as advocates (Haven) and the DA's Office. This makes it much easier for a "team approach" to be established, for reports to be reviewed quickly, and follow-up to be conducted in a timely fashion. When cases are handled in this manner, victims feel supported which reduces the feeling that the system "doesn't work" for them.

Stanislaus Family Justice Center, where the DVRT is co-located, provided services to and support to 257 unduplicated victims of domestic violence in 2012, 269 unduplicated victims in 2013, and 202 unduplicated victims between January – September 2014. Services include advocacy, basic needs, counseling, crisis intervention, support groups, housing and shelter assistance, law enforcement and prosecution, legal assistance, restraining order assistance, self-sufficiency and life skills, chaplaincy, and translation services.

Stanislaus County CAIRE Center, which is operated by Stanislaus County Child Protective Services and is the county's child advocacy center, provides multi-disciplinary Child Forensic Interviews for abuse and neglect (including child victims of sexual abuse and domestic violence) is co-located on the 2nd floor of the Stanislaus Family Justice Center.

When planning began for the Stanislaus Family Justice Center in 2006, most of the law enforcement agencies in the county committed to having an officer or detective co-located at the SFJC at least part-time. When the economy took a turn for the worse, the law enforcement agencies had to withdraw their commitments to co-locate staff at the SFJC. Within the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, drastic budget cuts reduced the number of detectives in the Investigation Division from 30 detectives to 8. There was space set aside in the center for law enforcement personnel, but the severe shortage of funding within the jurisdiction to commit to co-location unless grant funding is secured for that purpose. The first CalEMA grant (LE11) allowed the Sheriff to add a Family Crimes Detective dedicated to domestic violence. The detective, Chad Bankston, served as an original member of the DVRT until he left the department for another opportunity in December 2013. He was replaced by Detective Juan Alanis, who recently moved into a new assignment within the Sheriff's department. The current lead investigator for the DVRT is Detective Jesse Ruelas and he is co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center with other members of the DVRT.

d. <u>Describe the absence of, or improvement needed, regarding advocacy for victims of</u> <u>domestic violence and their children in the department's jurisdiction.</u>

Haven Women's Center is very responsive to the needs of domestic violence victims and the District Attorney's Victim Advocate assists victims requesting help during the court process. We are fortunate that both the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department and Modesto Police Department each have an investigator assigned to handle the domestic violence caseload. In many of the smaller cities throughout Stanislaus County, the DV caseload is spread out, or there is simply no significant follow-up investigation. One of the challenges for victims receiving services is a safe place for their children to be while they are receiving services and support from members of the DVRT. The Stanislaus Family Justice Center (SFJC) has a program called "KidsZone", which up until mid-November was staffed by Children's Crisis Center. Children's Crisis Center provided respite child care services on-site at the SFJC for children exposed to and/or victims of domestic violence, but no longer provides those services due to funding reduction. We have found this to be a huge barrier for DV victims to receiving timely and complete services. During the transition, we had some victims unable to receive services because we didn't have a staff person able to care for their children. Currently, volunteers and other SFJC staff are filling the role, but we need a dedicated person at least 0.40 FTE to serve

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as the Respite Child Care Provider employed by the Stanislaus Family Justice Center within the KidsZone and have included that position in the proposal budget.

e. <u>Describe the need for revised, expanded, or developed protocols for ensuring a consistent</u> and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders in order to ensure victim safety in ongoing cases.

Currently, patrol officers in Stanislaus County are dispatched and respond to violations of domestic violence protective orders. Officers, as a matter of protocol, complete investigative reports on such violations, and make arrests when the offender can be located. Cases involving misdemeanor violations of domestic violence protective orders are sent directly to the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office for review and complaint. Felony reports are forwarded to the Investigation Services Division for review prior to sending on to the District Attorney.

While there is no need to develop the protocols because they are already in place, it is our intent to review and possibly revise the violations of protective order protocols during this grant process (as we did in the previous grant period) to ensure and enhance victim safety.

f. <u>Describe the need for additional domestic violence-specific training for patrol officers/first</u> responders, and other relevant department personnel working in the agency.

The Stanislaus County Sheriff's Regional Training Division offers Domestic Violence

Training as part of Regular Basic Academy. The 24 week Academy, which satisfies the POST requirements for Police Officer, includes 10 hours of classroom instruction on Domestic Violence. Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus partners with the Academy to deliver the training, which includes a written exam and a pass/fail scenario.

Once a candidate passes Regular Basic Academy and enters the department's standardized Field Training program, they work with a Field Training Officer. While in that program, they gain experience and knowledge of domestic violence crimes by investigating cases and testifying in court.

The Sheriff's Department offers a POST mandated 2 hour domestic violence training update

that officers take every 2 years. It includes, but is not limited to: report writing, filling out paperwork, court orders, etc. The training is offered to other law enforcement agencies' personnel within Stanislaus County. Haven Women's Center does not participate in the 2-hour update training.

At the Modesto Police Department, mandatory DV training is provided to all sworn personnel every 2 years. In addition, Domestic Violence Detective Steve Anderson provides update or "Squad" training when a need is identified (i.e., consistent problems with police reports, or upon requests from the DA's Office).

According to Sheriff Christianson, "We need staff to be highly skilled, motivated, qualified, and well-educated to be able to deliver to the District Attorney a domestic violence case that is prosecutable." What is needed is more specialized training, delivered locally, that is clientcentered and focuses on the mechanisms and protocol for handling domestic violence cases within a rapidly changing, volatile environment.

Future training needs include more specialized training in domestic violence and family crimes, because there are always changes in case law and how cases are investigated. Trainings are provided, as needed, to squad briefings or electronically through the OESil system.

There are additional training opportunities that the Sheriff's Office can invest in, but funding is restricted and very few officers and other department personnel are able to travel out of town for trainings. Stanislaus County is a current grantee through the Office on Violence Against Women FY2013 Arrest Program Grant, which provides training funds to co-located staff at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center (SFJC). Members of the Domestic Violence Response Team (LE Specialized Unit) co-located at the SFJC are able to access these funds to attend the International Family Justice Center Conference offered by the Family Justice Center Alliance in April 2015 and April 2016, which are both OVW-approved trainings/conferences. The 2015 conference includes training and interactive peer to peer discussions on issues related to the

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handling of domestic violence cases with special focus on law enforcement response, criminal prosecution, civil legal assistance, and advocacy. Special tracks this year on crime scene investigation, the handling of non-fatal strangulation cases, and Family Justice Centers will provide in-depth training for multi-disciplinary teams.

g. <u>Describe the need for mechanisms of interagency accountability between the agency and</u> the contracted domestic violence service provider.

There are existing mechanisms in place to insure interagency accountability through the current Operational Agreement (January 1, 2012 – December 31, 2014) between Haven Women's Center, Stanislaus County District Attorney, Stanislaus Family Justice Center, Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, and Modesto Police Department. The updated Operational Agreement for the period January 1, 2015 – December 31, 2017 is attached in the Appendix.

In addition, on September 2, 2010, the partners in the Stanislaus Family Justice Center signed and established the <u>Stanislaus Family Justice Center Domestic Violence Investigation</u> <u>Protocol.</u> The agencies that signed and have since implemented the protocol are Stanislaus County Community Services Agency, <u>Stanislaus County District Attorney</u>, <u>Stanislaus County</u> <u>Sheriff, Modesto Police Department, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Stanislaus Family</u> <u>Justice Center</u>, Ceres Police Department, Newman Police Department, Oakdale Police Department, Turlock Police Department, Memorial Medical Center, Stanislaus County Office of Education, Stanislaus County Chief County Counsel, Health Services Agency, Riverbank Police Department, Waterford Police Department, Stanislaus County Behavioral Health & Recovery Services, Stanislaus County Probation Department, Patterson Police Department, Hughson Police Department, and California State University, Stanislaus.

The protocol states, in part:

"The purpose and scope of the protocol is to provide members of law enforcement agencies in Stanislaus County with direction and understanding of their role in the investigation of Grant Number:

reported crimes of domestic violence. Domestic violence is criminal conduct and it is the policy of every law enforcement agency in Stanislaus County to enforce criminal laws related to domestic violence and to protect the victim(s). This includes the arrest of domestic violence offenders if there is probable cause to believe an offense has occurred. Law enforcement will facilitate a victim's access to any available community resources during the investigation and subsequent events. The present and future safety of the victim is of utmost importance.

"Crimes of domestic violence shall be investigated by the agency with jurisdiction. If multiple jurisdictions are involved, the agencies will work together and coordinate to the extent necessary to conduct a thorough investigation. It is the officer's responsibility to thoroughly investigate an allegation of domestic violence and make every effort to identify the alleged responsible(s).

"Haven Women's Center is the primary agency in Stanislaus County to assist victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. Haven operates a temporary shelter for women and their children who are victims of domestic violence. In communicating with the shelter staff, officers should observe shelter procedures and recognize that the shelter may have different goals than law enforcement.

"Evidence Codes 1037.2 and 1037.6 provide that all contact between a victim and Haven is confidential. Haven staff is obligated to protect the victim's confidentiality. They will not confirm or deny the presence of a specific person at the shelter. They will not release any information about the victims, and whether or not they have sought assistance or refuge.

"Officers must provide the victim with the "Victims of Domestic Violence" card which will refer the victim of domestic violence or sexual assault to Haven for counseling services, support groups, temporary shelter and assistance in obtaining restraining orders. (Penal Code §264.2; Penal Code §13701(c)(9)(G) & (H)).

"Victims wishing to be transported to Haven for temporary shelter should be taken to a location agreed upon by Haven and the law enforcement agency.

"Patrol officers wishing to contact persons who may be residents of Haven's shelter should contact a detective in their agency who investigates domestic violence. Detectives will be responsible for determining whether or not Haven administrative staff will be solicited for information concerning sheltered victims.

"In cases of suspected child concealment, when the suspect is believed to be at Haven's shelter, officers should take an initial report and refer it directly to the Child Abduction Unit (CAU) of the District Attorney's Office.

"Haven staff cannot release information about their clients or their clients' children. Penal Code sections 277 and 278.5 contain provisions protecting the domestic violence victims from arrest or prosecution for child concealment.

"Detectives should selectively determine whether or not a situation/case warrants further emergency follow-up.

"District Attorney's Office Victim Services Unit is responsible for providing crisis intervention, assistance and resource referral to victims of crime. The assigned Victim Advocate will provide courtroom orientation, court escort for the victim, keep victim apprised of the criminal case status, assist with victim impact statements and make referrals to other agencies as needed. Other services will be provided as necessary pursuant to the Victim/Witness Grant.

"The Victim Services Unit will maintain a referral list of mental health providers specializing in domestic violence and will assist victims with filing claims with the State Government Claims Board to cover any allowable costs relating to the crime.

"The Victim Services Advocate will work closely with the prosecutor and act as a liaison for the District Attorney's Office with victims, families and other agencies.

"A Victim Services Advocate is available 24 hours a day to law enforcement agencies who need assistance with victims and/or families. An advocate will respond to crime scenes, hospitals, homes, law enforcement agencies or other locations as requested by law enforcement."

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2. Plan and Implementation (Maximum 10 double-spaced pages)

a. <u>Describe the department's plan for meeting the core program components (as listed in</u> <u>Section I, F, 2, of the RFP).</u>

1. Victim Advocacy

A. Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department will contract with Haven's Women Center of Stanislaus (Stanislaus County's Cal OES-funded Domestic Violence Assistance (DV) Program and Cal OES-funded Rape Crisis Program) for a 1.0 FTE Domestic Violence Victim Counselor position funded through this Cal QES proposal. The advocate will: provide immediate in-person response to requests for advocacy on a 24-hour basis. The advocate will provide consultation, resource materials and outreach materials to the applicant for the purpose of assisting officers and other relevant law enforcement employees. The advocate will assist with the development and/or revision of officer and advocate protocols for responding to victims of domestic violence, assist with the training of officers on responding to victims of domestic violence, and serve as a point of contact with the applicant for developing and initiating mechanisms of interagency accountability. The advocate will meet the requirements of a "domestic violence counselor" pursuant to Evidence Code 1037.1(a)(1). The Domestic Violence Victim Advocate will be colocated at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center as part of the specialized unit. Note that Haven will have an after hours on-call advocate respond to requests for advocacy between 5 pm and 8 am weekdays and on weekends. This is in accordance with the Stanislaus Family Justice Center Domestic Violence Investigation Protocol detailed on page 10 of this proposal.

<u>B. Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office</u> will commit the equivalent of 1.0 FTE Victim Advocate in-kind, (with Felony DV assigned to one Advocate and Misdemeanor DV assigned to another Advocate), to serve as a member of the specialized unit. The DA's office houses the Cal OES-funded Victim/Witness Assistance Program for the county. The Advocate(s) will contact domestic violence victims even before the case has been referred to the District Attorney's office for Deputy District Attorney review. They will offer assistance to file claims to

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the state for counseling and any medical expenses the victim may have incurred. They will provide court escort service for the duration of the prosecution and referrals to appropriate agencies. They will act as a liaison between the victim and the prosecutor and provide information about the criminal process. As the case is progressing, the Advocate may accompany the Criminal Investigator, Richard Balentine, to speak to a victim. The Victim Advocates will be partially co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center (during the time that they are working their DV caseload).

2. Investigation and Coordination

A. Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department will assign Detective Jesse Ruelas as the one full-time Domestic Violence Investigator (not a FTE: 90% funded through the grant, 10% funded through other sources). Detective Ruelas is 100% dedicated to the DVRT and will not have any collateral assignments. He will provide investigative and coordinating duties for the specialized unit during the grant period. The investigator must: review arrest and preliminary investigation reports to evaluate cases and provide supplemental reports for issues requiring further investigation within 48 hours of the arrest; gather and document evidence including witness statements, the identities of all children in the home, previous incidents of domestic violence and violent crimes, as well as civil restraining order information from the California Law Enforcement Telecommunication System (CLETS) system; assist with the development of protocols for ensuring consistent and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders in order to ensure victim safety; oversee the completion of domestic violence case followup requests or evidence requests from the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office; provide consultation and resources for officers, and other relevant personnel employed by Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department and Modesto Police Department, on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques; serve as a point of contact with Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus and the victim advocate for developing and initiating mechanisms of interagency accountability; and work in close cooperation with victim advocacy personnel.

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Detective Ruelas exceeds the following requirements: "Investigators assigned to the specialized unit must have at least an intermediate Commission on Police Officer Standards and Training (POST) certificate and have received specialized training beyond the academy level, related to the investigation of domestic violence crimes, in accordance with Penal Code Sections 13516-13519 et al." as he received his Advanced Commission on POST certificate in December 2012. He also has received specialized training beyond the academy level including Detective Core Course, Sexual Assault Course, Elder Abuse, CFIT or CAIRE (Forensic Interview of Children), Advance Crime Scene Interview and Interrogations. Detective Ruelas has been a Deputy with the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department since 1998. He will be co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center and assigned to direct the specialized unit for a minimum of one year. He currently directs the DVRT funded with Cal OES LE13 funds.

<u>B. Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office</u> will assign Richard Balentine as a .25 FTE Criminal Investigator to the specialized unit (funded .05 FTE through this grant, .20 FTE through other sources but not match funds). Investigator Balentine carries full peace officer status, and works under direction of the District Attorney. The position is a technical investigative assignment which assists in trial preparation and locating and obtaining statements from subjects involved in domestic violence matters submitted to the District Attorney's Office. Investigator Balentine is currently co-located full time at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center and is a member of the current DVRT.

<u>C. Modesto Police Department</u> will provide 0.50 FTE Domestic Violence Detective Steven Anderson (percentage of that FTE provided for the Cal OES Match requirement as detailed in the Budget and Budget Narrative each year). Detective Anderson will serve as a key member of the DV specialized unit co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center that will provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children. Duties will include: review arrest and preliminary investigative reports, provide supplemental reports for issues requiring further investigation within 24 hours of arrest, gather and document evidence, assist

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with the development of protocols to ensure victim safety, provide consultation and resources on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques for officers and other relevant personnel in the Modesto Police Department, participate as a member of the training team, and work in close cooperation with victim advocacy personnel. Detective Anderson has been with the Modesto Police Department as an officer since 2000. He has had assignments in Patrol, Narcotics and was promoted to Detective in September 2009. He was a Special Victim's Unit Detective from 2010 to present (as DV and SVU are one unit). He is currently assigned to work only DV cases, however in the past he worked Crimes Against Children, Sexual Assaults, Elder Abuse, and Human Trafficking. Detective Anderson has his Intermediate POST certificate, a B.A. in Criminal Justice with a minor in Sociology, has ICI certificates for investigations and sexual assaults. He is scheduled for ICI DV training in March 2015. Detective Anderson is currently a member of the DVRT funded through Cal OES LE13.

3. Training

Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Modesto Police Department, and Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office will collaborate as a team to provide training to law enforcement officers, and other relevant department personnel, on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques. Trainings will provide officers responding to domestic violence calls with practical references and resources that can be used to assist victims. The training will at least cover: the dynamics of power and control in violence against victims of domestic violence, understanding the concept of the dominant aggressor, and crime scene investigation. Training will be conducted by POST-certified instructors and provided to as many officers as possible during the grant period.

Domestic Violence is currently presented as a 2-hour update module at the Stanislaus Regional Training Division, Sheriff's Tactical Operations Program (S.T.O.P.), which is designed to be completed over a 4/10 (40 hour) training week and specifically geared toward completing

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ALL mandated Perishable Skills, Continued Professional Training, and State Mandated Training.

Members of the DVRT currently provide DV briefing trainings and detective training to their respective LE agencies on at least a monthly basis. Field Training Officer and Briefings are daily tools utilized for a case-by-case overview in the jurisdiction.

4. Protocols for Sustainable Response

<u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u> currently has a protocol for responding to victims of domestic violence in collaboration with <u>Haven Women's Center</u> (a Cal OES-funded DV Program recipient) as outlined in the <u>Stanislaus Family Justice Center's</u> Domestic Violence Investigation Protocol dated and signed on September 2, 2010. The protocol, as outlined in question 1g beginning on page 6 of this proposal, includes:

- The responsibilities of the officers responding to domestic violence calls including, but not limited to, how and when to contact the domestic violence victim advocate;
- The roles and responsibilities of the victim advocate in addressing the needs of victims as well as the needs and concerns of officers;
- A clearly enforceable method of interagency accountability to address concerns and conflicts raised by either the law enforcement agency or the domestic violence service provider;
- A long-term plan for sustaining an effective domestic violence response unit after the grant cycle has expired.

5. Co-location

Members of the Domestic Violence Response Team will be co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center (SFJC) at 1625 I Street in Modesto. SFJC opened its door to victims and their families on November 1, 2010 and just celebrated its 1st Anniversary. The two story facility is just over 9000 square feet and located in downtown Modesto, within walking distance of the courthouse and the District Attorney's Office. The center has allocated office space for the

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specialized team members. <u>Criminal Investigator Richard Balentine</u> and <u>Victim Advocate Cuca</u> <u>Rosing</u> from the District Attorney's Office, Modesto Police Department <u>Detective Steven</u> <u>Anderson, Sheriff's Office Domestic Violence Investigator</u> Jesse Ruelas, and the <u>Haven</u> <u>Women's Center Domestic Violence Victim Advocate</u> Aracely Sanchez are currently co-located at the SFJC.

The Stanislaus Family Justice Center adds efficiency and strengthens relationships among those who dedicate their professional careers to helping victims of violence. The working partners are Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, CAIRE Center, Community Services Agency, Stanislaus County District Attorney, Memorial Medical Center, Haven Women's Center, Stanislaus county and city law enforcement agencies, Stanislaus County Probation, Stanislaus County CEO's office, Stanislaus County Office of Education, Stanislaus Elder Abuse Prevention Alliance, Stanislaus County Superior Court, and Children's Crisis Center. Major services that are provided to victims include advocacy, basic needs, counseling, crisis intervention, housing and shelter assistance, law enforcement and prosecution, civil-legal advocacy, life skills, chaplaincy, and translation services.

Placing agency representatives who assist victims under one roof increases synergy and builds stronger understanding among professionals – resulting in better service and outcomes for victims. This effort provides support through improved case management and an augmented exchange of information and resources. Closing gaps in service improves accessibility to services and ease the burden of reporting crimes and prosecuting and rehabilitating offenders.

The Family Justice Center model is identified as an evidence-based practice in the field of domestic, family violence and sexual assault intervention, and prevention services. The documented and published outcomes include:

- Reduced homicides
- Increased victim safety
- Increased empowerment for victims

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- Reduced fear and anxiety for victims and their children
- Reduced recantation and minimization by victims
- Increased efficiency in collaborative services to victims among service providers
- Increased prosecution of offenders
- Dramatically increased community support for services to victims and their children

The benefit of co-locating the specialized team at the SFJC is that <u>client-centered services</u> will be available to the victim without having to travel around the county from agency to agency. The SFJC also has a "Kids Zone" where children can be cared for by a <u>0.40 FTE Respite Child Care</u> <u>Provider</u> (funded through this Cal OES grant, see budget for details) while their parent/caregiver is receiving services from the partners co-located in the center. The Respite Child Care Provider will provide quality therapeutic care for children and youth exposed to and/or victims of domestic violence, providing services and support to victims of domestic violence and their children, reducing barriers a victims may have to receiving services from the co-located members of the specialized unit at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center. He/she will create and maintain a safe environment for children, engaging them in therapeutic play; offering crisis counseling designed to address trauma; and organize children's activities that facilitate social/emotional growth, enhance development, foster trust, and promote positive social behaviors. Candidate to be hired. This is a new position to support the efforts of the Domestic Violence Response Team (Specialized Unit).

6. Operational Agreement

An new Operational Agreement for January 1, 2015 – December 31, 2017 between the <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u>, <u>Modesto Police Department</u>, <u>Haven Women's Center</u>, <u>Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office</u>, and <u>Stanislaus Family Justice Center</u> was signed on December 1, 2014 and is attached to this agreement in the Appendix. It outlines the duties

of each agency and their commitment to carry out the program purpose and components of the Cal OES Law Enforcement Specialized United Program.

Staffing listed in the budget, which are necessary to carry out the program purpose and components (and which were detailed above), include:

- a. <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u>, Domestic Violence (DV) Investigator, Family Crimes Unit: 1.0 FTE full-time employee
- b. <u>Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus,</u> 1.0 FTE DV Victim Counselor/Advocate
- c. Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office, 0.05 FTE DV Criminal Investigator
- d. <u>Modesto Police Department</u>, 0.50 FTE DV Investigator (Match)
- e. <u>Stanislaus Family Justice Center</u>, Respite Child Care Provider (FTE's vary by year)
- f. Independent Contractor/Consultant Services: Grant Management/Reporting (50.85 hours)

b. <u>Describe the department's plan for contracting with a domestic violence service provider for</u> <u>a Domestic Violence Counselor position.</u>

Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department will contract with Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus for a 1.0 FTE Domestic Violence Victim Advocate for the grant period, funded through this Cal OES proposal. The advocate will be co-located with the Sheriff's Department Domestic Violence Detective at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center. The Haven advocate will be supervised by Haven Women's Center Assistant Director, May Rico, who is part of the multidisciplinary team of providers at the SFJC. The Sheriff's Department will reimburse Haven for the advocate's salary and benefits as outlined in the budget and budget narrative attached to this proposal on an agreed upon timeframe (generally a cost reimbursement contract billed monthly).

c. <u>Describe the department's plan for utilizing the Domestic Violence Counselor (identified in</u> <u>Section I, F, 2, a, of the RFP) for the purpose of immediate response to victims and their</u> <u>children.</u>

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The <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u> will work with the Domestic Violence Victim Advocate in a collaborative manner as part of the specialized team. The advocate will work closely with the Domestic Violence Detectives from both the <u>Modesto Police Department</u> and the <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u>. The advocate will accompany law enforcement to provide immediate in-person response to requests for victim advocacy on a 24-hour basis. <u>Note</u>: Haven will have an after hours on-call advocate respond to requests for advocacy between 5 pm and 8 am weekdays and on the weekends as detailed in the <u>Stanislaus Family Justice</u> <u>Center Domestic Violence Investigation Protocol</u> on page 10 of this application.

d. <u>Describe the department's plan for providing domestic viplence-specific training (as</u> <u>identified in Section I, F, c, of the RFP) to patrol officers/first responders, and other relevant</u> <u>department personnel.</u>

Domestic Violence is currently presented monthly as a 2-hour update module at the Stanislaus Regional Training Division, Sheriff's Tactical Operations Program (S.T.O.P.), which is designed to be completed over a 4/10 (40 hour) training week and specifically geared toward completing ALL mandated Perishable Skills, Continued Professional Training, and State Mandated Training.

Members of the DVRT have attended International Family Justice Center conferences in the past, and members will be selected to attend future conferences with funding through Stanislaus County's OVW FY2013 Arrest Program grant (April of each year). The Conference is an OVW-approved training that is available to co-located staff at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center. Members of the DVRT will return with information and training protocols to enhance the current domestic violence trainings that are offered to officers and other law enforcement personnel. They will provide more specialized domestic violence training than what is currently offered as requested by the Sheriff. The exact number of trainings is unknown at this time.

e. <u>Describe the department's plan to institute mechanisms of interagency accountability</u> between the agency and the contracted domestic violence service provider.

Members of the DVRT (specialized unit) will be co-located at the Stanislaus Family Justice

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Center and will operate under the Domestic Violence Investigation Protocol outlined in the first section of this narrative and the Stanislaus Family Justice Center multi-disciplinary team model, which insures strict confidentiality and agency accountability. The activities of all the agencies outlined in this proposal, including the <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u> and <u>Haven</u> <u>Women's Center</u>, are the result of collaborative planning, group discussions, and ongoing coordination on the part of all the partners. The Stanislaus Family Justice Center has set aside dedicated workspace for the continued use of the DVRT as they did for LE11-13.

f. <u>Describe the department's plan to develop and implement protocols for ensuring consistent</u> and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders in order to ensure victim safety.

Patrol Officers in Stanislaus County are dispatched and respond to violations of domestic violence protective orders. Officers, as a matter of protocol, complete investigative reports on such violations, make arrests when the offender can be located, and forward all reports to Investigations for review. Cases involving violations of domestic violence protective orders are then sent to the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office for review and complaint.

While there is no need at this time to develop the protocols, it is our intent to review the protocols at least bi-annually and possibly revise the violations of protective order protocols during this grant process to ensure and enhance victim safety.

g. <u>Describe the department's plan for developing and/or enhancing protocols for responding to</u> victims of domestic violence and their children that will remain sustainable after the grant cycle has ended.

In addition to the existing Domestic Violence Investigative Protocol for the Stanislaus Family Justice Center, the specialized unit will enhance its Domestic Violence High Risk Case Response Team patterned after a similar team in San Diego County. The purpose is to collaboratively respond to the needs of individuals and their dependents experiencing intimate partner violence who are at a high risk for lethality. The High Risk Team will enhance the safety of domestic violence victims, their children, and dependent adult family members. It provides a comprehensive, coordinated, and collaborative response. It will improve the utilization of

With funding through Cal OES, an enhanced domestic violence training that complements the current program will be developed by the specialized team and delivered collaboratively with Haven Women's Center to officers and other relevant department personnel within Stanislaus County.

b. <u>Describe the qualifications of the officer(s) that will be assigned to the specialized unit and articulate how those qualifications meet the requirements (as listed in Section I, F, 2, b of this RFP).</u>

Detective Jesse Ruelas from Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department will be assigned to lead the specialized unit. He started his law enforcement career with Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department as a Deputy in 1998. He received his Advanced Commission on POST certificate in December 2012. Detective Ruelas has received specialized training beyond the academy level including Detective Core Course, Sexual Assault Course, Elder Abuse, CFIT or CAIRE (Forensic Interview of Children), Advance Crime Scene Interview and Interrogations. He conducts DV training for the Sheriff's Department including briefing trainings, detective trainings,

strangulation training, and serves as a field training officer. He currently directs the DVRT colocated at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center with Cal OES LE 13 funding.

Detective Ruelas meets or exceeds the requirements from Section I, F, 2, b of the RFP: "The investigator must:

1) Review arrest and preliminary investigation reports to evaluate cases and provide supplemental reports for issues requiring further investigation within 48 hours of the arrest;

Detective Ruelas currently reviews every "in custody" report and preliminary report involving domestic violence. All "in custody" reports are sent to the DA's Office immediately; they are reviewed by him to be certain they are complete and no further follow-up will be needed. Preliminary reports are reviewed and any necessary follow-up completed prior to the case being sent to the DA's Office for complaint. Arrest warrants are written or contact with outstanding suspect made.

2) Gather and document evidence including witness statements, the identities of all children in the home, previous incidents of domestic violence and violent crimes, as well as civil restraining order information from the California Law Enforcement Telecommunication System (CLETS) system;

Generally, the responding patrol officers conduct a complete investigation. Per policy, they will attempt to gather a recorded statement from the victim and obtain photographs/video of any injuries or other pertinent evidence. Officers document names/ages of children and whether or not they were present and witnessed the DV. Dispatch advises patrol officers of the existence of any protective orders. Once the report is forwarded to investigations, CLETS information is gathered by the investigations clerks and attached as part of the case file to be sent to the DA. If any of this information is missing, it is part of Detective Ruelas' responsibility to gather the information before sending the case to the DA.

3) Assist with the development of protocols for ensuring consistent and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders in order to ensure victim safety;

If there are areas of concern identified by sheriff's management, the DA's Office, or victim advocates, it is Detective Ruelas responsibility to facilitate training to the department, or meet with his Sergeant to develop those protocols.

4) Oversee the completion of domestic violence case follow-up requests or evidence requests from the District Attorney's Office;

Detective Ruelas currently conducts follow-up and completes DA requests as part of his duties as the DV investigator.

5) Provide consultation and resources for officers, and other relevant personnel employed by the Applicant, on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques;

Detective Ruelas currently uses the department e-mail system and squad briefings/trainings to pass along relevant DV information to patrol officers. He expresses the importance of the 293 Form per California state law.

6) Serve as a point of contact with the domestic violence service provider and the victim advocate for developing and initiating mechanisms of interagency accountability;

Detective Ruelas is currently available to Haven Women's Center and the District Attorney's Office and is co-located full-time at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center through the Cal OES grant to make interagency accountability easier. He directs the DVRT meetings and attends monthly domestic violence meetings with the DA's Office, DV Court personnel, law enforcement, and service providers and hosts Domestic Violence High Risk meetings on a monthly basis. He is also a member of the SFJC's Multi-Disciplinary Team.

7) Work in close cooperation with victim advocacy personnel.

Detective Ruelas has excellent working relationships with victim advocates at both Haven and the District Attorney's Office through his current work on the DVRT.

8) Investigators assigned to the specialized unit must have at least an intermediate Commission on Police Officer Standards and Training (POST) certificate and have received specialized training beyond the academy level, related to the investigation of domestic violence crimes, in accordance with Penal Code Sections 13516-13519 et al. Investigators must be assigned to the specialized unit for a minimum of one year; longer assignments are desirable."

Detective Ruelas has been a police officer for 16 years. <u>He currently possesses both</u> Intermediate and Advanced P.O.S.T. certificates.

Detective Steven Anderson has a B.A. in Criminal Justice and has been with Modesto Police Department his entire career since July 2000. Promoted to Detective in September of 2009. Assigned to the Special Victim's Unit (SVU) as a Detective in 2010 through present. Domestic Violence and SVU are one unit, however Det. Anderson only works DV cases. Prior to this assignment, he worked crimes against children, sexual assaults, elder abuse, and human trafficking. He is currently a member of the Domestic Violence Response Team (Specialized Unit) funded through LE13.

c. <u>Describe the department's experience working with victim services providers in the</u> <u>community</u>

The Sheriff's Department has established partnerships with Haven Women's Center and the District Attorney's Victim/Witness Program. Currently, the Sheriff's Department has Detective Jesse Ruelas co-located full-time at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center (SFJC) as the lead investigator for the DVRT currently funded through Cal-OES LE13. Haven has a full-time Domestic Violence Victims Advocate co-located at the SFJC as a member of the DVRT. The DA's Office has their Victim Advocate serving as a member of the DVRT in-kind.

The Sheriff's Department, District Attorney's Office, and Modesto Police Department have a current Operational Agreement with Haven Women's Center for the Domestic Violence Response Team (DVRT) through the current Cal-OES grant. All members of the DVRT are founding members of the Stanislaus County Family & Domestic Violence Coordinating Council, established in the mid-1990's to provide effective coordination between agencies for individuals affected by family and domestic violence and abuse; and prevention, intervention and treatment techniques accomplished through education, research and data collection.





OPERATIONAL AGREEMENT

This Operational Agreement stands as evidence that the STANISLAUS COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Modesto Police Department, Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office, and Stanislaus Family Justice Center intend to work together toward the mutual goal of providing maximum available assistance for domestic violence crime victims residing in Stanislaus County. The agencies believe that implementation of the Law Enforcement Specialized Units Program application, as described herein, will further this goal. To this end, each agency agrees to participate in the program, if selected for funding, by coordinating/providing the following services:

STANISLAUS COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT will closely coordinate the following services with Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Modesto Police Department, Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office, and Stanislaus Family Justice Center through:

- Project staff from each agency listed above will be readily available to the STANISLAUS COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT for service provision by creating a specialized unit to provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children. The specialized unit will accomplish this purpose through thorough investigation, immediate victim advocacy, training for local law enforcement officers and the development of effective protocols and practices that will continue after the grant cycle has ended.
 - o Specifically: 1.0 FTE Domestic Violence Counselor (Victim Advocate) from Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus (funded 100% through Cal OES LE14 grant process) will provide immediate in-person response to requests for advocacy on a 24-hour basis (Haven will have an on-call after hours advocate respond to requests between 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. Monday - Friday and on the weekends) The advocate will provide consultation, resource materials and outreach materials to the applicant for the purpose of assisting officers and other relevant law enforcement employees. The advocate will assist with the development and/or revision of officer and advocate protocols for responding to victims of domestic violence and their children, assist with the training of officers on responding to victims of domestic violence and their children, and serve as a point of contact with the applicant for developing and initiating mechanisms of interagency accountability. The advocate will meet the requirements of a "domestic violence counselor" pursuant to Evidence Code 1037.1(a)(1). Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus is Stanislaus County's Cal OES-funded Domestic Violence Assistance (DV) Program and Cal OES-funded Rape Crisis Program.

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- Specifically: One full-time dedicated investigator (not a F 1 E) from Stanislaus 0 County Sheriff's Department (funded 90% through Cal OES LE14 grant process, 10% through other sources) will provide investigative and coordinating duties for the specialized unit during the grant period. The investigator must: review arrest and preliminary investigation reports to evaluate cases and provide supplemental reports for issues requiring further investigation within 48 hours of the arrest; gather and document evidence including witness statements, the identities of all children in the home, previous incidents of domestic violence and violent crimes, as well as civil restraining order information from the California Law Enforcement Telecommunication System (CLETS) system; assist with the development of protocols for ensuring consistent and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders in order to ensure victim safety; oversee the completion of domestic violence case follow-up requests or evidence requests from the Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office; provide consultation and resources for officers, and other relevant personnel employed by Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department and Modesto Police Department, on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques; serve as a point of contact with Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus and the domestic violence counselor (victim advocate) for developing and initiating mechanisms of interagency accountability; and work in close cooperation with victim advocacy personnel.
- Specifically: Modesto Police Department will provide a Domestic Violence Detective at 0.50 FTE dedicated (in-kind match funded through General Fund) and <u>Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office</u> will provide a .25 FTE DA Investigator to the specialized unit (funded 0.05 FTE through Cal OES LE14 grant process, 0.20 FTE through other sources) and 1.0 FTE Victim/Witness Advocate (Cal OES-funded Victim/Witness Assistance Program).
- Specifically: Stanislaus Family Justice Center will provide a 0.40 FTE Respite Child Care Provider (funded 0.40 FTE LE 14, 0.30 FTE LE15, and 0.25 FTE LE16; with remaining FTE funded through other sources during LE15 and LE16) to provide quality therapeutic care for children and youth exposed to and/or victims of domestic violence, providing services and support to victims of domestic violence and their children, reducing barriers a victims may have to receiving services from the co-located members of the specialized unit at the Stanislaus Family Justice Center. He/she will create and maintain a safe environment for children, engaging them in therapeutic play; offering crisis counseling designed to address trauma; and organize children's activities that facilitate social/emotional growth, enhance development, foster trust, and promote positive social behaviors.
- Specifically: Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Modesto Police Department, Stanislaus Family Justice Center, and Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office will collaborate as a team to provide training to law enforcement officers, and other relevant department personnel, on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques. The training will also provide officers responding to domestic violence calls with practical references and resources that can be used to assist victims. The training will at

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least cover: the dynamics of power and control in violence against victims of domestic violence, understanding the concept of the dominant aggressor, and crime scene investigation. Training will be conducted by POST-certified instructors and provided to as many officers as possible.

- o Specifically: Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, Haven Women's Center of Stanislaus, Modesto Police Department, Stanislaus Family Justice Center, and Stanislaus County District Attorney's Office will collaborate as a team to develop and enhance protocols for responding to victims of domestic violence and their children. The protocols will include (at a minimum): the responsibilities of the officers responding to domestic violence calls including, but not limited to, how and when to contact the domestic violence victim advocate; the roles and responsibilities of the victim advocate in addressing the needs of victims as well as the needs and concerns of officers; a clearly enforceable method of interagency accountability to address concerns and conflicts raised by either the law enforcement agency or the domestic violence service provider; and a long-term plan for sustaining an effective domestic violence response unit after the grant cycle has expired.
- Specifically: <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u>, <u>Haven Women's Center of</u> <u>Stanislaus</u>, <u>Modesto Police Department</u>, and <u>Stanislaus County District Attorney's</u> <u>Office will co-locate their members of the specialized unit at the <u>Stanislaus</u> <u>Family Justice Center</u>. The members of the team will be provided reasonable work space to allow for co-location of responders, which will foster positive relationships amongst the team members and enhance their efforts to provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children in Stanislaus County.

- Regularly scheduled meetings will be held weekly by members of the specialized unit representing <u>Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department</u>, <u>Haven Women's Center of</u> <u>Stanislaus</u>, <u>Modesto Police Department</u>, <u>Stanislaus Family Justice Center</u>, and <u>Stanislaus</u> <u>County District Attorney's Office</u> to discuss strategies, time tables, and implementation of mandated services.

Unless otherwise indicated, this agreement is in effect from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017.
