2019 HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE FACILITY COLLECTION (TOTAL OF 703,850 POUNDS)








The Supervisory Control And Data Acquisition (SCADA) system at the flare station was replaced/upgraded to include the ability for management to remote view and control the flare system. The ability to view and control the system remotely is a great benefit to management during shutdowns, when less experienced staff respond to the auto dialer callout.




The Landfill recently purchased a new Vibratory Roller, replacing a 1991 (Tier 1) Vibratory Roller, with a (Tier 4) modern equivalent. The Vibratory Roller is used to compact cover soil, creating a flat area for vehicles to drive and back up on.



Implementation of a covered load program began July 1, 2019. This program charges customers the cost of the tarp (currently \$5), if they come in with their load uncovered. This program helps to prevent litter from blowing out of the vehicle, while in route to the landfill. The results are above.







Completed Landfill-2 Cell-6 construction project which has created an additional 5 years of landfilling capacity for municipal solid waste.





Landfill crews responded to approximately <u>1,435</u> illegal dumpsite reports and picked up approximately <u>670</u> tons of refuse. Roadside clean up crews collected <u>2,190</u> illegally dumped tires.



Fink Road Landfill received two Ford F-250 trucks which help mobilize staff around site, as well as to transport staff and materials to the closed Geer Road Landfill for maintenance activities.

Milk and Dairy

Stanislaus County has 177 cow, 7 goat and 4 sheep diaries. This is the same number of dairies as in 2018, however, 10 dairies canceled permits and 10 permits were issued.

Federal inspection: Interstate Milk Shippers (IMS) inspection is performed every 2 years by a state inspector who is trained by the Food and Drug Administration to inspect a random selection from Stanislaus County. This month 36 dairies were drawn out of a hat and inspected using criteria from the Pasteurized Milk Ordinance (PMO) that Stanislaus County adopted last year. The dairies are scored in 2 categories: Condition and Enforcement. The Condition portion is how the dairies are producing milk in a sanitary condition with regards to cleanliness, protection from contamination, water and chemical protection. The Enforcement portion is how we handled issues on the dairies, being able to identify violations, correcting the violations in a timely manner, taking samples of milk and water in the timeframes outlined in the PMO. We passed with a Condition score of 95 and an Enforcement score of 99. Our last inspection in 2017 was a Condition score of 95 and an Enforcement score of 98.

Stanislaus collaborated with Tulare and Sonoma Counties in sharing program best practices during 2019

Starting July 1, 2019, the County issued new permits to all dairies that must be posted in the milk house,

along with the most resent score sheet.



On April 12, 2019, Stanislaus County assisted in an illegal milk/ alcohol undercover operation with the CDFA Milk Branch Special investigations unit, Alcohol Beverage Control, Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department, Stanislaus County Animal Control, Code Enforcement, and Environmental Health. Milk was being milked out of a cow and a goat into a cup, mixed with tequila, and some spices. The mixture was then sold to the undercover agents. Later the undercover agents purchased some illegal cheese. Since the occupants didn't have a permit to sell alcohol or dairy products, the owner of the property was cited with a felony.

Mandatory Commercial Recycling AB 341

Since implementation of AB 341 in 2011, we currently realize a 94% compliance rate for qualifying businesses and multi-family complexes. Outreach and education efforts will continue through 2020 and beyond.

2019 Accomplishments

- Switched computer antivirus security to CrowdStrike and started using spotlight software to ensure software compliance with updates.
- Relocated Parks and Recreation staff hardware and completed the separation of information systems from Environmental Resources.
- Installed a new Virtual Machine software from VMware creating multiple virtual servers using a single physical server.
- Procured newer mobile phones that will get software updates and installing Microsoft Intune for management purposes.
- Purchased a new air conditioner for the server room to maintain appropriate temperature and prevent system overheating.
- Setup faster internet connection at the Fink road Landfill using a Virtual Private Network with a Next Generation Firewall to quickly encrypt traffic back to corporate.
- Information Technology staff responded to 834 help desk tickets for the year of 2019.
